Stanton's Specialized Auctions of this type take place each spring and fall, in addition to their schedule of nearly 175 other auctions held annually.

The auction brought in onsite participants from 21 states, 4 Canadian Provinces, as well as active online and phone bidding from across North America, Europe, New Zealand, and the world.

One of the Regina Automatic changing music boxes, one of these with stained and leaded glass sold for \$12,650.

Victor VV-XVIII with Vernis Martin decorated case brought \$9,350.

On Nov. 10-12. Hundreds of early-morning buyers armed with flashlights and winter gear swarmed the parking lot before dawn on Friday, Nov. 10, looking for bargains. Some then moved inside for early buying at 7 a.m., with visitors laying down a \$50 fee for early entry at the Hotel Mega Center and ballroom. More frugal visitors opted for general admission on Saturday and Sunday, paying just \$7.





Antiques & Appraising School Releases Data On Top Selling Items



The latest results from the Asheford Institute Of Antiques survey of buying trends within the antiques and collectibles community were recently published online this past week by the school's Research & Polling Department.

After conducting similar surveys over the past five years, the internationally recognized home-study school on antiques, collectibles and appraising, released its latest trending data from the antiques marketplace for the 2016 year. The survey, which concentrated on compiling and grouping information related to customers buying habits over a twelve month period, was brought back this year after a strong response on the school's website from readers requesting updates from previous surveys, said current Director of the Institute, Charles Green. He went on to note that there were some interesting differences between the results from this poll, and

those from previous years. "We've made our questionnaire sharper, and more specific, as well as bringing the participant base up to over 1,200 respondents, but the questions are still essentially the same," said Green, "even though the answers are quite different.'

Carlee Jackson, the school's public relations director agreed with Mr. Green's assessment, and stated that the main goal of this year's survey was to once again measure the interest in current trends of antiques and collectibles, based on actual sales results and requests for specific items.

She noted that while the survey was informal in nature, and not predicated on scientific formulas, the results were still quite compelling when viewed in their entirety. "What we're seeing is a strong change in direction when it comes to certain areas of the decorative arts..." said Jackson, "It's not just Mid-century modern that's moving, but a number of other areas that are also making up ground." Jackson went on to note that interest in 1960's and 70's collectibles, particularly space and Star Wars related items, had also risen sharply as well. "There's no doubt in my mind that these are the new younger collectors that we're seeing today," said Carlee. "They're the one's who are really beginning to drive the industry forward."

Aside from the popularity of Mid-century modern furniture, many of the younger dealers from the survey also noted that literally anything twentieth-century, from brutalist metal sculptures to lesser known painters had also become increasingly sought after by both dealers and collectors. "We're in a virtual bidding war every time something from this era comes up," said Shannon Smith, a young east coast dealer. "Honestly, sometimes I wonder if it's worth all the fuss!

Older dealers seemed to echo a similar sentiment, but indicated that there were other areas of the market that were beginning to show signs of renewed interest, particularly in the area of Greek and Egyptian revival styles - especially when done in stone and marble. Claude Paquin, a longtime dealer from Quebec, said some of his Victorian marble-top side tables, which hadn't moved in years, were suddenly flying out the door. "Who knows," said Paquin, "...maybe it's the beginning of something old!"



Fantastic Finds at the Chicagoland Antique Advertising, **Slot Machine & Jukebox Show**

Once again a heavy mix of antique advertising items were joined by all forms of coin-operated gambling, vending and other machines, all with a wide range of prices.

Frank Zygmunt Jr., of Westmont, IL., said, "I think Dad was directing me" as he pointed to a 1910 Caille Jockey coin-op. gambling machine he discovered hidden away on the top shelf of a closet while cleaning out his late father's home after selling it. Zygmunt's father, a well-known worldwide coin op machine vendor, passed away after many years of setting up at the Chicago Show. "I never

knew it was there," said Zygmunt, placing a price tag of \$15,000 on the device.

B.J. Pawlaczyk's 1914 Lockwood-Ash outboard motor made in Jackson, \$4,500. 989-326-*0727*.

He also pointed with pride to a seldom-seen 1908 cast iron Fey Little Chief spinning wheel face coin-op slot machine he Mich., was priced at recently purchased and presented at the show for display only. "This is always my first stop for some real show-stoppers" said one visitor, rubbing this hands together and walking into the sprawling 10-booth layout of Bill Rawski of Zap Props,

Chicago. Many people stopped to gawk at, and try out, Rawski's 30" long coin-operated Terrestrialscope Telescope with cast iron and aluminum stand, complete with three steps to reach the eyepiece. "The timer lets the viewer see the craters on the moon for just one thin dime," Rawski said. He priced the oddball device at \$12,000. Advertising collectors checked out his five different countertop "bullet light" advertising signs, priced from \$3,500 to \$8.500 each.

Asked at the end of the show if the event was a good one, veteran dealer John Papa of Mayfield, N.Y., blurted out, "Oh my God, I brought 54 jukeboxes and have only five left!" Two favorites included a 1947 AMI Model A showy "mother of plastic" that could be played at home for \$2,500. Others "oohed and ahhed" over his 1946 Filben Maestro priced at \$8,500.

The two Wisconsin dealers known for rare finds again set up across the aisle from each other and again offered show stoppers.

"It's the only example known," said Paul Hindin of Mequon, Wis., pointing to a 1927 18" tall Miles-Hi porcelain vending machine priced at \$17,500. At the same spot, a French Electra early 1900s 16" tall coin-operated shooting gun game with ornate etched glass and wood case. It could test your marksmanship for \$12,500.

"Try to lift it," Jack Freund of Springfield, WI, said with a smile as he pointed to his rare15" tall early 1900s Advance cast iron peanut machine. He estimated the weight at 20 to 30 pounds and noted a price sticker reading \$16,500. The dealer said he purchased the rare machine from someone who "bought it at a garage sale for \$15" and quickly added, "I paid them a whole lot more than that!" Freund also pointed out his "most ornate of all vending machines," a 17-inch-tall Leebolt peanut vendor priced at \$4,995.

Everything from gambling and coin-op "real photo" postcards to actual gambling machines filled the booth of Bud Meyer and Steve McCormick, who traveled to the

show from Castro Valley, Calif. Collectors had a choice of two 1930s Rol-a-Top slot machines, both priced at \$3,500 each and more than 100 pre-1920s gambling theme postcards.

Vintage coin-operated Coca-Cola vending machines are always a show favorite and Greg Bookout of G & Y Amazing Finds pointed with pride to his restored 1940s Model 27, with open leg stand, that could cool pop at your home for one dime, and \$3,900. At the same spot, foot traffic stopped to check out a restored full-size Pluto Cartoon figure coin-operated kiddie ride priced at \$8,950.

Once again, the Chicago show was a family affair for many -- some coming to buy, some to sell, and some to just to browse through the offerings.

Twenty-nine year-old Nick Carini said he has been collecting for 18 years, and he set up at the show with his father John, both from Milwaukee. Nick pointed with pride to his latest find, a penny-operated 1934 cast iron and aluminum Little King peanut vendor, part of his "personal collection." Bank collectors stopped at the Carini booth to admire a pair of 2 1/2 inch celluloid advertising coin banks, circa 1920s, priced at \$200 each.

John Carini also signed and sold copies of his "Pocket Guide to Coin-op Vending Machines" a 160 page soft cover book, chock full of color photos.

Both father and son said they enjoyed buying and selling at the Chicagoland show. "She started assisting me with coin-op stuff and selling hot dogs 26 years ago," said dealer George Kesely of Munster, Ind., smiling proudly at daughter Kristina. Did her training bear fruit? She stopped to visit her father at the November show and offered her business card, "Kristina Kesely Phd., Chemistry, Lafayette, Ind." She added that her job now is in "virus research, trying to engineer a vaccine for MERS and SARS." Both father and daughter sported identical coin-op collecting T-shirts but they offered no hot dogs this time!

Dealer Nathan Lippe of Hanover Park, Ill., featured a booth full of vintage advertising signs and was once again assisted by daughters Hanna, age 4 1/2, and Charlotte 7. The small fry said their favorite was a die-cut tin Bunny Bread advertising sign priced at \$675 almost as tall as they are.

Another repeat from last show, Dad-and-Lad shoppers Shawn Flock and son Orrin, 14, drove 4 hours to Chicaogland from Hesperia, MI, "bagging several bargains." The young man's treasures included a 10-cent aspirin vendor, a Vendorama and Perk-Up coin op machines.

The resort hotel sponsored wintertime activities at Pheasant Run Resort, are always popular with show attendant families who wanting to take a break. The popular indooroutdoor hotel year-around swimming pool which allows swimmers inside to dive under a partial wall and poke their heads outside for a moment was enjoyed by many.

And, the heated covered walk way between the Mega Center, Ballroom made for toasty travel between the two show locations.

Collectors and shoppers will meet again April 6-8, 2018, at Pheasant Run in St. Charles, Ill., for the semi-annual show.



Fantastic Pieces - Fantastic Prices at Stanton's Music Machine Auction in November

The collections sold came from various Estates, private collectors and Museums across the United States and Canada. The sale produced many unique and unusual pieces including a Rare and Original Encore Player Banjo that was in good working order, is sold for \$36,300; A Symphonion triple-disc upright music box in an oak cabinet sold for \$19,800; 4 Regina automatic changing music boxes sold from \$6,500 to \$12,650 (depending on condition and model), a Rare Reginaphone Style 240 console model with Lions heads in an oak cabinet \$13,475; One of the finest collection of high-end Victor floor model phonographs was offered from a collection in Tennessee with a Victrola VV-XVIII in a Vernis Martin decorated cabinet bringing \$9,350; 2 Victrola VV-XX sold for \$7,870 and \$5,500 respectively; Three Asian decorated floor model Victor's found new homes at \$5,247; \$6,050, and \$880; A Mills Violano Virtuoso (player violin) from the William Robson Estate near San Jose, California had been completely disassembled and was sold in pieces for \$3,498. It was to be completely restored, but the party never completed the project. A Seeburg KT (Eagle) nickelodeon (not

working) brought \$5,247, while a Seeburg KT Special in incomplete and poor condition sold for \$3,025; A rare Victor V in mahogany (as most were oak) with rounded corners sold for \$6,050; A butterscotch Catalin or Bakelite radio brought \$1,210; Nearly \$750,000.00 of music machines and related items sold to new buyers during the event.



"The Marketing of Tobacco" A Special Exhibit at the 44th Winter WADA Antiques Show

Folks familiar with the semi-annual shows produced by the Wisconsin Antiques Dealers Association, aka WADA, are familiar with Lee Bernard Antiques, Jackson, Wisconsin. In recent years Lee, along with his wife Roxanne, have exhibited in Booth 3 at the WADA shows, but this February Lee will ALSO exhibit his tobacco advertising collection in WADA's Special Exhibit Booth just around the corner from the show's entrance. Joining Lee, long-time collector Henry Hecker who will also share very special examples of tobacco advertising from his own collection.

"The Marketing of Tobacco" is a free exhibit for those who attend the 44th Winter Wisconsin Antiques Dealers Association Show & Sale at the Waukesha County Expo Center in suburban Milwaukee. Come see the rarity, quality and variety of objects assembled by these top collectors of "Tobacciana". Henry Hecker and Lee Bernard will be on hand both days to answer questions and to share their knowledge of this fascinating field.

Tobacco Advertising 101:

Native Americans introduced tobacco to the first European settlers in the early 1600's. Traders returned to Europe with tobacco artful use of color and design plants from the Americas and, thus, the craving for a new commod- to attract the consumer's eye. ity was born!

Henry provided some background on the earliest tobacco advertising. "Paper and wood were undoubtedly used several hundred years ago to advertise tobacco. While it is likely simple ads in newspapers and postings of broadsides began long before the mid-nineteenth century, the real explosion in graphics mar-

keting occurred in the last quarter of the 1800's. With the advent of sophisticated lithography on both tin and card stock, manufacturers of tobacco products employed every conceivable image and narrative in advertising and packaging. Images of attractive women were the most commonly used to gain the attention of a predominantly male customer base. Often the women were dis-

played in, what was considered at that time, a very risqué manner. But cigar box labels covered the gambit: politicians and war heroes, sports figures and sportsmen, race horses, actors and actresses, fanciful depictions from literature and mythology, and holidays (especially Christmas and New Years). Native Americans and African Americans were commonly depicted often in less-than-complimentary ways that are today considered politically incorrect, if not downright racially discriminating. Inducement to use the product was, therefore, by association with vividly-depicted references of sex appeal, heroism, outdoors life, sports talent, literary knowledge, etc., all designed to appeal to the male gender.

"Early on a segment of the public realized there was circumstantial evidence to health risks of smoking. The noted Hall of Fame baseball player, Honus Wagner, halted the sale of his tobacco baseball cards because of his concern about young people using the product. However, as the large tobacco companies emerged in the 20th century, more ruthless and deceptive marketing became common place actually claiming health benefits of smoking and the denial of health damaging effects of tobacco. Eventually this resulted in governmental regulation with warning labels and the ban on television ads for smoking materials. Recall the 'Marlboro Man' ads of the 1950's-60s. Tragically, several of these actors succumbed to lung cancer because of their loyalty to the products they pitched."

How did the collections start?

Lee began collecting tobacciana a scant five years ago, illustrating there's plenty of fine examples available. About his first acquisition he says, "I bought a colorful tobacco tin, Buckingham Cut Plug, with the intention of selling it; but I really liked it, so I kept it. That was the start of my collection of cigar & other tobacco related items. The great graphics on the old tins & boxes appeals to me & the hunt for items to add to my collection is fun & interesting." Lee's favorite piece is a colorful Possum cigar tin. "Who would want to smoke a cigar out of a tin with an opossum on it?" Lee asks!

Henry's been collecting cigar boxes for about 25 years, focusing mostly on Wisconsin cigar makers but also boxes with great graphics. Henry says, "My first purchase was a box from the Henry Castenhoz

saloon in Milwaukee, probably from his sample room. Castenhoz also bottled beer for a time; the reason I acquired the box as a brewery 'go-with' This was way before I purposely started collecting cigar boxes. Ironically I bought the box from Lee Bernard!" Henry's favorite piece is a small Milwaukee Stock Yards Christmas box with Santa on it; he's never seen another, the survival rate of such boxes is so low.

Words of wisdom? Henry notes the field has gained popularity in the last 10 years and good boxes are commanding strong prices, becoming hard to find. Henry recommends,

"Buy what you like and you can always upgrade later. Base your purchases, first and foremost, on good graphics humidor was suitable to and condition. Pick a theme, otherwise your collection can become unwieldy and consume too much space." Lee adds, "Buy the best you can afford - it's better to buy one \$20 tin than four \$5 tins. Educate yourself on the subject by attending antiques shows, talking with knowledgeable dealers, and studying books on the subject so you get a feel for what is available."

Henry and Lee will both be on hand to discuss antique tobacco advertising collecting. In addition, wander the show's three large rooms featuring everything from vintage holiday items to jewelry, to antique cupboards offered by 55 of the Midwest's top dealers from 9 states. The Waukesha County Expo Center's Forum Building, 1000 Northview Road, Waukesha, WI 53188, is the home of this semiannual event. Show hours are Friday, 10-8 and Saturday, 10-5. In addition to the

good food customers have come to expect, a traditional Wisconsin Fish Fry will be served late Friday afternoon and evening so bring your appetite!

Also at the show, antiques (more than 100 years old) and vintage (50-99 years old) items will be collected by the Friends of the Wisconsin Historical Society for their biennial "30th Star Benefit Antiques Auction".
