Dear Friends

We live in troubled times, only today in the national press an account of "road rage", another symptom of our society, a young man being stabbed to death—cause—temper—"road rage".

Temper is like a fire; it gets very destructive when it gets out of control. When a person loses their temper, one of the most common expressions used to describe the situation is "fly off the handle". The phrase refers to the head of a hammer coming loose from its handle as the carpenter attempts to use it. Several things happen as a result; first, the hammer becomes useless—no longer good for work. When you lose your temper, you lose your effectiveness. In that frame of mind, anything you say may not be taken seriously.

Second, the hammer head can hurt just about anything in its path. Our children can carry the scars of our anger with them all their lives. We may not realise we have done it and we may never have intended to do it in the first place, but the facts are words can cause wounds. Angry words can become the pattern of abuse that our young people pick up and use with their children and young ones. Anger has a long reach.

Third, the repair of both the hammer and the resulting damage takes time. The person who loses their temper may recover quickly but the one who is the victim of a hot temper rarely recovers quickly.

So friends, keep your temper under control not just today, but every day. Nobody wants it!

May I invite you to join in one of our Harvest Festival Services and praise God for all His faithfulness towards us. In fact why not join with us every Sunday.

Broughton WI Report May to July 2017

In May, Phil Walker gave an account of a not so well known emergency service, but one which is very important, namely the 'Shropshire and Staffordshire **Blood Bikes**,' which provides to the NHS a free-of-charge, urgent courier service. Volunteers from very different walks of life ride specially equipped motor bikes and deliver urgent items to hospitals in Shropshire, East and North Staffordshire and Cheshire. They operate on a rota basis every day overnight, at weekends and on bank holidays and deliver such items as blood, samples, platelets, medical notes, bone marrow and frozen breast milk. A controller based at home takes calls and arranges deliveries with the individual drivers who are on duty between 7 pm and 6 am. It is a safe and efficient mode of delivery, as they can get along the road more easily than a taxi, they never exceed the speed limit and don't use blue lights. The National Association of Blood Bikes was set up in 2010 and the SSBB in 2014 (this has now extended its name to include 'Cheshire.') The service is wholly funded by public donations and can save the NHS as much as £300 a trip through not having to use commercial couriers or taxis. This service was represented at Croxton's recent Well Dressing Festival paying tribute to our Emergency Services.

Many members and friends visited Kensington Palace on 17th May to view a special exhibition of Princess Diana's Dresses as well as the Palace and gardens. Unfortunately it poured with rain most of the day, so most of the time was spent inside, but spirits were not dampened too much. Thanks go to Margy Horton for arranging this trip. We met in Croxton Church for our June meeting, as the Parish Room had been commandeered for the General Election. Susan Ord talked about 'The Secrets of

Handwriting,' pointing out how a writer's personality, feelings, mood, aptitudes, etc. may be revealed through his or her handwriting, and how graphology, the study of handwriting, has many uses including for interviewing, recruitment and forensics. She showed us samples of writing by some well known figures which revealed their personalities, notably Mussolini and Donald Trump.

July 1st was Croxton's 4th Well Dressing Festival, which is covered elsewhere in this issue. A lot of hard work by many people went into making this community project a great success once again. The next one will be in July 2019.

Our annual meeting out in July was held at the home of Ros Langford, when we were able to admire her colourful garden and enjoy delicious refreshments with strawberries and cream, as well as discussing the usual business and forthcoming events.

Other happenings apart from the monthly meetings were an enjoyable annual dinner at the end of April at Tern Hill Hall, a good number of entries in the County Show, with awards to Pat Kennedy, Ros Langford, Beryl Roe and Marie Poole (apologies if anybody has been left out), the national AGM in Liverpool, participation in Broughton Community Choir's concert in Croxton Church, and a 'Life Hack' workshop at Keele. Craft Club continued to meet and some members went on a visit to Wollerton Hall Gardens. Lots going on, as usual.

The 2017 Croxton Community Well Dressing Festival

The fourth Croxton Well Dressing Festival took place on Saturday 1st July with the overall theme for the 2017 event being: 'Supporting the Community – the Emergency Services'.

After a week of rain and cold temperatures, the festival organising committee were relieved to wake up to a dry day and the sun shining!

The six intricate and colourful well dressings had been constructed by a team of 30 people during the previous seven days and were carefully transported on a flat-bed trailer from Blorepipe to Croxton, pulled by Rob Unsworth's smart red tractor.

By 9.30am, a team of six strong men then erected the heavy boards behind Boughey's well on the Flash in the centre of Croxton, and the five others at various wells around the half-mile wells trail.

The crowds started to gather mid-morning to admire and photograph the beautiful design at Boughey's well - (complete with a 3-D Alsatian police dog) whilst being entertained with folk music by the '*Tern Valley Tinkers*'. At 11.45 am Ros Langford (Community

well dressing co-ordinator)

welcomed everyone and explained the origins of the well dressing festival in Croxton before introducing Staffordshire Police and Crime Commissioner - Matthew Ellis, who was to officially 'open' the event. Matthew stressed how working together and supporting each other was so invaluable and reflected on the recent troubles experienced by communities across the country. He thanked the emergency and voluntary services for the vital and often difficult work that they do - receiving a heart - felt round of applause from everyone present. County Councillor Jeremy Pert thanked everyone for the hard work that had gone into putting-on the festival, and how



successful it had been in bringing people from different groups and all ages to work together on a project for the benefit of the community. The Rev. Terry Williams then conducted a traditional blessing of the well and prayers for the community.

The Staffordshire Historic Churches Trust was founded in 1953 with the aim of helping churches with the cost of repairs. Ride and Stride is the annual sponsored event in aid of county Historic Churches Trusts all over England. It takes place this year on Saturday September 9th.

Participants are sponsored by family and friends to visit as many churches as they can between 10am and 6pm. In 2016 140 churches took part in Staffordshire and 108 cyclists and walkers were sponsored (plus three car drivers). A total of £11,591 was raised. (Gift Aid will increase this amount) The money is used to make grants to churches for repairs and essential maintenance. Half the money raised by each cyclist/walker is returned to their home church.

If cycling or walking are too strenuous for you, you can still take part travelling by public transport or car.

As well as having the aim of raising funds for churches in need of help, Ride and Stride Day gives the opportunity to get out and about and admire our wonderful heritage of churches, many of which are normally closed (apart from times of worship, of course). A handsome trophy is awarded to the cyclist or walker who visits most participating churches.

It is also a special day of fellowship for all those taking part – whether you are welcoming visitors to *your* church or going out on your bike or on foot to visit other churches. It is a very practical way to remind ourselves that we are part of something much bigger than our own building and our own congregation.

So please think about taking part – as a cyclist, walker, welcomer, sponsor – and enjoy the day!

THE GREAT WAR REMEMBERED

In our continuing series commemorating the men honoured on the war memorials at Broughton and Croxton, in this issue of ABC we remember Francis Sutton, who is commemorated on Croxton's war memorial.

Francis James SUTTON



Jerusalem War Cemetery

- Date of Birth: 1894
- Parents:
 - o George Sutton (1847)
 - Second wife Emma Sutton (nee Barlow) (1851 born in Codsall)
- o Rank: Private
- o Regiment: London Regiment 20th (County of London)
 Battalion (Blackheath and Woolwich)
- o Formerly Rifleman 13475 KRRC
- o Service number: 630042
- o Date of death: Killed In Action 30/04/1918
- o Commemorated at: EEF Jerusalem War Cemetery
- o Grave Refernence: K. 15.

Location Information:

Jerusalem War Cemetery is 4.5 kilometres north of the walled city and is situated on the neck of land at the north end of the Mount of Olives, to the west of Mount Scopus.

The cemetery is found on Churchill Blvd, next to the Hadassah Hospital. The Australian Memorial is opposite the cemetery entrance.

- Family History: George and Emma married in 1890 at Lichfield and went to Croxton where George was working as a coachman / gardener in Croxton.
- o 1901 Census Francis is working for James Plant at Foxley Eccleshall.

Military History: Francis was a New Army recruit originally with the KRRC and his army number shows he joined them between 1st June and 29th July 1916. Please see below for more Military History

The 20th County of London Battalion London Regiment formed in London on 3rd September 1914 in 2/2nd London Division then retitled 180th Brigade 60th Division. They moved to St Albans in March 1915, went on to Coggershall May 1915, Hatfield in July 1915, Saffron Walden October 1915, Hertford December 1915, Sutton Veny January 1916 finally landing at Le Harve 24th June 1916. They were attached to XV11 Corps. On November 1st the division received orders to reorganise preparatory to move to Salonika. Units entrained at Longpre going via Marseilles and Malta and assembled in Salonika on Christmas Day 1916

- On 10th June 1917 moved to Egypt arriving Alexandria on 12th June 1917
- Salonika 1917
- The Battle of Dorian 24th-25th April and 8th 9th May

In June 1917 the division reorganised again in preparation for a move to Egypt for operations in Palestine. It embarked on 12th June and by the 4th July had completed the concentration at Moascar in the southern Suez canal Zone. The Division began to advance to Palestine and by 23rd July was at Deir el Bulah 8 miles South West of Gaza. The division remained in Palestine and took part in the following engagements:-

The 3rd Battle of Gaza (30th Oct-7th Nov 1917) notably in the capture of Beersheba (31stOct) and the Capture of Jerusalem (8th-9th Dec) and the Defence of Jerusalem (26th-30th Dec)

In 1918

- The capture of Jericho (19th-21st Feb)
- The Battle of Tell'Asur (8th-21st March)
- The First Trans Jordon raid as part of Shea's Force (21st March -2nd April)
- 1 The Attack on Amman (as part of Caytors Column 27th-30th march)

The Second Trans Jordan Raid (30th April-4th May)

The Second Trans Jordan Raid on Shunet Nimrin and ES Salt officially known by the British as the second Action of ES Salt, and was fought east of the River Jordan between April 30th and 4th May 1918. On the 21st March Ludendorff launched The Spring offensive on the Western Front, overnight the Palestine Theatre of War went from the British Government's first priority to a "side show", because of the threat to Allied Armies in Europe. 24 Battalions, 60,000 mainly British Soldiers were sent to Europe as reinforcements, they were replaced by Indian Infantry and Cavalry from the British Indian army. With large troop movements these withdrawals and reinforcements caused a substantial reorganization of The EEF and weakening the strength of the division left to mount the Second Trans Jordan Raid.

During the second attack across the Jordan River fighting occurred in three main areas:

- First The Jordan Valley
- Second on the Eastern edge of the valley where Ottoman Army Garrisons at Shunet Nimrin and El Houd were attacked by the 60th (London) Division many of whom had taken part in the First trans Jordan attack.
- The Third area occurred after ES Salt was captured by the Light Horse Brigades to the East of the valley in the hills of Moab, when they were strongly counter attacked by the Ottoman forces, the EEF mounted and Infantry forces had to withdraw back to the Jordan valley, the weakening of the force due to the reorganisation meant that until mid-September 1918 they continued the Occupation of the Jordan Valley.

Frank Sutton was killed on the 30th April 1918 the first day of the Trans Jordan attack and is buried in the Jerusalem War Cemetery grave reference K 15

PHONE BOXES IN CROXTON AND FAIROAK

The phone boxes in Croxton and Fairoak have now been purchased (£1) for the community by Eccleshall Parish Council for community use. They need some renovation (painting and cleaning) and the community needs to decide how they can best be used. Local Councillor, Ros Langford has thrown down the challenge to the community:



The red telephone box was once a common sight across the land, a design so associated with Britishness that tourists would be as likely to pose beside one for a photo than to step inside to make a call. But with the rise of the mobile phone, the redundant kiosks are increasingly being put to inventive uses, from miniature art galleries to pint-sized pubs. As part of BT's "adopt a kiosk" scheme, communities are able to take over a decommissioned telephone kiosk for £1. Although new users are not allowed to install "electronic communications apparatus", 3,500 have been snapped up and put to a variety of uses. One of the most common, especially in rural areas, is as a lending library or book exchange".

CROXTON BROADBAND UPDATE - 'SUPERFAST' & Otherwise

The articles in the previous editions of ABC magazine described progress in the availability of "superspeed" broadband in the central area of Croxton. The new green cabinet situated by St Paul's churchyard wall finally became operational on 16th January and on 3rd February leaflets were posted through the letter boxes of the properties which should now be eligible to apply for high speed broadband. To upgrade to higher speed broadband services it is necessary to contact an Internet Service Provider (ISP) and they will advise what speeds are available at the property. Note that the request to upgrade can be made to any ISP but obviously one needs to check the terms of any existing contract if contemplating changing ISP. For information only, I myself switched from TalkTalk (because I was totally frustrated by their customer support call centres in Asia) to Zen Internet (entirely based in Rochdale and either top or close to the top of every UK survey of ISP's)

The last time I spoke with an Openreach technician working in the cabinet, twenty-five properties had by then been connected to fibre-connected services. That's 25 (30%) of the approximately 85 properties which could upgrade to fibre-connected services.

Future fibre developments

As previously explained, there are currently no firm plans to extend fibre availability within the Wetwood exchange area. However, Openreach and Superfast Staffordshire "continue to explore possible technical solutions to address the final 5%" of properties in the county which have no planned fibre upgrade.

Non-fibre improvements

I have recently discovered that Wetwood Exchange is now equipped to provide "ADSL2+" connections. Without getting too technical, ADSL2+ is designed to "operate at double the downstream data rates of the previous ADSL2 standard and can provide higher speeds, particularly for those that live close to the BT exchange." I have carried out a speed check (see below) on some properties whose telephone numbers I know and the information returned indicates that speeds over 10 Mbps could be available at properties not able to be connected to the fibre network, depending on the distance (length of copper wires) from the Wetwood exchange building on Lodge Lane.

BT Line Checker

A 'provisional check' of your available broadband services can be made by entering your telephone number at: http://www.dslchecker.bt.com/adsl/adslchecker.welcome If the resulting report indicates that higher speeds than your current service are available, then request an ISP to confirm what they could provide. The ISP's are able to liaise with Openreach and thereby to establish the actual capability of your connection.


