MAY MEETING MINUTES

The East Texas Gem and Mineral Society meeting was called to order by President Rip Criss at 7:08 p.m., May 4, 2009 in the meeting room of the Discovery Science Place on Broadway Street in Tyler, TX.

First order of business was acceptance of the minutes of the April 6, 2009 meeting as published in the Rock-N-Rose newsletter. Laura Wilson made motion to accept the minutes, seconded by Becky Whisenant and passed by unanimous approval. A total of 33 club members and 1 visitor were present.

The financial report was given by Club Treasurer, Jeri Kitchens.

One item of old business was the report by Gene Goar that the wire wrapping class slated for late May has been called off, for now. The earliest the instructor can work the dates into her schedule is late August. A total of 14 people had signed up with 2 more possible students, which reached the maximum of 16, divided into 2 classes of 8 each. There will be more information on the classes in future months.

Jack Shull gave a brief report on the upcoming May 9 trip to Jasper to gather petrified wood. There will now be a small collecting fee of \$5 per person, \$10 per family, to help with the escalating lease fees on the land. It was noted that this is the first time Ron has ever charged an entry fee. Pete Kaiser added that there was a sign up sheet on the back table and that he would email the trip members if rain forced cancellation of the trip.

There being no new business to be brought before the members, the program moved to a reminder by Rip of the citrine from Brazil which was the silent auction item of the night. Drawings for door prizes and a short break for refreshments were called.

Program for the evening, presented by Don Campbell was a showing of #7 of the Great Courses: The Identification of Minerals by Dr. John Renton, PH D, West Virginia University. Don added that he loves to look through old mineralogy books and recommended some of his favorites, both old and new prints. He also said that the web site mindat.com offers a wealth of information.

Keith and Charlotte Harmon and Mr. & Mrs. Ed Wheeler arrived during the program after just coming back to Tyler from a trip to Waco, TX. Keith gave a report on the progress made by the committee formed at the last club meeting to offer suggestions and ideas about having a "kid's day" on the Friday before the annual Club show in January at the Rose Garden Center in Tyler. Following a short discussion, with a question and answer session, Keith said the club needed to vote on the issue. Keith made a motion to have the Kid's Day, seconded by Penny Hawkins, approval voted by membership with 2 votes in opposition. Motion carried.

Charlotte gave the sad news of the passing of Jack Parker and reminded members of the long term Club association of Pat and Jack Parker. A motion was made and approved to donate to the American Scholarship Fund in the name of Jack and also Leon St. Pierre another long term member who passed away during the winter.

Keith reminded members that he & Charlotte will host a rock sale at their home on June 6th with about 40 tons of rocks of all types and associated equipment for sale. He had fliers to hand out with the details.


Rip adjourned the meeting at 8:40 p.m.

"STONE SOUP" recipes from fellow Rockhounds submitted by Bob Powers

Eggplant Parmesan - recipe adapted from Tyler Florence @ Foodnetwork.com

- Tomato sauce (use whatever brand name prepared tomato sauce you like)
- 4 cups dried bread crumbs
- 1 tablespoon garlic powder
- 1 tablespoon dried oregano
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 5 eggs
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- Extra-virgin olive oil
- 4 pounds medium eggplants, trimmed and cut lengthwise into 1/2-inch-thick slices
- 2 pounds whole milk ricotta cheese
- 1/2 cup chopped fresh basil leaves
- 1 1/4 cups freshly grated Parmigiano-Romano
- 2 pounds shredded mozzarella cheese

Directions for eggplant preparation: Combine the bread crumbs, garlic powder, and oregano in a shallow bowl; season generously with salt and pepper and mix well. Crack 3 of the eggs into another shallow bowl; season with salt and pepper and beat with a fork to mix. Put the flour in another shallow bowl and season with salt and pepper. Arrange the eggplant, flour, beaten eggs, and bread crumbs on a work surface near the stove.

Heat about 1/4-inch olive oil in a large skillet over medium heat. When the oil is hot, dredge several eggplant slices first in the flour, then dip them in the egg, and finally coat them in the bread crumbs.

Put as many eggplant in the skillet as will fit comfortably in a single layer and cook until tender and well browned on both sides. Drain on paper towels. Cook all of the eggplant slices this way, adding more olive oil to the pan as needed. Stir together the ricotta and 1/2 cup of the Parmigiano cheese. Stir in the basil and remaining 2 eggs, and season with salt and pepper. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. To assemble the dish, first get yourself set up with a large, buttered baking dish. Have ready the eggplant, the ricotta mixture, the tomato sauce, the shredded mozzarella cheese and the remaining 3/4 cup grated Parmigiano. To start, spoon some of the tomato sauce over the bottom of the baking dish. Now add a layer of eggplant. Spread with half of the ricotta mixture. Spoon another layer of tomato sauce over and sprinkle with about one-third of the mozzarella. Repeat with a layer of eggplant, the rest of the ricotta, tomato sauce, and another third of the mozzarella. Finish with the rest of the eggplant, the rest of the tomato sauce, and the rest of the mozzarella. Sprinkle with the 3/4 cup Parmigiano. Put the dish in the oven and bake for about 1 hour, until golden and bubbling. Via Summit Gem Newsletter 03/09

Some Facts About Silver - submitted by Bob Powers

"Pure silver has a brilliant white color and is the whitest of all metals. None surpasses it in luster, and in hardness it ranges between pure gold and pure copper. An alloy of 925 parts fine silver and 75 parts copper is called 925-1000 fine or what is commonly known as sterling silver.

The word "sterling" is the quality mark of the best in silver. The word is Middle English, probably Anglo-Saxon. The origin of the term dates back to the 12th century when five free towns banded together in the eastern part of Germany calling themselves the Hanseatic League. They were free to make their own laws and issue their own currency. When trading with the British merchants, they paid for the British products with silver coins. These coins attracted the attention of the Britishers for their consistency of metal and the dependability of weights, and were, therefore, referred to as the coins of the Esterlings. In due time, after the British adopted the characteristics of these coins, the metal and the coin became known as sterling. Down to the present day this term has stood for the test of fineness and quality."

Hello to the club, from Marilyn Austin,


