Jesus said to them, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat." --Matthew 14:16

Communion is a big deal to us in the church. It is a big deal to us in the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), especially. When you have communion every week, you develop a special relationship with that moment. You look forward to it, you hunger for it when it is missing, you use that time as a touchstone with your Lord, you develop a theology around it, too. We have done that, most certainly, at First Christian Church. Communion is the culmination of the service for us these days, the highlight, if you ask me. It has taught us the importance of coming together around the Table. It has informed us on how to be an inclusive community, with everyone welcome. Fences get mended around that Table. Burdens get lifted. And our experience there has made us a people who place a priority on feeding the hungry, as Jesus instructed us to be. When hungry people surrounded Jesus and his disciples, he said to them, "You give them something to eat." We took that seriously when we started our Dilworth Soup Kitchen. And, like the disciples marveling over the multiplied loaves and fishes, we've been surprised by the bounty that has come from that ministry and the number of lives impacted by it--still serving hundreds almost nine years after its birth. It is, of course, only a natural progression from thinking theologically about the Table and responding to our Lord, who

Sunday, October 1st is World Communion Sunday. It is a day when churches all over the world celebrate communion together. It is a big deal. There's so much wrong with our world, so many divisions between us even in this one nation, and even within the church battles are being fought that certainly break Jesus' heart. But at times, we gust to beauty. World Communion Sunday has the potential to be one of those moments of beauty. See further reflection on World Communion Sunday on page 3 of this newsletter.

With this theology of the Table woven deep into our identities, the Future Story Team has dreamed of an Open Table Service--an evening worship experience that incorporates a simple meal shared and real conversation around tables in our sanctuary. We are looking to have our first Open Table Service sometime this Fall. The plan is to begin them quarterly, and then more often as we all get the hang of this new way of doing church. What will we need to get this started? Some willing souls who can help plan and put together a simple meal (soup and homemade bread, to start), who can commit to attending and participating for the few Sundays this service will happen, who will want to step out into something new and unfamiliar--even in a familiar setting, who will be willing to invite friends and strangers to be part of it, too. The beliefs are there, the welcome of Christ is there, and the Holy Spirit is moving, too. What about you?

## Church Happenings

Phil Bauer is a church member who is currently serving time in the Federal Correctional Institution in Okdale, LA. As he is developing in his faith and seeking ways to serve God. I asked him to share reflection with us about Communion. As we approach World Communion Sunday, consider our brothers and sisters in Christ who are far away as you also reflect on "What does communion mean to me?" Jolin W. McElroy

## What does Communion (The Lord's Supper) Mean to Me?

First let me say that the verses from Luke 22: 14-20 gives us the best description of that moment. Especially "And He took bread, and when He had given thanks, He broke it and gave it to them saying 'This is My body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me.' And likewise the cup after they had eaten saying "This cup that is poured out for you is the New Covenant in My Blood." For these two verses is a promise that we all can partake in. As I partake of the bread, I see Christ being beaten, spit upon, slapped, whipped until parts of his flesh are torn away from the bone. Then the Cross, as he is laid out with his hands and arm stretched out and being nailed to it, as his feet in the same manner. Then the Cross being brought up for all to see. Through that show of love, Christ forgave us all at that time. Once he gave up his spirit, to make sure Christ was dead, a spear was pieced into his side, and water and blood flowed out. Christ paid it all for us! With this vision still my mind I reflect on His entire Life from birth, his Ministry, and all his trials and teachings.

What goes through my mind, I think of my life, mostly from the time or start of my incarceration, while in county jail for 2 1/2 years. I went to church services every Sunday, not once was Communion given. When I finally got here in Federal Prison, my first Sunday in February 2013, I went to Sunday service and at that time I was told they have communion, my heart was pounding hard in my chest, I was shaking. When communion was passed around and got to me, I was trembling bad. As I held the bread and cup, with my eyes closed and praying, that's when the flood gates open up, tears and tears were coming down, not tears of sadness, but tears of Joy and Comfort. All this time in my mind I was thinking "How can I be worthy of taking of this cup of communion?" The answer came to me at that time. Only through Christ are we worthy to partake of His sacrificial death, burial and resurrection. We alone can't do it.

One might be asking what does this have to do with "What does communion mean to me?" Well, brothers and sisters, it means for me: Love. Love -- what Christ went through for me His entire Life -- will always be there. I can always look to Him for everything and know his arms are wide open waiting for me to come and feel His presence all around me and in me.

In one of my studies, a quote I like is this, "He is both God and man, His death becomes the infinite sacrifice for sin and the gift of Life." "(The Gospel of Mark by Rhoderick D. Ice, pg 70 from American Bible Academy). With this in mind I quote from Paul in I Cor 13:13 "So now faith, Hope, and Love abide, these three, but the greatest of these is Love" (ESV).

That's what communion means to me, Christ's unselfish Love. He paid it all for us at the Cross. So "Do this in Remembrance of Me!"

# YOUR GENERAL BOARD: UPDATE

The General Board held its regularly scheduled meeting on Sunday, August 27.

**Finance Update:** Offerings and other revenue through the end of August totaled \$ 131,195; expenditures totaled \$ 131,794, so the budget was essentially in balance. However, projected offerings are behind by well over \$ 5,000 for this point in the year. Not making projections will either directly affect Missions giving or essential expenditures (payroll, building operation). You will be receiving a letter via email (or hard copy for those who don't have email) in the coming week asking to prayerfully consider your current commitment to the church and if possible, to give a little extra.

The Board is grateful for your continual support of our faith community with your time, talent and financial resources. It is only with your support that our church is able to live out its mission: "To love as Jesus loved and serve God in all we do."

#### Board Action on Finance Team Recommendations.

The Board unanimously approved the following recommendations from the Finance Team (Julie Burch Board, Steve Clifton, Chip Givens, Connie Marchbank, David Wagoner, Paul West, and Jolin McElroy). These recommendations are aimed at helping the church better manage cash flow fluctuations as well as earmark certain revenues specifically for Church Missions.

- <u>Establish a new General Operating Reserve Fund in the amount of \$5,000</u>. The Trustees have agreed to seed the new fund with a loan contribution of \$5,000. The loan is with the understanding that the Church will repay the Trustees the total amount as soon as feasible, using Use of Building (rental) Revenues. The money in the Reserve fund will be used to address short-term cash flow issues, i.e. when giving falls short in weeks when payroll or other essential expenditures are due. The Treasurer will use the least amount necessary in Operating Reserves to make up for the shortage in General Operating funds in order to meet these obligations.
- Establish a Board policy for any revenues the Church receives for Use of the Building(s) as follows: 20% to go into the Designated Fund for Missions; 80% to go into the new Operating Reserve Fund. This policy is effective immediately, starting with revenue received under the space rental agreement for private music instruction. Any revenues received from any future expansion of rental space as well as revenues from fees for Weddings will be subject to the 20/80 designation.
- Establish a Board policy that all "undesignated" revenues that come to the Church be subject to the same 20% Missions, 80% Operating Reserve designation. An example of undesignated revenues is occasional rental of space to movie production companies.
- <u>Establish a Board policy that any new spending proposals over \$ 500 come through the Finance Team, appointed by the Moderator, for review and recommendation prior to coming to the Board.</u> The only exception would be for expenditures relating to emergencies, e.g. urgent maintenance or repairs to keep church property safe.

**New Wedding Policy:** The Future Story envisions opening up the Sanctuary to serve as a Wedding Chapel. Not only will this provide greater exposure of FCC to the community, it will provide a revenue source to help fund Church Missions. The Board is grateful to David and Ginger Wagoner who have led the team to revise the current policy. Action on the new policy was deferred to a future meeting to give the Board more time to study it.

Once the policy is adopted, the church will need a small team of people to tend to the details - as well as people interested in serving as paid Wedding Hosts. See related item in this Newsletter. Please let me know if you are interested in serving in either capacity.

<u>Building Use Policy.</u> The Board reviewed the first draft of the new policy and offered several comments and suggested changes. The revised draft will be on a future Board agenda. Many thanks to Steve Clifton for leading this effort.

**2018 Church Leadership:** The Moderator has appointed the following people to serve as the Nominating Committee for 2018: Chip Givens, Leslie Therrien, Diane Vogt and Laura West. The Committee is seeking candidates to serve as Moderator, Vice Moderator, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Secretary, Historian, Trustees, Elders, Deacons and Junior Deacons. This is a wonderful opportunity to share your time and talents to lead and support FCC. Your church needs you. If you are interested in serving in any of these positions, please contact any member of the Committee.

\*Note Change in Board Meeting Schedule\*: Due to the planned absence of several Board members for family or other reasons, the September 24 Board meeting is cancelled. The last Board meeting for 2017 has been rescheduled for Sunday, October 15 (moved up from the original date of October 22). Important items for the October agenda include: approval of the recommended Slate of Officers and Board Members for 2018; approval of the 2018 Ministry Finance Plan; Wedding Policy; and Building Use Policy. Board meetings are open to all. If you have any questions or would like to address the Board at its next meeting, please contact me.

<u>Annual Congregational Meeting:</u> Sunday, November 19, immediately following Worship. The Congregation will be asked to take action on the 2018 proposed Slate and Ministry Finance Plan.

## Update on Harvey and Irma:

#### Hurricane Irma:

Week of Compassion partners are assessing the extensive damage in Cuba. We have set aside funds to support the coming appeal, once response plans are in place.

Power outages and flooding continue in Florida and along the southeast coast. Week of Compassion is working with regional leadership to assess the effects of Irma on our Disciples congregations. Reports of roof damage and flooding at homes and church buildings have already begun, and we anticipate many more as people are able to return from evacuation locations. Congregations across Florida and the southeast continue to offer shelter and assistance to their communities, with support from regional leadership.

Week of Compassion has an ongoing relationship with the Volusia Interfaiths/Agencies Networking in Disaster, where we are supporting long-term recovery from Hurricane Matthew. We have reached out to offer additional assistance for additional efforts responding to Irma.

#### Hurricane Harvey:

In the last week, Week of Compassion has distributed over \$100,000 in solidarity grants to households and churches through the Coastal Plains Area and Southwest Region. Additionally, our staff has provided information and pastoral support to Disciples congregations making significant impact in their local areas. Our congregations span the impact zone-from Corpus Christi, Aransas Pass, and Victoria in the west, to Beaumont, Port Arthur, and Orange in the east; from Galveston and Texas City in the south, to Conroe and Kingwood in the north. Disciples have distributed more than 1000 clean up buckets and have helped muck out dozens of houses. Congregations have collected school supplies, hosted meals, and offered prayer for and with their neighbors.

Together with Disciples Volunteering and local and regional leaders, Week of Compassion is planning for long-term recovery support and volunteer opportunities.

Under the new policy, the church will provide a Wedding Host who will be present on the day of the rehearsal and the day of the wedding. The Host will represent the church and help the wedding party with specific facility-related needs on that day. Wedding Hosts will be paid for hours worked, at \$ 30 per hour, with revenue coming from fees charged to couples (reduced fees for church members).
