A conversation with Panthers Head Football Coach Corey Parker

On Saturday, the River Rouge Panthers football team faced off against Grand Rapids West Catholic in their first ever state championship appearance. During an exciting matchup at Ford Field, the Panthers fell 40-34 to the reigning title contenders, but their historic season stands as the school's best season ever – undoubtedly providing a preview of what's to come in the future.

To celebrate the Panthers' epic season, we sat down with Coach Corey Parker to gain insight on the team's historic run. Last weekend, the Panthers suffered a tough loss. How are the players handling everything?

Like men. They looked at this game as the opportunity of a lifetime, however they also view the loss as a moment that they will grow from. Their chins are up, and they'll be fine because they have each other.

It's definitely a brotherhood, and everyone is really proud of each other because We shocked the world, got to a state championship and almost took down the juggernaut. Overall, they're doing just fine.

This was such a historic year. What was the team's overall record?

We were 12-2. Our only loss came to Notre Dame Prep, and then of course Grand Rapids West Catholic in the state championship. This was their third win in a row, and they've been to the championship game several times over the past six years.



What Does Terrorism Look Like?

I am among the tens of millions who had to be peeled away from their television set on Friday, November 13 and in the days after ISIS terrorists randomly massacred at least 130 people and wounded hundreds more in Paris. Then, there was the nearly 30 people executed at a hotel in Bamako, Mali. And there were the several threats against New York City, and the presidential and police responses to those threats. This terrorism has caused fear and insecurity in France, Belgium and the United States.

Terrorism is defined as the use of criminal acts to inspire human fear. ISIS engages in their criminal acts to create a sense of instability in parts of the Western world. Days after the massacre, those who planned and participated in the carnage were found, and some were killed (or blew themselves us). Catching these few terrorists will not stop.

Some political pundits that appeared on news programs urged the United States and others to consider the "root causes" of ISIS, while others think that actions in the West are to blame (consider the Charlie Hebdo attack and those who blamed a magazine cover for the assassination of journalists). I'm not sure that this is the most appropriate or compassionate response so quickly after the terrorist attacks. Still, these are questions that must eventually be answered. What should our response be? Is this war? Are we prepared to endure another Vietnam, committing U.S. lives to a ground war that is perhaps unwinnable?

We can expect more security and scrutiny, and appropriately so. It is also unfortunately likely, however, that some of the scrutiny will have an element of profiling (especially racial profiling) involved, since many (perhaps most) of the ISIS terrorists are young, male, and Muslim But despite Donald Trump's jingoistic insanity, do we want to stop everyone who "looks" like a Muslim. What does a Muslim look like? What does a terrorist look like?

Just a few days before the Paris massacre, the news was dominated by Black student

protests around country, at the University of Missouri at Columbia, and at Ithaca College, Yale University, Smith College, Claremont McKenna College and the University of Kansas. Many of these protests were in solidarity with the Mizzou students and in solidarity with the #BlackLivesMatter movement. There is no comparison between what happened in Paris and what has happened on many campuses, it occurs to me that the "n-" word bandied about is an act of terror that is designed to make African American students feel insecure and unsafe. This is why the students who ask for "safe space" should be encouraged, not ridiculed.

Strewing cotton balls on the lawn in front of the black culture center on Mizzou Campus is an act of terror, designed to exploit feelings of insecurity. It is neither a trivial act, nor a prank, but an act of hate. It is especially hateful when the perpetrators are fairly certain that they will not be caught and that there are few consequences for their actions. In the domestic context, anonymous terrorism is especially unsettling because one rarely understands exactly who the terrorists are. Anonymous terrorism reminds me of the KKK, the criminals who only felt safe when they hid behind hoods and sheets.

Campus racism has long-term consequences for young African Americans. Some will learn how to protest and carry the spirit of protest with them for the rest of their lives. Others, unfortunately, will learn to "go along to get along", internalizing the lessons of intimidation. They are the young people who dismiss racism as "no big thing". But it was a big thing when White Tulsans burned down Black Wall Street, and no one stood in solidarity. Lynching was a terrorist act, but Congress would not pass anti-lynching legislation. Those terrorist actions took place in the early 20th century, but later, Bull Connor was a terrorist. George Wallace was a terrorist. Comb our history and you'll find any number of terrorists who perpetrated criminal acts against African Americans. Those who ignored those criminal acts create a climate where racial terrorism can occur.

The White thug who massacred nine people at Emanuel AME Church in South Carolina committed a heinous act of terrorism. The people of Emanuel fought back with a loving defiance. They wouldn't stop going to church, they wouldn't stoop to hate. Still, the slaughter of nine people had a national impact.

The people of the United States mourn with our brothers and sisters in Paris as they sort through the aftermath of death, wounding, and destruction. We stand in solidarity with them against the evil that ISIS represents. And we stand in solidarity with the domestic terrorism that pollutes the atmosphere at some of our nation's college campuses, and in other public spaces. The University of Missouri President Timothy Wolfe who refused to address campus racism was sanctioning terrorism. I shudder about what happened in Paris, and I also shudder at those who find domestic racial terrorism acceptable. If carnage in France provokes war, what should racial terrorism in the United States provoke?

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
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Detroit Red Wings School Assembly Program visits Grandport Academy

have appeared at previous occasions – though none were able to attend last week's event.



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

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December 1st brought awareness to World AIDS Day

AIDS stands for "acquired immune deficiency syndrome" or "acquired immunodeficiency syndrome" and denotes a condition, which results from the damage done by HIV (human immunodeficiency virus) to the immune system. The condition was first identified in 1981 and the name "AIDS" was first introduced on July 27, 1982.


HIV can only be transmitted between people through direct contact of a mucous membrane or the blood stream with a bodily fluid. Hence, there has been a lot of stigma around the spread of HIV and people living with HIV and AIDS. It has been estimated that around 33 million people around the world have been infected with HIV and that around two million people die from AIDS related conditions each year. On October 27, 1988, the UN General Assembly officially recognized that the World Health Organization declared December 1, 1988,

to be World AIDS Day. World AIDS Day has also been observed on this date each year since then.

Symbols

A simple red ribbon is one of the most widely recognized symbols of HIV and AIDS and the people who live with these conditions. The symbol was presented by the Visual AIDS Artists Caucus in 1991. The individuals in this group wished to remain anonymous, keep the image copyright free and create a symbol to raise consciousness of HIV and AIDS. The red ribbon was originally intended to be worn as a badge, but is now used in a wide variety of ways.

Out of those 50,000 people diagnosed with new cases annually, around 20,000 do not find out they have it until it becomes full blown aids. The truth: HIV is no longer a death sentence, and those who receive treatment for it have life expectancies that rival those of HIV-negative people.

ground, and what brought you to River Rouge?

What are your predictions for the 2016 season?



There's an expectation now because of the path we've gone. We're not going to sell ourselves short by not holding the kids to those expectations.



The Detroit Tigers announced today that the club has agreed to terms with right-handed pitcher Jordan Zimmermann on a five-year contract. "We are very excited to add a pitcher of Jordan's caliber to our roster," Tigers Executive Vice President of Baseball Operations and General Manager Al Avila said. "Jordan is a durable pitcher who pounds the strike zone and attacks the hitter on every pitch. He's a top of the rotation type talent we've been targeting this offseason."

Zimmermann, 29, made 33 starts with the Washington Nationals in 2015 and compiled a 13-10 record with a 3.66 ERA (201.2IP/82ER) and 164 strikeouts. Zimmermann, who is 6-2 and 223 lbs., walked just 39 batters in his 201.2 innings and ranked sixth in the National League with a 1.74 walks per nine innings.

In seven seasons at the major league level with the Washington Nationals, Zimmermann has made 178 starts and has a career record of 70-50 with a 3.32 ERA.

The Detroit Tigers have been

busy upgrading the team-acquiring outfielder Cameron Maybin from the Atlanta Braves in exchange for lefthanded pitchers Ian Krol and Gabe Speier last week.

"Cameron Maybin is a good outfielder with plenty of experience in center field," said Al Avila, Tigers Executive Vice President of Baseball Operations and General Manager. "He is coming off of a solid offensive season in 2015 and brings speed and athleticism to our club. Brad Ausmus and the coaching staff will determine Cameron's role during Spring Training." Maybin, 28. hit .267 (135x505) with 65 runs scored, 18 doubles, two triples, 10 home runs and 59 RBI in 141 games for the Braves in 2015. Maybin also added 23 stolen bases, which ranked 10th in the National League. Defensively, Maybin had a .991 fielding percentage, committing just three errors in 341 total chances.

Yet as he stares into the eyes of Apollo Creed's son Adonis (Michael B. Adonis struggles. The elder Rocky faces health issues. Bianca has her own challenges. They are misfits. Imperfect people. You stayed glued to their personal dramas. That's the mark of intuitive screenwriting. As you get more and more involved with the characters, the charm of this movie sneaks up on you like a left hook.

Coogler knows how to get great performances out of Jordan. Jordan, an accomplished young actor, knows how to give the director every emotion he seeks. Fear. Anger. Sadness. Joy. You never question Adonis' feelings. They are authentic. Plus Jordan has chiseled his body into a cut, muscular physique. He looks like an explosive boxer. Tessa Thompson as Bianca, the angel who pulls Adonis through to the other side, is vibrant, urban, hip and sweet. Conversely, Anthony Bellew as the flippant Conlan, is as beastly as Mike Tyson just before he bit off Evander Holyfield's ear.

The big surprise is that Sylvester Stallone gives the most compelling and truthful performance of his career. Nothing over the top. Nothing unbelievable. Rocky has lost a couple of steps; his energy is low. He's a senior citizen trying to get by, living vaguely off the past. No wife. Few friends. No glory. He's wrinkled. His hair is gray. He has given in to old age. This is a marked departure from the eternally young-looking Stallone you see on the red carpet, a diehard who looks like he's chasing his youth. Now, he's stripped down and raw, like Mickey Rourke was as Randy "The Ram" Robinson in The Wrestler. Stallone deserves an Oscar nomination for Best Supporting Actor. Ditto Jordan for Best

When you step into the theater to watch this boxing movie, don't look for Rocky. Yes, you'll see and feel remnants of that spirit. But Creed is its own story. Its own franchise. It's the rebellious son that wandered out on its own. For that reason, Baby Boomers and Millennials will dig it.
