More Dealers - More Great Pieces at the Chicagoland Antique Advertising, Slot Machine & Jukebox Show

It was the third time at Chicagoland for David Cogan and 12- year-old son Max who flew in from Scottsdale, Ariz., to shop for "old wood constructed antique coin op gambling machines" for Dad while son Max enjoyed the electronic arcade versions. Teen daughter Farrah, who had attended the show in the past, elected to stay home this time, making the visit a "Dad and Lad event." Father and son agreed they were again "impressed by the fantastic stuff at the show."

It also was the third time at the show for Nathan Lippe to bring along 6-year-old daughter Charlotte from Hanover Park, Ill. Lippe was set up to show and sell vintage advertising signs -and again was assisted in sales by his small fry. The little saleslady popped a vintage cap on her head and wore a big smile as she peeked through a full size 1940s Armstrong Tire with double-sided tin advertising sign priced at \$300. Lippe, known for unusual neon signs, pointed to his 30-by 58-inch Marigold Ice Cream light-up sign priced at \$2,100.

Still more antique neon signs plus hundreds of unusual pieces were displayed among the 10 booths of Bill Rawski. A bright red 8-foot-long Mercury automobile neon sign could hang in your garage for \$9,500. A 30-inch-diameter double-sided two color Used Cars neon could light your night for \$12,500. Both were 1950-60s era. The dealer said he has hundreds of other items at his 72,000-square-foot fabrication, sales and prop warehouse, Zap Props, Inc., in Chicago.

One of the tallest and most expensive, juke boxes at the show was the original light-up 7-foot-tall 1941 Rockola Commando that could play twenty 78 rpm records at your place for \$20,000. At the same spot, dealer John Papa of National Juke Box Exchange in Mayfield, N.Y., offered a finely crafted reproduction of an 8 _-foot-tall 1904 Mills Roaring Lion lung tester. The quartersawn white oak device, with giant lion head, could be operated for one penny, and be yours for \$15,000. The finely crafted coin op piece was said to be one of two examples constructed by artists "working on and off over a two year period."

Another massive music machine, an original Mills Violano Virtuoso Bowfront standing 6-feet-tall with quartersawn oak construction, was shown by Frank Zygmunt Jr. of Westmont, Ill. The historic device could offer both actual piano and violin tunes for a nickel each -- along with a purchase price of \$125,000. At the same spot, another quartersawn oak example, a 1910 Mills floor model gambling slot machine with stick gum vendor, was tagged at \$40,000.

Are there still rare and unknown coin op machines to be discovered? "Oh yes!" gushed collector Bill Howard of Akron, Ohio, with a broad smile, pointing to an 18-inch-tall aluminum coin operated "Strike Out" trade stimulator baseball machine he

had just purchased. Howard shook hands with dealer John Herook of Wynnfield, Mass., after purchasing the pyramid-shaped device, with embossed baseball bats on the front, for \$4,500.

Vending machines of all kinds were plentiful at the event but only one dealer showed a 1920s round glass globe Leebolt fancy cast aluminum 18-inch- tall vendor - complete with circular tin top containing small advertising signs. The rare machine was priced at \$5,495 and brought to the show by Jack Freund of Springfield, Wis. Still others checked out his restored 3-foot-tall 1920-30s Beechnut coin op machines in four different colors and priced \$1,195 to \$1,595 each. The veteran dealer said he has been showing on and off at Chicagoland, "since the beginning."

Junior size Mills QT slot machines are popular with collectors, and you could take your choice from four different restored models priced from \$1,600 to \$3,000 each at the booth of Rick Hector and Claire Chacon of Lakeland, Colo. The pair traveled 1,100 miles to the show, driving "over 15 hours from beginning to end" according to Chacon. A full-size restored Mills Diamond front slot at the same spot was priced at \$1,600.

Corn, soybean and wheat farmers Dale and CarolSmall Carol drove more than10 hours from Neodesha, Kan., because as Dale said, "I got the juke box bug again." The pair were shopping and checking out several models early in the show, but had not made a final decision to purchase on the first day. When asked how many music machines he has, Dale thought for a moment, looked into space and said "I think there's nine."

"Ooh, that one is rare! chirped one shopper pointing to a 1949 Dr Pepper Vendo 27 upright soda pop bottle vendor. Dealer Todd Perkins of St. Joseph, Mo., told the shopper, "You can take it home for \$4,650." The dealer also offered a group of fully restored 1930s floor model cigarette machines priced from \$1,750 to \$4,000 each.

As was the case at the spring Chicagoland Show, some collectors and shoppers with kids in tow took advantage of the Pheasant Run Resort indoor-outdoor swimming pool and specially planned family activities. Once again, the covered walkways between the hotel and Mega Center show location offered easy access over the weekend.

Collectors and shoppers will meet again April 7 - 9, 2017, at Pheasant Run in St. Charles for the semi-annual show.





Veteran antiques dealer and show promoter Larry Kaczmarek of Village Blacksmith Antiques is now at the helm of the 2017 West Bend Antique & Fine Art Show slated for **Saturday**, **January 20th from 9:00 am-5:00 pm and Sunday**, **January 21st. from 9:00 am-3:00 pm**.

The West Bend show and sale is a two-day event held at the beautiful Washington County Fair Complex. Admission is \$5 good for both days of the sale. Children under 16 are free and parents are encouraged to bring their family along. Strollers and wheelchairs are welcome. The building is handicap accessible. Parking is free. Food and beverage will be available from Bryan's Catering.

This popular and well-run show was previously under the management of Skip and Nona Knapp of N.L.Promotions, LLC for the past 16 years. They are also the promoters of the highly successful Elkhorn Antiques Flea Market held in May, June, August and September each year at the Walworth County Fairgrounds in Wisconsin since 1982.

The Knapps approached Kaczmarek about taking over the West Bend Show in early 2016 because of his 6 years of experience successfully promoting the Madison Antique Show and his 20 years of experience as a dealer who sells exclusively at monthly antique shows and sales throughout the State of Wisconsin.

At the national and international level, the AMCA maintains a calendar of National Meets and Road Runs that include some of the premier antique-motorcycle gatherings in the world. National Meets typically include a large vendor area, where members can sell everything from antique-bike parts to entire motorcycles that are at least 35 years old. In addition, National Meets offer a full schedule of other activities, ranging from seminars and bike shows to motorcycle field games and antique-bike racing.

JudgingAll National Meets also feature the AMCA's National Judging Program, in which members' motorcycles can win awards in three categories: Restored, Original Condition or Period Modified. Instead of competing against each other, bikes entered in the AMCA Judging Program are evaluated on a 100-point scale against the standard of the same motorcycle as it would have appeared when it originally left the factory.

National Road Runs provide an opportunity to use these classic machines for their intended purpose-riding on back roads in some of the most scenic parts of the country.

In addition to those events, AMCA members also get access to a number of benefits, including a high-quality magazine six times per year, online forums where they can seek advice from experts, and the AMCA Virtual Motorcycle Library, featuring downloadable copies of hundreds of old and rare sales brochures, parts lists and repair manuals. Plus, AMCA members receive discounts on admission to some of the country's premier motorcycle museums.

Mostly, though, people join the AMCA to meet up with others who share their interest in machines from the classic era of motorcycling. For some, that means the satisfaction that comes from investing thousands of hours in bringing a rusted hulk back to it original perfection. To others, it means preserving artifacts of the past so that they can be appreciated by future generations, or the simple pleasure of enjoying a two-lane road at an unhurried pace-just like motorcyclists generations ago.



Antique & Appraisal School Celebrates Half-Century Milestone



50th Anniversary

While not quite considered an "antique" just yet, the Asheford Institute of Antiques, a professional-level distance learning program on **SHOW** antiques, collectibles, and appraising, turned fifty this past week, mark-Asheford Institute NEW YORK, N ing a milestone in antiques and appraising education, as the longest running Institute of its kind. Although the school premiered its home-study program to the antique world in late 1965, it didn't officially open its doors to students until 1966.

"We've seen an awful lot of changes since our inception" said Peter Green, the Institute's original founder. Green, who started the school based on the notion that there was a need for antique and appraisal education, said he could hardly believe how the antique and appraisal services market had grown over the past 50 years – "I can remember when antique stores were hard to find... now you can tap your phone and find virtually anything instantly!"

During the 1980's, Green's son, Charles took over the day-today operations of Asheford, and is the school's current director. When asked what he thought represented the Institute's high-water mark over Asheford Director, Charles the past fifty-years, Green unabashedly responded that the introduction Green Celebrating School's of the school's new online e-Course earlier this year was a game-chang-

er for antique and appraisal education in general. "The e-Course allowed us to bring a half-century worth of teaching expertise to a new and expanded format," said Green. "With the ability to use online interactive

multimedia for instruction, we've really been able to raise the bar in antiques and appraising education for our students." Green went on to say that although online instruction had obviously become the new norm, the "textbook" version would still be offered for a number of years to come.

According to a press statement, as part of the school's year-long celebration, staff from the Institute will also participate in a traveling roadshow to commemorate the school's 50th anniversary. Plans reportedly include tours of major antique events and shows throughout North America, and will incorporate free appraisal clinics, business seminars and evaluations to mark the Institute's anniversary. "We really want to give something back to our students and those interested in antiques," said founder Peter Green, "It's been a great privilege to teach so many... it's just our way of saying thanks." Exact dates for upcoming events have yet to be released, but are expected to be announced later this month according to school spokesperson, Pamela Drew.
