CALL COMMITTEE & CONGREGATION COUNCIL ANNOUNCEMENT:

At a special meeting of the congregation council held on Sunday January 6, the call committee presented to the council their unanimous recommendation for their "candidate of choice".

To respect the confidentiality of the pastor candidate and out of consideration for their current ministry, the call committee presented information about the candidate but did not share the candidate's name or other identifying information with the council.

The call committee arrived at their recommendation after many hours of prayer, discernment and conversation in evaluating each candidate through the lens of "Could we see this person as Gethsemane's pastor?" The selected candidate has been notified of the committee's recommendation and has agreed to have their name put forward to the congregation.

The call committee's evaluation was informed through interviewing candidates in multiple face-to-face conversations, contacting their references (laypersons and rostered ministers), and experiencing the styles and content of their preaching and worship leadership. The format of the candidate conversations also allowed each candidate to ask questions of the call committee members concerning our congregation's vision for mission and ministries.

The candidate recommended as Gethsemane's next pastor is the individual whom the call committee discerned as the one that the Holy Spirit has guided us to, someone whose gifts and talents are well-suited to lead our congregation into God's future.

The motions passed at the January 6 special council meeting are as follows:

- 1) To recommend to the congregation (a) the pastor candidate of choice, as presented by the call committee, and (b) their compensation package.
- 2) To set the date of a special congregational meeting as Sunday January 27, 2019 for the congregation to vote on (a) calling the candidate of choice as pastor of Gethsemane Lutheran Church, and (b) assuming the vote to call is successful, approving the compensation package to be offered to the pastor.

The January 27 special meeting of the congregation will be held immediately following the adjournment of the annual meeting.

So that the members of the congregation can get to know the pastor candidate prior to the January 27 congregational meeting, a "meet-and-greet" event will be held at the church on Saturday January 26 starting at 2:00 p.m.

Please arrive at the narthex before 2 p.m. on January 26 to allow time to put on your name tag and to choose your preferred seat in the chapel. The pastor candidate will first share their personal and professional background, including why they're interested in being our pastor, followed by a period of light refreshments and informal conversation in the Garden Room.

The call committee invites questions about the call process itself, although candidate details must remain confidential. Please contact any of us: Jerry Class, Mary Erlenborn, Jeffrey Jenkins, Linda Juhasz, Mark Mendoza, and Aaron Williams.

San Diego Project Heart Beat

Project Heart Beat has one main goal: "To save lives through early defibrillation and educate society on simple recognition and response to SCA (Sudden Cardiac Arrest)."



AEDs are designed to be used by non-medical personnel. The new generation of AEDs analyzes a victim's condition and, if necessary, delivers an electrical shock to the heart to reverse sudden cardiac arrest. Ease of operation with clear voice directions and automatic analysis enables a person with minimal or no training to use the device.
