The History of the W. Nelson McCoy's Blue Bird Pottery

W. Nelson McCoy was born in 1820 in Harpers Ferry, Virginia, which is located in West Virginia. In January 1848, he and his wife Ester moved to Ohio's, Muskingum County, Springfield Township, in a community called Putnam. At that time, Putnam was a suburb of Zanesville, but in 1872, it became incorporated into Zanesville.

During the same year as W. Nelson and his wife arrived in Putnam, they had a son whose name was James W. Years later J.W. would go on to establish a well-known pottery, the "J.W. McCoy Pottery".

W. Nelson came to Putnam as a farmer. He acquired some land and built a house. In addition to farming, he also built a small, log building to produce stoneware during the warmer months. The pottery was a small, "Blue Bird" type shop, which was like the ones many of the farmers had at the time. It was primitive in its equipment, and the ware it produced was rough and unfinished. Although during that period, most of the home-owned, "Bluebird" shops operated under primitive conditions.

W. Nelson only produced pottery for a few years, not eight as previously believed. In January 1853, a notice was published in the "Zanesville Daily Courier" stating that a partnership that W. Nelson had with Jeremiah Elder was dissolved. The partnership was in a Putnam grocery store, named Elder & McCoy, which had been established at some uncertain prior time.

On the same date that W. Nelson ended his partnership with Elder, a second notice was published reporting that he had taken another partner, Norman Dodge, in the grocery business. Later W. Nelson bought out Elder, and the name of the grocery was changed to "McCoy & Dodge".

35Considering his job at the grocery, and the labor involved in farming, maintaining his household, supplying clay and firewood for his kiln, one would imagine that W. Nelson only had a small amount of time for actual pottery production. Surely, the volume he produced was small, and it was undoubtedly unmarked, since none that is attributable to him has been found.

Prior to 1853 a grocery store in Zanesville was owned by "James Benjamin & Co.". Sometime after 1858 W. Nelson acquired the major share in the "Benjamin & Co.", and the name of the store was then changed to "McCoy – Benjamin & Co.". Hugh McDonald was another owner besides McCoy and Benjamin.

In addition to the operation of the store itself, James Benjamin had other interests; he was a wholesale dealer in stoneware. The newspaper "Zanes Times Signal" carried an article in 1957 by Norris F. Schneider, who, quoting old sources, said that during the 1870's Benjamin was one of the three major stoneware wholesalers in the region. The other major stoneware wholesalers at the time were J.C. Gillespie, and Hudson C. Ward.

The crock shown is an example of Benjamin's wares. The inscription on it is stenciled in blue ink, and reads, "Jas. Benjamin Wholesale Stoneware Depot Zanesville, O".

W. Nelson is not known to have been associated with James Benjamin in the pottery business in Zanesville. However, he and Benjamin were associated in the pottery business located in Cincinnati. (See the article, "The History of the James Benjamin Potteries and his Connection with W. Nelson McCoy", which is contained on this Web site).

W. Nelson as a long-time, Zanesville businessman, became respected and popular. In 1881, he was elected the mayor of Zanesville, and in 1883, he was reelected. W. Nelson continued managing and working in his grocery and dry goods store until the early 1890's. He died in 1894.

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

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



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A Treasure Chest "A Trunk"

A trunk, according to Webster dictionary, is a chest for clothing. Trunks were used for storage, traveling and for concealing valuable belongings. Years ago, trunks were stored in wells attached with a rope, so thieves couldn't steal silver and money, etc. These boxes of different shapes, covered with metal, cloth, leather or canvas, were used by travelers to carry clothing and personal items, like we use our modern luggage. All trunks had trays or bonnet boxes with covers for storage of ladies hats, parasols and gloves. A lot of trunks are missing trays, because they were lost or destroyed over the years.

In the fall of 1900, Sears Catalog displayed twenty-five trunks on two pages, ranging in price from \$1.75 to \$37.00. The ad read, "We sell trunks at all prices. We can suit you in style and quality. We want your order, because we can sell good trunks and bags cheapest. We recommend the medium and better grades; a dollar or two added to the price of a trunk may mean many years of additional usefulness. There is integrity in trunks, as in other merchandise. They should be made to stand the wear and tear, which they are sure to get from time to time. Our trunks and bags are made under careful supervision, every nail, rivet, clamp, hinge and lock is attached with exactness and skill of the thorough workmanship. This is why we warrant every trunk to be represented and the best of its kind at the lowest possible price."

There were several trunk companies in Wisconsin, located in Milwaukee, Kenosha, Racine, Appleton, and Fond du Lac. Trunks were made from raw wood scraps of rough unplaned lumber, so companies were located near waterways and lumber mills. Pieces of tin or embossed tin covered the lumber, where seams joined together, a slat of wooden strip was attached with rivets, which is a nail with a head on both ends. Trunks were constructed of many other materials, such as wicker, rattan, and leather. There are many shapes and sizes, flat, rounded, camel back, and rounded sides. If you have ever visited Staten Island Museum in NY, where the Statue of Liberty is located, they have a display of over one hundred different kinds trunks that immigrants used when they brought their possessions to America with them.

Children's Trunks (smaller in size), doll trunks, salesman samples and unusual styles of trunks have greater demand and bring higher prices. Only the very elite could afford trunks for their children, most families shared one trunk. Theater trunks were very large and made of veneer covered with leather or black canvas. They stand on one end when you open them, and have drawers on one side and a place to hang costumes on the other. Traveling entertainers used them on trains. They were not made of wood, because they would have been too heavy to carry. Many old trunks were used to hold a young girls "Hope Chest" and carried a rich history from the old country. In Central Wisconsin, many trunks are from Germany, Poland, Czechoslovakia, and Norway.

Many people have at least one trunk in their possession. A trunk is one of the most basic and useful pieces of furniture there is. Trunks can be used as cocktail or lamp tables, storage units and benches. In the last twenty years, there has been a big resurgence in trunks, many people restore them to their original finish, or remove the tin to expose the beautiful patina wood finish. The inside of trunks and trunk trays can be restored using wallpaper, fabric, or cedar wood. Old trunks can be purchased at flea markets, rummage sales, or antique shops. The average price ranges from \$50 to \$200, depending on condition, style and rarity.

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

All manufacturers must know their consumers to market well and make a profit. It quickly became clear that British housewives found Flow Blue with its vivid cobalt hues and Mulberry in a range from chocolaty browns to moody purples, less desirable than their American counterparts. Adapting to this observation, potteries exported much of their Flow Blue and Mulberry to America for use as everyday dishes.
