CANDIED POPCORN

6 quarts air popped popcorn

1-1/3 cup Sugar

1/2 cup Karo Syrup (light)

1 cup Margarine

1 tsp vanilla

Cookie sheet, greased

SISTERS OUTDOOR QUILT SHOW SPECIAL EXHIBIT- "Three Times Ten: A Quilting Journey"

At the November business meeting, MMQ members selected "Three Times Ten: A Quilting Journey" as the theme of our Sisters Outdoor Quilt Show Special Exhibit in July and at a subsequent Special Exhibit at our own Sunriver Quilt Show in August. The following information may help answer questions you might have about the exhibit and "fuel" a few ideas for getting started on a quilt for the exhibit.

Why "Three Times Ten"? Mountain Meadow Quilters was founded over 3 decades ago to meet the quilt education and fellowship needs of Sunriver-area quilters. Subsequently, the Guild - in cooperation with Sunriver Mall merchants - organized and presented a one-day outdoor exhibit of our quilts. This has become an annual tradition and on August 4, 2018 we will host the 30th Annual Sunriver Quilt Show. This year's exhibit commemorates our three-decade quilt show history by presenting a display of triangle-based quilts representative of quilt styles, patterns, and fabrics of that 30 year period. The exhibit not only illustrates our collective, quilt making journey, but also reminds us of the skills we have learned, the appreciations we have gained, and bonds of friendship we have formed.

What are triangle-based quilts? A triangle-based quilt is one that is composed primarily of triangles. The triangles may appear as individual blocks or be a component (unit) in a multi-unit block - or they can go together to form a new, larger shape; e.g., six congruent equilateral triangles form a hexagon. Shapes other than triangles may be included in the quilt, but in small quantities; e.g., a square in the center of a star block. Triangles commonly used in traditional and contemporary quilts include (but are not limited to) half-square triangles, half-rectangle triangles, equilateral triangles, and isosceles triangles. Irregular triangles and free-form triangles can also be used.


What if I want to do an applique quilt? With a little creativity, you probably can! One idea that comes to my mind is to create background of half-square triangles and apply a spectacular applique motif atop that background. I'm sure there are other possibilities - as there also are for "art" and abstract quilts.

Can I submit a quilt that I have previously made? Yes, in some cases. Since this year's theme has a historical aspect, you might well have a triangle-based quilt you previously made that fits the intent of the exhibit. Sisters Outdoor Quilt Show, however, requires that the quilts for their show have not been previously exhibited at their show. Last year our Sunriver Quilt Show had a similar rule, but I do not know at this point if that will be the case this year.

(Please note - all entries for the Sisters Outdoor Quilt Show must measure at least 40 inches by 40 inches.)

How can I learn more? I'll set up a resource display at upcoming MMQ meetings that includes triangle-based quilt photos, patterns, quilt books, etc. I'll also be available at the display to answer questions. The internet is a valuable resource for locating images and patterns for triangle-based quilts – as well as for viewing tutorials on making and joining triangular units. Second-hand and thrift stores are a great source of older quilt books that might well have patterns from earlier decades. Chances are you will also find ideas in books you already have.

Feel free to let me know if I can be of help. Judy A. Johnson

TREASURER'S REPORT

Since we're so close to the end of the year, I thought I'd take a good look at our actual cash income and expenditures for the year, and compare them to our budgeted amounts, to see how we stand going into 2018.

I've been reporting great work by our committee chairs all year long, and now that we're close to the end of the year, this is still the case. Everyone can be commended for doing such a great job staying within their budgets and putting us in such good position for the start of the new year.

On the income side, the cash donations we received (\$1,745) and the 2017 membership dues (\$4,900), both of which are largely out of our control, were spot on their budgeted amounts. Regarding the quilt show, I already discussed the fact that bazaar sales were, unfortunately, about \$1,000 under budget, but thanks to other quilt show expenses also being under budget (general show expenses by \$400 and credit card fees by \$200), as well as vendor income being over its budgeted amount by \$150, our overall quilt show cash income was \$4,259, just \$241 under our budgeted amount of \$4,500. Even our net book and pin sales this year of \$316 (before today's sales) exceeded our budgeted amount of \$225 by close to \$100.

Overall, our total cash income for the year was \$11,220, just \$206 short of budgeted cash income of \$11,425.

Our real winners this year were on the expense side, a really great performance by all committee chairs. I'm not going to include the quilt retreat in this discussion, as its cash surplus of almost \$3,000 this year is set aside in our savings account to be used for our next retreat, and is not available to us for our ongoing programs and functions.

Big winners on the expense side this year were: Program, which had a budget of \$4,000 and used only half of that amount, and Education, with a budget of \$1,000, of which it used... NONE!

Even facility rentals were over \$400 under budget; this is largely due to our cancelled meeting in January (saved \$225), and the wonderful room rental discount BJ's Quilt Basket gave us, saving another \$200. Even all of our miscellaneous expenses were under budget by over \$200.

If you remember, our overall cash budget this year, excluding the quilt retreat, was to break even, i.e. with zero net income or loss. Right now it looks like we are going have net cash income of approximately \$2,500, thanks to everyone's efforts. What a great year this turned out to be!

Right now we have \$12,000 in our checking account, which includes \$840 of next year's dues already received. Our savings account has \$6,100, of which \$4,400 is designated for the 2020 retreat (\$2,900 carryover from the prior retreat and \$1,500 from this year's bazaar sales.)

2017 HOUSTON INTERNATIONAL QUILT FESTIVAL

The Houston International Quilt Festival is the largest quilt festival in the world. The statistics on this quilt festival are amazing: 1,600 quilts on display, 1,000 vendors, 500 classes and more than 60,000 attendees. For the City of Houston and the George R. Brown Convention Center, it is the largest convention held each year and annually contributes the second largest amount of tourist dollars to the Houston economy.

Classes start on Monday at 9 am and continue to noon on Sunday. With 500 classes offered, there is something for everyone. I took several business-type classes learning as much as I can on how to get my quilt pattern business started.

The vendor area opened on Wednesday at 5 pm with VIP Preview Night for those taking classes or members of International Quilt Association. I was a VIP due to the classes I took so I started my shopping at 5 pm. The shopping is overwhelming. You can attack it in one of two ways: review the list ahead of time and hit only those booths that interest you; or walk up and down all 24 rows looking left and right to see all the vendors. I did both ways. I just didn't want to miss anything. There were also areas for "Meet the Teachers" and "Demo Alley", which I also visited.

I did not look at every single quilt that was on display, but the quilts I saw were amazing and the quality of the work was over the top. There were special exhibits and Central Oregon was represented well with quilts on display by Jean Wells, Sheila Finzer and Kristin Shields.

I met quite a few quilters, some that were staying in the same hotel, some in my classes and just stopping for lunch or a snack. One thing about quilters, we are a very friendly group always ready to chat; pass along a quilting tip; or give encouragement on starting a new quilt pattern business.

I brought back lots of new quilting items and knowledge, but I also brought back memories that I will keep forever.

PAY N' GO vs. NON-PROFIT

Pay N' Go has created a lot of controversy in the guild. Pay N' Go first began at the 2016 Sunriver Quilt Show. At the time no consideration was made in relation to our newly acquired non-profit status. Volunteers to run the 2017 Sunriver Quilt Show were found late in the planning stages. They did not wish to add Pay N' Go as a part of the Quilt Show. The MMQ Board supported this decision. Members became unhappy to not have Pay N' Go as part of the Quilt Show; thus, the MMQ Board reconsidered their previous decision. Not being clear on such short notice how this affected the non-profit status, the MMQ Board decided to allow the Pay N' Go to occur as long as it was done as vendor, not as a part of MMQ. This decision was made one month before the Quilt Show. Some members who knew about the decision chose not to be a vendor. Therefore, there was no Pay N' Go at the 2017 Quilt Show.

The MMQ Board put Pay N' Go on the agenda for the 10/20/2017 Board Meeting. The following is a summary of the discussion that occurred. When the guild became a non-profit organization, each Board Member received a booklet from the Oregon State Attorney General, titled "A Guide to Non-Profit Board Service in Oregon". It states Board Members have 3 General Fiduciary Duties: 1. Duty of Due Care, 2. Duty of Obedience, and 3. Duty of Loyalty. Under Duty of Loyalty it states: "Decisions regarding the organization's funds and activities must promote "public purpose rather than private interest". Pay N' Go would fall into the category of a small business venture that profits certain individuals (i.e. private Interest). Having Pay N' Go under MMQ could cause MMQ's tax-exempt status to be subject to review and even removal by the State of Oregon or the IRS. Such a review could result in the IRS assessing a flat 35% unrelated business tax and requiring us to file an annual FORM 990-T reporting the activity.

The Board did not think having a Pay N' Go under MMQ was a good idea. After much discussion it was decided selling quilts for our members' individual profit is not an activity related to our tax-exempt status. A motion was made that Pay N' Go (or something similar) would not be a part of the MMQ quilt show. It must be separated from MMQ. This passed unanimously. However, no one has a problem with Pay N' Go being a vendor at the quilt show. A motion was made and passed that Pay N' Go would be allowed as a vendor at the Sunriver Quilt Show. Procedures will need to be written by a committee of interested volunteer MMQ members. This will be announced in the near future.

Frequently asked question: If the above is correct, how can we sell quilts at our quilt show? Quilts displayed at the quilt show are clearly identified as being offered for sale/no sale by the exhibitor of the quilt, NOT by the quilt show organizer or sponsor. Thus, there is no appearance of quilt selling activity being conducted by the organizer. The Pay N' Go is strictly a sale to profit individuals and therefore will not be sanctioned under MMQ.

BUSINESS MEETING MINUTES—November 14, 2017

Meeting was called to order at 10:00 am by President, Patty Gates.

Greeter: Denise Meese reported we had three visitors today. **Hospitality**: The treats were provided by Jean Stuart, Judy A. Johnson and Sarah Kaufman. "**Thinking of You's**": Carol Webb took a spill while walking her dog and has a broken wrist.

Announcements: Marleen Fugate passed around a "Treats" sign-up sheet for the first few months of 2018. Dorothy Spain passed around a sign-up sheet for volunteer teachers of Bazaar Classes for next year. Bazaar classes will be held on the second Thursday of the month at Homestead Quilts in La Pine and the fourth Tuesday of the month at B.J.'s Quilt Basket in Bend. Nancy Fischer reminded us the deadline for the Newsletter is November 21. This deadline is for articles for the December/January Newsletter issued late November. There will not be a separate newsletter for January. The next issue won't be until February. So, January announcements are due November 21st. **Program**: Kate MacMillan introduced Jean Wells, owner of the Stitchin' Post in Sisters. Jean passed out a hand-out about announcements from the Stitchin' Post. Remember they will be closed January 3 through January 12. They will be doing inventory and having a store remodel; after they will be having an open house. Jean spoke about the "Alchemy of Fabric". She likes the sound of the work "alchemy". She thinks it is magical and is the way she thinks of fabric. She says it is a coming together of potions (mixing fabrics). Nowadays, there are so many new cuts of fabrics: jelly rolls, charm packs, etc. that can be used. She is also very comfortable mixing a variety of styles of fabric, i.e. batiks, solids, Asian etc. What is importance is the "Color". High contrast in fabric pushes the importance of the fabric; as does the content (movement of the pattern in the fabric). She has also written a book "Intuitive Color & Design. She displayed samples of her current and favorite works.


