One of the translations of the Native American word Minocqua is "a pleasant place", and that it surely is. The surrounding area is known as Wisconsin's Lakeland district. Over 3,200 lakes dot the area - one of the highest concentrations of lakes in the world. Oneida County, where Minocqua is located, itself has an amazing 1,100 lakes within its borders.

Summer is wonderful but short here in the Northwoods, and the town's population of just under 5,000 swells to many times that with vacationers. The Minocqua Antiques Show certainly gets into the Northwoods spirit too, with many of the dealers focusing on the primitive, country, and sporting antiques that would be perfect additions to any vacation home.

LeAnn Swiggum of J & L Antiques is one of those dealers, specializing in rustic furniture and accessories. "This is always among our best shows, sales-wise," said Swiggum, "and a lot of those sales are from customers that have bought from us here year-after-year."

At the booth of Sunshine Treasures, shoppers found a wide array of fine jewelry ranging from 19th century garnet bracelets and shell cameo brooches to stylish Art Deco pieces. Somewhere in Time made quite a jewelry-splash too, with their display of period Czech Art Deco and Art Nouveau necklaces and earrings It's always worth a trip to the Northwoods just for the Minocqua Antiques Show. But of course, there's so much more to do in the area. Minocqua is the perfect place for a weekend getaway or a summer family vacation. 

¹⁶ A Major Step In Fighting Fraud In The Antiques Business

History has been made! The Federal Trade Commission and the Professional Show Managers Association (PSMA) have jointly taken a giant step in educating the public about fraud in the world of antiques and collectibles and the Wisconsin Antique Dealers Association, dedicated to honesty and authenticity in the trade of antiques, has joined the effort!

A yearlong crusade, led by Nancy Johnson and Dordy Fontinel, board members of the Professional Show Managers Association, has resulted in the printing and mass distribution of hundreds of thousands of colorful informative bookmarks. Titled "Antiques, How to Shop Wisely", the educational pieces give bullet points of information to be considered when shopping for antiques.

"When shopping for antiques and collectibles, ask the dealer. How long have you been in business? How do you know any item is genuine, not a fake or reproduction? What are your criteria for identifying the item? Will you give me a written guarantee that the item is authentic? What is your return policy?"

In addition, Johnson and Fontinel were successful in their request that Consumer Information on Safely Shopping for Antiques and Collectibles be added to the FTC website. The two women spent nearly six months working with the FTC on the specific information that is now available. The recently posted article may be accessed by visiting the FTC.gov website or simply googling FTC antiques. When PSMA President Nancy Johnson wrote an article in the Association's Winter 2007 newsletter entitled "When Did It Become OK To Cheat Someone?", a commentary on our world's complacency about being defrauded, show promoter Dordy Fontinel responded and began a dialogue with Johnson about the problem of fakes and fraud in the world of antiques and collectibles. This dialogue resulted in Fontinel speaking with Sen. John Warner, subsequent meetings with his staff and the Federal Trade Commission.

Last June, Fontinel and Johnson met with Jeanne Bumpus, Director of Congressional Affairs at the FTC, and members of the planning and information division of the FTC. Their goal was to have Antiques & Collectibles recognized as "consumer items" and to encourage the FTC to take note of the rampant fraud, which is taking place under the guise of "Antiques". The FTC agreed and the process began. Knowingly selling a fake is criminal fraud in most states.

PSMA also feels that the bookmarks will provide a convenient opportunity for anyone interested in educating the buying public and fighting the cause. PSMA encourages show promoters, dealers, shop and mall managers, club members, and auctioneers to get involved, therefore PSMA is offering the bookmarks at their cost.

The battle has just begun! Now that the FTC has issued an Alert that selling an antique or collectible item that is not authentic is Fraud, Fontinel and Johnson feel more consumer protection will occur on the state and local level. Such fraud can be reported directly on the Federal Trade Commission site at: http://www.ftc.gov/bcp/index.shtml . Choose the tab "File A Complaint."

These informative bookmarks are given to attendees of the Wisconsin Antique Dealers Association shows held

Lake Geneva Antique Mall Celebrates Its 25th Anniversary In Business

Lake Geneva Antique Mall celebrates its twenty-fifth business anniversary this year. In the Spring, owner Scott Lancour, hosted a catered open house to mark this milestone. Dealers, employees and customers had a chance to meet and mingle and reminisce.

In February 1988, with only twenty-five dealers, uncertain expectations and a leaky roof, Scott opened. Within weeks dealers packed the remaining booths, there were plenty of eager shoppers and soon the roof was replaced.

"I thought Lake Geneva would be a good place for an antique mall," Scott recalls, "but I didn't expect it to be full-time as quickly as it did."

Twenty-five years ago Ronald Reagan was president. Gas pumped for .91 cents a gallon. Sterling silver stood at \$6.00 per ounce, gold \$437.00. Tom Clancy, Lee Iococca and Dean Koontz were hot reads. Lockerbie, Scotland, combed through PanAm wreckage of interminable terrorism, while Yellowstone battled wild-fires. On television, improbably inventive MacGuyver thrilled fans; at the movies Rainman stormed Vegas and Die Hard wouldn't. August 8, 1988, the lights went on at Wrigley Field, it's first ever night game. And Lake Geneva had no store entirely dedicated to antique fanciers.

With its Mid-western town atmosphere, the Mall is as comfortable with the wealthy patron as the green beginner. Scott's mom, Connie, handles bookkeeping, assisting customers with deft kindness and her charming laugh. Dad Bernie, expertly mends finds and puts finishing touches to pieces ready to display. At times their grandchildren help, gaining valuable skills. Scott welcomes the computer savvy of son, Blaine, for the Lake Geneva Antique Mall.

"In 1988, Country Living Magazine was a major influence in what people bought, how they decorated," Scott reflects. "Now it's internet and blog driven."

In recent years, the collectible market has felt the downturn. Roseville and Weller, once highly desirable, have seen a drop off. Dolls and toys in general are down. Collectors no longer amass hundreds of a particular genre, but shoppers are returning. Scott sees newer buyers purchase strictly to decorate with or use. "They're drawn to vintage office and commercial furniture, often repurposed. The pop-culture memorabilia appeals to them."

Business is steady as easy-going Scott takes calls, acquires a china set and works with buyers. Mall dealers are in and out, tending booths. Classical music drifts overhead unobtrusively.

Mall employees are capable and friendly. Jim, with a childhood steeped in the antiques business, has worked here twenty years. A Mall dealer within the first couple years, Jim states, "Before this mall opened, the only antique-shopping in Lake Geneva was a few scattered houses with a room or two of antiques. The Mall filled a niche in this area." Speaking modestly of his background, he admits knowing "a bit about antiques in general".

Ginger, full-time since 2000, plunged into the antiquing world in 1994. At









heart an archeologist, she loves being surrounded by the past. "Changes? Days of the purist collector are gone.

People now mix antique and modern." She downplays her expertise in pottery and jewelry. Fearless with power tools, Ginger has a thorough command of wood and furniture and Scott relies on her abilities.

Jeanie's antiquing credentials go back twenty years, the past eight with Lake Geneva Antique Mall. Her forte includes textiles, china and small primitives, appreciating "old things had a former life. There are fewer impulse purchases now, but good, unique things will always sell." She attributes the success of Lake Geneva Antique Mall to "hard work, great staff," she quipped, smiling, "REAL antiques and good dealers. Dealers have to work harder than they used to."

Long-time customer Dean, declares, "Quality abounds here-no junky stuff." Once a collector of farm machinery, he now looks for more manageable pieces. "Have patience," he promised, "it may not be here today, but keep checking - it'll be here."

A look around the Mall confirms his opinion. Booths are clean and orderly. Unusual advertising signs. art, primitives, delicate china, precious metals. Mid-century Modern keeps pace with impressive Victorian, mission-style and Arts and Crafts. Lighting reflects the gleam of rifles and rhinestones.

Scott's outlook is on the future of antiques. He says, "We adapt to changing times and trends." The irony of using 21st Century technology to market the past is on display. "People photograph items with their smart phones and share it with friends before making purchases," Scott explains. "We've started a TWITTER account along with our Facebook page. We're planning to link these to other websites. Pinterest for one."

If it's been a while since you visited, now is the perfect opportunity. Acquiring vintage isn't simply buying something; you're saving a memory. The past may be prologue, but at Lake Geneva Antique Mall it's also past-perfect!

Florida – The old saying that every season has a reason, seems to be spot on when it comes to people looking to purchase antiques and collectibles. The Asheford Institute of



Antiques (AIA), a professional-level, distance learning program on antiques and appraising, recently released the results of an in depth survey it conducted on market trends in the antique business, which it compiled from students and former graduates.

The primary focus of the survey was to gauge interest in current trends of antiques and collectibles, based on sales and requests for particular items. And while no measurable scientific practices were employed, and the survey was informal in nature, the

results were still quite interesting, said the schools publications Director, Tony Drew. "What we found was that there was a real generational shift in the marketplace, things that tended to "trend" upwards in a truly noticeable fashion, were much more the domain of younger buyers. Whereas items that seemed to have little or no Internet "buzz," remained fairly stable in their position of relative interest to potential customers, and were more often purchased buy older buyers." In other words, said Drew, "Younger consumers seemed to be setting the trends as to what was hot and what was not – some what unusual occurrence in the world of antiques."

Don Kirpatrick, a 20-something dealer in the Northeast who participated in the school survey, said that while he still looks at everything when attending auctions for inventory, he now concentrates more heavily on items like Art Deco, and early primitives. "My clientele is primarily younger-hipster folks who want things from these periods, they're not looking for mid-Victorian pieces that are heavily decorated..." Staffers from the school who conducted the survey said this was a common theme they found when asking about what was selling. "Younger dealers had very different items and inventory when compared to older dealers," said Shirley Huey, one of the staffers who helped complete the survey, "Not only were they different in inventory, but in their marketing approaches as well."

Charles Green, current Director of the Institute, also noted that while 20 years ago most antiques stores often had a "little bit of everything," today's dealers tend to concentrate on items based on generational interest. "I think what we're finding, said Green, "is that bricks and mortar antique businesses are beginning to be more representative of what you see in online stores... a far greater degree of specialization is taking place, and the age of both the dealer and the customer seems to have something to do with that."

Green went on to stress that while the survey was by no means scientific, it still pointed out interesting trends within the today's antiques marketplace.
