hypnotherapy. Ms. Curro relates that, the definition of hypnosis that appeals most to her is "bringing people out of the trance in which they normally exist. Hypnotherapy is defined by her as "a therapeutic method of using an individual's natural suggestibility to replace inappropriate or obsolete behaviors with other healthier and more beneficial". She asked if any of us had ever driven somewhere and did not remember driving there. That is a form of self-hypnosis. Another example Mary gave was the act of reminiscing. Newer research shows almost everyone is suggestible. Hypnosis is not a state of unconsciousness. Physical sleep is an unconscious state. When a person is in hypnosis, they are aware of what is happening in the external world; they are not "under someone's spell. All hypnosis is some form of self hypnosis."

Mary stressed that you cannot make someone do something under hypnosis that they would not do when fully awake. She has worked with PTSD patients as well as many other conditions. Some examples of conditions that have been improved or alleviated by hypnotherapy are pain, grief, stuttering, and stress. NEWS FROM MOAA

If you had to guess, what location in the country would you say has the most military retirees?

At MOAA headquarters, we're well aware Virginia, Florida, California, and Texas have the heaviest concentration of MOAA <u>members</u> among states.

When we ran across an <u>analysis by the DoD</u> <u>Actuary sorting military data</u> by congressional district ... [we looked at the top five districts where military retirees live, SBP-eligible survivors, disabled retirees.]

As it happens, Florida's 1st congressional district is the record-holder in all three categories. In fact, one of every five residents of that district is a military retiree. The top three districts are the same for all three categories, in varying order. The fourth and fifth spots have some differentiation. The following data identifies states by congressional districts.

Top 5 congressional districts with people drawing DoD retired pay:

Florida 1st - 33,947 Virginia 2nd - 30,981 Colorado 5th - 26,724 Virginia 1st - 25,852 Virginia 4th - 19,166

Districts with the most service-connected disabled retirees in America:

Florida's 1st - 16,935 Colorado 5th- 15,062 Virginia 2nd - 13,577 Virginia 1st- 12,420 Texas 31st- 17,640

Districts with the most SBP-eligible military survivors in the country:

Florida 1st - 4,327 Virginia 2nd - 3,577 Colorado 5th - 2,873 Alabama 2nd- 2,631 Florida 8th - 2,594
