WASHINGTON – Gov. Rick Snyder and former Emergency Manager Darnell Earley are scheduled to testify in DC later this month. Governor Snyder is scheduled to appear on March 17 in front of a U.S. House committee investigating the Flint water crisis. U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Administrator Gina McCarthy is also scheduled to be in attendance.

On March 15, Darnell Earley, former Flint Mayor Dayne Walling, former EPA Administrator Susan Hedman and Virginia Tech researcher Marc Edwards are scheduled to appear. Earley did not appear in DC when he was asked to ap-


pear last month. The House Democratic Steering and Policy Committee invited Snyder to appear before them in February, but he declined to attend. However, since that time, Snyder asked Oversight Committee Chair Jason Chaffetz, R-Utah for the opportunity to testify "to explain how the local, state and federal governments combined to fail the people of Flint."

Earley was the emergency manager of Flint at the time the city changed its water source to the Flint River in April 2014. The committee heard testimony Feb. 3 from

LANSING - Secretary of State Ruth Johnson today urged all qualified Michigan voters to participate in the presidential primary election on Tuesday, March 8 and reminded them of what to expect in their polling place.

"This election offers you the opportunity to speak out on who may next lead our nation," said Johnson, Michigan's chief elections officer. "I encourage you to make your voice heard At the polling place, voters will be asked to select a presidential primary ballot for either the Democratic or Republican parties that also may contain local election items. Voters who do not wish to participate in the presidential primary may receive a ballot that contains only local items.

The presidential primary is open to all registered voters. There is no political party registration requirement in Michigan, so voters can choose to participate in either the Democratic or Republican party primary.

Polls are open 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Additional information regarding Michigan's presidential primary can be found at www.Michigan.gov/elections.

CALL TO ACTION Do you feel your property taxes are too high? What should you do?



As many families look for ways to save money each month. One place they should look at is the taxes being charged for their home. Here is some information that will help you determine if there are some savings availible to you.

What is the March Board of Review?

The Board of Review reviews the assessment roll received from the Assessor to check to see it is complete, accurate, uniform and valid. They conduct public hearings in March to hear appeals from property owners.

Should I Appeal to the Board of Review?

Each year, prior to the March meetings of the local board of review, assessment change notices are mailed. These informational notices include State Equalized Value, Taxable Value, the percent of exemption as a Principal Residence or Qualified Agricultural Property, and whether or not an Ownership Transfer has occurred. If you believe the Assessed Value is more than half the value of your property, you may appeal the Assessed and/or Taxable Values at the March Board of Review. You can obtain information about the specific meeting dates and schedule an appearance with the Board of Review by contacting your local assessing office. The Board has no control over millage rates or property taxes. Other reasons to appeal to the Board of Review would include:

CLASSIFICATION: Indicates the use of your property. There are six classifications, Agricultural, Commercial, Developmental, Industrial, Residential and Timber Cutover.

STATUS: Certain properties are tax-exempt.

EQUITY: All properties within the jurisdiction are to be assessed at the same ratio; 50% of True Cash Value.

HARDSHIP: Poverty stricken property owners can request tax relief from the Board of Review through a hardship. Household financial documentation will be necessary.

Am I Required to Attend the March Board for a Commercial/Industrial Real Property? No. As of the year 2007 Commercial and Industrial Real properties no longer have to petition to the March Board of Review. These appeals can be made directly to the Michigan Tax Tribunal on or before May 31st.

Even though we've been short staffed due to the economy, people are there to guide you to a solution and help you find services. Residents just have to make the effort.

Are there any upcoming city developments residents should know about?

We are quite proud to say that we were selected as one of ten Rising Tide communities in the state of Michigan. Our community development staff has also been going after other grants as well, which makes us feel really good.

In October, we'll be hosting the Michigan Supreme Court who will conduct their procedures for one day in our city. This spring, we will also welcome the DIA's Inside-Out exhibit, in addition to Chalk on the Avenue in May. Lastly, we're collaborating with Wayne Metro in terms of demolition, as well as their upcoming program to assist residents with water bills.




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Why President Barack Obama Is One of the **Best Ever**

· Signed the Fair Sentencing Act, which reduced the sentencing disparity between crack-cocaine versus powder cocaine possession from 100 to 1 to 18 to 1 - a disparity that has disproportionately impacted African Americans in this country for decades

 Signed the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act into law in order to reregulate the financial sector after they caused the catastrophic financial crisis

· Health Care and Education Af-

dren to remain covered by their parents' insurance until the age of 26; and requires health insurance plans to disclose how much of the premium actually goes to patient care

· Signed the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, or as we affectionately call it, Obamacare, into law, which now allows over 32 million uninsured Americans to get health coverage

In 2011, President Obama:

· Had known terrorist leader, Osama bin Laden, captured and killed by U.S. Special Forces • Ordered all U.S. military forces out of Iraq, where the last troops left in December 2011

 Signed the FDA Food Safety Modernization Act, which aims to ensure the U.S. food supply is safe by shifting the focus from responding to contamination to preventing it

• Released new fuel standards to increase fuel efficiency for all new cars and trucks sold in the U.S., which will cover cars and light trucks through 2025, and will save consumers money, reduce our dependence on oil, and protect the environment

All of this was done during President Obama's first-term. There are so many other outstanding things that President Obama has done, that it would require more space on the page and more time to discuss. Oh, and don't forget that President Obama managed to get re-elected a second time, in spite of the elaborate schemes and deliberate attempts by his many detractors, who were hell-bent on destroying his astonishing legacy before it truly even began.


strength mentally and physically and so much more. I could go on, but this partial list gives you an idea of the rewards of playing roller derby.

Who were some of your friends that you grew up with?





Along with the JROTC, Interact Club and Basketball team a plea went out from the Robichaud athletic department to



The Detroit Friendship House has provided more than 80 years of client services, tending to the basic needs of residents in both Hamtramck and Detroit. Priding itself as a group of "neighbors helping neighbors", the organization faithfully serves up to 40,000 meals each month to citizens in need of assistance.

With donations from Gleaners Food Bank, Forgotten Harvest and Enlenmenn's Bakeries, the Friendship House offers nonperishable food items to local families, available on a monthly basis. Contributions from private donors are also accepted, in addition to help from volunteers to assist with day to day operations.

Clients can receive assistance several days a week, with the facility remaining open every Tuesday from 3:30 -7:00 PM, Thursday from 1:00 - 4:00 PM, and Saturday from 9:00 AM to 12:00 PM. Each parishioner must be a Hamtramck resident or reside in the 48212 zip

new initiatives which includes receiving a \$700 Million to hire a community relations officer and buy new police vehicles. They will also re-establish the Police Explorer Post which will get youth involved and improving community relations between the residents and the police force. Chief Riley has also created a home ownership program to encourage our police officers to live in our community.

Fire Department

In the last year the fire department has brought in almost 2 million dollars from the distressed cities grant and the Safer grant under the leadership of Chief John Adams. They recently hired 10 new fire fighters and intend to hire 2 more. Currently, they are managing the demolition of 75 blighted homes in the city of Inkster, and we will be applying for additional federal funds to remove even more blighted properties in our city.

City Government

He thanked the employees who he said have done an admirable job over the last 3 1/2 years working as a skeleton crew.

Each and every employee keeps our city running for you every day.

Charter Reform

He focused on the fact that the City has had the same city charter for the last 51 years. He said it is time to do things differently. 

Established in November 2015, the group has seen immense growth in participation at the Booker T. Dozier Recreational Center – an aspect that will be celebrated during their annual showcase this summer called the Divine Experience.

For Hunter, group cofounder

and alumnus of Inkster High School, the team has brought an important element to the area following the dissolution of the school district in 2013.

"I was part of Inkster High's Performance Academy which allowed me to further my career in dance," she said. "Because they closed the schools, my younger sisters attend another district without these types of extracurricular activities, so [Jasmine] and I started a dance team that we wanted to keep in the city. We believed that the kids felt kind of abandoned, so we needed to help bring some programs involving arts and dance.

"Our numbers have tripled since we started; we're outgrowing the room at the recreation complex and our parents are getting more and more involved. It's really exciting to see us grow."





Millage tax increase to be on Romulus ballot on March 8

The citizens of Romulus will have more to vote for on March 8th, than their choice for President of the United States. The wording on the ballot is below:

Shall the City of Romulus, Michigan, borrow the sum of not to exceed **Twenty-Five** Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) and issue its general obligation unlimited tax bonds, in one or more series, payable in not to exceed ten (10) years from the date of issuance, for the purpose of paying the cost of neighborhood street improvements throughout the City, consisting of paving, repaving, resurfacing, reconstructing and improving neighborhood streets, including all related appurtenances and attachments?

The estimated millage to be levied in 2016 is 3.53 mills (\$3.53 per \$1,000 of taxable value) and the estimated simple average annual millage rate required to retire the bonds is 3.55 mills (\$3.55 per \$1,000 of taxable value).

Edwards, Flint resident LeeAnne Walters, and officials from the Environmental Protection Agency and DEQ. U.S. Representative Elijah Cummings, D-Maryland, the ranking member of the committee, wrote a letter Monday, Feb. 22, calling on Chaffetz to request documents from Snyder and his staff on their role in the city's water crisis.

Snyder's office released nearly 300 pages of emails from 2014 and 2015 earlier this year after he promised during his State of the State address to make his correspondence about the water crisis public to ensure that residents have answers about "what we've done."

More than 20,000 other documents have also been released by the Department of Environmental Quality, Department of Health and Human Services, Department of Treasury, Department of Technology, Management and Budget, and Department of Agriculture and Rural Development as part of multiple FOIA requests.

The city reconnected to the Detroit water system in October 2015, but the residents have been told to use bottled water until further notice.

Four-time Grammy Award Winner Stanley Clarke has attained "living legend" status during his over 40-year career as a bass virtuoso. He is the first bassist in history who doubles on acoustic and electric bass with equal ferocity and the first jazz-fusion bassist

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ever to headline tours, selling out shows worldwide. A veteran of over 40 albums, he won the 2011 Best Contemporary Jazz Album Grammy Award for The Stanley Clarke Band. Clarke co-founded the seminal fusion group Return to Forever with Chick Corea and Lenny White. In 2012 Return to Forever won a Grammy Award and Latin Grammy for Best Jazz Instrumental Album, Forever.

Clarke's newest CD, The Stanley Clarke Band: UP, was released on Mack Avenue Records September 30, 2014. Entirely produced by Clarke, he considers UP to be the most energetic, fun, rhythmic and upbeat album that he has ever done. Unlike his predominant acoustic bass work on the last few albums, UP is almost equal electric and acoustic bass.

He revisits one of his classic recordings, the bass anthem "School Days." He was nominated for a 2015 Grammy for Best Instrumental Composition with "Last Train To Sanity" off the UP CD.

Clarke's creativity has been recognized and rewarded in every way imaginable: gold and platinum records, Grammy Awards, Emmy nominations, virtually every readers and critics poll in existence, and more. He was Rolling Stone's very first Jazzman of the Year and bassist winner of Playboy's Music Award for ten straight years. Clarke was honored with Bass Player Magazine's Lifetime Achievement Award and is a member of Guitar Player Magazine's "Gallery of Greats." In 2004 he was featured in Los Angeles Magazine as one of the Top 50 Most Influential People. He was honored with the key to the city of Philadelphia and put his hands in cement as a 1999 inductee into Hollywood's "Rock Walk" on Sunset Boulevard. In 2011 he was honored with the highly prestigious Miles Davis Award at the Montreal Jazz Festival for his entire body of work. Most recently, Clarke won the 2013 and 2014 Downbeat Magazine's Reader's and Critics Poll for Best Electric **Bass Player**

An accomplished film and TV composer of over 65 projects, his credits include Boyz N The Hood, the Tina Turner biopic What's Love Got To Do With It, Romeo Must Die, The Transporter and most recently the 2013 blockbuster, Best Man Holiday. He has garnered three Emmy Nominations and a BMI Award for his scoring. In 2014 Clarke was invited to become a member of the exclusive Academy of Motion Picture Arts & Sciences.
