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Greetings to the Saints of St. Mark,

57 As they were going along the road, someone said to him, "I will follow you wherever you go." 58 And Jesus said to him, "Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests; but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head." 59 To another he said, "Follow me." But he said, "Lord, first let me go and bury my father." 60 But Jesus said to him, "Let the dead bury their own dead; but as for you, go and proclaim the kingdom of God." 61 Another said, "I will follow you, Lord; but let me first say farewell to those at my home." 62 Jesus said to him, "No one who puts a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God." (Luke 9:57-62)



One thing that is clear about following Jesus is that He does not want us to get distracted. As someone has said, "The main thing is the keep the main thing the main thing." During His ministry, Jesus was at work to help His followers be able to focus on what's important. He told His followers there are lots of commandments but two stand out – love God with everything you've got and in every area of your life and love your neighbor (those near you) as yourself. One might add the Golden rule as a simple expression of how to love our neighbor as ourselves. Jesus came teaching the Kingdom of God, carrying out the work of the Kingdom of God and taught His followers to pray that the Kingdom of God would continue to come. Of course, He not only said to pray for God's Kingdom come and His will to be done on earth but to do the work of the Kingdom as well. Even as Jesus ascended to heaven after His resurrection, He gave them their commission, that as they go through life they are to make disciples by teaching people to obey what He taught them. When we do what Jesus said and love the way Jesus loved, then God is honored and His Kingdom comes to us and through us in the world. This is the main thing that Jesus was doing and teaching -- to allow the Kingdom of God to be released in the world – and Jesus does not want His disciples to get distracted with lesser things.

The FOCUS Committee of our church spent the last year looking at St. Mark UMC to see if we could find a way to help our church be about God's Kingdom work in our each of our lives, in our church, and through our church. This is important, because we realize we are one church, but that we assemble at three campuses. Moreover, we have four worship experiences of which we are a part. We also counted up the number of activities we offer folks to be involved in, and there are over eighty-five. This means we have a lot going on in lots of places with lots of people. This is the perfect recipe for distraction! So we have been at work to simplify our understanding of our mission and find the markers that will help us in our journey with God and for God as His church with a Kingdom mission. We are to leave a mark for Jesus Christ by staying close, connected and hopeful with God, one another, and our communities. This description of St. Mark UMC's mission is simple but not simplistic or necessarily easy. Our mission has movement, as we stay close, connected, and hopeful. As God seeks to love us back to Him, our mission moves us further and deeper in the three relationships that God calls us to: with Him, with one another as the church, and with the community and the world. You'll be hearing more about this soon.

It is easy for a church to get distracted, because a church is people, and people can get distracted. The passage above indicates that people want security, have obligations, and need relationships. These are all important. But they can also be distractions – good things keeping us from the best. Jesus says the life of the Kingdom, its love, grace, hope, service, forgiveness, and God's activity in our lives is the main thing. And when the main thing is the main thing, everything else finds its place as well. There's Kingdom work to be done as we follow Jesus – let's get after it!

In pursuit of Holiness

I have spent a good bit of time studying particular parts the Wesleyan Movement over the past few months and how our Methodist past impacts where we are today as a church. When we take the time to look back I believe it can be a helpful guide for us as we navigate both our individual walk with Christ and the path for the church as well. One of the most important things I have studied has been the importance John Wesley placed on individual Holiness. This idea can be seen running throughout our Methodist history all the way to our mission stated by the church today; "to make disciples of Christ for the transformation of the world". If we are to transform the world that means individuals will have to be

transformed as well and that looks like holiness. The theme of holiness is part of our DNA.

The church or England in many ways had become an institution, built for the establishment; that was just grinding along without seeing much change in the people of the church. "The summer of 1738 John Wesley was preaching "Salvation by Faith" and the church and England as a whole was introduced to a force with a new concern for renewal, both individual and institutional." Wesley while experiencing his own spiritual renewal saw faith was not for a particular people and ultimately required individual faith and transformation of that individual along their spiritual journey. While some would protest that Wesley taught a works based salvation, a clear reading of his teaching is that both the works, and other spiritual disciplines were a response to God's grace.

Wesley formed religious societies, made up of smaller classes, "to promote real holiness of heat and life." The practice of the societies was to meet regularly to encourage one another in practical holiness. They gathered together to help each other grow in their faith, hold each other accountable, to do live together. They asked each other how is it with your soul? What are you hearing from God? How are you living out your faith and serving those less fortunate than yourself. This is our Wesleyan DNA that we should be on a spiritual journey with Christ living and experiencing sanctifying, perfecting grace living a life of holiness. I have been asking myself how can I live into this pursuit of holiness as I continue my spiritual journey. I wonder are you willing to ask the same question living into your spiritual DNA?

Warm Your Body and Soul

Bundle up - it's cold outside! Now that the temperatures are dropping below freezing it's the time of year to warm up with a good cup of something hot to drink. And don't just warm your body with say, a hot cup of tea - warm your soul. Find a quiet spot, prepare the tea and read Scripture - yeah, the Bible - yeah, by yourself. It will not only warm your body and soul - it will refuel your faith, hope and love. Begin reading the stories of Jesus in the Gospel of John and pray, asking God to give you a fresh insight. I recommend reading a new translation for

the New Year like - THE VOICE - it's written in today's language. Reading Scripture with a warm drink is a pattern I began years ago - just don't begin like I did.

We were living in England, in the Chelsea area on Oakland Avenue. (Recently, I found the little house we lived in on Google Earth - I could not believe it was still standing!) One day, when it was cold outside, I took a red double-decker bus to an English Tea House near Piccadilly Circus and ordered a hot cup of tea. Now that I was in the 8th grade, I thought it was pretty cool to order a cup of tea in London by myself, but it didn't turn out as I had planned. The British are known for their tea around the world. I asked for a cup of tea with lemon and a biscuit - they call cookies "biscuits" in England. And they always prepare a cup of tea by first putting in milk before pouring the tea from a pot. After I was served, I added a dollop of honey and lemon, stirring the cup. But before I took a sip, I noticed the milk in the tea was sour. I called over my server and complained. She apologized in a beautiful English accent and brought me another cup. Again, I added the lemon and honey, but called back the server complaining, the milk was still sour. "Oi," she shouted in a not so pretty accent, "what you doin, Mate. The lemon is souring the milk!" Young and naive, I high-tailed it out of there - learning basic chemistry the hard way! To this day, whenever I prepare a hot cup of tea - I remember my embarrassing gaffe in London. Maybe that's why I recommend having a "quiet-time" - alone!






