

## From the Pastor

"Steadfast love and faithfulness will meet; righteousness and peace will kiss each other."

--Psalm 85:10



Last week in worship, we were all introduced to a few songs in a video that was made for our Stewardship Drive this year. That video showed photographs of various events, gatherings, ministries, and friendships within First Christian Church. The photos were submitted by various members and friends of our church, seeking to describe how we've enjoyed our connection to our church over the past year. It is worth watching, so if you haven't had the chance to see it, we will be posting it on Facebook and on our website in the near future. Among the songs shared on that video, there is a song called "God is on The Move" by 7eventh Time Down. The words evoke some of our story as a church:

Anytime a heart turns from darkness to light,
Anytime temptation comes and someone stands to fight,
Anytime somebody lives to serve and not be served,
I know . . .
God is on the move, on the move, Hallelujah!
God is on the move in many mighty ways . . .
God is on the move, on the move today!

Our story as a church is less a story about us than it is a story about God's action among us. This is the church God decided wouldn't close back in the early 1990s, when the numbers got down to 14 or 15 on a Sunday. This is the church that, with very little money in the mid 1990s, decided to do a major renovation to salvage the Christian Education Building and secure it for future ministry. This church pioneered calling a woman pastor before many people had ever met or heard of one. Countless times, this church provided a welcome to people who were otherwise displaced or shunned or lost or hungry or broken. More than one sobriety story is connected to First Christian Church. This church has become family to people who have felt very much alone. This church learned about refugees before refugees were part of the national debate and we joined with people who had escaped religious persecution--not because we all decided to do the right thing, but because God decided to send us new friends who would become brothers and sisters in Christ just by walking through our doors. We were taught through our relationships with real people about the right thing. This church championed a dream to provide a soup kitchen (in Dilworth of all places!). Now, there are multiple soup kitchens in our area. This church decided to tackle literacy problems among schoolchildren and provided books for an entire first grade of a school with many at risk children. First graders have cheered and celebrated because of FCC's donations of books two years in a row. This church makes a difference consistently. It is a church with heart--and more often than we might realize, that heart of ours is evidence of God on the move right here. This church has sent people to camp and then to college. This church has encouraged wild hopes and fervent prayers as it has cheered its young people forward.

I received another email a few weeks ago from Dilworth Elementary School. They're having another field trip in the near future to our Fellowship Hall to donate supplies and decorations to our Dilworth Soup Kitchen. Dilworth Elementary is not the only one! We are a regular destination for St. Patrick's Catholic School as well. Could the renovators of the Christian Education Building imagine, back in the 1990s, that the Fellowship Hall would become a field trip destination with such relevance? Or, what's more, that hundreds of people would be fed weekly because of the generosity of this church in providing the place and the equipment and the environment for such an effort to thrive?

Over and over again, I see God on the move here. As you consider what you can share with the church for the coming year, please know that what you give makes an impact that reaches far beyond this congregation-beyond even the wonderful faces on that video. Why? Because God as at the heart of it, and has been for many years. May it always be so.



### **MISSIONS NEWS - What's Happening?**



## YOUR GENERAL BOARD: OCTOBER UPDATE

The General Board met on Sunday, September 30.

**<u>Finances:</u>** Total offerings/ revenue year-to-date through the end of September were \$ 141,791. Total expenditures were \$ 146,393, or a difference of \$ 4,602.

Two serious concerns were discussed by the Board: 1) need for additional heating and air conditioning repairs of about \$ 1,800; and, most critically, 2) the church is not meeting the 2018 operating budget goal of 5% (\$ 10,000) for Missions giving. Year-to-date, no church operating budget funds have gone to Missions, due to other high priority expenses for payroll and facilities. Of course, the church provides a great deal of in-kind support to Missions, including Loaves and Fishes; school supplies for Classroom Central; books for children; Lenten Season of Service; and hosting the Dilworth Soup Kitchen. Most of this support is provided by individuals giving goods or time directly, and it does not flow through the church budget.

On October 5, a letter was emailed to members and friends regarding the need to give above and beyond normal offerings in order to support Missions giving through the operating budget.

The 2018 Stewardship Campaign, led by Steve Clifton, has been kicked off and will continue through October. A video prepared by Laura West will be sent out via email to help promote the campaign.

The Board is grateful to all who support and sustain the ministries of our church.

<u>Assistant Treasurer responsibilities</u>. The Board approved unanimously the appointment of Pam McKnight and Tammy Pereboom as Co-Assistant Treasurers to serve the remainder of 2018.

<u>Finance Team:</u> The team will present the proposed 2019 Ministry Finance Plan for approval by the Board at the October meeting, and approval by the Congregation in November. Members of the team are: Julie Burch Board, Julie Bogguss, Steve Clifton, Chip Givens, David Knight, Connie Marchbank, Diane Vogt, and Paul West.

<u>Nominating Committee</u>: The Committee is developing the 2019 Slate of Officers and Board members for approval by the Board in October and approval by the Congregation in November. Members of the Committee are: Julie Bogguss, Chair, Karen Artz, Chip Givens and Laura Hughes.

<u>Constitution and By-Laws Revision</u>. Julie Bogguss presented draft revisions to the Constitution and By-Laws for review. Steve Clifton and Chip Givens, past Moderators, have assisted in the revision effort. Neither document have been revised since 2008 so it is way past time. A major goal is to reduce the size of the Board and to update the Committee structure. With Board approval of final changes in October, they will be presented to the Congregation for approval in November.

**Garden Team.** The team has begun its work to develop a plan to revitalize the old playground area into a beautiful garden. Team members include: Julie Bogguss, Chair, Steve Clifton, Laura Hughes, David Knight, Michelle Daigler, Nancy Carol Stahl and Carol Tarcza. Others are invited to join them! This is a long-term project for which funding will need to be identified. *The team is looking for help in writing grant applications so if you have this experience or know of someone who does, please contact Julie Bogguss*.

<u>Next Meeting:</u> The Board will meet on Sunday, October 21, 12:15 p.m., Fellowship Hall. Please note this is a change from the usual 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of the month and the last scheduled meeting for 2018. Board meetings are open to all. *Beginning with the October meeting, the Board agenda will be posted in the church entryway and choir room on the day of the meeting.* Minutes of meetings are available to anyone who would like a copy. ## CHURCH COMPUTER NEEDS CAN YOU HELP?


### **Laptop Need**

### "God is nigh"

The earliest official reference to using "Taps" at a military funeral is described in an 1891 manual. During the Civil War, a Union soldier "was buried at a time when the battery occupied an advanced position concealed in the woods." Because it wasn't safe to fire the customary three volleys over the grave, Captain John Tidball decided the sounding of "Taps" would be an appropriate substitute ceremony.

Previously, "Taps" signaled the end of a soldier's work day, but it has since come to honor the end of his or her earthly life. Horace Trim's lyrics remind us of God's constant presence:

Day is done, gone the sun From the lakes, from the hills, from the sky All is well, safely rest God is nigh.

Thanks and praise for our days 'Neath the sun, 'neath the stars, 'neath the sky As we go, this we know God is nigh.
