BUSINESS MEETING MINUTES—October 10, 2017

Meeting was called to order at 10:04 am by President, Patty Gates.

Greeter: Denise Meese reported we had six visitors today and some of them joined. Hello to Tammy MacArthur who is visiting today. **Hospitality**: Carole Elsbree announced the treats were provided by LaWanda Richardson, Kathy Greenleaf, Yvonne Brown and LaVelle Wallace. **"Thinking of You's"**: Louise Yoshihara's son is doing better. **Minutes**: The minutes from the September 9, 2017 Business Meeting, were motioned, seconded and approved with no corrections. **Announcements**: Patty is working on scheduling a Board Meeting for 10/20; she will confirm by email if it is a go. Sandy Schmidgall is still filling positions for next year; some were filled at today's meeting. Call her if you are interested in a position. Sandy Mahnken is trying to schedule the tour of the Children's Center again. She is looking at Friday, Nov 3, (12 - 1:30) as the date for the tour. Call her if you are interested. **Program**: Kate Macmillan introduced Katie Pederson from Seattle as our guest speaker. She spoke about the book "Quilting Modern" she co-authored. She grew up in Michigan and her mother was always involved in crafts. She also lived in Flagstaff, AZ. She showed a lot of quilts using colors from her stash. Her backings are often flannel and/or leftover pieces of fabric. She starts with a theory/plan (strip piecing or using 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ "or 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " squares) and just starts placing them on her design wall and a quilt is born.

Break

Treasurer's Report: Mindy Wolfman the Checking Account balance is \$12,900 and the Savings Account has \$6100, of which \$4400 is reserved for the next retreat in 2020. The Treasurer's report was motioned, seconded and approved with no corrections. Dues are being collected for next year and will be collected at the next two meetings. This year fees will not be collected at the Holiday Party (causes too much confusion). The fee remains at \$35. Two things are done to complete your membership: 1) Fill out a new membership form, and 2) Pay the \$35 fee. Membership: Sally Wilson reported we have about 150 members. Your membership card can be picked up in January. Communications and Website: Louise will update the membership form online, Program: Kate MacMillan informed us the November Business Meeting will feature Jean Wells, owner of The Stitchin' Post. Education: Bill Fellows (from Cynthia's) will speak about presser feet for your sewing machine at the next Education Meeting at B.J.'s Quilt Basket. Sunriver Quilt Show: No report. Sisters Quilt Show: The question was asked by the membership what the subject will be for next year's guild theme guilt. Julia was asked to provide some ideas for the guild to vote on. The overall theme of next year's guilt show in Sisters is "Creative Trails". Bazaar: No report. Service Projects: Mike Carriger has more than met his goal of 100 quilts for 2017. We have donated 138 quilts this year. Next week is a Sit N /Sew at Homestead Quilts on Tuesday, October 17. You don't have to bring your sewing machine; they will be cutting for next years' service quilts. Bring your mat and rotary cutter instead. There is a potluck as usual; the entrée is Chicken and Noodles in Cream Sauce. You are asked to bring a side dish. Sit N Sew will also be held after the Education Meeting on October 24th; the menu will include Mike's Trail Stew, bring a side dish. They showed a beautiful modern quilt made (by Sit N Sewers) to be donated to a woman veteran. Newsletter: The next newsletter deadline is 10/17/2017. Send articles to: mmqnewsletter@gmail.com. Retreat: No report. Applique: The next meeting is 10/17/17. Block of the Month (BOM): Deb Ewing will do the Block of the Month in October; there will be some Technique of the Month also given by Deb. Technique of the Month (TOM): Nancy is working on Block of the Month for 2018. In January she will give the fabric requirements for her mystery quilt called "Journey Home". Secret Pals: Marcia Schonlau reported the Secret Pal Luncheon would be the first Wednesday in December. (12/6). Christmas Party: Linda Ehrich asked the members to vote for either ham, chicken or beef for the Christmas Luncheon. Chicken was the winner. I guess the menu is being worked on. Next month they will know the cost. New Business: Audit Committee: Mary Klein and Susan Campbell offered to complete the audit for this year. Master Quilter: Members voted before the meeting and during the break: the votes were then counted. The announcement is usually made in December at the Holiday Party. However: if there is a tie vote, the members are asked to re-vote for the two with the highest number of votes. In this year's situation there was a tie vote but there were only two nominees. The guild was asked if they wanted to vote again; i.e. did anyone want to change their vote. The answer was "no". It was decided that both Marleen Fugate and Pat Jones would be elected as Master Quilters because the vote was equally divided and they were both equally elected. Sorry no surprise at the Holiday Party but they will receive their badges. Photographer: Jan Beeson is leaving for the winter and asked for a volunteer photographer for our activities. LaWanda Richardson volunteered. Old Business: None. "Show and Tell" - Barb Lowery had members of her mystery quilt class come up and show the quilts that were made. 11 participants showed their quilts. Show and Tell then occurred. "Drawings" occurred.

BOARD MEETING MINUTES-October 20, 2017

Members Attending: Patty Gates (BM), Michelle McMicken (BM), Sandra Schmidgall (BM), Mindy Wolfman (BM), LaWanda Richardson (BM), Mike Carriger (BM), Sally Wilson (BM) and Nancy Fischer (BM). Other attendee's: Denise Meese, Mary Klein, Judy A. Johnson, Linda Ehrich and Pat Jones. Meeting called to order by President, Patty Gates, at 10:15 a.m. Agenda as follows:

New Business:

Other Guilds using our Quilt Racks: The new Redmond Guild "The High Desert Quilt Guild" asked if they could borrow/rent our quilt racks for their show. Discussion followed and the motion to lend/rent our quilt racks was made and passed to "not" lend out our quilt racks. Reasons were: We were very lucky to have someone make the quilts racks for us in the first place; however; they have been in use now for several years and have become very fragile besides awkward to handle, move and transport. We didn't want to risk any damage that could occur. Linda Ehrich stated she could make a quilt rack with wheels (for our meetings) so that presenters wouldn't have to hold quilts up so long for guests. We asked for two please.

Treasurer: Mindy has been the treasurer for several years now and in light of our fairly new non-profit status she has been reviewing line items in preparation for the 2018 MMQ budget. The guild has been carrying too high of a balance in the checking account. She provided a table showing the accumulation of funds from 1/11 @ \$4.830 to the current amount of \$12,639. Mindy said a healthy budget needs about ½ of what we have, i.e. \$5,800 as a surplus. \$1,600 of this money is in the Judy Hopkins Fund. Discussion followed about what to do about the surplus. Suggestions were made: Set aside an amount for our 30th MMQ Birthday celebration at the Quilt Show; Purchase 2 more tents (10 x10) for the quilt show; Increase the budget for Program to have more professionals speak at the guild meetings; \$500 scholarship for a promising Home EC, textile design, fiber artist, dress designer type student; Donation to 4-H groups; Ask Committee Coordinators if they have any special purchases they need; and purchase a new banner announcing the Quilt Show at the Sunriver Mall entrance. As a result of the discussion, The Board made a motion to put \$500 (a one time line item for next year's budget) aside to celebrate the guilds 30th Birthday. This motion passed. A second motion was voted on and passed to set up a committee of membership volunteers to be selected to plan the Birthday Celebration. Another motion was made and voted on to set up a second committee to look into how to best use the excess funds in the treasury. Sandy Schmidgall (next year's guild President) will talk about this at the February Business Meeting to seek help from guild membership. The committee will later make a presentation to the guild, providing and asking for suggestions, then taking a vote as to what the guild wants to do. This will be contingent on finalizing the 2017 budget and figuring out exactly how much is in surplus at the beginning of the year, then the committee will be given a budget.

Service Quilts Budget: Mike Carriger provided a report on the method he uses to compute the cost of a service quilt along with a request to increase the budget for Services next year to help cover costs. He is asking that the budget be \$1,000. This will be considered and discussed at the budget meeting.

Old Business:

Pay N Go: When the guild became a non-profit organization, each Board Member received a booklet from the Oregon State Attorney General, titled "A Guide to Non-Profit Board Service in Oregon". It states Board Members have 3 General Fiduciary Duties: 1. Duty of Due Care, 2. Duty of Obedience, and 3. Duty of Loyalty. Under Duty of Loyalty it states: "Decisions regarding the organization's funds and activities must promote public purpose rather than private interest". Pay N Go falls into the category of a small business venture that profits certain individuals (i.e. private Interest). It is not impossible to have a Pay N Go; but, the following would be required. 1. Full disclosure must be visible that the funds received are not for MMQ, but for individuals of MMQ. 2. It would require that the guild report the income on IRS Form 990-T and paying unrelated business income tax (which is a flat 35% tax).

Pay N Go (continued): It also alerts the IRS to scrutinize our activities. According to the above mentioned booklet "If the transaction is challenged (by anyone, not just IRS) the director will have the burden of establishing that the contract or transaction is fair and reasonable, that there was full disclosure of the conflict..." ORS 65.361. After much discussion it was decided selling quilts for our members for their individual profit is not an activity related to our tax-exempt function. A motion was made that Pay N Go (or something similar) would not be a part of the MMQ quilt show. It must be separated from MMQ. This passed unanimously. However, no one has a problem with "Pay N Go" being a vendor at the quilt show. A motion was made and passed that Pay N Go could be a vendor at the Sunriver Quilt Show. Procedures will be written by a committee headed by Michelle McMicken and include Barb Lowery, Mary Klein and Judy A. Johnson (if she wants) and other interested persons. Procedures will be written and presented for approval at the January Board Meeting.

Judy Hopkins Funds (about \$1,600): The money in the Judy Hopkins fund were accumulated in 2011. Upon her death her quilt supplies were given to the guild by Sarah Kaufman (a dear friend). Many fabrics and notions were sold at our meetings. Also, there were several projects (in various stages of completion) offered to guild members to finish. These finished quilts would be shown in an exhibit honoring Judy Hopkins. This was done at the Sunriver Lodge and the Sunriver Quilt Show with all proceeds going to the guild. At the time of the sales the guild made no documented decision as to what the money would be designated to buy. Many suggestions were made at that time. Some suggested it be used to lower the cost of the Christmas Party or the fees for the Retreat. Many members complained that this would benefit only those that chose to participate and not the entire guild. There was never any resolution about the funds, except that it should benefit the entire guild, not just certain groups. After discussion, In order to resolve this matter (excess funds on reserve and how to use the funds); the following motion was made: The Judy Hopkins fund will be used for the benefit of the entire guild and a committee would be formed, of interested members, to determine how to use the money at the members wishes and with approval of the Board. It passed unanimously. Sarah Kaufman suggested we get better microphones for the SHARC. Some of us seem to remember we can't use any personal equipment at the SHARC. This needs to be checked. Also, the sound problem may not be the microphones, it could be the speakers. Microphones could also be useful at other events, i.e. quilt show.

Outreach Committee: Mike Carriger provided a draft copy of the operation of the Outreach Committee he is forming. The committee requires no budgetary needs. The procedures will be reviewed by the Board and discussed at the Board Meeting in January.

Quilt Show Report: This was on the agenda but the report was only received that morning so copies couldn't be made nor any of it reviewed beforehand. Discussion will be held off. Pat Jones read a report on the quilt hanging process.

Website: The website is paid for through 2018; but is up for renewal in late spring or early summer. So many questions have come up about the website. Since we are approaching renewal time it was decided to form a committee to look into what can and cannot be done and what we need to do to change it; what can be added and what must be done in another fashion? A Facebook site (closed group to only MMQ members) could be inter-active (questions and answers) or a blog; but who will maintain it? Linda Ehrich knows a lot about Facebook and will look into it. Mike Carriger is also interested in looking at what can be done. Mike and Linda will contact Louise to discuss these things.

A Board meeting is proposed for 1/4/18 to approve the budget for 2018. This is not definite and all will be advised.

Meeting adjourned at 12:35 p.pm.

THE STITCHIN' POST




