Comedian And Civil Rights Activist Dick Gregory Dies At 84

Dick Gregory, the comedian and civil rights crusader, died Saturday. He was 84.

His family announced the news on his public Facebook page.

"It is with enormous sadness that the Gregory family confirms that their father, comedic legend and civil rights activist Mr. Dick Gregory departed this earth tonight in Washington, DC," his son Christian Gregory said in the post. "The family appreciates the outpouring of support and love and respectfully asks for their privacy as they grieve during this very difficult time. More details will be released over the next few days."

According to The Associated Press, Gregory, who was recently in and out of the hospital, died following a severe bacterial infection. NPR has not independently confirmed the cause of death.

Gregory gained attention as a comedian in the early 1960s, and was the first black comedian to widely win plaudits from white audiences. Darryl Littleton, author of the book Black Comedians on Black Comedy, told NPR in 2009 that Gregory broke barriers with his appearances on television, just by sitting down:

"Dick Gregory is the first to recognized — and he'll say it — the first black comedian to be able to stand flat-footed, and just delivered comedy. You had other comedians back then but they always had to do a little song or a dance or whatever, Sammy Davis had to dance and sing, and then tell jokes. Same with Pearl Bailey and some of the other comedians. But Dick Gregory was able to grow

## New Yorkers To Protest NFL In Solidarity With Kaepernick

The New York Justice League—helmed by famed Women's March chieftain and Time's 100 Most Influential People honoree Tamika Mallory—will hold a rally Wednesday in support of free agent quarterback Colin Kaepernick, who apparently has been "white-balled" by the National Football League for taking a stand, um, knee, for social and

racial justice in America.

"United We Stand: Rally for Kaepernick" is scheduled to begin at 5 p.m. EDT on August 23 in front of the NFL headquarters at 345 Park Avenue in New York City.

"Colin Kaepernick used his Constitutional right to free speech and took a knee on behalf of black lives," Mallory said in an email statement to NewsOne. "Within his field – where players have been excused for egregious behaviors like violence against women—it is clear team owners are making a statement, and we as consumers, viewers and people of good moral conscience must make a statement as well."

#### Senator David Knezek will host Medical Marijuana **Town Hall on August 31**



State Sen. David Knezek (D-Dearborn Heights) will host Medical Marijuana Town Hall meeting to talk about the rights and regulations available to local communities under Michigan's new medical marijuana laws.

"Many years ago, Michigan voters approved the compassionate use of medical marijuana; unfortunately in the years after the vote, the legislature failed to enact any sort of rules and regulations surrounding dispensaries, growth, production and transport of the product," Knezek said. "In the last few years, there has developed a real Wild West mentality when it comes to medical marijuana facilities operating in the state. I identified that as a real problem when I first came into office, and my colleagues and I have started looking into developing rules and regulations while making sure patients have access to medication."

A panel of experts in the law, regulation, and patients rights areas will discuss the laws at the town hall. The informational session will be just that, Knezek said, not a forum to debate the controversial issue.

"I'm not hosting a debate on whether or not you think it's good or bad or if you do or don't want it in the community," Knezek said. "It will be the City Council that decides what comes to Dearborn Heights and how much; what I want to do is bring in experts

in the legal field, regulatory departments at the state level and patient representatives.

"I simply want to let folks know what control they do have as a community so they'll be up to speed on what they can and can't press local City Council members to do."

The meeting is set for 6 p.m. Aug. 31 at Carl E. Stitt American Legion Post No. 232, 23850 Military, in Dearborn Heights.

Guest experts will include Doug Mains of the State Bar of Michigan's Marijuana Law section; Shelly Edgerton, director of the Michigan Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs; and Robin Schneider, executive director of the National Patients Rights Association.

The state Legislature recently enacted the Medical Marijuana Facilities Licensing Act, which allows communities to adopt their own ordinances authorizing and regulating medical marijuana facilities within their borders.

"In Detroit, we had hundreds of dispensaries popping up by churches and next to schools and we knew this wasn't folks acting in a legal way," he said. "The city was able to use the law we passed to enact their own ordinance, and that's really important. Detroit said they wanted it all to be zoned so

they can't go into a business corridor, or within 1,000 feet of a school or church. "They took over 200 dispensaries and said they could only be in such a stringent area ... that they are expected to drop to less than

Just this week, Donald Bailey, a member of the state Medical Marijuana Licensing Board, proposed shutting down all dispensaries by Sept. 15 in order for them to be eligible for future licensing. Under a law passed last year, a new licensing system is required to be established and applications for the five categories will start being accepted Dec. 15.

The board ended up postponing the decision.

Knezek said he believes the proposal if passed would better serve communities.

"If the state board decides to shut everything down, it gives all the more reason for cities to make sure they have robust ordinances in place to manage the outcome of what the decision is," he said.

All residents of the Fifth Senate District — covering Dearborn Heights, Detroit, Garden City, Inkster, and Redford Township are encouraged to attend the Aug. 31 town hall, which is open to all communities. Light refreshments will be provided.



on television, sit down on the Jack Paar show — and sit on the couch and actually have a discussion, and that it never happened in the history of television."

Gregory "opened the door" for Bill Cosby to rise to fame, Littleton

He was noted for his political and social activism, beginning in the civil rights movement in the 1960s. He attended the historic 1963 March on Washington. Forty years later, Gregory told Tavis Smiley on NPR about his experience at the march, describing it as "joy. It was festivity, and as far as the human eye could see."

Gregory talked in 2003 about his experience trying to integrate a restaurant in Mississippi before the march, showing he could inject some humor into a serious story:

"We tried to integrate a restaurant, and they said, 'We don't serve colored folk here,' and I said, 'Well, I don't eat colored folk nowhere. Bring me some pork chops.' And then Ku Klux Klan come in, and the woman say, 'We don't have no pork chops,' so I say, 'Well, bring me a whole fried chicken.' And then the Klan walked up to me when they put that whole fried chicken in front of me, and they say, 'Whatever you do to that chicken, boy, we're going to do to you.' So I opened up its legs and kissed it in the rump and tell you all, 'Be my guest.' "

He was direct in his language about race. He co-wrote with Robert Lipsyte the book nigger: An Autobiography — the "n" is lowercase — in 1964. Gregory explained to NPR why he chose that

"So this word 'nigger' was one of the most well-used words in America, particularly among black folks. And I said, 'Well, let's pull it out the closet. Let's lay it out here. Let's deal with it. Let's dissect it.' Now the problem I have today is people call it the N-word. It should never be called the N-word. You see, how do you talk about a swastika by using another term?"

Gregory called the U.S. "the number-one most racist system on the planet. ... And I hope that America is willing to take this shoe of racism off and deal with racism and deal with sexism."

He ran for mayor of Chicago in 1967 and ran for president in 1968 under the Freedom and Peace Party. He was on the ballot in eight states and got 47,133 votes, as Ken Rudin wrote for NPR.

Hunger strikes were a frequent activist tool for Gregory. He told Juan Williams on Talk of the Nation that he went without solid food for two and a half years to protest the war in Vietnam.

At one point, he said he weighed 365 pounds. But he lost a lot of weight fasting to protest the war. "I went on a fast, 40 days of water. Forty days of fruit juice. Forty days of fruit. And then 40 days of water again," Gregory told NPR.

In 2000, Gregory went on a hunger strike to protest police brutality, long before the current wave of activism.

Gregory promoted some conspiracy theories, telling NPR in 2005 about conspiracies involving the death of Princess Diana and the

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

A day with a Detroit Fire Fighter

Being a firefighter is not an easy job. These men and women put their lives on the line daily to keep our cities safe. But how much do we really know about the job? I sat down with my dad, Wayman Session, a Detroit fireman, and found out what it's like to work for the Detroit Fire Department. Why did you want to become a fireman?

I wanted to become a fireman because I like to help people. There are also many different avenues that you get into through the fire department, like being an Arson Investigator or a Fire Prevention Inspec-

How long have you been a

#### fireman?

I started at the fire department in 1990, so I'm going on 27 years at the D.F.D.

#### What's the most exciting part of the job?

There are many exciting parts. Going into fires, driving the rig, and just getting to the scene and helping save properties and lives.

#### What is your rank? How to you get promoted to different ranks?

My rank is F.E.O., which is a Fire Engine Operator. So my job is to make sure that the fire rig is clean and everything is in working order. I also have to

get all of the fire personnel to and from all runs safely, and provide all the water that is needed to extinguish fires of any kind. Promotions in the firefighter division are seniority based. So as people retire, you move up in rank. In divisions like arson, you have to take a test to be promoted.

#### Describe a typical day at the fire house.

The first thing we do when we come in is put our gear on the rig, so if we have a run, everything is already there. But we do basic things like cleaning up the fire house, cleaning the trucks, and making sure we

Well, all fires are severe, but I've seen all kinds of things in my 27 years at the fire department. From car accidents to people with life threatening injuries, so there really isn't one fire or situation that stands out

#### How do you juggle family life with work?

It's difficult sometimes because it's hard to find the right balance between your profession

#### Would you recommend becoming a firefighter as a profession to kids in the community?



During the 2016-2017 NFL season, the then-quarterback for the San Francisco 49ers was widely praised and criticized for his decision to kneel or sit when the national anthem was being played before games. He touched off a movement, inspiring professional and amateur athletes alike to protest police violence against people of color.

Most recently, the Kaepernick movement gained further velocity and credence when the Cleveland Browns held the NFL's largest protest since Kaepernick began kneeling in August 2016. A dozen players on Monday took a knee during the national anthem before Cleveland's home game against the New York Giants on Monday. The move came less than a week after their coach, Hue Jackson, said he didn't want to see his players protesting during the national anthem.

Kaepernick's protest also gath-

ered steam last week when the Smithsonian National Museum of African American History and Culture announced that his 49ers jersey and social justice message will be highlighted in an upcoming

Although rumors persisted that Kaepernick was close to being signed by the Baltimore Ravens, this prospect was eventually scuttled amid divisive commentary from NFL retiree Ray Lewis, the owner, and other critics.

Kaepernick's supporters' hopes were given a second look via the Miami Dolphins—then dashed again by generally salty Miami fan backlash to a Fidel Castro t-shirt that Kaepernick wore in the city last season and the team's hiring of a widely maligned quarterback, Jay Cutler, who was pulled out of retirement and ushered onto the field instead of Kap.

A lot has been made of Kaepernick's playing abilities, with some calling him great to mediocre. Point of fact, during last season with the 49ers, he threw 16 touchdowns and four interceptions in 12 games, according to Sports Illustrated.

Despite this proven productivity, after the first week of pre-season football, Kaepernick remains unemployed by the NFL, whose ownership group appears to be in collusion to keep him out of the sport. This confederacy of NFL owners has only drawn further backlash from mostly African-

#### Tips on Shopping at Farmers Markets:



Get More Fresh Produce in Your Diet

Shopping at farmers markets is one way to get delicious and fresh produce you can enjoy at home.

"Getting plenty of fruits and vegetables helps families live healthier lives and reduces the likelihood of chronic disease," said Elaine Auld, CEO of the Society for Public Health Education (SOPHE). "Lack of nutritious foods puts people at high risk for diabetes, cardiovascular disease, and obesity." Not everyone may be familiar with shopping at farmers markets. Auld offered the following tips to help people make the most of bringing the best of the farm to their family.

Know the season. Knowing what you may find at the market, before you go, can help you shop efficiently and cost-effectively. Specific fruits and vegetables available in your community will vary based on the seasons and weather.

Plan your meals but leave room for spontaneous purchases. Plan your meals in advance but, leave some room to improvise or adapt recipes. Farmers markets can expose you to new hybrids of traditional vegetables, such as broccolini, which is a combination of broccoli and kale. Talk to the vendors and ask them how to prepare something that you may have never tried be-

fore.

Shop to save. To save money, buy in bulk or late in the day. Vendors may be more willing to make you a deal. Sometimes bulk purchases are discounted. Some vegetables can be frozen for later use. Many farmers markets also accept electronic benefit transfer (EBT) or Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) purchases.

Bring your own bags. Nylon or cloth bags can help ensure your purchase makes it home safely. A backpack can help if you have a long distance to travel.

Get used to handling fresh produce. Always wash all fruits and vegetables before eating. It may take time to learn how to handle freshly harvested produce, but the superior flavors are worth it. Ask how to best store your purchases to maximize freshness and flavor.

To help promote healthy eating, SOPHE partnered in a three-year national project, Partnering4Health. There are Partnering4Health projects in 97 communities across the country assisting people and communities to live healthier. A third of the projects are supported through the National WIC Association (NWA). The American Heart Association, the American Planning Association and the Directors of

Health Promotion & Education, are also involved.

USDA provides federal grants to states for WIC. These programs provide breastfeeding support, supplemental foods, health care referrals, and nutrition education for low-income pregnant and postpartum women, and to infants and children up to age five who are at nutritional risk. Here are a few examples of WIC programs that are working in their communities to help women and families access nutritious food. The area WIC program in Durango, Colorado, was able to work with community partners to offer a free farmers stand in low-income communities offering fruits and vegetables. They've served 500 people and given away an estimated 3,000 pounds of food.

Getting fresh fruits and vegetables is a challenge in Angelina County in East Texas. Organizers with WIC set up a network to distribute fresh produce to three area food banks serving 16,000 people. In Marion, Virginia, WIC organizers working with the H.A.N.D.S. Healthy Corner Store initiative increased availability of fresh produce and healthy snack options in rural convenience stores. They also worked with farmers market managers to increase awareness of fresh, locally grown produce.

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
