MEMBER HAPPENINGS

LAPIDARY / JEWELRY SUBGROUP MEETING-

The March meeting of the Lapidary/Jewelry Group was held Saturday, March 11, at Kinney Polve's workshop with eight members and one visitor attending. Kinney started the meeting by showing everyone some examples of his creations that he completed during his visit to Quartzite, AZ. He also explained that he learned silversmithing while in Quartzite and went into detail about the steps needed to do silversmithing and showed everyone the equipment needed to complete the work. In addition, he discussed the problems and difficulties a novice may encounter while working with silver and how to avoid mistakes. Everyone appreciated and admired his work and asked many questions, one of which is when he will start teaching silversmithing and how much it would cost. Kinney explained that due to equipment limitations, he could only teach two people at a time. He will put together a list of materials and costs to let everyone know before they sign up for a class. He will work with those interested in the class to set up a mutually agreeable date for the first class. Terry Roberts will send out a notice to the L/J Group asking for names of those interested in the silversmithing class as well as another class in basic wire wrapping. At the end of the discussion, Kinney showed the group all of the rocks that he and Vicky Polve collected during their stay in Arizona. He also let the group sort through two tubs of slabs for something they wanted for their next project.

The next L/J Group meeting will be held at the home of Terry Roberts on Saturday, April 8.

NEW UPCOMING CLASSES

There will two new classes offered soon. The first will be Silversmithing. It will teach the basics of working with silver. The project will be a sterling silver cabochon pendant. Class fee will be \$25.00, for the cost of materials, and is limited to two members per class. I will have all the necessary tools to complete the project. Classes will be held at my workshop, south of Hender-

son. This will be an all-day class, and lunch will be provided. Please contact Terry Roberts to have your name added to the list, classes will start as early as May.

The second new class will be Flint Knapping. This class will also be held at my workshop. The initial cost for this class will be \$10.00, and be limited to about 6 members. The cost is for the basic knapping tools and the material for the project. We will be making an arrow head, and possibly a knife blade. Class should be about 4 hours. I am by far not a professional knapper, but I should be able to teach all the necessary skills so that you will be. Members taking the class will then have all the basic tools for knapping, and should be able to continue on their own. I would hope this will lead to a Knapping Group being formed within the club. Contact Terry or myself to have your name added to the list.

This class is free and all the tools and copper wire used in the class will be donated by the club. However, please note that the tools belong to the club and will not become the property of the student. However, if you already have a cab that you want to use, be sure to let us know and bring it with you when you attend the class. We have decided to limit the class size to no more than 4 students per instructor in order to complete the course in one day. Thus, the class size is limited to 8 students per session.



BENCH TIPS BY BRAD SMITH



BEZEL PROBLEMS—When bezel setting a cab that has rather sharp corners, have you ever had problems pushing the metal down at the corners? It's a common problem often causing a wrinkle in your bezel and a grimace on your face.

In order for a bezel to capture the stone, the top edge of the bezel must be compressed and become shorter to lay down onto the stone. With a round or oval stone this naturally happens as you push and burnish the bezel. But when setting a stone with corners, the tendency is to push the long sides of the bezel down first. No compression occurs along the sides, and all excess metal is left at the corners. Compressing everything there is difficult. Often the only way to remove the extra metal at the corner is to make a saw cut and fold the two sides in to touch.

If you want a smooth bezel all around the corners, the simple solution is to set the corners of the bezel first. Then push in and burnish the sides. In this way the necessary compression is distributed along the length of all sides and not forced to occur at the corners. With the corners set first, the top edge of the bezel can easily be compressed along the sides.

CHEAPER & BETTER PICKLE — Most jewelers use a granular pickle mixed with water. The active ingredient is sodium bisulfate. This can be purchased from local stores as a common pool chemical used for adjusting the acidity of the water. It's sold under various names, so be sure to check the list of active ingredients for a brand that is 95% or more sodium bisulfate.

ROCK-N-ROSE

An added benefit is that the pool chemical is more pure in form than what is sold for jewelry use and does not cause the brown grime often found floating on the top of the pot.






