Dear and Beloved Friends in the NMPC Community of Faith

Friends! This is an important letter. I write to you about our beloved community of faith- NMPC. For years when people came to the church and joined they would say "I was first greeted and welcomed by Anne Bagwell." *or* "I was first greeted and welcomed by Marge Carpenter." First of all, Anne has passed away, and Marge has moved away. And besides that, these days there are not that many first time visitors coming to the church--not that many people moving into the area. We have been most fortunate recently to welcome the Greens, the Freemans, and the Tompkins. They selected us. That alone is affirming as they visited other churches.

What are we to do? I suggest we must take the initiative. We must move out into the community to tell our story, to speak of our faith and of the incredible work our church supports. I ask each one of you to think about the 3 things you like best about NMPC. Things you would miss if it were not here.

Let me give you my list. Yours will be different but just as good. I would say first of all that this a free and open community of faith that welcomes everyone in the name of the Christ who has welcomed us and who welcomes everyone— a community of faith that encourages each individual to be on their own unique spiritual journey. Each of us is an experiment of one. No cookie cutter theology here— no one size fits all. We are a compassionate, positive and inclusive community. Our services are open and contemporary and we have a wonderful choir and a great ministry of music. Awesome!

Secondly, we are mission oriented! Here I have asked Cada Grove, Chair of our Missions Committee to list all of the activities and missions that we support. It's incredible all that is being done by only 58 people. Awesome!

Financially we support the AICC, Lighthouse Ministries, Coalition Against Domestic Violence, Literacy Council, ESPM (school supplies) and the Foodbank. With volunteer action we support Habitat for Humanity work camps who are housed at the church, 2 Red Cross Blood Drives held at our church, the prayer shawl ministry, the baby cap project etc. In addition members of our church are involved in many other community groups ranging from the arts to history preservation and education.

Thirdly, there is a strong supportive fellowship here. Folks get the feeling of family, of a loving community, a real place of deep belonging. We enjoy being with each other for both worship and for service and just for good times. We love this community of faith and we want it to continue long after we are gone. We are committed to make that happen.

So, my friends. These are the three strengths of the church that I would speak with others about as I invite them to come and to be with us. I hope and pray that each one of you reading this will find a way to reach out to others, to take some initiative, to welcome others, and to speak with them about your faith and about the amazing work and worship of this beloved community of faith -- the Naomi Makemie Presbyterian Church.

Please, let me hear from you. Let the Session members hear from you. We need to all come together and to work on this. Remember, "with God all things are possible."

A Process to Follow...

Robert and Jody, Clerk of Session, recently attended a workshop on church survival. They were given the following factors to think about in evaluating our church. In the next newsletter we will provide a questionnaire for each of you to complete. The session is currently completing this process independently and we will combine your questionnaires and report the results to all of you in a future newsletter.

Factors of Congregational Survivability, Vitality, and Vibrancy: A Spiritual Strategic Journey Playbook Resource TCP Leadership Series By George W. Bullard Jr.

Age: Your congregation is more likely to exist ten years from now with vitality and vibrancy if the average age of active congregational participants is less than 50 years old. You are marginal or uncertain to exist with vitality and vibrancy if the average age of active congregational participants is 50 to 65 years old. You are less likely to exist with vitality and vibrancy if the average age of active congregational participants is over 65 years old.

Tenure: Your congregation is more likely to exist ten years from now with vitality and vibrancy if the average tenure of active congregational participants is less than 15 years. You are marginal or uncertain to exist with vitality and vibrancy if the average tenure of active congregational participants is 15 to 25 years. You are less likely to exist with vitality and vibrancy if the average tenure of active congregational participants is more than 25 years.

Buildings: Your congregation is more likely to exist ten years from now with vitality and vibrancy if your buildings are in good shape and simply require routine and expected repairs. You are marginal or uncertain to exist with vitality and vibrancy if your buildings need regular repairs, and you are behind on routine maintenance. You are less likely to exist with vitality and vibrancy if your buildings are in disrepair and you must address major repair needs.

Relationships: Your congregation is more likely to exist ten years from now with vitality and vibrancy if relationships within the congregation are about true friendships with one another. You are marginal or uncertain to exist with vitality and vibrancy if relationships within the congregation are about meaningful fellowship. You are less likely to exist with vitality and vibrancy if relationships within the congregation are about face familiarity with many people.

Worship: Your congregation is more likely to exist ten years from now with vitality and vibrancy if worship services are about a true relationship with and praise to our Triune God. You are marginal or uncertain to exist with vitality and vibrancy if the worship services are a weekly program in keeping with our faith traditions. You are less likely to exist with vitality and vibrancy if worship is a weekly cultural gathering where we celebrate the traditions of the church.

Budget: Your congregation is more likely to exist ten years from now with vitality and vibrancy if more than 30 percent of your budget goes to programs and missional efforts outside the congregation. You are marginal or uncertain to exist with vitality and vibrancy if 20 to 30 percent of your budget goes to programs, and missional efforts outside the congregation. You are less likely to exist with vitality and vibrancy if less than 20 percent of your budget goes to programs and missional efforts outside the congregation.

Debt: Your congregation is more likely to exist ten years from now with vitality and vibrancy if you have no significant debt for your buildings and/ or other areas of your church. You are marginal or uncertain to exist with vitality and vibrancy if you have significant debt for your buildings and/ or others areas of the church. You are less likely to exist with vitality and vibrancy if you have overwhelming and burdening debt for your buildings and/ or others areas.

APRIL SESSION AND CORPORATION UPDATES ...

At the April Session meeting, John Tamm visited on behalf of the Presbytery's Committee on Ministry. He updated us on his role and discussed the transition plans in the wake of the retirement of the General Presbyter. We briefed him on all our missions and other church activities.

Buildings and Grounds will repair the manse dishwasher and will sell hot dogs on May 18 for the Super Saturday celebration. Work continues on the plans for a Memorial Garden. The Session approved a motion to use the capital improvement funds in the trust regular account for the manse hot water heater.

Congregational Life has accepted the responsibility of managing the blood drives twice a year. Let Meg know if you can help.

The Mission Committee will provide lunch for two Habitat for Humanity work groups on May 7 and 14 at the site. In addition, the church will house the William & Mary group and host them for dinner at the Blarney Stone on Tuesday, May 14.

The Membership, Friendship and Service Committee was busy planning the May 3 Spaghetti Dinner and Silent Auction Fundraiser. It is a great community gathering from 5-7 PM.

The Worship and Music Committee will re-evaluate having personal palms next year depending on the cost.

For April, the average attendance was 42 and our active membership is 58.

At the Corporation Meeting, we reviewed the quarterly financials which were favorable. In addition, Cada reported that all required paperwork has been filed with the Commonwealth of Virginia.

From our Clerk of Session... "THE PRESBYTERIAN TRADITION"

More than 2 million people call the Presbyterian Church their spiritual home. There are nearly 11,000 Presbyterian congregations throughout the United States serving the communities in which they live.

Presbyterians are distinctive in two ways: they adhere to a pattern of religious thought known as Reformed theology, and a form of government that stresses active, representational leadership of both ministers and church members.

The word "Presbuteros," from which we get "Presbyterian," is a Greek word meaning "elder." It's used 72 times in the New Testament.

Church Women United...

If you look closely at the month calendar you will find that every 3rd Tuesday at noon, Church Women United meet at NMPC. They are a racially, culturally, theologically inclusive group of Christian women who celebrate unity in diversity working toward world peace. Founded in 1941, they sponsor a number of worldwide celebrations each year, such as the World Day of Prayer and Human rights Day among others. They also support a number of local mission projects that include meals for habitat volunteers, supplies for Head Start and several others.
