Let's put a stop to Domestic Violence and Abuse



Domestic Violence Statistics

Every 9 seconds in the US a woman is assaulted or beaten. Around the world, at least one in every three women has been beaten, coerced into sex or otherwise abused during her lifetime. Most often, the abuser is a member of her own family. Domestic violence is the leading cause of injury to womenmore than car accidents, muggings, and rapes combined.

Studies suggest that up to 10 million children witness some form of domestic violence annually.

Nearly 1 in 5 teenage girls who have been in a relationship said a boyfriend threatened violence or self-harm if presented with a breakup.

Everyday in the US, more than three women are murdered by their husbands or boyfriends. Ninety-two percent of women surveyed listed reducing domestic violence and sexual assault as their top concern. Domestic violence victims lose nearly 8 million days of paid work per year in the US alone-the equivalent of 32,000 full-time jobs. Based on reports from 10 countries, between 55 percent and 95 percent of women who had been physically abused by



Romulus Mayor Burcroff Thinks Regional

Jobs coming to Romulus

The city of Romulus, Michigan refers to itself as the Gateway to the World. The city is one of seven which make up the Detroit Regional Aerotropolis. Mayor LeRoy D. Burcroff looks out to that world, to the communities which make up southeast Michigan. For Burcroff, what's good for the region is good for his city. "We're a transportation mecca here," he says, referring to the area's proximity to airports, interstate highways and railway systems.

Work began earlier this past summer on Amazon's new fulfillment center in Romulus, which is expected to create more than 1500 jobs for the region. The Romulus center is one of three Amazon ventures in Michigan since 2016. A fulfillment center in Livonia opened early in 2017 and a new distribution center is planned for the city of Shelby Township. The city of Detroit is one of the cities vying to be the company's choice for a Midwest location for a second headquarters.

Mayor Burcroff says Amazon's interest in Michigan is a gain for local businesses and jobseekers. He is also pleased to see the region coming together to make it work. "It's good that finally we've got collaboration with the tri-counties," Burcroff says, "it's not us against them, it's let's work together to make that happen."

While the efforts of Amazon are good for the region, Romu-

lus is set to benefit by the company's pledge to make improvements to the city's infrastructure, including roads and traffic signals. The improvements, guaranteed by Amazon, are intended to make transport efforts less complicated, but residents in the area naturally will benefit also. Additionally, Burcroff says all those workers spending time at Amazon are expected to provide a steady profit for small businesses within the city.

In addition to Amazon, Romulus is also the site for a new Mopar Parts Distribution Center, set to open later this year. The 500,000 square-foot facility is expected to create 200 new jobs. The city also announced earlier this summer that Penske will be breaking ground in Romulus for a 606,000 square-foot distribution center which is expected to create more than 400 new jobs. Burcroff emphasized that the benefits are not only for Romulus. "It's good for our neighbors," he said.

An area left out of the equation which Burcroff says everyone needs to promote is mass transit. The mayor says other large American cities are way ahead of the Metro Detroit region in the area of cooperative public transportation. Not all metro Detroit communities participate in regional mass transit. Burcroff believes it can be







WOMEN'S MARCH TO HOST WOMEN'S CONVENTION IN DETROIT FROM OCTOBER 27- 29

"Reclaiming Our Time" will be the official Convention theme Submitted by Dale Rich



In the two decades since hundreds of thousands of women convened on Philadelphia's Benjamin Franklin Park Way to celebrate sisterhood and turn the spotlight on social, political and economic disparities in the United States, the Million Woman March has grown into a non-stop movement.

On Oct. 25, African-American women throughout the nation will observe the original marchers while doubling down on demands for equality and emphasizing self-determination. An anniversary reunion will be themed "Raising Up the Mother of Civilization." And in Detroit, the inaugural Women's Convention will be held Oct. 27-29.

Oct. 25, 1997 was an historic effort. It was founded by Phile Chionesu, a noted human rights activist, Black nationalist, freedom fighter and owner of an African crafts shop. She was joined by Asia Coney, a grassroots activist and Philadelphia-based tenant orPhiladelphia Art Museum.

The event was marked by prayer, music and inspirational speeches meant to promote positive change. Speakers included Winnie Madikizela-Mandela; U.S. Rep. Maxine Waters; Sista Souljah; actress Jada Pinkett-Smith; Attalah and Ilyasah Shabazz, daughters of Malcolm X; and Dr. Dorothy Height. A message was read from Assata Shakur from her exile home of Cuba.

For its time, the march was considered a social phenomenon due to its unconventional, grassroots way of organizing. Details of the planned march spread via groups like Alpha Kappa Alpha, word-of-mouth, flyers, black-run media, and a network of women's organizations.

The march, inspired by the Million Man March held two years earlier, was the launching pad for the development of the first global movement for women and girls of African descent throughout the diaspora. More than two million people, according to some estimates, braved rain and unseasonably chilly temperatures. Some attendees were in jeans; others wore festive African garb. Many toted signs reading "No more AIDS, Abuse, Addiction," and "I Am One in a Million." In 1996, black women were 18 times more likely than black women to get AIDS. In addition, black men earned \$30 more weekly than African-American women.

the world. In fact, the First Annual International Women's Solidarity and Appreciation Day will be held Oct. 25, on which women are asked to abstain from work, school and spending, and anything not uplifting and empowering.

In Detroit, speakers for the inaugural convention will include Angela Rye, Amber Tamblyn, Symone Sanders, Stacey Abrams, Nina Turner and U.S. Rep. Waters, cutting a wide swath across racial justice, reproductive and immigrant rights, the LGBTQAI, and the environmental community. The convention will focus on issuebased education, skills training and civic engagement. In addition the program will focus on youths and restoration and personal growth. It will include film screenings, a social justice concert, training sessions and opportunities to connect with activists from all over the country. The convention will be held at Cobo Center in Detroit, Michigan, 1 Washington Blvd, Detroit, MI 48226

whether the gun, that had none of Smith's DNA on it, was planted or not: "Finally, the Court observes, based on its nearly thirty years on the bench, that an urban heroin dealer not in possession of a firearm would be an anomaly."

Wow...just wow! And you have the nerve to ask why Kaepernick is taking a knee?

Ever since Kaepernick began his protest during the 2016 NFL season, countless unarmed Black men and women have died at the hands of trigger-happy members of law enforcement, with the majority of those rogue law enforcement officials getting away with murder, with no accountability for their actions. According to a report by the law enforcement watchdog group Mapping Police Violence, police killed at least 336 Black people in the U.S. in 2015 and at least 309 Black people in the U.S. in 2016. In addition to these startling figures, the report also shows that Black people are three times more likely to be killed by police than White people, with 33 percent of those Black victims being unarmed, compared to 18 percent of Whites. So far in 2017, police have killed approximately 207 Black people, and sadly the number is climbing.

Based on their past decisions regarding select players in their league, the NFL is seemingly okay with endorsing, and having a nonchalant attitude, regarding drug abuse, domestic violence, murder (alleged), racist comments, DWIs, animal abuse, etc., but clearly doesn't seem to care about a Black man exercising his first amendment right to protest unjustified police brutality and the legally sanctioned police killings of Black men and women all across this country.

That is why I had to make myself put down the NFL pipe. No drug in

this world is strong enough to keep me that addicted, to the point where I lack conviction, willpower and moral principles. I can only imagine how hard it must be for you to put that NFL pipe down, because I know how addictive it is, but there's hope for you. You can be free and kick this addiction if you really want to—just like I did.

The first step is acknowledging that there is a problem that must be fixed. Let's start there. Let's acknowledge the real reason Kaepernick started taking a knee, and let's start supporting him and his efforts wholeheartedly and with conviction. This is bigger than Kaepernick getting signed to a contract or being back in the NFL. This is about addressing a problem that is bigger than Kaepernick and bigger than you and I. So, what will it be? Will you be sucking on that NFL pipe this week, or will this be the week you officially kick the habit? Let me know how things are working out for you, and please know that I'm always here to help you deal with the withdrawal symptoms that come along with kicking the habit, so that you won't relapse.

So, go ahead, dope fiend. You can do it. Go ahead and put that NFL pipe down.





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Why More Americans Should be Talking about Retirement



(StatePoint) More than half of Gen X-ers and 40 percent of Baby Boomers have never given advice to their children about planning for retirement, according to a new study from North American Company for Life and Health Insurance.

Boomers and Gen X-ers share similar financial fears, according to the study. About 66 percent of Baby Boomers admit they are concerned about outliving their retirement savings. Gen X-ers are even more fearful - 77 percent report the same concern.

These fears may stem in part from the fact that many Gen X-ers are getting squeezed - with nearly a fifth of this "sandwich" generation supporting their parents and 71 percent supporting children.

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
