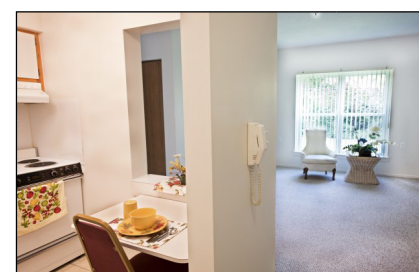

In 2012, for the first time in American history, Black voter turnout (66.2 percent) at the national level exceeded White voter turnout (64.1 percent).

The United States of America is once again at a pivotal and crucial political crossroads. The outcome of the November 8th national elections will determine the future of the nation and of the world.

This is a propitious moment, not only for 47 million Black Americans, but this is also the time for all Americans to decide whether or not American democracy will finally fully embrace the goals of freedom, justice, equality and empowerment for all people.

Don't let anybody attempt to suggest that your vote doesn't count. Every vote counts. For some strange reason, there are several national pundits that are once again predicting a low voter turnout by Black America. These external pollsters and political observers really don't know Black America.

This is one of the reasons why the NNPA and other Black-owned media companies are so strategically important. The NNPA not only knows the facts about Black America, the NNPA also reports and defends the interests of Black America without apology or compromise of principle and integrity.

For nearly 190 years, the Black Press in America has been and continues to be the "trusted voice" of Black America. No political party should take the Black vote for granted. Our votes have mattered and our votes will continue

to matter. We will make the critical difference in the outcome of the upcoming national elections.

"Southside With You"

"Thought he was just another smooth talking brother?" says an inquisitive Chicago mom. She's repeating the words her daughter used to describe a colleague she's meeting for a first date. Never have eight words been so inaccurate. That "he," is a twenty-something Barack Obama. The daughter is Michelle LaVaughn Robinson. As this very romantic and intelligent film brings one of the world's most famous relationships into view, it's easy to see why Barack and Michelle are still in love.

Famous presidential relationships abound. There's the eccentric, Franklyn and Eleanor Roosevelt. The tumultuous, Jack and Jackie. The divisive, Bill and Hillary. Now there's Barack and Michelle, this generation's famous POTUS union. And their relationship is almost the model for cohabitation. Both are smart, sharp, liked and admired. They're private, yet they live their lives in the public eye. How the hell they've kept their marriage together, without much controversy, is a mystery to most. Until now.

It's ironic, but perhaps the best way to understand their relationship is by looking at the seeds of their romance through a reimagined first date, through the eyes of a White filmmaker who doesn't even know them.

First-time writer/director Richard Tanne recreates the first days of the Obama's partnership with a reverence fit for a king and queen and an intimacy few romantic films achieve. It's almost as if you're hiding in the backseat of Barack's old beat-up car and

eavesdropping. Or sitting next to them in the movie theater when they see Spike Lee's "Do The Right Thing." Or standing in the back of a community center when Barack delivers one of his first rousing speeches and Michelle is impressed.

Tanne's efforts are helped greatly by Patrick Scola's unobtrusive cinematography, Lucio Seixas's simple production design, Megan Spatz's lived-in costumes, Evan Schiff's spot on editing (84 minutes) and a caressing musical score by Stephen James Taylor (Maya Angelou and "Still I Rise"). Their collective efforts set the time and place perfectly.

It's 1989, and a hot summer day/night on the Southside of Chicago. Even with the A/C cranked up high it can't cool things down. In the midst of a heat wave, this decades-old African American community faces challenges it still encounters today. A desire to get ahead, live in peace and bring opportunities to a neighborhood that is stymied by crime, an apathetic government and all that goes with life in the inner city.

Michelle Robinson (Tika Sumpter, "Ride Along") is a Harvard Law School-educated attorney working at Sidley Austin LLP, the sixth-largest U.S.-based corporate law firm. As one of only a few Blacks in the office, she's in a highly visible position.

Michelle is the advisor for the first-year law associate Barack Obama (Parker Sawyers). It is

truth. If you don't, I'LL KNOW!" I warned them.

Liars lose trust and get no respect. I also told my children that if they were honest with me, I would be merciful because I can respect honesty. It reminds me of how God says in 1 John 1:9, "If we CONFESS our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." If we are straight up truthful and candid with God about our sin, He obligates Himself to forgive us. That's grace and mercy.

God is sure to forgive us when we are honest about our actions, but people are not as forgiving. Even when there is forgiveness, consequences remain. Usually, when you have misbehaved, erred, done something embarrassing, whether purposely or inadvertently, being honest about it has consequences. There could be loss, major and or minor. Nevertheless, we are called to be honest people if we want to be considered moral. Truth is honorable, noble and righteous. Most of us want to be those things. Honestly, we should be honest.

It's easy to tell the truth when you have nothing to lose. Sometimes telling the truth could cost you a relationship, a job, your reputation, your status, position, safety or maybe even your very life. Sometimes telling is accompanied by consequences. The more severe the consequences, the harder it might be to be honest. Some people lie for no reason, maybe because of a mental problem or self-esteem issues or lie to deceive. But others lie to keep down conflict, avoid trouble or to spare themselves some type of grief.

Honesty is the best policy. It's virtuous. Telling the truth is always the right thing to do. The Bible tells us not to bear false witness or lie (Exodus 20:16). A person who tells the truth at all costs is honorable.

If we are honest, we must admit that people are often dishonest. In an attempt to spare themselves, they withhold or rearrange the truth to their advantage, or so they try. Is there such a thing as a white lie? A lie is a lie is a lie. Is lying ever necessary or justified?

One rule I always gave my children was to tell me the truth no matter what. I told them I would always know the truth and that it would be in their best interest to be forthright and always give me the truth. 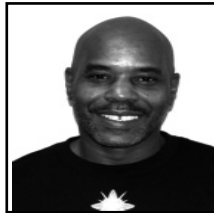

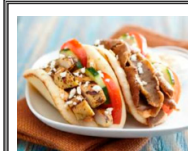

RIVER ROUGE POLICE BLOTTER FOR WEEK ENDING September 3rd, 2016

“What’s going on in Your Neighborhood?”

August 16th, 2016

At 2346hrs, an officer went to a home in the 1000 Block of Coolidge to follow up on a CSC complaint. The complaint involved a 12 year old female juvenile runaway who has returned home. The 31 year old mother stated that on August 27, 2016 at 1400hrs she to her 12 year old daughter to Wayne County Safe, regarding her daughter having sexual relations with a 20 year old male. During the interview at WCS, the juvenile told them she has engaged in sexual relations. And she states she had sex with the male suspect in the living room of her home on Tuesday and Wednesday of last week. The female juvenile states she snuck downstairs on both occasions. Both happened nights to be with the male. The mother stated that the 20 year old and his younger brother stayed with her and her family for a very short time because the mother’s boyfriend felt bad for them because they were homeless. The mother states they kicked the two them out last week because she believed the daughter was developing an usual bond. Since then the 20 year old has been over several times trying to get the 12 year old to take a walks with him, but most of the time mother would not allow her to go. The younger brother helped the female juvenile runaway. The

younger brother would tell her to hide from her parents, and they would come and get her, and take her to a home a block down, where she was eventually picked up. The officer advised the 12 year old that she is considered a runaway and she is known to be with the 20 year old male. The officer went to the abandoned home and found an unloaded window that they possibly gained entry. The officer spoke to a neighbor who report seeing the female juvenile, with the brothers at the house last night. The officer made entry to the home and found the younger brother hiding upstairs and the female juvenile hiding in the basement.

August 28th, 2016

At 1313hrs, an officer was dispatched to the 1st Block of West Henry Street on a Runaway Juvenile. The officer made contact with the 32 year old mother who stated her 14 year old daughter was last seen inside their home by her roommate at 0300hrs, in the bed sleep. The mother states at 1300hrs she looked in her daughter’s room and throughout the house for her and she was nowhere to be found. The mother believes she went over to a friend’s home on Linden, but she wasn’t there. So where is her daughter?

August 29th, 2016

At 1771hr, an officer was dis-

patched to the 200 Block of Fairmont Street to meet another officer involving an investigation of a Runaway Juvenile. Officers were there to inform the 42 year old mother that her 16 year old daughter had been abducted in River Rouge, molested, then taken and dropped off in the City of Ecorse. She was located at 3rd & Southfield and she was transported to Wyandotte Henry Ford Hospital for further medical treatment. The mother advised the officer between 1500-1530hrs she sent her daughter to the 76 Gas Station on West Jefferson and then she was supposed to go to Bi-Rite Market, to pick up some food, but never returned, the mother also stated that there has been a male between 45-60 years of age that goes by the nickname of “bear”. The suspect’s real name might be Larry who lives on Stoner Street. He has been seen following this female juvenile around the city. And once followed her into a nearby gas station and tried to grabbed her hand, but she resisted and made such a scene, and the male became upset and left. He has followed her on several occasions and her mother called policed two weeks ago to report this same male following her. An officer went to the hospital to interview the female juvenile. She states incident began when she went to the gas

station and she was walking afterwards when a 4 door sedan with tinted windows pulled up alongside of her and the male driver told her to get in the vehicle. The female juvenile told him “no” and continued walking. The male in the vehicle continued following her until he pulled into the Parking lot between the Resale Shop and The Tax Experts and pulled out a handgun and told her if she didn’t get in the vehicle he would shoot her. The location was right near McDonald’s. The male told her to keep her head down once she got into the vehicle and drove her to an apartment building that was in Taylor or Dearborn. She states once they arrived at the apartment building the male was sitting on a couch in the living room, with two children. The juvenile states she realize that he was the male that has been following her. The male only looked at her but did not speak to her, nor did he partake in the rape. The suddenly another r male who abducted her goes by the name of “lack” and drove to the location made her go into the basement with him and another male, who goes by the name of “Brown”. While sexually assaulting her she heard conversation between the two regarding \$150.00. Both male sexually assaulted her both vaginally and orally. She state when “Black” was rapping her he told her to stop crying and when he finished “Brown” had his turn. She states “Black” had a tribal type tattoo on his shoulder, and “Brown” had chipped teeth.

with great reservation that she agrees to join him on an excursion to a community meeting at a church. She is adamant about not fraternizing with one of her Black, male colleagues. People will talk.

Barack shows up in a junkyard chariot, a broken down, compact car with a hole in the floorboard of the passenger side. They drive off, sitting close but a cool distance apart, emotionally and intellectually. Her part of the conversation is very academic and professional. His is nosy. They verbally spar, like defense and prosecuting attorneys feeling each other out to see who has the better case.

There are points in “Southside With You” when the Afrocentric discussions (arguing over the best Stevie Wonder song) between the two colleagues become more personal and depict a supportive relationship in the making. Barack talks about his father who died and was buried under an unmarked tombstone. Michelle tells him his mission should be to put words on the stone.

“Southside With You” vividly recreates the budding romance of Barack and Michelle. It also puts on a screen, for everyone to see, a romantic courtship between educated African Americans, the kind that Hollywood rarely depicts.

A very winsome and loving film. It’s hard not to be swept off your feet.

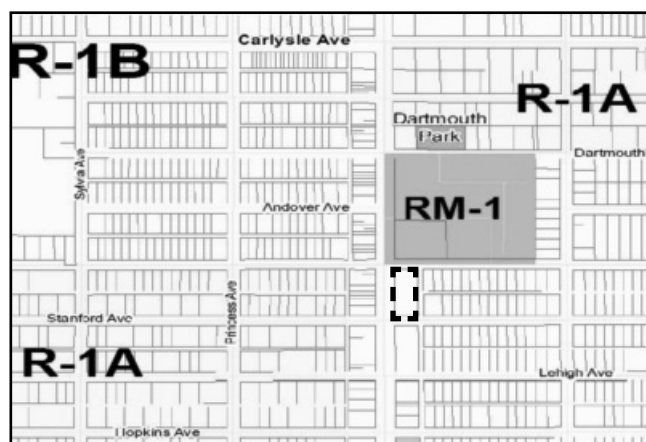

The Lions began their preparation for the Indianapolis Colts this past Monday with a practice in shorts at the team's headquarters and training facility in Allen Park. Detroit will open the 2016 regular season with a road battle against the Indianapolis Colts as both teams concluded their preseason battles with 2-2 records. 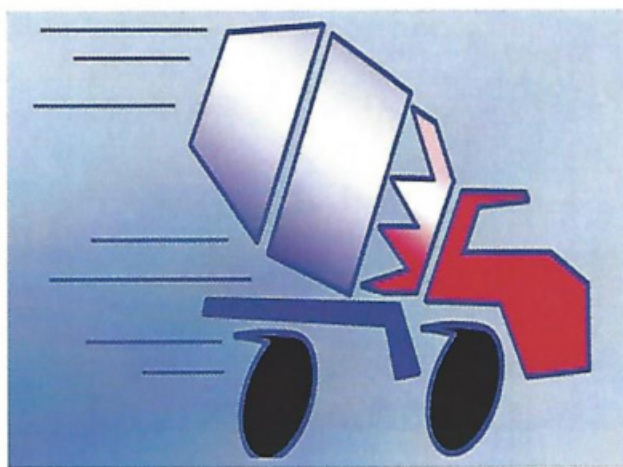

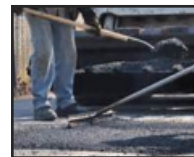
