We will take a lunch/snack break, if you wish to bring your lunch. I will try to have some snacks, you are welcome to bring something to share, however bring your non-alcoholic drink of choice as drinks will not be provided.

Although, I have a list of some of those interested in the class, I ask that you RSVP with \$15 deposit as soon as possible so I know how many to plan for. If you need a tool kit, you must let me know in advance so I can make them up (at least by March 7), although I will have a few extra tools for use in class for those who don't have their own. If bringing your own tools, I suggest having all those listed.

We will go over wire techniques such as cleaning your wire, the correct pressure, wrist movements, etc. This also includes the supplies (copper wire, cabochons) and instruction to make two pendants. Are you interested in making jewelry and/or any of the Lapidary Arts?

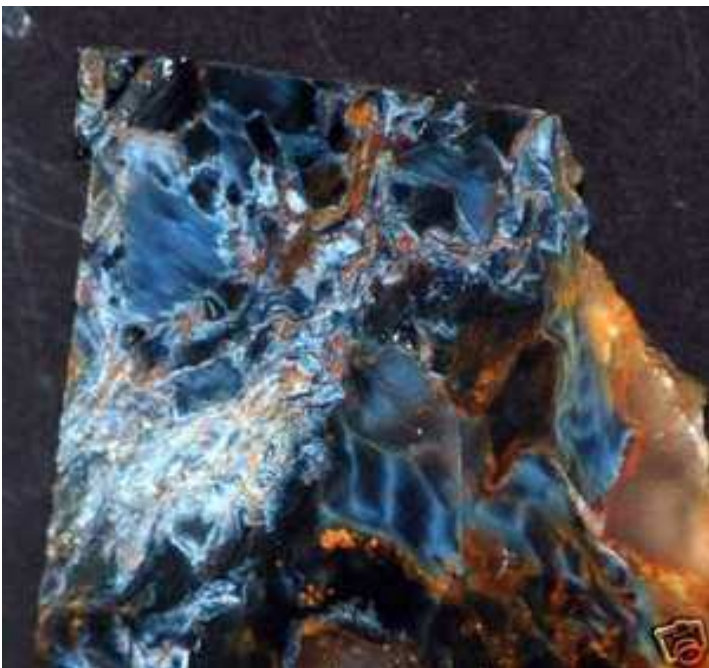

BENCH TIPS BY BRAD SMITH

Bezel Setting Problems

When bezel setting a cab that has rather sharp corners, have you ever had problems pushing the metal down at the corners? It's a common problem often causing a wrinkle in your bezel and a grimace on your face.

In order for a bezel to capture the stone, the top edge of the bezel must be compressed and become shorter to lay down onto the stone. With a round or oval stone this naturally happens as you push and burnish the bezel. But when setting a stone with corners, the tendency is to push the long sides of the bezel down first. No compression occurs along the sides, and all excess metal is left at the corners. Compressing everything there is difficult. Often the only way to remove the extra metal at the corner is to make a saw cut and fold the two sides in to touch.

If you want a smooth bezel all around the corners, the simple solution is set the corners of the bezel first. Then push in and burnish the sides. In this way the necessary compression is distributed along the length of all sides and not forced to occur at the corners. With the corners set first, the top edge of the bezel can easily be compressed along the sides.



Cheaper & Better Pickle



Most jewelers use a granular pickle mixed with water. The active ingredient is sodium bisulfate. This can be purchased from local stores as a common pool chemical used for adjusting the acidity of the water. It's sold under various names, so be sure to check the list of active ingredients for a brand that is 95% or more sodium bisulfate.

An added benefit is that the pool chemical is more pure in form than what is sold for jewelry use and does not cause the often found brown grime floating on the top of a pickle pot.

NEWS ITEM - Trillions in Diamonds

Russia has just declassified news that will shake world gem markets to their core: the discovery of a vast new diamond field containing "trillions of carats," enough to supply global markets for another 3,000 years.

The Soviets discovered the bonanza back in the 1970s beneath a 35-million-year-old, 62-mile diameter asteroid crater in eastern Serbia known as Popigai Astrobleme.

A tid-bit of information on Wire from 2 sources found on the internet:

14 KT Gold-Filled Wire

14Kt gold-filled is created by bonding 14Kt gold to a core of semi-precious metal (brass) through extreme heat and pressure. The result is a wire that is long lasting and tarnish resistant. Wire workers use this medium over 14Kt gold wire for a variety of reasons. The main reasons are its durability and it is economical for our customers. One can enjoy the rich look of 14Kt gold at a fraction of the cost. You can expect your piece of jewelry to last a lifetime - an heirloom.

14Kt gold-filled was used extensively in the late 1800's during the Victorian Age and again in the '30's and '40's. Finding jewelry from those periods are a testament to the quality and durability of 14Kt gold-filled. Its popularity has resurfaced again with the renaissance of wire jewelry. For care, simply clean as you would your 14Kt gold jewelry.

Sterling silver is .925 silver. It makes for long lasting and beautiful jewelry. It does tarnish. To maintain its beauty with little care, your piece should be stored in a plastic bag which slows down oxidation. Common silver jewelry cleaners are readily available on the market to keep your pieces bright and shiny.

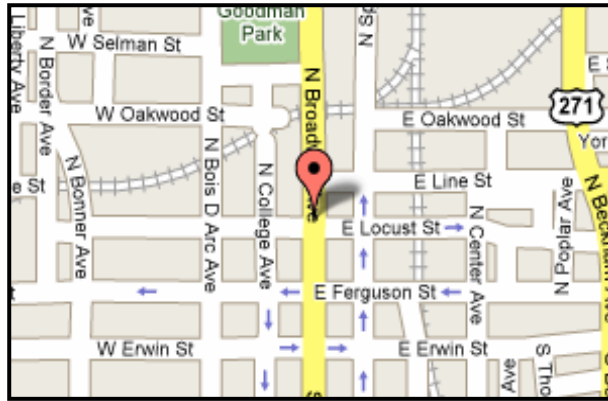
Gold Filled

Gold-filled wire is made by fusing a layer of 14kt gold to a base metal—usually brass – that results in a permanent bond. The gold layer on gold-filled products is thicker and will wear better than gold-plated products. Although gold-filled wire is considered hypoallergenic, some people who are especially sensitive to metals may still have allergic reactions to it.

Silver is a natural precious metal. When silver is combined with copper in a 92.5% / 7.5% ratio, it is considered sterling. Adding copper to silver makes the silver harder and easier to work with. Sterling silver wire will tarnish over time but can be polished easily. From Huntin' & Diggin' 2/13
