These visits always attract a large number of kids. Unfortunately once our regular schedule starts again we will not be able to continue going every weekend but we hope to be able to go every two weeks.

Our community film screening programme has been very popular this month. We go to different locations on the island and screen a film for children in the street using a projector and small speakers. This always attracts lots of children, as well as adults, and provides entertainment to the community. We hope in the next couple of months to expand this programme to communities on the mainland who have even less access to this form of entertainment.

Unfortunately we will be losing four of our members this month, some of who will be pursuing further studies outside the island.
