

The History of the JW McCoy & Brush-McCoy Potteries

In 1848, J.W. McCoy was born and raised in Putnam, which is now part of Zanesville, Ohio. He was married in 1870, and the next year he and Sarah (Sade) Elizabeth Brown his wife, moved to Uniontown in Newton Township, Muskingum County. There J.W. operated a dry good store.

In 1871, the McCoy's moved to the community of Roseville, Ohio. There he entered into about a five-¬year partnership with his father-in-law, James E. Brown in a general merchandise business, which was called "Brown & McCoy".

Then in 1876, J.W. opened a General Merchandise store on his own. In 1886, he entered into a partnership and established the "Williams and McCoy Pottery Co.". After about four years of operation a new partner was taken in and the pottery was renamed the "Kildow, Williams and McCoy Pottery Co.". According to, "The Business Review of Muskingum County", "This plant was one of the most extensive in the valley and produced all kinds of common stoneware and a variety of culinary utensils."

Then in 1890, after about two more years of operation, the KW&M pottery was renamed again, and was called the Midland Pottery Co. By 1892, J.W. was not only involved in pottery manufacturing, and retail pottery sales, but he had become a pottery jobber, selling bulk wares to wholesale dealers.

In 1898, following about six years of operation under the name the Midland Pottery Co., the pottery was sold to the "Roseville Pottery Co.". This ended the partnerships J.W. had in the pottery business. Since very few pieces from these early potteries that J.W. was affiliated with have been found, it is most likely that most of them were unmarked.

As discussed in, "The History of the W. Nelson McCoy's Blue Bird Pottery", (seen elsewhere on this Web site), Wilber F., the cousin of J.W., was a partner in the "Zanesville Hardware Company". The date that Wilber's part-ownership in the store was established remains uncertain, but it was probably between 1870 and 1875.

In 1899, J.W. along with several investors, formed a pottery solely under his name, the J.W. McCoy Pottery Co. He must have devoted much of his time to his new pottery, for in 1901, he turned the management of his general store over to his son Arthur.

For several years, the "J.W. McCoy Pottery Co." concentrated on the production of the simpler, utilitarian stoneware pieces. However, around late 1902 the pottery branched out and began to include the production of art pottery. The art pottery production consisted of elaborately designed, decorative items such as jardinières and pedestals, various other flower containers, umbrella stands, and sand jars. The production of these attractively glazed pieces proved to be a very successful undertaking.

In 1909, George Brush joined the "J.W. McCoy Pottery Co.". Prior to that time he had established a pottery under his own name. However, the pottery only operated about one year before a fire destroyed the entire plant. The "Brush Pottery" was not rebuilt, but he retained the remaining assets of the Brush Pottery. Later in the year after his pottery burned, George Brush became the Manager of the "Globe Stoneware Company", and the "Crooksville Clay Products Company".

After joining the "J.W. McCoy Pottery", within two years George Brush had become the General Manager of the pottery. In October of that year, the directors of the McCoy pottery decided to expand the pottery by the purchase of the "Globe Stoneware Co." (1901-1911).

During August of 1911, George Brush, acting on behalf of the Brush Pottery interests, purchased the old "J.B. Owens Pottery", Plant Number One in Zanesville (1883-1909), along with the equipment and molds. Late in 1911, the officers of the "J.W. McCoy Pottery", at the suggestion of George Brush, agreed to combine the assets of the company with those of the "Brush Pottery". Consequently, George Brush obtained the controlling interest in the "J.W. McCoy pottery", and the name of the pottery was changed to the "Brush – McCoy Pottery".

In 1912, the "Brush-McCoy Pottery" purchased the equipment and molds from the "A. Radford Pottery", which was located in Clarksville, West Virginia.

In 1918, the McCoy family sold their interest in the Brush – McCoy Pottery; however, it was not until late 1925 that the directors of the pottery dropped the McCoy name. The new name of the pottery was the Brush Pottery Co., and it operated under that name until it closed in 1982.

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

Van Briggle Pottery & Tile

Dozens of glaze colors, hundreds of designs, hundreds of thousands of pieces created - all bearing one name - the name of the brilliant artist and his wife whose lives left a permanent and timeless imprint on the tradition of American art pottery. This is the Van Briggle legacy - begun in 1899. With the passing of time new chapters are added, and this artistic legacy is as alive today as any time in its history. Each day the Van Briggle studios produce the early designs of its founders, Artus and Anne Van Briggle, as well as pieces created over the years that compliment their celebrated style, in a variety of colors - both historic and contemporary.

At Van Briggle Art Pottery in Colorado Springs, the beginning of a new millennium brought the dawn of a new century in this Van Briggle legacy. Beginning our second hundred years of creating fine art pottery, we find ourselves returning to our roots. Simultaneously, we are looking to the future, contemplating what legacy we will leave for future generations. We are surrounded by evidence that we bear the name of a creative genius, highly acclaimed in his day, and the dedication of so many artisans and staff over the past 100 years, which brings a deep sense of joy as well as responsibility.

Almost daily we experience poignant reminders of the Van Briggle legacy: someone walks into our showroom with a piece of Van Briggle wrapped in a towel or newspaper, placed in an old shoe box, with a story of how their grandmother purchased this piece 75 years ago on a trip to Colorado Springs - and that she wouldn't part with it for any price; we walk into a museum in Pasadena, California and unexpectedly see a small collection of Van Briggle pieces, all bearing dates from the early 1900's; we receive a telephone call from a collector who just bought an old "Lorelei" vase for a few dollars in a box lot at a farm sale somewhere in the Midwest - the farmer and his family had purchased the piece years ago when they came to Colorado after the harvest was in; while on a visit to the Metropolitan Museum in New York or the Smithsonian in Washington, D.C. we find pieces of Van Briggle pottery among their permanent collections.

Stories like these remind us that the work of our hands today is the continuation of a celebrated artistic heritage begun over one hundred years ago. Indeed, we do feel a responsibility that is both sobering and exciting as we continue the legacy of Artus and Anne Van Briggle. Their names hold a distinctive place in the history of fine and decorative arts. The desire to continue an honored tradition brings with it a dilemma: how do we continue their artistic legacy without simply mimicking its earlier sublime creations? We want to know that if Anne and Artus were to miraculously return to us one day, as we open another kiln filled with art pottery bearing their name, they would see designs and glazes they would cherish in their hands and hearts, as we hold theirs in ours. We would want them to recognize the pottery pieces inscribed with their name. However, knowing they were accomplished artists, we would also want them to say, "...and how you have grown with the years!" We must stay true to our past, yet we must evolve and grow - after all if art is anything, it is dynamic! Clay is a particularly versatile medium for an artist. A survey of what is produced by potters around the world shows that, more than any other medium, clay offers the artist extraordinary scope of expression.

As artists and artisans here at Van Briggle, we occasionally monitor what other artists

are doing with clay and glaze. Fads and trends have their moments in time, and it can be tempting to follow these more immediately accepted styles and idioms, though they lay beyond the bounds of the Van Briggle tradition. However, we are repeatedly drawn to one over-riding goal - to establish an aesthetic that transcends time; to create a style unique to our heritage that establishes itself by continually reaffirming its principles; to explore new ways of expression while always being reminded of their origins. In judging the viability of each new design or glaze we find ourselves asking these questions: Does it look like Van Briggle? Is it worthy of bearing that name? Is it informed by our legacy without simply repeating it?

An overview of Van Briggle pieces over the last century shows hundreds of designs with flower, animal or human subjects artistically applied to pottery forms. Typically, these pieces are highlighted with a soft matte glaze - Artus Van Briggle's passion. The subject of Van Briggle is, essentially, nature, which for all intents and purposes is an inexhaustible source for the artist. Themes and motifs inspired by nature can be interpreted and reinterpreted indefinitely on graceful forms. Matte glazes may be created with a broad range of hues to enhance and lend these forms a soft satin touch. A viewing of our current inventory shows a number of designs created by Artus and Anne Van Briggle that have been produced continuously since the early 20th century. Along with these, one finds distinctive designs by other artists that have been added to the collection over the years. Of course the majority of pieces are glazed with the signature Van Briggle matte glaze - one of Artus' most profound achievements - in various colors. Over the past two decades we have carefully identified and retained only the designs we feel fit most appropriately into the Van Briggle style, and have eliminated others that do not. When new designs are added they are carefully selected to enhance and further the Van Briggle tradition.

Artus Van Briggle established his pottery during the Arts and Crafts movement, a time when many artists and craftsmen were creating their works in reaction to the mass production of the industrial revolution. Though the scope of the Van Briggle tradition is broader than the movement, Van Briggle's work fits well within its emphasis on making hand-crafted art available to a wider public. In the same way, it is our goal in an era dominated by ever increasing emphasis on technology, to provide our society with a counterpoint of artistry and hand craftsmanship.

What could be more rewarding? Reminders of the Van Briggle legacy are all around us. An old black and white photograph immortalizes a moment when Artus posed outside a kiln while the earliest Van Briggle artisans brought pieces for his inspection. A former employee describes how the kilns used to be fired with coal, which he remembers shoveling by hand. A pottery piece from 1902 has mysteriously acquired a look and feel that only the passing of time will create. These reminders and countless others renew and strengthen our resolve to continue the tradition.

Each day brings a sense of excitement and anticipation; there is no end in sight to the Van Briggle legacy. Inspired by the essence of our style, successive generations can continue to express the timeless and endless themes found in nature, interpreted through creative minds and skilled hands. Artus and Anne Van Briggle's aims and values were noble and sincere. As we remain true to these goals, the Van Briggle tradition, begun so many years ago, will continue long into the future.



The History of the W. Nelson McCoy's Blue Bird Pottery

W. Nelson McCoy was born in 1820 in Harpers Ferry, Virginia, which is located in West Virginia. In January 1848, he and his wife Ester moved to Ohio's, Muskingum County, Springfield Township, in a community called Putnam. At that time, Putnam was a suburb of Zanesville, but in 1872, it became incorporated into Zanesville.

During the same year as W. Nelson and his wife arrived in Putnam, they had a son whose name was James W. Years later J.W. would go on to establish a well-known pottery, the "J.W. McCoy Pottery".

W. Nelson came to Putnam as a farmer. He acquired some land and built a house. In addition to farming, he also built a small, log building to produce stoneware during the warmer months. The pottery was a small, "Blue Bird" type shop, which was like the ones many of the farmers had at the time. It was primitive in its equipment, and the ware it produced was rough and unfinished. Although during that period, most of the home-owned, "Bluebird" shops operated under primitive conditions.

W. Nelson only produced pottery for a few years, not eight as previously believed. In January 1853, a notice was published in the "Zanesville Daily Courier" stating that a partnership that W. Nelson had with Jeremiah Elder was dissolved. The partnership was in a Putnam grocery store, named Elder & McCoy, which had been established at some uncertain prior time.

On the same date that W. Nelson ended his partnership with Elder, a second notice was published reporting that he had taken another partner, Norman Dodge, in the grocery business. Later W. Nelson bought out Elder, and the name of the grocery was changed to "McCoy & Dodge".

35Considering his job at the grocery, and the labor involved in farming, maintaining his household, supplying clay and firewood for his kiln, one would imagine that W. Nelson only had a small amount of time for actual pottery production. Surely, the volume he produced was small, and it was undoubtedly unmarked, since none that is attributable to him has been found.

Prior to 1853 a grocery store in Zanesville was owned by "James Benjamin & Co.". Sometime after 1858 W. Nelson acquired the major share in the "Benjamin & Co.", and the name of the store was then changed to "McCoy – Benjamin & Co.". Hugh McDonald was another owner besides McCoy and Benjamin.


In addition to the operation of the store itself, James Benjamin had other interests; he was a wholesale dealer in stoneware. The newspaper "Zanes Times Signal" carried an article in 1957 by Norris F. Schneider, who, quoting old sources, said that during the 1870's Benjamin was one of the three major stoneware wholesalers in the region. The other major stoneware wholesalers at the time were J.C. Gillespie, and Hudson C. Ward.

The crock shown is an example of Benjamin's wares. The inscription on it is stenciled in blue ink, and reads, "Jas. Benjamin Wholesale Stoneware Depot Zanesville, O".

W. Nelson is not known to have been associated with James Benjamin in the pottery business in Zanesville. However, he and Benjamin were associated in the pottery business located in Cincinnati. W. Nelson as a long-time, Zanesville businessman, became respected and popular. In 1881, he was elected the mayor of Zanesville, and in 1883, he was reelected. W. Nelson continued managing and working in his grocery and dry goods store until the early 1890's. He died in 1894.

History of Haviland China

In 1840, David Haviland, who had a china shop in New York City, made his first trip to France to establish an alliance with a manufacturer who could create pieces of porcelain for the American trade. He eventually settled in Limoges, France to oversee production. This was near the source of the abundant kaolin mines, the special white clay unique to Limoges porcelain. He established his own company in 1853 to produce china specifically for the American market.

There were numerous china manufacturers in Limoges, but the Haviland Company was the first to have artists on site to do the decorating. After the Civil War, David sent his son, Théodore, to the U.S. to handle distribution and marketing. Production dramatically increased and another son, Charles Edward Haviland, took over management of the firm from his father. Many talented artists were engaged and soon the lithograph or transfer technique of decoration was developed. White House china sets were designed for Presidents Lincoln, Grant, Hayes and Harrison. But the Victorian housewife was the primary customer with a wide variety of patterns to choose.

Théodore Haviland left the company to start his own in 1893 and was a very innovative marketer. Many prizes were won at exhibitions by both Haviland companies. "A set in every home" became Théodore's goal, and full services of china for \$29.95 are found in the Sears catalogs of the 1920s. Several patterns from both firms were used as premiums by the Jewel Tea Company. It is estimated that there are over 30,000 patterns and variations.

Charles Haviland's company went out of business in 1931. Because of the approaching hostilities in Europe, Théodore moved his company to the United States in 1936, where it operated until 1957. The patterns of both companies were gathered and bought in 1941 by William Haviland who retired in 1972. Although the name Haviland remains today, the firm has gone through several changes in ownership.

Charles Field Haviland

Charles Field Haviland, the nephew of David Haviland, married into another porcelain family in 1859. When he retired in 1881 the name was "bought", and has been passed down through several firms until the present day.

Johann Haviland

Johann Haviland, the grandson of David Haviland, started his own company in Bavaria, Germany, in 1907, and went out of business by 1924. An Italian firm bought the company and in 1933 sold it to the Rosenthal conglomerate. Quantities of this inexpensive china were sold at PXs in Germany after WW 2. Several patterns were used as grocery store premiums. The company has no connection with the French or American china.

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

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
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
