

The Inside Story . . .

³⁴ At three o'clock Jesus cried out with a loud voice, "Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?" which means, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" (Mark 15:34)

My God, why have you forsaken me? The pathos and angst in that cry send chills up the spine. To be God-forsaken is to be in the place of desolation, emptiness, barrenness, anguish, and hopelessness. The question of "why . . . why God . . . why have you forsaken me?" is the expression of a heart torn by loss. It is the cry of a mother as she holds her lifeless child. It is there behind the choked back tears of a husband at night after they've buried his wife. It is seen in the eyes of one who looks in the mirror after hearing the word CANCER at the doctor's office. It is the only words in the silence that can be formed in the mind when the unthinkable happens and the evils of life — death, disease, tragedy, agony, and loss — have drained the life and love of God from our lives and we are left kneeling in the void and emptiness that remains.

The people of God often ask God "why" in the midst of faith. The psalmists in Scripture question God's goodness and doubt God's sovereignty, but yet they still contain a shard of trust, a glimmer of hope. But when God leaves the building, when the Lord abandons, then there is no flicker of light and no foothold to trust. All is darkness where there is no faith to see by and when hope has been trampled by desolation and lies dead in the dust.

I speak of the abandonment of God from a human perspective because it is real and profound and some have been there who have not yet found a way out of the blankness. Yet more significant still must be depth and suffering of Jesus' soul when He cried, "My God, My God, why have You forsaken Me?" It sounds like a question but it is really a statement. It is the definition of the cross of Christ. It is what He prayed would not happen when He begged for the cup to pass. It is the culmination of Son of God's walk upon this earth. One of the earliest hymns of the church says

Though He was in the form of God, He did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied Himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, He humbled Himself and became obedient to the point of death— even death on a cross. (Philippians 2:6-8)

Even as we marvel at the "emptying" that took place at the incarnation when God became flesh and blood and laid helpless in a manger, we stand speechless in the incomprehensiveness of that abandonment Jesus experienced on the cross. Yet as surely as He was called "Jesus" to save the people at His birth, He would hang on the cross to be forsaken by God. And Paul tells us why. For our sake, God made Jesus to became sin [to take on the rebellion and hatred and all that is bad and wrong that we have done and do] Who knew no sin [this good and obedient and faithful Jesus] that we could be made the righteousness of God [in a right relationship — forgiven by and restored to and belonging with God] in Christ Jesus (2 Corinthians 5:21). He was abandoned by God for us.

"My God, why have you forsaken me" is still a prayer, a broken prayer of a broken heart. But it is a prayer God hears. From the depth of the cross, Jesus feels that prayer. From the darkness of the tomb, Jesus hears that prayer. And in His resurrection, He answers that prayer by declaring that we are never abandoned. He is with us . . . Always and ever. He can fill our hearts and heal us.

SCRIPTURES

Psalm 22:1-13

- ¹ My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?
 - Why are you so far from helping me, from the words of my groaning?
- ² O my God, I cry by day, but you do not answer; and by night, but find no rest.
- ³ Yet you are holy, enthroned on the praises of Israel.
- ⁴ In you our ancestors trusted; they trusted, and you delivered them.
- ⁵ To you they cried, and were saved; in you they trusted, and were not put to shame.
- ⁶ But I am a worm, and not human; <u>scorned by others, and despised by the people.</u>
- ⁷ All who see me mock at me; they make mouths at me, they shake their heads;

- ¹³ they open wide their mouths at me, like a ravening and roaring lion.

Mark 15:25-36

²⁵ It was nine o'clock in the morning when they crucified him. ²⁶ The inscription of the charge against him read, "The King of the Jews." ²⁷ And with him they crucified two bandits, one on his right and one on his left. ²⁹ Those who passed by derided him, shaking their heads and saying, "Aha! You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, ³⁰ save yourself, and come down from the cross!" ³¹ In the same way the chief priests, along with the scribes, were also mocking him among themselves and saying, "He saved others; he cannot save himself. ³² Let the Messiah, the King of Israel, come down from the cross now, so that we may see and believe." Those who were crucified with him also taunted him.

³³ When it was noon, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. ³⁴ At three o'clock <u>Jesus cried out with a loud voice</u>, "<u>Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?</u>" which means, "<u>My God, my God, why have you forsaken me</u>?" ³⁵ When some of the bystanders heard it, they said, "Listen, he is calling for Elijah." ³⁶ And someone ran, filled a sponge with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink, saying, "Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to take him down."
