SEPTEMBER MEMBERSHIP UPDATE

Membership is the lifeblood of any organization. According to MOAA, declining chapters have 75 members or less. All chapters are having the same difficulty with recruiting new members. PACMOAA membership has decreased from 99 members at the end of 2013 to 77 members (65 regular, 10 auxiliary/surviving spouses and 2 Honorary) as of 25 August 2016. This includes 5 Lifetime members as well as 7 new members this year.

We started the year with 84 members. LCDR Cherrington sent out 165 letters inviting eligible MOAA members to join and only 4 joined. LCDR Cherrington would like to hold a membership drive in the spring but NEEDS a committee to help plan and run it! At this time, we have 2 members - LCDR Cherrington and Bettye Hussey working this project. PACMOAA accomplishes a lot for a small chapter but we need more people doing the work of the organization! Another way to increase membership is to invite a friend to a dinner to see what the organization is like. If all members could invite one friend over the next 6 months, that should also help with membership.

The dues money enables PACMOAA to pay for things like the newsletter; speaker expenses; VCOC dues and administrative expenses like nametags, printing, postage and entertainment like the Tidewater Concert band that perform at our Christmas gala. It is hard to meet expenses with decreasing membership. **Remember the effectiveness VCOC has in the state legislature is directly related to chapter membership!**

Governor McAuliffe Signs Historic Legislation Establishing Military Medics and **Corpsmen Pilot Program**

This historic event was attended by three PAC-MOAA members: Legislative Representative CWO3 Karl Wilson, MAJ Sherry Ferki (representing the Virginia Nursing Association and PACMOAA), and VCOC President COL

Steve Turner. The legislative representatives from the PACMOAA, Hampton Roads and Peninsula Chapters met before the bill signing and spoke with aides for Senator Kaine and Senator Warner. All the hospital systems in Virginia will be involved with this program. This event culminated efforts by VCOC via the JLC 2016-06 initiative to develop a Bridge to Health Care Careers for Former Military Medics and Corpsmen as outlined in the following position paper:

1. Objective :

To provide former military medics and corpsmen with employment opportunities and help fill workforce gaps for employers in the Virginia health care sector.

2. Background:

b. Medics and corpsmen receive extensive and valuable health care training while on active duty

c. This military health care experience may not easily translate into comparable certifications/licenses required for health care jobs, meaning that former medics and corpsmen may be required to spend two or more years in school before they can obtain the credentials necessary to work in Virginia's healthcare sector.

3. Discussion:

to make an immediate impact on Virginia's bers," said Governor McAuliffe. health is untapped.

b. Creation of a medic and corpsmen health career pilot program would allow Virginia health care employers to hire former medics and corpsmen immediately after their separation from the military, tapping into their skills and experience.

c. To create the pilot program:

i. Legislation is required to give licensed practitioners the authority to delegate certain tasks to these highly - skilled veterans, enabling them to utilize their medical training in the Virginia health care sector.

ii. Funding is needed in order to test clinical utility, build buy-in from and familiarize hospitals with the veterans' skills and abilities, and test whether medics/corpsmen would be interested in this role.

4. Recommendation:

That the Governor and General Assembly authree positions and appropriate thorize \$400,000 (GF) in FY17, continue at these levels a. 11,000 medics and corpsmen transitioned in FY18, and pass the legislation necessary to assist former military medics and corpsmen in continuing to use their skills learned in the service and to place them on a path to careers in Virginia health care industry.

"As a former Army doctor, I worked alongside "Profiles of Honor" traveling museum and legamilitary medics while treating soldiers injured during Desert Storm," said Lieutenant Governor Ralph Northam.

Sentara Heart Hospital hosted the bill signing. Howard P. Kern, President and CEO of Sentara Healthcare, added, "Recognizing how important this is for veterans, and the Commonwealth's need for more health care professionals, Sentara has supported establishing this pilot program. We also have provided input to the Department of Veterans Services as it has been developing the details."
