Schuette Reminds Residents to Be on Alert for Scammers in the Aftermath of Hurricane Harvey



LANSING – Michigan Attorney General Bill Schuette is reminding Michigan residents to exercise caution in the wake of Hurricane Harvey. Unfortunately whether it is selling a flood damaged vehicle or taking donations meant for disaster relief, scammers choose times of disaster to take advantage of hard working well meaning citizens.

"Hurricane Harvey has inflicted disastrous results on the state of Texas and we are thinking of all the individuals affected by the storm," said Schuette. "It is important to remember that while storms like this can bring out the best in people, it can also bring out scammers who see a disaster as nothing more than an opportunity to make a quick buck. I encourage Michigan residents to protect themselves from post disaster scams."

Schuette noted that the most common scams to happen after a storm of this nature are

City Of Detroit Now Using Hidden Cameras to Catch and Prosecute Illegal Dumpers



Detroit Mayor Mike Duggan and Police Chief James Craig are sending a strong message to anyone who illegally dumps debris in city neighborhoods: Police are watching.

Each week, workers from the city's DPW remove more than

500 tons of illegally dumped material across the city. To address the problem at its roots, DPD has been testing hidden cameras in a number of locations where dumping repeatedly reappears after city crews clean them up. During that

In the aftermath of a natural disaster, many individuals seek to donate to relief efforts and residents who have lost everything in the storm. However, scam artists use disaster tragedies to enrich themselves. These scammers exploit the sympathy of donors—perhaps with a name sounding both compassionate and legitimate or with a heart-wrenching appeal—to steal the donations or get consumers' sensitive financial information.

Residents can avoid disaster scams and make a positive contribution to relief and rebuilding projects by doing a little research before making a donation. Follow these tips:

Be cautious of requests for donations by unfamiliar organizations or people.

Beware of unsolicited contacts and appeals on social media sites. Some leading relief charities now accept donations via cell phone, but unsolicited text messages, like unsolicited telephone and email communications, should be viewed with suspicion and handled with caution.

Crowdfunding and other types of internet-giving can be tools of tremendous good, but as with any type of giving it can be abused, so proceed with caution when donating online. A Consumer alert with additional information and advice on crowdfunding is available here. Continue to reach out and help, but choose established charitable organizations with a history of helping those in need.

Before donating, search the Attorney General's websiteto see if the organization is registered to solicit in Michigan. (Be aware that some legitimate charities, including the American Red Cross and Salvation Army, do not appear in the Attorney General's database because they are exempt.)

The Attorney General's website has additional information and advice on charitable giving. Citizens may call the Attorney General's Charitable Trust Section at 517-373-1152 to check on a specific charity. To check on a police or fire organization, call 800-769-4515, toll-free.

Protect Yourself Before Purchasing a Used Vehicle

When flooding hits, hundreds of vehicles are damaged. Many will end up on the used car market. Vehicles with flood damage from a hurricane can be shipped across the country in a matter of days and appear for sale on the internet or at car lots, without any mention or obvious signs of the damage.

The National Salvage Vehicle Reporting Program, an independent third party standards body for the federal government's comprehensive database on vehicle damage history, reports that thousands of water/flood damaged vehicles have been sold at auction, including some then resold without disclosure that they were flood-damaged.

Water can damage vital parts of a car including airbag sensors, brakes, and electrical systems — and the damage may not show up right away. Weeks or months could pass before evidence of damage is known, putting the purchase past warranty and leaving a driver without a car.

Have the vehicle inspected by an independent, competent automotive technician who has no relation to the seller. Since water damage can be hard to spot, paying an expert mechanic for an inspection is a good idea.

Check the vehicle history. Get the VIN (vehicle identification number) and trace its history through the National Motor Vehicle Title Information System database for a small fee. The National Motor Vehicle Information System is administered by the U.S. Department of Justice.

Some consumers also choose to trace vehicle history using commercially available reports such as Experian's Auto Check or CarFax. A vehicle history should tell you if the car has been in a flood region or issued a flood or salvage title. Remember though, these databases do not always have up-to-date or complete information about a vehicle (which is why the independent inspection is critical).

Be on the lookout for vehicles with tell-tale signs of being submerged in water. For example:

Musty or "over-perfumed" smell or signs of mold or mildew;

Water stains, mud or residue in the trunk, under the carpet, floor mats, gas and brake pedals, and in hard-to-reach places difficult to clean;

Title or registration histories indicating the car was in a flood area; Car hesitates, runs rough, or shows signs of premature rust or corrosion in places where you wouldn't expect to see rust, such as the upper door hinges, trunk latches, and screws on the console.

Residents can share video of illegal dumping anonymously through Improve Detroit App

To further expand DPD's ability to catch illegal dumpers, the Improve Detroit app, which lets residents report illegal dumpsites, now lets users upload video and images and submit them anonymously to the city. That is welcome news for Jonathan Pommerville, who for years has video recorded illegal dumpers in the act and posted the videos

"This is the kind of issue where everyone in the community needs to do their part," said Pommerville. "I'm thrilled that the city now is using hidden cameras to identify the people who dump in our neighborhoods and is following up with criminal investigations."

time, DPD has identified alleged illegal dumpers in 25 cases, based on the strength of the video images.

One of them is Leo Tolin, of Detroit, who was captured on video dumping in northwest Detroit on August 26th. After being identified based on video evidence, a warrant was issued and today he was arrested by police. Investigators, armed with a search warrant, also seized Tolin's 16foot white box truck, from which he dumped a large box and other debris. Once Tolin, who is the owner of Price is Right movers, pays \$1560 in blight violations or he posts a \$1500 bond, he will be able to have his truck returned.

"For too long, people have used our neighborhoods as dumping grounds because they could get away with it," said Mayor Duggan. "With a lot of things that used to be tolerated in this town, like illegal graffiti, we're not toler-

ating people who want to dump in our neighborhoods anymore. We are going to charge them and whenever we can we are going to use existing laws to seize the vehicle they used in

The city currently has more than a dozen cameras installed at frequent dumping locations around the city. By the end of September, Chief Craig said he expects to have dozens of cameras at known dumping locations, where video will be reviewed daily by staff at his Real Time Crime Center. The total cost of the cameras is about \$75,000, including the monthly cost of \$54 for electricity and internet access for each camera.

"Whenever we can, we are going to use technology to our advantage," said Chief Craig. "We are doing it effectively with Project Green Light and with this initiative we are using video technology to conduct investigations that begin with reports of illegal dumping made to the city through the Improve Detroit app. I believe the Detroit Police

AN AFTERNOON WITH MARY MOORE **CO-PRESENTED BY LINCOLN PARK LIBRARY** AND HISTORICAL SOCIETY



On the afternoon of Saturday, September 23, the Lincoln Park Public Library and the Lincoln Park Historical Society will host a talk by Mary Moore, Lincoln Park native who played professional baseball with the All American Girls Professional Baseball League (AAGPBL) in the early 1950s. After graduating from Lincoln Park High School in 1950, where she showed exceptional athletic promise in softball, basketball and other sports, Mary joined

the women's league, playing infield with the Springfield Sallies and the Battle Creek Belles. After playing a total of 124 games, a work injury forced her early retirement. In 2001, Mary was among the inaugural class of inductees into the Lincoln Park Sports Hall of Fame.

Among her many memories of growing up in Lincoln Park, Mary recalls playing ball regularly in the fields near the Moore family home on Wilson. Eddie Lake, shortstop with the Detroit Tigers from 1945 to 1950, lived just a few blocks away and sometimes joined in.

The AAGPBL was formed in 1943 during the Second World War when most able-bodied athletes were serving in the armed forces. Born of an idea by Philip K. Wrigley, owner of the Chicago Cubs, the league and its players served to lift the morale of the country during war time by continuing the nation's favorite pastime. The league's franchises were all

based in the Mid-west, in cities from Minneapolis to Battle Creek. After twelve seasons the AAGPBL ended in 1954.

The program begins at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday the 23rd at the Lincoln Park Library. Mary will share her stories of playing ball with the women's league, will share memorabilia from her career, and will also participate in a Q & A session. The popular 1992 fictional comedy based on the AAGPBL, "A League of Their Own", starring Geena Davis, Tom Hanks, Madonna, and Rosie O'Donnell, will be shown following the

field. In the spring, there's track and field and girls' soccer. The field was being used so much that it was hard to maintain upkeep during the seasons we used the field the most. Also, if you make the state play-offs, you'll have the option to have your own home games. That is a great opportunity for home field advantages, however, the field can get pretty beat up during that time. The synthetic turf will eliminate the issues that we struggled with in the past.

What are the benefits of synthetic turf?

There are many financial and safety benefits to synthetic turf. Overall, it's a better cost value for our school district. The maintenance costs associated with a grass field- cutting the grass, planting grass seeds, watering the grass, painting the field - we no longer have to pay for. Once the turf is installed, the field is low maintenance. The field looks nice, but it's actually safer for our athletes too. Real grass can get muddy and our athletes can slip during a game or practice. Animals such as squirrels and rabbits can create holes or lumps in the field which can cause our athletes to trip and twist their ankles. Synthetic turf is a smooth, dry surface that students can feel safe playing sports on.

Does the new field benefit other sports aside from football?

The synthetic turf benefits our track team a great amount. We've made it to the state championship for track, but our track field was lacking. We couldn't host state qualifying meets because we didn't have enough lanes for all the track runners. The old field had 4 lanes and the new field has more lanes. The material is better for our athletes to runner on and the track meets will run more efficiently.

How was the new field funded?

The River Rouge School District funded the new football field. The renovations were not sponsored by any outside organizations or businesses.

How long did the planning and building process take?

The field renovation has been a 2year process. The discussion began January of 2015. We had to figure out a budget for this project before any building began. We had to carefully select an architecture firm that corresponded with our finances, but also met our needs and that we were looking for. As of January, of this year, the planning and executing began. It took time to get it approved by the school board and complete the building. However, the end result is wonderful and I am so excited for the students to play sports on

Why do you think sports and physical education is important for students?

I think sports and physical education is one of the main components to developmental growth. It teaches students how to work within a team. Athletics teaches vou how to become a better leader and it also teaches you how to compete with others, as well as yourself, responsibly and respect-

fully. If you are not competing with yourself and carrying yourself as a leader in everyday life, that day could turn out to be a loss for you, whether it's financially, spiritually, or mentally. The skills that sports instill in a person can be greatly utilized in the real world.
