Amazing 2 Day Rich Penn Auction Features Nearly 1,200 Lots for Eager Bidders

The two day auction featured nearly 1,200 lots. It was an interesting mix of Advertising, Petroliana, Country Store, Salesman Sample Stoves, Toys, Coin-Operated machines, Disney, and other unusual Decorative items.

Advertising items are always well represented at a Penn auction and this one was no exception. One of the more unusual pieces was an Optometrist's Clock. This rare c.1900 litho on wood clock had one very large eye that watched the bidding price climb as time passed. It ticked away until bidding reached \$4,750. All prices are hammer prices and do not reflect the 10-20% buyer's premium.

A Sharples Separator "Shapely" die cut and self framed tin litho sign, with very strong color showing a milkmaid, had equally strong bidding. Final bidding reached \$4,000. Another farming related sign also perked up bidders. The c.1890 chromolithograph for John Deere Buggies was in an original signed frame. "Deere Vehicles Are All Right" rolled up to a top bid of \$3,000. Ebbert vehicles seemed to be all right too. A beautiful c.1906 self framed tin litho for the The Hickman-Ebbert Wagon Co. rolled off with a high bid of \$1,700.

With a large selection of Petrolaina, gas globes also came through well. An always desirable Frontier, Rarin'-To-Go, with Capcolite plastic body and good lenses reared up and galloped off with a \$1,100 top bid. An unusual Wareco Ethyl oval globe, in a Capcolite body, took a \$1,400 bid. A Clark Globe, with wide glass body, still had much of the original caulk holding the pair of excellent lenses. Collectors prize original and that helped push the globe to a top bid of \$850. Petroliana pieces come in many forms. In the miniature form of a visible gas pump, a lighter fluid dispenser rang up a \$2,000 winning bid.

From the Gas Station, to the Country Store, the great pieces just kept on coming! A keystone display piece in every quality Country Store was a double tower showcase. Only the finest goods were to be presented in these displays. And German Silver was even better. This Double Tower was everything a collector could ask for. In great original condition, selling for \$3,100, it will be the keystone piece in a successful Texas bidder's Country Store. Many of those quality stores had the finest notion and fab-

ric displays as well. Among them would be a spool cabinet. Several were offered. The most striking was a Corticelli Silk Co. two door, in oak with etched mirrored doors. It sold at \$2,600. A double rotating cylinder Merrick's in excellent condition sold at \$1,800. A classic hardware store piece, an 80 drawer nut & bolt cabinet, gathered a solid \$2,000. An equally classic Country Store piece, a NCR model 92 cash register, rang up an \$1,800 bid. And what Country Store would be complete without a Coffee Bin. This great example, originally from a store in Fairborn, NE, was wonderfully decorated and collected a top bid of \$1,700.

Salesman Samples proved to be popular among a variety of collectors. Used by traveling salesmen to explain their wares, the full-size cast iron stoves would have been difficult to travel with. So scaled down versions were taken to the merchants. According to Penn, "It's been a number of years since we offered this many Salesman Sample stoves. And the prices were pretty strong." The top selling stove was a nice original Great Majestic Junior. It cooked up a winning bid of \$1,800. A Karr Range, in blue, sold for \$1,500. It's green version sold close behind at \$1,450.

Rich Penn added, "While many categories of antiques are slowly declining in interest & value, some have stabilized and others are starting to see renewed collector interest. The prices on the coin-operated machines would seem to be one of those categories with renewed interest." This auction seemed to support that assessment. With a number of Jukeboxes, soda machines and other coin-operated pieces,

bidding was aggressive. An unusual nonworking but rare Evan's "Holiday" jukebox, sold to a European bidder for \$8,000. A rare Pepsi-Cola VMC 81 went to a new home with a top of bid \$4,250. Another rare machine,

a Coca-Cola American Vendor model 120, popped a top bid of \$3,900. This machine came

from the Coca-Cola museum in Elizabethtown, KY. While not a coin-operat-


ed piece, an equally rare ICY-O Coca-Cola cooler settled on a top bid of a cool \$5,000. For the gambler who likes slot machines, a 1930's Mills 5c War Eagle, with a repaired back bonnet, flew away for \$2,250. An equally cool Bennet Cigar vendor, c.1900, smoked the bidding for \$2,100.

Rich Penn Auctions are noted for consistently offering a wide variety for collectors. This auction was another example. The selection of rare Walt Disney pieces took variety to a new level. Many of the pieces sold had a direct connection to legendary Disney animator Ward Kimball. One of those pieces was "Nazi" Donald." That automaton was believed to have been a lobby piece produced for the 1943 animated short, "Der Fuehrer's Face." This Disney anti-Nazi short film won Disney their first Academy Award in 1943. Many years later Ward Kimball discovered the piece at a Flea Market in CA. He had it restored. Donald commanded a high bid of \$2,500! Other Disney pieces were even stronger. A 15" Jiminy Cricket automaton hopped up to a \$3,250 top bid, while Mickey Mouse as a wizard waved his wand and conjured a bid of \$3,000. A Popeye automaton flexed several bidders waving arm muscles until a bid of \$3,250 took Popeye & Sweet Pea off their warf. A Disney, Steampunk Dirigible, 1 of 50 made and likely or like the one from Michael Jackson's house, floated away to a successful bidders home for \$2,500.

Perhaps the most interesting piece in the auction....and the one that attracted the most global attention, was the ten foot tall Robot from The World of Sid & Marty Krofft. The piece was a key fixture to a failed amusement park at the Omni Hotel in Atlanta. Without any of the technical plans, it's size and complexity discouraged many bidders. Selling at bargain basement price of \$2,750, it left for an extensive restoration in CA and then off to it's final home with a bidder from Europe.

When asked what he thought about the auction results, Penn said, "It ended up being a great auction! Prices seem to be gaining strength again. And our following, in the US and globally, continues to grow." Penn's next auction is November 2, 3 & 4, again in Waterloo, IA. This auction will include several large collections of Advertising, Country Store, Coin-operated machines and Petroliana. Van Briggle Pottery & Tile

Dozens of glaze colors, hundreds of designs, hundreds of thousands of pieces created - all bearing one name - the name of the brilliant artist and his wife whose lives left a permanent and timeless imprint on the tradition of American art pottery. This is the Van Briggle legacy - begun in 1899. With the passing of time new chapters are added, and this artistic legacy is as alive today as any time in its history. Each day the Van Briggle studios produce the early designs of its founders, Artus and Anne Van Briggle, as well as pieces created over the years that compliment their celebrated style, in a variety of colors - both historic and contemporary.

At Van Briggle Art Pottery in Colorado Springs, the beginning of a new millennium brought the dawn of a new century in this Van Briggle legacy. Beginning our second hundred years of creating fine art pottery, we find ourselves returning to our roots. Simultaneously, we are looking to the future, contemplating what legacy we will leave for future generations. We are surrounded by evidence that we bear the name of a creative genius, highly acclaimed in his day, and the dedication of so many artisans and staff over the past 100 years, which brings a deep sense of joy as well as responsibility.

Almost daily we experience poignant reminders of the Van Briggle legacy: someone walks into our showroom with a piece of Van Briggle wrapped in a towel or newspaper, placed in an old shoe box, with a story of how their grand-mother purchased this piece 75 years ago on a trip to Colorado Springs - and that she wouldn't part with it for any price; we walk into a museum in Pasadena, California and unexpectedly see a small collection of Van Briggle pieces, all bearing dates from the early 1900's; we receive a telephone call from a collector who just bought an old "Lorelei" vase for a few dollars in a box lot at a farm sale somewhere in the Midwest - the farmer and his family had purchased the piece years ago when they came to Colorado after the harvest was in; while on a visit to the Metropolitan Museum in New York or the Smithsonian in Washington, D.C. we find pieces of Van Briggle pottery among their permanent collections.

Stories like these remind us that the work of our hands today is the continuation of a celebrated artistic heritage begun over one hundred years ago. Indeed, we do feel a responsibility that is both sobering and exciting as we continue the legacy of Artus and Anne Van Briggle. Their names hold a distinctive place in the history of fine and decorative arts. The desire to continue an honored tradition brings with it a dilemma: how do we continue their artistic legacy without simply mimicking its earlier sublime creations? We want to know that if Anne and Artus were to miraculously return to us one day, as we open another kiln filled with art pottery bearing their name, they would see designs and glazes they would cherish in their hands and hearts, as we hold theirs in ours. We would want them to recognize the pottery pieces inscribed with their name. However, knowing they were accomplished artists, we would also want them to say, "...and how you have grown with the years!" We must stay true to our past, yet we must evolve and grow – after all if art is anything, it is dynamic! Clay is a particularly versatile medium for an artist. A survey of what is produced by potters around the world shows that, more than any other medium, clay offers the artist extraordinary scope of expression.

As artists and artists here at Van Briggle, we occasionally monitor what other artists are doing with clay and glaze. Fads and trends have their moments in time,

and it can be tempting to follow these more immediately accepted styles and idioms, though they lay beyond the bounds of the Van Briggle tradition. However, we are repeatedly drawn to one over-riding goal - to establish an aesthetic that transcends time; to create a style unique to our heritage that establishes itself by continually reaffirming its principles; to explore new ways of expression while always being reminded of their origins. In judging the viability of each new design or glaze we find ourselves asking these questions: Does it look like Van Briggle? Is it worthy of bearing that name? Is it informed by our

legacy without simply repeating it? An overview of Van Briggle pieces over the last century shows hundreds of designs with flower, animal or human subjects artistically applied to pottery forms. Typically, these pieces are highlighted with a soft matte glaze - Artus Van Briggle's passion. The subject of Van Briggle is, essentially, nature, which for all intents and purposes is an inexhaustible source for the artist. Themes and motifs inspired by nature can be interpreted and reinterpreted indefinitely on graceful forms. Matte glazes may be created with a broad range of hues to enhance and lend these forms a soft satin touch. Aviewing of our current inventory shows a number of designs created by Artus and Anne Van Briggle that have been produced continuously since the early 20th century. Along with these, one finds distinctive designs by other artists that have been added to the collection over the years. Of course the majority of pieces are glazed with the signature Van Briggle matte glaze - one of Artus' most profound achievements - in various colors. Over the past two decades we have carefully identified and retained only the designs we feel fit most appropriately into the Van Briggle style, and have eliminated others that do not. When new designs are added they are carefully selected to enhance and further the Van Briggle tradition.

Artus Van Briggle established his pottery during the Arts and Crafts movement, a time when many artists and craftsmen were creating their works in reaction to the mass production of the industrial revolution. Though the scope of the Van Briggle tradition is broader than the movement, Van Briggle's work fits well within its emphasis on making hand-crafted art available to a wider public. In the same way, it is our goal in an era dominated by ever increasing emphasis on technology, to provide our society with a counterpoint of artistry and hand craftsmanship.

What could be more rewarding? Reminders of the Van Briggle legacy are all around us. An old black and white photograph immortalizes a moment when Artus posed outside a kiln while the earliest Van Briggle artisans brought pieces for his inspection. A former employee describes how the kilns used to be fired with coal, which he remembers shoveling by hand. A pottery piece from 1902 has mysteriously acquired a look and feel that only the passing of time will create. These reminders and countless others renew and strengthen our resolve to continue the tradition.

Each day brings a sense of excitement and anticipation; there is no end in sight to the Van Briggle legacy. Inspired by the essence of our style, successive generations can continue to express the timeless and endless themes found in nature, interpreted through creative minds and skilled hands. Artus and Anne Van Briggle's aims and values were noble and sincere. As we remain true to these goals, the Van Briggle tradition, begun so many years ago, will continue long into the future.



gl - Gallon. Typically used when advertising stoneware capacity

For Rest - For Restoration. Don't go to the auction expecting a cream puff.

GBCF - Glass Ball Claw Foot. Describes the foot usually found on late Victorian parlor and lamp tables.

GWTW - Gone With The Wind. A style of lamp with a matching font and top globe. Correctly referred to as a parlor lamp but popularly known as a Gone With The Wind, after the movie of the same name.

LRRH- Little Red Riding Hood. Typically refers to the Regal China products that feature her.

MIB - Mint In Box. Any item, but often a toy, that is in the same condition as new and in the original box.

MOP - Mother of Pearl. Polished nacre usually derived from mollusk shells. Typically found in jewelry, ladies dresser articles, buttons and in the windows of RPOG art.

NIB - New In Box. Similar to above but often assumed to be of modern production NOS - New Old Stock. Old merchandise, often with original manufacturer's tags and merchant's price tags, that has never been sold or used.

NWOT - New With Original Tags, but sometimes used as New With Out Tags. eBay sellers are usually guilty of using this both ways. If buying online, clarify before bidding.

o/b - Outboard. An outboard motor.

OOB - Oil on Board. Art work done on a board, usually Masonite.

OOC - Oil on Canvas. Art work done on canvas.

Pre Pro - Pre Prohibition, prior to 1920. Refers specifically to alcohol related advertising.

Post Pro - Post Prohibition, after 1933. Refers specifically to alcohol related advertising.

QA - Queen Anne. Generally refers to a 1920's or 30's revival style exemplified by a cabriole leg.

Repro - Reproduction. A good definition would require a separate article but you get the idea. Occasionally people will use the slang "Repop" for repro or "Repo" which is inaccurate and what happens to your car when Vinnie pulls up in a tow truck.

RPOG - Reverse Painted on Glass. Less common as ROG. Any item where the design or artwork has been applied to the obverse side of the glass but typically a lamp shade, decorative framed art or advertising items.

RPPC – Real Photo Post Card. Differentiates a post card that was printed, (developed) off your film from one that was commercially printed. These were so popular that Kodak marketed the 3A folder specifically for the RPPC.

RR – Railroad.

RW - Red Wing. Red Wing, or less often, the several other stoneware companies that called Red Wing, MN their home.

/s/ - Signed.

s/g - Salt Glaze. Refers to the type of glaze used on stoneware and to differentiate it from the later, more common, zinc glaze.

TOC - Tin Over Cardboard. A type of sign made of tin wrapped over a piece of paperboard and hung by a piece of short thread mounted to the back side of the sign. Commonly used in the 1930's and 40's by brewing and other industries.

T&S- Time & Strike. Refers to clock movements. Differentiates between time only and striking movements.

Antiques Abbreviations

A while ago a reader asked about explaining some of the abbreviations they encounter in auction ads. This got me thinking about the abbreviations auctioneers use and why we use them. After a phone call to Gloria I offered to put together a listing.

By definition, an abbreviation is a shortened form of a word or phrase used for brevity. Within context and reason it identifies certain aspects of a piece to the buyer without needlessly going into detail. A lamp buyer will know what a "bracket lamp" is. It's unnecessary to say, "Victorian cast iron wall bracket with mercury glass reflector, chimney & drop in finger font". Most auctioneers use abbreviations in order to keep the size of the ad affordable. However it can be too much of a good thing and some of the more arcane descriptions can confuse or mislead the reader. To a person who collects a particular category most abbreviations in that category are readily recognized. To anybody else they are probably gibberish. Even a novice farm toy buyer won't need a three day weekend to decipher IH, McD & JD. WWI & WWII are obvious but would most folks recognize CW (Civil War) out of context? Coins, firearms, Hummels (152/A TMK3 UB K255 HB, anyone?) and other categories all have their own abbreviations that often are exclusive to that field. But if you are a glassware buyer does it really matter if you can't translate a 28g, o/u, d-bbl, ss w/syn stock and vr?

Some descriptions, while not technically correct, get the point across. For example "Jewel T', (which is short for Jewel Tea, a grocery chain) takes up less space than "Autumn Leaf", (a pattern name for china offered as a premium by Jewel Tea). This may seem like a trivial difference but similar descriptions over several publications begin to add up.

A listing that encompassed all of the collecting fields would be more of a project than I can take on but the following abbreviations should get you through most ads for antique auctions. If you have others you'd like to add to the list or that you've wondered about, please email them to me at mike@paulauction.com.

A&C - Arts & Crafts. Refers to the style of furniture usually associated with early 1900s Stickley. Often but erroneously referred to as Mission or Prairie.

COP - Century Of Progress. Typically refers to souvenirs hauled back from the Chicago World's Fair of 1933/34. Even in the middle of the Great Depression, a lot of Wisconsinites made the trip to see the COP.

CRS - Somebody explained this to me once, but I can't seem to remember what they said.

Dmg - Damage.




