Syllabus Thomas Nelson Community College (TNCC) HMS 171- Advancing Youth Development Summer 2019

Advancing Youth Development (AYD) is a 3-credit **blended and accelerated course**, 50% face-to-face (f2f) and 50% online) with specific learning objectives. In order to meet the 45-hour course requirements of AYD, you will be expected to:

- attend 7 hours of f2f class time on Thursday, July18, 9am-5pm
- attend 7 hours of f2f class time on Thursday, August 1, 9am-5pm
- attend 7 hours of f2f class time on Thursday, August 15, 9am-5pm
- complete final 24 hours of independent online study that includes the final examination and Theory to Practice paper due Thursday, August 22, 5pm

NOTE: If you are unable to attend all f2f class dates, register for a future class.

Course Description

Provides overview of principles of youth development research and the impact on the youth work field. Credits: 3 semester hours. Part of Career Studies Certificate in Youth Development.

Course Objectives

Students will be able to:

- Identify and explore personal view of youth work and assertions of youth development
- Explore current research regarding the impact of adolescent brain development on physical, cognitive, emotional, social, sexual, and spiritual developmental youth outcomes
- Identify internal and external developmental assets which contribute to developmental youth outcomes
- Identify services, opportunities and supports that promote developmental youth outcomes
- Identify the knowledge, skills and personal attributes of successful youth workers
- Explore core competencies needed for effective facilitation and management of group learning
- Identify common cultural assumptions and stereotypes that adults hold about young people, where they come from, and how they affect the practice of youth work
- Identify five forms of adultism and alternate caring behaviors to address cultural assumptions
- Identify barriers to and strategies for engaging youth
- Identify and assess best program practices that reflect exemplary youth work
- Identify guidelines for institutionalizing the youth development approach into organizational practice
