

While I realize I am getting "older" it is easier for me to see the Journey of Life. I can look back and there is a long path I have taken. I can see now the different curves that make it such a winding way. It's my journey and with the older part I can see it more clearly. I can see the ups and the downs. I can see the bright times and the dark times. I was reflecting the other day while I was paddling around on my kayak about some of those turns along the way. I found myself going back to my favorite Psalm and ultimately preaching to myself.

Psalm 84 (NIV)

¹ How lovely is your dwelling place, Lord Almighty! ² My soul yearns, even faints, for the courts of the Lord; my heart and my flesh cry out for the living God. ³ Even the sparrow has found a home, and the swallow a nest for herself, where she may have her young - a place near your altar, Lord Almighty, my King and my God. ⁴ Blessed are those who dwell in your house; they are ever praising you. ⁵ Blessed are those whose strength is in you, whose hearts are set on pilgrimage. ⁶ As they pass through the Valley of Baka, they make it a place of springs; the autumn rains also cover it with pools. ⁷ They go from strength to strength, till each appears before God in Zion. ⁸ Hear my prayer, Lord God Almighty; listen to me, God of Jacob. ⁹ Look on our shield, O God; look with favor on your anointed one. ¹⁰ Better is one day in your courts than a thousand elsewhere; I would rather be a doorkeeper in the house of my God than dwell in the tents of the wicked. ¹¹ For the Lord God is a sun and shield; the Lord bestows favor and honor; no good thing does he withhold from those whose walk is blameless. ¹² Lord Almighty, blessed is the one who trusts in you.

A poet I am not, just ask Kay; but this Psalm says a lot to me and many times for me I miss part of it, if I am not careful. In middle verses, 5-7 David says we are set on a journey that will have many a difficult time. The "Valley of Baka" is a very difficult place, dry, rocky a hard place. Kind of sounds like some of the paths we walk in our own journey. Then David says God provides that which is precious to us along the way, in this case water. Water was and still is a precious thing in the Middle East but if we are not careful we will not realize where it came from. Then David points out that many times we strive, struggle, crawl just trying to move forward along our journey; then and only then sometimes do we find ourselves face to face before God. Those places of strength came from Him. Those places we found safety and renewal came from Him. Then I find myself before a Holy God. Then I can proclaim I just want to be with God no matter what. If you are finding yourself in a difficult spot along the journey of life take a moment to look around you might see better God is with you and from there you can praise Him even in the difficult places along the Journey.




