This novel is about a boy named Moose Flanagan who lives with his family on Alcatraz Island in the San Francisco bay. He is 12 years old, and he lives in the Island because his father is a guard. Soon after, he finds out that the civilians on Alcatraz are going to have a huge banquet because the person who caught Al Capone is coming to the island. A few days before the banquet, Natalie is coming to Alcatraz as well. However, when Moose and his friends are helping Natalie unpack, they find a bar spreader used to spread prison bars. This arouses the kids' suspicion, and they throw the bar spreader into the Bay. A few days later, all of the things that could go wrong on Alcatraz seem to go wrong, and the kids have to fix everything without being caught by the adults.

This book was a fun read, full of facts and action, and I would recommend this book as a gift to anyone in middle school. I also liked the trivia section in the end of the book, because this showed the real information that was the basis for this book.
