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# Greetings to the Saints of St. Mark,

<sup>5</sup> The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. (John 1:5)

Wasn't the eclipse something? I hope you had a chance to see it. It was truly an amazing event in God's creation. Now, I'm not going to say it was a spiritual event, but it was spectacular. And it did underscore something very important about our life in God.

Someone asked me why it didn't get completely dark. During an eclipse, the moon moves in front of the sun and effectively blocks the sunlight that would directly fall on the earth. For those of us in Greenwood, SC who were in the direct path of the moon's movement in front of the sun,

we experienced "the totality" (the total effect of the moon's blockage of the sun's light). But even "the totality" wasn't total. Those of us that saw it together commented on how it was kind of "8:30 PM in the summer" kind of dark but not pitch black. The reason is, of course, the sun's light is greater than the moon's ability to stop it.

You see, the sun sends its light out in all directions. The moon cut off the direct sunlight available from the front but there was all the other sunlight that kept going from the sides, the top and the bottom, and from behind. The eclipse kept the sun from being as bright as it could be but by no means did it shut the light out completely.

Along the same lines, while there is not complete darkness during an eclipse, the moon is completely black. Thankfully this is not normally the case or our night would be so dark. The moon shows its light second hand. It reflects the sun's light. It has not light in itself but depends on the sun's light for its light. When the moon gets in front of the sun, it can no longer reflect the sun's light. We see the moon's darkness when the sun cannot shine upon it. Does anyone notice a parable that God's creation seems to be telling us during an eclipse?

John's gospel describes Jesus as the "Light of the World." In his prologue, John tells us that this light, this Christ, comes into the world yet there are those in the world that would seek to blot out that light. We see the persons like the Pharisees trying to fight His light by their words and actions. We see the demonic realm push back against His light as He exposed and removed their darkness. Perhaps, there is no more dramatic illustration of this than when Jesus was executed on the cross. Then he was buried in the tomb and the great stone rolled in place. The Light of the World, the Son of God, was hidden behind the stone in that tomb. But it was only an eclipse. The Son did rise and His light overcame the darkness. Darkness cannot overcome the Light of the World. His Light is always stronger!

This same "parable of the eclipse" also reveals something of our lives as Christ-followers. Just as the moon depends on the sun for its light, we depend on Christ. We are not the light of the world; we reflect His light. When we come between others and Jesus by our hurtful actions, judgmental words, or less than pleasant and helpful behavior, we block Christ's light from shining in the world. We effectively eclipse God's love from shining by getting in the way of God's love and blocking its rays. Most of us know something of how dark we can be without God's light and love shining on us. Yet, when we do this faithfully in our words and actions, our attitudes and lives, we reflect His light. We aren't hindrances but reflections.

The eclipse reminds us that the sun is bigger than the moon and, ultimately, far more powerful. And the natural place for the moon is reflecting its light, not blocking it. It's what it was made for. I wonder, how are we doing at what we were made for?

Let me just say it has been a busy summer for our church and for many of our families. We have seen a new Senior Pastor arrive, Rev. Steve Brown. We have seen a great VBS with over 350 children in attendance. We saw our people go and support five different Salkehatchie camps, including all the work our people did to serve at Emerald City Salk. I could go on and on about what you did through all of those and what we have seen God doing in the lives of those people involved. It truly is amazing watching all of it. I want to tell you about the big project at our Coronaca Campus, The Connection.

We have been working on a partnership with Rice Elementary School; it is the closest Elementary school to our Coronaca Campus. The goal is to help the staff at Rice Elementary to carry out their mission to educate and care for children. We are trying to help them

by serving, giving, praying, and building relationships at Rice Elementary so that we can show them the love of Christ. Rice Elementary has 530 students, 75 staff, plus all the district employees and parents we can impact by serving there. Let me share with you some of what we have been doing over the summer. We sorted and delivered all the books to the classrooms. Several of our people painted a new school logo and several other college logos throughout the main halls. We delivered gift bags to the staff and personalized gift buckets with school "stuff" to the teachers and aids. Every gift had a handwritten note saying that they and their school had been prayed for. We held a prayer walk at the school one night before the teachers reported. It was great to look around and see a few people from every service and campus represented as we were giving our instructions. We also fed the whole staff the last day before students reported. Several of us have been on campus since classes started back helping as the new school year has begun. A personal highlight for me was helping one of the kindergarten classes during the eclipse. I was able to help those kids see what God was doing, and keep them safe. Yes, I am still smiling about that afternoon.

How will this partnership progress? We invited the entire staff to come and worship with us Sunday, August 27, so that we may pray for them and the school year. We are working with the administration to provide opportunities to help children: mentoring, eating lunch, helping with special activities, reading, or listening to the children read. Plus, we will offer encouragement through activities for the staff, and we will meet the needs of children as we go throughout the year.

People ask me how this will impact the school and the community. I don't know the exact outcome. What I do know is that when we walk into that school with our tee shirts on, people already know who we are even if it's our first time there. I know people are talking about what is happening. I received a note from a church member and teacher at Rice. I want you to hear two sentences from that note about the impact so far and what is to come.

> "Dear Pastor John & Connection Members, ... The teachers have been saying wonderful things about how much we are showing God's love....I look forward to watching God's work!"

What I know is that by people going and serving and giving of themselves, we are seeing people receiving the love of Christ and opening up to that love. It is going to be a fun school year watching God work!

A man went to the doctor and said he wanted to live to be 100. The doctor said, "Well, give up anything you enjoy; do not eat any meat, have nothing to do with women, do not eat any sweets, go to bed early, get up early, work hard, and take no vacations." The man said, "Will I live to be 100 then?" The doctor said, "Not necessarily, but it will certainly seem like it!"

I wrote briefly about this in last month's newsletter, but I think it's important, and I don't think we take it seriously.

Deuteronomy 5:12-15 "Observe the Sabbath day by keeping it holy, as the Lord your God has commanded you. You have six days each week for your ordinary work, but the seventh day is a Sabbath day of rest dedicated to the Lord your God. On that day no one in

daughters, your male and female servants, your oxen and donkeys and other livestock, and any foreigners living among you. All your male and female servants must rest as you do. Remember that you were once slaves in Egypt, but the Lord your God brought you out with his strong hand and powerful arm. That is why the Lord your God has commanded you to rest on the Sabbath day.'

"Remember the Sabbath day - keep it holy." This is the one commandment that we think it's okay to break. As a pastor, Sunday can't be my Sabbath day - I have to work. As a bi -vocational pastor, I'm working Monday-Friday as well. Saturday is my Sabbath day. Asking me to work on Saturday is equivalent to asking me to cheat on my wife. It's that important.

Why is it that you can't get everything done you need to get done in 6 days? In 2015, Chick-Fil-A had \$6.8 billion in sales nationwide. As a franchise, they added 100 new restaurants nationwide in 2015. And they're closed on Sundays. Chick-Fil-A is not #1, but they do come in ahead of Pizza Hut, Panera Bread, Domino's Pizza, Chipotle, Sonic, KFC, Carl's Jr./ Hardee's, Arby's, Dairy Queen, Little Caesars, Jack in the Box, Popeyes Louisiana Kitchen, Papa John's, Panda Express, Jimmy John's Sandwiches, Whataburger, Zaxby's, Five Guys, Culver's, Bojangles', Steak n Shake, Papa Murphy's, Church's Chicken, Wingstop, Checkers/ Rally's, Qdoba Mexican Eats, El Pollo Loco, Krispy Kreme, Del Taco, Tim Hortons, White Castle, Jersey Mike's Subs, Firehouse Subs, Jason's Deli, Moe's Southwest Grill, Boston Market, In-N-Out Burger, Baskin-Robbins, McAlister's Deli, Captain D's, Auntie Anne's, & Jamba Juice.

Chick-Fil-A is topped only by McDonald's, Starbucks, Subway, Burger King, Taco Bell, Wendy's, and Dunkin' Donuts. And if you look at average sales per individual restaurant, no one touches Chick-Fil-A. It's not even close. How do they do this? How are they wiping the floor with the competition working only 6 days a week while everyone else is working 7? From Chick-Fil-A's website: "Our founder, Truett Cathy, made the decision to close on Sundays in 1946 when he opened his first restaurant in Hapeville, Georgia. Having worked seven days a week in restaurants open 24 hours, Truett saw the importance of closing on Sundays so that he and his employees could set aside one day to rest and worship if they choose - a practice we uphold today.

It doesn't make any logical sense. I don't think there's a magical formula. I don't think Chick-Fil-A has some secret they aren't telling anyone. But I do think it's the principal of rest. Rest gives you a chance to reflect, to reset, and to refocus on what's important.
