The Presbyterian Mission Agency is working with partners to meet immediate needs and support long-term recovery. The Presbyterian Disaster Agency (PDA) program remains in constant contact with leadership in New Covenant, Mission, and South Louisiana Presbyteries. **PDA is the emergency response and refugee program of the denomination, committed to the long-term journey of recovery of communities adversely affected by a crisis or catastrophic event.** It is funded by the *One Great Hour of Sharing* and has designated funds to respond to disasters.

A note. 1. This hurricane/flood damage will devastate Houston and will take years to recover. 2. My dear friend was a pastor in Burgaw, NC when Hurricane Hugo hit. The PDA was the only organization still around three years after the hurricane assisting victims to get beyond what FEMA, the Red Cross, and other organizations couldn't and wouldn't provide.

3. After the tornado hit the Eastern Shore in 2014, the PDA was front and center providing assistance to those affected by the disaster.

Time and time again, the PDA has proven to be a <u>*put it where your money is*</u> group who will be there until all feet are back on the ground and running. Let's demonstrate our discipleship goes beyond the borders of our home and let's give generously.


A taste of heaven


When an admirer asked renowned pianist Vladmir Horowitz how he could play so beautifully, he's said to have replied that anyone could play the notes, but the true music lay in the pauses between them. The same can be said of life.

Rabbi Evan Moffic (Shalom for the Heart) writes, "It is in the pauses — the rests, the spaces in between — that meaning is made and that holiness is felt." Nowadays we keep so busy there's hardly a pause or space in our day. "But that's not the way God created us [or] the world," Moffic continues. "God worked, then rested. God created, then paused. ... Thus, our Sabbath is the day when we can marvel at the beauty of the world God created. It is the day we enjoy what the ancient sages called 'a taste of heaven.' It is a day when we stop thinking about the *what* of life and remind ourselves of the *why* of life."

Chi Gong and Tai Chi Exercise

As we age it is imperative that we stay physically active in order to live a healthier life. The National Institutes of Health (NIH) has found that, of 8 modalities of exercise, Tai Chi has the greatest benefits for seniors in terms of muscle tone and balance. In our exercise class here at the Naomi Makemie Presbyterian Church, we offer both Chi Gong and Tai Chi on Fridays from 10:00 A.M. to 11:00 A.M. in the Makemie Room. Chi Gong is like the "grandfather" of Tai Chi. Tai Chi is a more stylized and flowing system of exercises. We usually do "Chi Gong Shibashi," which is a system of 18 exercises. Also, in our warm-up period we sometimes do the "Eight Treasures." These ancient Chinese exercises have been adapted for American use and have been found to be helpful, particularly for seniors, though our classes are open to persons of all ages. 

After a renowned career in academia, priest and author Henri Nouwen devoted his final years to living in community with and caring for adults with severe developmental disabilities. A friend once asked Nouwen if it might make more sense to spend his remaining time writing.

"I am not giving up anything," Nouwen answered. "It is I, not Adam [the man he helped with the most basic needs], who gets the main benefit from our friendship."

For Christians, work and worship cannot be separated."
