Alan Davilla arranged a special treat for us to begin the year. Alan works at Aerocrafters, where they specialize in restoring warbirds and other military aircraft. They are located at the Santa Rosa Airport and are owned by Steve Penning and Lynn Hunt. Aerocrafters opened in January 1992, and have grown to occupy nearly 50,000 square feet of hanger, shop and storage space.

Aircraft restored or worked on at Aerocrafters include: HU-16, PBY-5A, Sea Fury, T-6, T-28, B-25, A-26, BT-13, PT-13/PT-17, P-51, P-63, Provost, Strikemaster, Folland Gnat, F8F, MiG-15, MiG-17, PZL TS-11, Aero L-39, F9F-5, Yak-3, Yak-52, MaxHolste Broussard, Nanchang CJ-6, Taylorcraft L-2, Stinson L-5, L-18, Fairchild 24, Cessna UC-

The main hanger was dominated by two B-25s. The one in the foreground is in flying condition and open for us to explore. Also on the floor were a P-51D (now completed, flown and shipped to it's owner in France!), L-39 Albatross (now flying), MiG-17 and Sea Fury. Those in a disassembled state offered an opportunity to photograph some unusual details.
