The Equifax Data Breach: What to Do



If you have a credit report, there's a good chance that you're one of the 143 million American consumers whose sensitive personal information was exposed in a data breach at Equifax, one of the nation's three major credit reporting agencies.

Here are the facts, according

to Equifax. The breach lasted from mid-May through July. The hackers accessed people's names, Social Security numbers, birth dates, addresses and, in some instances, driver's license numbers. They also stole credit card numbers for about 209,000 people and dispute

Dingell Stands Up for EPA Workers on “National Save the US EPA Day”

WASHINGTON, DC – U.S. Congresswoman Debbie Dingell (MI-12) today stood up for U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) workers in Michigan and across the country on “National Save the U.S. EPA Day.” The effort, led by the American Federation of Government Employees (AFGE), comes as the EPA faces deep funding cuts from President Trump and the Republican Congress that could slash up to 25 percent of the agency’s workforce and endanger its ability to protect public health and the environment for decades to come.

“We cannot afford to lose these jobs or halt the critical work taking place in EPA offices in

Michigan and across the country,” said Dingell. “That is why I have introduced legislation called the REGION Act, which would prevent the closure of any EPA regional or program office and protect thousands of jobs. This legislation will ensure that these dedicated scientists, engineers and public servants can continue working every day to protect the air we breathe and the water we drink now and for the future.”

Dingell introduced the REGION Act in July following reports that President Trump’s budget request would force several offices to shutter, including the U.S. EPA’s Large Lakes Research Station office on Grosse Ile and the National Vehicle and Fuel Emissions Laboratory in Ann Arbor, which employs 435 people.

Dingell visited the Ann Arbor EPA lab in May to speak out against proposed cuts to the facility, which conducts critical research, testing, analysis and technological studies in support of the establishment and monitoring of both fuel economy and vehicle emission standards. Dingell’s legislation would also prevent the closure of the EPA Region 5 office in Chicago, which serves Michi-

gan, Illinois, Wisconsin, Indiana, Minnesota, and Ohio and is critical to protecting the air, drinking water, and health of residents in the Great Lakes states.

“We need to stay united against these misguided cuts that would be bad for our economy, bad for our environment, and bad for our future,” Dingell said. “We must continue to make our voices heard that we want clean air, we believe in climate science, and we demand that the dedicated scientists and engineers at EPA be allowed to continue to serve the American people.”

Earlier this year, President Trump proposed cutting the EPA budget by \$2.6 billion, a 31 percent decrease. The proposed 2018 budget for the EPA will result in the elimination of the Office of Environmental Justice, the Office of Public Engagement, and all 14 climate voluntary partnership programs. In addition, the proposed budget will slash state grants, cut geographic programs, and eliminate funding for science and technology programs by 14 percent.

Trump Can't Deport the American "Dreamers" Without a Fight

Our 45th President swept into office with a foundation of racist claims. First, the very basis of his political participation was his false assertion (for which he has never apologized) that President Barack Obama was not born in the United States. Using the "birther" movement as a basis, "45" signaled to every random racist out there that he was willing to ignore truth to attack President Obama.

Then, he used horrible rhetoric to describe Mexican people as violent rapist, followed by his usual "and some of them are very nice." He suggested that a federal judge could not do his job because he was of Mexican descent. And much of his campaign was focused on deporting people. The pace of deportations has increased since he took office.

Now, he has snatched stability away from a group of young people called "dreamers" have built.

These young folks were brought to these United States by parents who came to this country illegally. In legal limbo and unable to apply for jobs or college admission, many of these young people lived in the shadows, working under the table or not at all, piecing together livelihoods as best they could.

President Barack Obama grappled with this issue and, through executive order (because Congress would not act), created the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program. Attorneys general in some states have described the program as illegal and have threatened to sue for its elimination. Attorney General J. Beauregard Sessions has said he would not defend the program, because President Obama "overreached" in establishing it. So, the camera-hogging "45" actually al-

lowed Beauregard (who he very recently dissed) to announce that DACA will end, although there is a "grace period" of six months.

I don't think many understand how many hoops childhood arrivals must jump through to attain "dreamer" status. They have to pay almost \$500 every two years and fill out more than a dozen forms to qualify, including forms that detail income, expenses and assets. They must have a work permit. If they move, they have to inform the U.S. Customs and Immigration Service. And they can't leave the country without permission, which is only sparingly granted, and usually only for educational purposes. Requests to visit relatives are rarely granted and, even when permission is granted, there is no guarantee that "dreamers" will be allowed back into the country.

So, while President Obama did a great thing by creating DACA, the program does not go far enough. "Dreamers" do not have the same privileges that other citizens have, and they have more responsibilities. Their status can also be revoked, if they have had any interactions with "law enforcement" officers, and we all know how that one goes.

While it appears that "45" has given dreamers some hope by delaying enforcement of DACA elimination for six months, and by making nice with Democratic leaders, the drama of dangling possibilities in front of folks and then snatching them away is typical "45" showmanship and irrationality. The fact that Sarah Huckabee Sanders, the White House parrot, raised Black unemployment in a White House press conference is further evidence of this administration's racism. Has there been any other time when these people have mentioned Black unemployment?

Part of the reason "45" is revoking DACA has to do with his anti-Mexican, anti-immigrant, racist biases. But part has to do with his administration's attempt to eliminate anything Obama from our government. It is pathetically appalling to watch the way that "45" and his minions are obsessed with President Obama and the work he did.

As an example, Education Secretary Betsy DeVos, who I call "Secretary DeVoid" (of good sense), has decided to "examine" the Obama approach to campus rape. She is more concerned, it seems, with those accused of rape or sexual assault than with the victims. FBI data shows that only 5 percent

of rape accusations are false. We should be more concerned about those who won't come forward than those who are unjustly accused. But someone who works for a genital-grabber might well see things differently.

Similarly, an Obama-era regulation that would have EEOC collect data on pay differences by race and gender in companies with more than 100 employees has been suspended and so-called woman's advocate Ivanka Trump has said that collecting such data really doesn't matter. As many as 800 Obama executive orders and regulations have been reversed. We shouldn't be surprised that DACA has met the same fate.

Dreamers aren't going to simply slink back across borders to countries they have never known as adults. Moments after Beauregard Sessions' announcement they took it to the streets in protest. They are letting "45" and his sidekicks know that their dream won't be deferred. We should all be inspired by their activism and stand with them for justice.

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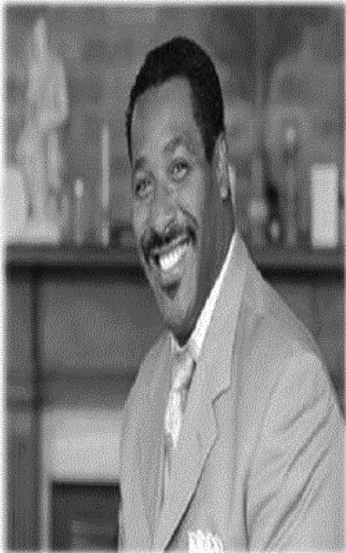
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Releta Moch Celebrates her 90th Birthday with family and friends

documents with personal identifying information for about 182,000 people. And they grabbed personal information of people in the UK and Canada too.

There are steps to take to help protect your information from being misused. Visit Equifax's website, www.equifaxsecurity2017.com. (This link takes you away from our site. Equifaxsecurity2017.com is not controlled by the FTC.)

Find out if your information was exposed. Click on the "Potential Impact" tab and enter your last name and the last six digits of your Social Security number.

Your Social Security number is sensitive information, so make sure you're on a secure computer and an encrypted network connection any time you enter it. The site will tell you if you've been affected by this breach.

Whether or not your information was exposed, U.S. consumers can get a year of free credit monitoring and other services. The site will give you a date when you can come back to enroll. Write down the date and come back to the site and click "Enroll" on that date. You have until November 21, 2017 to enroll.

You also can access frequently asked questions at the site. Here are some other steps to take to help protect yourself after a data breach:

Check your credit reports from Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion — for free — by visiting annualcreditreport.com. Accounts or activity that you don't recognize could indicate identity theft. Visit IdentityTheft.gov to find out what to do.

Consider placing a credit freeze on your files. A credit freeze makes it harder for someone to open a new account in your name. Keep in mind that a credit freeze won't prevent a thief from making charges to your existing accounts.

Monitor your existing credit card and bank accounts closely for charges you don't recognize.

If you decide against a credit freeze, consider placing a fraud alert on your files. A fraud alert warns creditors that you may be an identity theft victim and that they should verify that anyone seeking credit in your name really is you.

File your taxes early — as soon as you have the tax information you need, before a scammer can. Tax identity theft happens when someone uses your Social Security number to get a tax refund or a job. Respond right away to letters from the IRS.

Visit Identitytheft.gov/data-breach to learn more about protecting yourself after a data breach.

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Even with Advanced Degrees, Black Women Earn Less than White Men

more than Black women doing the same job, the gap for retail salespersons is also shocking, at more than \$9 an hour," according to EPI researchers.

Valerie Wilson, the director of race, ethnicity, and the economy at EPI said that career choice and education have little to do with the pay gap between Black women and White men.

Some people mistakenly believe that if Black women simply worked harder, they would earn higher wages.

However, according to EPI, the truth is that, "Black women work more hours than White women. They have increased work hours 18.4 percent since 1979, yet the wage gap relative to White men has grown."

The EPI blog post said that the growth in annual hours is "larger for Black women than for White women and men" who work in low-paying jobs and that, "both Black and White workers have increased their number of annual hours in response to slow wage growth" and "working moms are significant contributors to this trend."

Half of Black women who have jobs are working moms compared to 44.5 percent of White women.

Another common myth associated with the pay gap between Black women and White men is that Black women would earn higher wages, if they were more educated.

"Two-thirds of Black women in the workforce have some postsecondary education, 29.4 percent have a bachelor's degree or higher," the blog post said. "Black women are paid less than White men at every level of education."

According to EPI, Black women with less than a high school diploma make \$10.62 on average compared to White men who make \$15.16. Black women with advanced degrees earn \$31.57 compared to White men, who make \$48.27.

The racial wage gap persists in jobs dominated by Black women and jobs dominated by White men, according to EPI, dispelling the myth that Black women earn less due to their career choices.

"While White male physicians and surgeons earn, on average, \$18 per hour

Rookies were the Stars in Lions First Win

Last year the Detroit Lions football team was a game away from winning their first division title in over 15 years, nevertheless, did not get the job done. This year, the team is undoubtedly better. With a beefed-up offensive line, a handful of defensive draft picks and free agent acquisitions, and a healthy backfield on offense as well as defense, this Lions team is shapelier than ever. However, the Detroit Lions did not get their season off to a great start. Matthew Stafford threw a pick-six on the game's opening drive to Arizona Cardinals cornerback Justin Bethel. Stafford wasn't facing immediate pressure and appeared to be confident throwing the ball. Except his intended target wasn't in position to make a play. Instead, Bethel got a running start toward the end zone as he happily picked off the pass to give Arizona an early 7-0 lead. You could see fans in Ford Field looking puzzled and saying, here we go again, playing from behind in the game again. However, the defense came to play with huge improvements from last year as defensive line kept pressure on Arizona's

quarterback in results of interceptions by Lions safeties Glover Quin, Tavon Wilson, and Miles Killebrew. Not to mention the Lions rookie first round draft choice linebacker Jarrad Davis became the first Lions rookie to record a team-high in tackles (nine total tackles to lead the Lions in their 35-23 win over the Cardinals) during the season-opener since Ernie Sims had 10 against Seattle September 10, 2006. Davis also recorded a fumble recovery in the game. That's three interceptions, for a team that had just 10 all last season. In addition that's four takeaways overall, for a team that had just 14 all last season that was 28th in the league. They held Cardinals running back David Johnson, one of the league's best backs, to 23 rushing yards on 11 carries. On offense, how about in the Lions' 35-23 win over Arizona, rookie wide receiver Kenny Golladay hauling in touchdown receptions of 10 and 45 yards, with both occurring in the fourth quarter. His 10-yarder gave the Lions a 21-17 lead, which they would not surrender. Also Golladay became the first Lions rookie to catch a

touchdown in the opening game of the season since receiver Calvin Johnson at Oakland September 9, 2007. Golladay is also the first Lions rookie to catch two touchdown passes in the opening season game since receiver Charles Rogers grabbed two against Arizona September 7, 2003. Yes when Kenny Golladay caught two touchdowns passes in his first exhibition game; he has become a rookie to watch for the Detroit Lions. After he repeated the feat in his regular-season debut, there's no telling how high expectations might soar for the young receiver. "When I got to training camp, I realized this was real, and again in Indianapolis at the first preseason game, but this was a whole new level," Golladay said. "This game counted, and that's a rush." The 6-foot-4 Golladay stretched out to make a diving catch of Matthew Stafford's pass for a 45-yard touchdown, surpassing an impressive day for two of Detroit's top draft picks this year.

Speaking of Lions rookies, cornerback Jamal Agnew provided a much-needed spark as a punt returner, averaging 16 yards with three attempts. Veteran Lion receiver Golden Tate led the Lions in both receptions (10) and receiving yards (107).

Yes, it was good day at Ford Field this past Sunday and by the way, Detroit Lions claimed the club's 48th win on opening weekend. The Lions currently rank fourth among teams all-time for the most wins in Week 1 of the season. Next game the Lions will travel to the New Jersey Meadowlands to play the New York Giants this up coming Monday night.

Q: What kind of services does the library offer?

A: We offer free computer for the community, on the spot computer assistance for people who need it, we also offer computer training classes. We have many programs for infants through adults, every season throughout the year, like the summer reading program, book to loan, feature films and educational films, and there's copying, various reference resources, and doing research for people.

Q: Do you need a library card to gain access to these services?

A: For most things, yes. Our library cards are free, and you do need to have it. The only thing you would not have to have a card for is to use the computers. We do allow people to come in as a guest, you just need to have some form of I.D. so we know who it is in case there's a problem.

Q: How would you go about getting a library card?

A: You have to be a resident of Lincoln Park to get a library card here, and you just need to give us your I.D. with your current address on it. If you don't have your I.D. with your current address, you can use a bill from the city, a lease, or anything like that.

Q: If I'm looking for a certain book and you don't have it, can I request it?

A: Yes, we are members of the library network. That's over 70 libraries that work together, and we share all of our resources. So we request it from whoever has it available, and it gets shipped here. We get shipments on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. And it checks out just like a regular item from our library.

Q: How do you guys get your

books?

A: We purchase books for our library, and we have different vendors that we use. I purchase books for the youth and teens, and my coworker purchases books for the adults. We go through book reviews and patron inputs to find out what books are needed for the library.

For best results, tape off trim and adjacent walls with a premium painter's tape to prevent paint bleed. It's a small investment that will make a big difference.
