Official date set for reopening of Jefferson drawbridge

During a recent city council meeting in Ecorse, Wayne County officials delivered much awaited news regarding progress on the Jefferson Avenue drawbridge. After providing a brief presentation, Assistant County Executive June Lee announced that the bridge is set to reopen in August 2016 – considering no delays emerge during the process.

With work already underway on the \$17 million project, workers will repair damage stemming from May 2013, when an intoxicated operator lowered the drawbridge onto a passing freighter. The incident halted a large amount of traffic flow between Detroit and River Rouge, as many drivers use Jefferson Avenue as an alternate route to I-75. Over the past two years, several residents have lost jobs, while local businesses report a steady decrease in customer traffic.

"The bridge being out of commission has had a drastic effect because it relegates our



Bill package calls for assurances for affordable, clean water

LANSING - State Representatives Stephanie Chang (D-Detroit), LaTanya Garrett (D-Detroit), Sheldon Neeley (D-Flint), Julie Plawecki (D-Dearborn Heights) and state Senator Bert Johnson (D-Detroit) will announce the introduction of a bipartisan, bicameral package of bills to address the water affordability and quality issues that are occurring in Detroit, Highland Park and Flint at a press conference on Thursday, Nov. 12, at 11:30 a.m. in Rooms 402-403 of the state Capitol in Lansing. The representatives will be joined by Melissa Mays, a Flint mother, and Nicole Hill from Detroit. The women will explain their individual experiences with Flint's unsafe drinking water and Detroit's water shut-offs. Also joining the representatives to show their support will be representatives from groups that have worked with families and homeowners in these cities.

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Charters and heavy testing hurt our schools

ways to get rid of them.

Across the country, parents have been in revolt against high-stakes standardized testing, with kids tested over and over again while creativity is cut out of classroom curricula. Parents — particularly in targeted urban schools from Chicago to Boston — are also marching against the forced closing of neighborhood schools, displacing kids and shutting down needed neighborhood centers.

Now there is more and more evidence that the parents have it right — and the deeppocket "reformers" are simply wrong.

First, the Obama Administration — which has pushed high-stakes testing as central to its education agenda - announced that kids were being tested too often, with too much school time devoted to preparing for and taking required tests. In what a writer for the New Yorker described as a major "mea culpa," the administration now recommends that standardized testing be limited to 2 percent of class time. Maybe music, art and creativity will have a chance once more.

Second, a report by the Center for Media and Democracy on charter schools — the centerpiece of the so-called reformers' agenda — reports that some \$3.7 billion in federal money has been larded onto charter schools in the past two decades with virtually no accountability. The result is often a simple rip-off: schools that never open or open for a few months and shut down. Some highly touted cyber charters — schools featuring online courses - are, as Education Week reported, essentially useless, like not going to school at all. Others, like the highly touted New York Success Academy Schools, apparently boost their test scores by identifying low-performing students who have "got to go" and finding

And now the National Assessment of Education Progress, the gold standard for measuring progress, reports that American kids have lost ground in math, and either were stagnant (4th graders) or worse (8th graders) in reading.

Charters are spreading like kudzu; wall-to-wall standardized testing is nearly universal — and the parents are right: It isn't working.

The reality, as National Education Association President Lily Eskelsen Garcia has pointed out, is that the nations that have outperformed the U.S. in recent years don't do the things that the deep-pockets reformers have been touting. They don't terrorize teachers; they train, respect and pay them. They don't set up private charters and drain money from public education; they devote more resources to the poorest students, not less. They don't do repeated highstakes standardized testing; they evaluate teachers and students carefully, mentor them and improve them.

The school "reformers" are hurting, not helping. Closing neighborhood schools too often divorces parents from their students' schools. Demeaning teachers is leading to higher turnover, when experience is central to becoming a good teacher. Repeated standardized testing takes the joy out of learning, making kids less likely to find their strength.

Obama rejects pipeline

Presiden Obama finally rejected the Keystone Pipeline XL late last week ending seven years pitting oil companies and Republicans against environmentalists and liberal activists.

The State Department has been reviewing the pipeline for much of Obama's time in office. The president cited the country's leadership in climate change as a reason for the rejection, saying "approving this project would have undercut that leadership".

"When I'm president, Keystone will be approved, and President Obama's backward energy policies will come to an end," Florida Sen. Marco Rubio said in a statement.

Louisiana Gov. Bobby Jindal, whose state could benefit from the pipline tweeted, "President Obama is bowing to radical environmentalists and snubbing thousands of high quality, high paying energy sector jobs".

The desision also ticked off organized labor. Terry O'Sullivan, the general president of the Laborers' International Union of North America, blasted the decision. "After a seven-year circus of cowardly delay, the President's decision to kill the Keystone XL Pipeline is just one more indication of an utter disdain and disregard for salt-of-the-earth, middleclass working Americans," O'-Sullivan said.

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

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Hands-free driving is not distraction-free

Recent studies have shown that hands-free devices - i.e. earpieces, dashboard systems and speakerphones – still pose a risk for mental distraction while driving on the road. 
local business district to a dead end street," said River Rouge City Commissioner Dan Cooney. "People used to roll through town to get to work in Delray or Downtown Detroit. During that time, they may have stopped for a tank of gas, or frequented a restaurant for breakfast or lunch. Now they're forced to go around us to I-75. And with the Fort Street bridge also out of commission, it's caused an additional problem with dangerous potholes on the I-75 bridge because everyone now has to use the freeway just to get around the Rouge River.

"Top that off with the fact that people are losing jobs because without business, some places have had to cut down on their employees, and other businesses have had to close altogether."

County executives maintain that the bridge closure's economic impact has been taken into consideration, and that a lengthy rebuilding process is necessary to ensure the structure is safe for travel. Nevertheless, downriver residents and business owners express immense frustration over the two year time frame it's taken to begin work on the bridge.

Though Cooney voices the same disappointment, he still believes that the county is making steady strides to get the area back on track.

"You can only beat up on the county so much," he said. "I know a lot of people felt that the delay involved money, but the \$17 million it takes to fix the bridge has been picked up by the insurance company; that's not the issue. The reality remains that the previous administration kind of dropped the ball on fixing this bridge. A matter of days after Warren Evans was sworn into office, he came to our council meeting to let everyone know that

In the end, Cooney foresees the bridge's eventual reopening as an immense benefit to the entire downriver area.

"This bridge issue is really important to River Rouge, Ecorse and the rest of the downriver community because of the advantage we have of taking back streets in and out of downtown Detroit," he said. "Another very important reason we need it fixed is because they're about to start construction on Delray's Gordy Howe International Bridge next summer, which is a five year project. Once the Jefferson bridge is rebuilt, our area is going to be a global transportation hub. Many people who used to go through Gordy Howe will be using our structure to access jobs, and to support the local businesses. In my opinion, our city has a once in a lifetime opportunity to reinvent itself as a community by tying into the development and construction of the

Each week, River Rouge offers a Friday SMART Bus service for local residents in need of transportation around the city. The program runs from 9 AM to 3 PM, and is open to citizens of all ages.

Though the service has been offered for nearly five years, it will serve as the perfect accommodation for residents this winter.

"We just got a new bus about a month ago; it will pick people up so they don't have to walk far in the winter." said Citv Administrative Assistant, Jeanie Hubbard. "It has set stops and goes around the city on a route. So a lady over on Visger may want to go over to Family Dollar, and it will take her there and drop her off. Someone else may want to go to Bi Rite for food, or stop to get a haircut and grab medication from the Rouge Pharmacy. It's a really great program."

Each Friday, the bus sets out on a main route beginning at

Forest and Jefferson Avenue, and ventures to various points around the area. Residents can indicate where they need to go, and can expect to be dropped off and picked up after completing their errands. Additionally, special arrangements may be made for senior citizens needing special drop off/pick up accommodations. In the end, the service aims to address the needs of various residents throughout the city. "This is really great, especially in the wintertime," said Hubbard. "Half of the people who ride the bus really just need to get out of the house. They're taken down to McDonalds, and then just sit there for an hour to have coffee and a cheeseburger. Then that bus comes back around to pick them up, and they're really grateful because it gave them an opportunity to get out, at least for a minute. That's why this is so important. We're really glad to offer it."



As of Monday, November 9, 2015, the Pistons are 5-1 and have the fourth-best record in the NBA. Detroit picked up its fifth win of the season with a 120-103 victory at Portland (11/8) after trailing by as many as 18 points in the third quarter. The Pistons win at Portland was their first since 2005-06, and the team ranked fifth in the NBA in opponent's points allowed (94.0). Reggie Jackson scored a career-high 40 points at Portland and ranks ninth in the NBA in points per game (23.2). The Detroit Pistons have the second toughest strength of schedule in the NBA so far this season.


However, Andre Drummond leads the NBA in rebounds per game (20.3) and offensive rebounds per game (7.2). With that saying, the NBA announced today that Pistons Center Andre Drummond has been named Eastern Conference Player of the Week for games played from November 2 through November 8. Drummond becomes the first Piston to win the award in consecutive weeks and the first player to win the award in the first two weeks of the season since Le-Bron James in 2012 with the Miami Heat.

Drummond averaged 22.0 points, 24.3 rebounds, 1.7 blocks and 2.3 steals and shot

69% from the field in leading the Pistons to a 2-1 week including wins at Phoenix (11/6) and at Portland (11/8). He recorded 25 points and a career-high 29 rebounds vs. Indiana (11/3) and scored a season-high 29 points to go with 27 rebounds at Portland. His two 25-point/25-rebound games gave him three for his career, which ranks as the most among active players. Only Dwight Howard (2) and Al Jefferson (2) have recorded multiple 25-point/25rebound games among active players. Drummond, who averaged 8.0 offensive rebounds and 16.3 defensive rebounds for the week, joined Wilt Chamberlain and Kareem Abdul-Jabbar as the only players in NBA history to record three 20-point/20-rebound games in their first six games of a season.

Drummond, who leads the NBA in rebounding, is the first Piston to record six consecutive double-doubles to start a season since Bill Laimbeer in 1986-87. His 122 rebounds through six games this season are the most since Dennis Rodman recorded 120 in 1994. His 20.3 points and 20.3 rebounds per game through six games this season are the most by any player since Wilt Chamberlain in 1970-71.

Schools. The youth placed flowers at the gravesites of the fallen soldiers and the Martin Luther King H. S. Band performed the Star spangled Banner.

The Chairperson for this year's ceremony was Robert B. Middleton of the Detroit Historic Civil War Society along with Joannie Capuano, Executive Director of the Historic Elmwood Foundation. On hand to participate in the event were City Council member Rev. Andre Spivev, representatives from the Charles Wright Museum, retired veterans from over 20 local organizations. The event was co-sponsored by the Detroit Public Schools Academy of Military

The 1st Michigan Colored Infantry was formed on February 17, 1863, after an editorial and letter writing campaign by Henry Barns, an editor for the Detroit Tribune and Advertiser. Barns was commissioned the regiment's first colonel for his efforts; he maintained this post until voluntarily stepping down in favor of a regular army officer. The regiment was organized at Camp Ward, located on a farm in Detroit. A historical marker was erected at Macomb St. East of Chene at Duffield School. Eight-hundred-forty-five men from Detroit, southern Michigan, and Ontario, Canada, volunteered for the regiment. There were two men from Ecorse -Samuel Pearce, Thomas Seymour. (A complete list of the 102nd colored troop can be found at http://www.mifamilyhistory.org/civilwar/cwcoloredinfantry/countylist.aspx?id=Wa yne.

Some of these early volunteers were escaped slaves from the Underground Railroad; 72 had been living in Canada where their status as free men was assured. While all were fighting against slavery, some were fighting to free actual family members who may have still been in slavery. For these early black volunteers particularly, to step into the spotlight by volunteering took enormous courage, not to mention the bravery of those who crossed back into the US to fight.

The Battle of Honey Hill was the third battle of Sherman's March to the Sea, fought November 30, 1864, during the American Civil War. Attacks were launched by U.S. Colored Troops that included a brigade the 54th Massachusetts (depicted in the movie Glory) and 55th Massachusetts. This was the last battle of the 102nd.

The 900 man unit left Detroit on March 28, 1864. The regiment, only lost 10 percent of its men during the nineteen months the regiment was in the field, campaigning throughout South Carolina, eastern Georgia and Florida. In Baldwin, Florida, 21 miles away from Jacksonville, the unit was attacked suddenly by a Confederate cavalry force. The soldiers easily defeated the Confederates, which proved to their officers that they were just as skilled and reliable as any other infantry.

The total enrollment in the

Photo by Dale Rich people died of wounds, and 129 people died of disease. They fought for days under the most adverse weather conditions without the benefit of shelter or tents. As a result of this extreme exposure they suffered serious and debilitating health problems for the remainder of their lives. When the war ended and these veterans applied for service connected disability, the Government was extremely strict; the burden was on the veterans; and many of their pensions were often denied.
