Additional pet waste stations are coming to the community. Pet waste must be removed promptly. We get asked – why do I have to pick up my dog's pet waste when the geese waste is everywhere? That is an understandable question, but the Law states pet waste must be picked up. Dog waste breaks down slowly and remains on the ground for long periods. Not to mention no one wants to step in fecal matter. Be Pet Courteous - keep your dog on a leash, limit nuisance pet noise (barking, whining), and clean up pet waste promptly.



FROM YOUR HOA BOARD

The HOA Board met with homeowners is September and updated the community on the status of the road bond and the contracts. The Developer is quickly finalizing the outstanding issues and is on schedule to have the road bonds released in October, barring any unforeseen circumstances. Additional contracts were renegotiated during the past quarter, including the liability insurance contract and the landscaping and maintenance contract. Both contracts bring in substantial savings. The Annual budget is being prepared and will be ready for homeowner review next month. The goal is not to increase the assessments. The delinquency rate decreased from \$65,000 to \$53,000 and our Community Attorney is stepping up efforts to bring delinquent accounts current. The Ponds and Fountains will be taken off line this month for winterization and were turned off due to low water level. Some Violation Letters issued this summer were backdated and inaccurate; the affected hoewowners were advised and the Board is working with CMC to review and correct the letters. Finally, clubhouse rental hours will change from 5am to 11pm to 5am to 12 midnight.

With School back in session, we have an increase in school busses in our neighborhood. Some residents have expressed concerns that busses are speeding, not picking up children, or operating in a dangerous manner. Feed your lawn. Fall fertilization will help maintain your lawn's root health and replenish nutrients that were expended in summer.

Remember to water. Thriving plants are still thirsty; water early in the day to avoid evaporation and disease development, and water deep.

Air out the soil. Aeration loosens soil and literally airs out the earth. Soil plugs that are removed can be left on the lawn they will eventually break down, providing nutrients to your lawn. Balding turf, matted-down grass, sparse new growth, pools of water and tough ground are signs you need to aerate.

Level and reseed. Start spring on level ground by filling ruts and low spots where water collects now. Early fall is the best time to reseed a lawn so turf roots establish before winter.

- **Gutters.** Inspect and clean gutters and downspouts.
- Seal and Cracks. Seal gaps and cracks around windows and doors with weather-stripping and caulk.
- Get on top of roof problems. Inspect your roof for damaged or curled shingles, corroded flashing, or leaky vents.
- Walk and Driveways. Take steps to repair damaged sidewalks, driveways, and steps.
- Chill out. Drain and winterize outdoor faucets and irrigation systems.
- Freshen your filter. Clean or replace dirty furnace filters.
- **Give your furnace a physical.** Have a professional inspect your heating system.
- Gather round the hearth. Check fireplaces for soot or creosote build-up and schedule a visit from a reputable chimney sweep.
- Keep your family safe at home. Test smoke and CO monitors, inspect/install fire extinguishers, review fire escape plans, and rid your home of old newspapers and other fire hazards.

Divide plants. Fall is an ideal time to divide the root ball on your overcrowded perennials and replant. Cutting back the plants prior to transplanting can help reduce shock.

Plant fall bulbs. Plant in the fall to enjoy spring's first blooms - crocus, daffodil, tulip. The best time to plant is after the first frost so the bulbs will stay cool all winter.

Pick up leaves. Fall cleanup will save time for gardening come spring, and clearing your lawn of leaves and sticks will prevent the heavy, wet foliage from suffocating the turf. Dark, moist environments are breeding grounds for disease.

Mow low. Make the last mowing of the season a short cut since you'll retire lawn equipment until spring comes around again.

Decorate for the holidays. Fall is the time to think festive! Draw attention to your landscape with lighting, and find ways to incorporate a pop of color by filling containers with seasonal selections - mums for fall.

Clean up. Wash down the patio furniture and store it for the season. Pick up toys so they don't get buried or lost.

Within the District, violent crime is down by 16. 4 percent when compared to this time last year. Property crime has also decrease by 5.6 percent.

Within PG County, an armed robbery occurred on 15 Sep at 3:37 am at the 7 Eleven in Clinton; \$4000 was stolen. On the same day, the Topolino Restaurant in Camp Springs was robbed of \$80. Brandywine Crossing has a new bus stop; but this has brought a sharp increase in theft from autos. Lock your doors and never leave valuables in sight.
