From the Desk of Father George

Greetings Parishioners and friends of St. Julie's,

The stories of Naaman and the Samaritan Leper from today's Scriptures can offer us some valuable lessons. Depending upon the ear (*or heart for that matter*) with which we listen; there is the opportunity to understand the gift of faith and belief in several ways. We might hear about the universal love of God since both men were foreigners, or perhaps how sin alienates us from one another and from God. It is even possible to reflect upon thankfulness or the process of accepting God's ways into our lives. Whatever the message speaking loudest to any of us, remember, the love of God is trying to break into us.

I've often reflected and preached upon our need to be open to the marginalized and outcasts of our society... and perhaps for some of us... it is as near as our own family or neighborhood. As faithful disciples, we should hear that there is no hesitation on the part of Jesus or Elisha to reach out to the outcasts of their day (the lepers). Without judgement of any sort, we find both kindness and caring which challenge us to do the same.

Without kindness or concern for our brothers and sisters, we betray who we are as believers as well as the one in whom we believe. When we reach out to the outcasts or marginalized of our world we are in effect, reaching out to Jesus himself. If we deny them, we too deny Him.

During this week, spend some time reflecting upon the prejudices or judgements you carry, and invite God to make the voices of Naaman and the Samaritan leper a call for conversion and grace.

This week marks the beginning of the Jewish Feast of Sukkot which is commonly translated as Festival of Tabernacles and lasts for seven days. During the existence of the Jerusalem Temple, it was one of Three Pilgrimage Festivals on which the Israelites were commanded to perform a pilgrimage to the Temple. Sukkot had a double meaning for the Israelites. The one mentioned in the Book of Exodus is agricultural in nature marking the end of the harvest time and thus of the agricultural year in the Land of Israel. The more elaborate religious significance from the Book of Leviticus is that of commemorating the Exodus and the dependence of the People of Israel on the will of God.

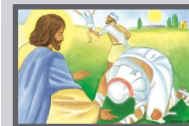
