On stage, National Champion hammered dulcimer player Brenda Hunter (fiddle, hammered dulcimer) and Jill Egland (flute, accordion, whistle) trade off inspired flights of lead and counter melody over dynamic backing by Kat Edmonson (six-and twelve-string guitar, bouzouki). Albums and Radio play. In January of 2012, the band began recording its sixth album. Other albums to the band's credit: Live at Painted Sky (2008), Invite the Light: World Music for Winter (2006), Even Hotter Water (2005), Catching the Mooncoin (2003), and If We Were Us (2002). All are radio favorites on public and independent stations across the land and cyberspace. Public Radio International's Echoes Nightly Soundscapes has featured many tracks from Invite the Light and Catching the Mooncoin, along with two Living Room Concerts and a feature story. Public radio stations on the West Coast favor the band's upbeat Celtic material, along with numerous on-air performances and interviews.



Biographies

Brenda Hunter was born in Whittier, California, and grew up singing four-part harmonies with her family. She studied several instruments and voice, graduating with honors in music education. Brenda is a veteran of numerous ensembles, from

Renaissance to rock, and legend has it she once wore a tiger-striped dress while playing 'Tequila' on her saxophone at a gig. She discovered the hammered dulcimer in 1993, while living in Indonesia with her husband and children, and three years later won the **National Championship** on that instrument. Since returning to Bakersfield, Brenda has mastered the Irish fiddle, gotten her teaching degree, and authored a book of arrangements of Irish tunes for hammered dulcimer. Between Banshee road trips, she teaches high school piano, headlines dulcimer festivals, and performs on the Celtic harp.

Jill Egland was born and raised in Bakersfield, California. In college, she studied music, photography and creative writing before embarking on a career in international development. (Being a Pisces, she didn't find her sharp veer in career choice the least bit baffling.) She lived for many years in Southeast Asia, Europe, and eventually, New York's Lower East Side. After 20 years of being away, she returned to Bakersfield and was playing in a community orchestra when she was recruited to the all-women Celtic/Klezmer band out of which, several iterations later, Banshee in the Kitchen was born. Between Banshee road trips, she directs special projects for the Arts Council of Kern, including its wildly successful concert series, and manages, for the most part, to keep up with her equally busy and artistically talented teenager.

Katharine Edmonson grew up in a Pasadena home with a steady diet of folk music and weekly hootenannies. As a nomadic young adult, she worked her way across the US framing houses and driving heavy equipment by day and performing in coffee houses and country bars by night. She's sung with Buck Owens and the Buckaroos, performed in a disco band, and played C&W sporting big hair and lavender boots. She's also an award-winning kayaker, a visual artist, a mom, and a science teacher who works with at-risk youth, and who loves mountain biking. Kat's always been drawn to the intricate rhythms and modal harmonies of Irish and Scottish music, but it wasn't until meeting up with Brenda and Jill that she decided to pursue it for real.

Kris Martin started playing the bass when she was nine. She wanted to play drums, but that was quickly dismissed. Instead, her dad bought her a big plastic bass, which she lugged on and off the school bus all through grammar school. Then she lugged a full-sized wooden one on and off the school bus through high school. "While I've messed around with piano and guitar, the bass is my true love. I love its deep, rich voice. You can feel the bass way down deep in your soul. I'm a true backup musician by nature. My goal is to give the lead players a fuller sound." Banshee in the Kitchen shares Kris with the popular regional bluegrass band, Out of the Blue, based out of the tiny Kern community of Bodfish. When she's not being coaxed into bands, Kris works as an emergency room nurse in the hospital that serves the Kern River Valley.

How they met, and the name. In a happy coincidence of co-location, Jill, Brenda and then-guitarist Mary Tulin met years ago in that hotbed of Celtic music, Bakersfield, California. Brenda and Jill moved to town first, and met at local musical gatherings, yet joined different bands. Mary arrived soon after and joined Jill's band, and later (finally!) so did Brenda. The three discovered a strong musical and personal synergy, and were soon off on their own. The name came easily. Brenda wanted to be in a band called Banshee. Jill liked the feminist ring of Barefoot in the Kitchen. Mary offered, "How about Banshee in the Kitchen?" And so they were. When Mary's doctor husband retired in 2009, the two headed to the wilds of Washington State. Just when Brenda and Jill thought all was lost, Kat, who had taken dulcimer lessons from Brenda, mentioned she played guitar, and... well... you just don't mess around with providence. She was in.
