As President Donald Trump continues to sow confusion about the Affordable Care Act (ACA), a recent poll by the Kaiser Family Foundation, shows that, although some of his tactics are working, many consumers still plan on signing up for healthcare during the open enrollment period.

The ACA open enrollment period started on November 1

and will end December 15 in most states and despite its critics, the law has effectively reduced the uninsured rate for Blacks; healthcare advocates have said that access to preventive care provided by the ACA could also limit the effects of healthcare disparities, like infant mortality rates and

Shopping Black Friday should start today in your community



There is always so much hype during this time of year as people prepare for Christmas Day. Much of that hype has to do with getting good deals on presents for their loved ones on Black Friday. I do not get into the big commercialization of Christmas Day celebration. Christmas Day is to celebrate the birth of Jesus, so we should be giving him gifts...But that's another column.

I believe Black Friday (shopping and spending lots of money) should be every day, but it should start in our own communities. There are many businesses within all of our communities that are just waiting for your business. They pay taxes to the cities in which we live, they employ people from the community and they donate to charities and programs within community. In most cases, you know the owner, so just pull the owner aside and share your concerns with them. I'm sure they will make the adjustment. Before you make the decision to not support your local business, think about the service you received at businesses outside of the community. Be honest with yourself. Did you stop shopping with them, when the service wasn't good? I bet you didn't.

So, think about it and plan to Shop Locally.

It came to light on Tuesday that Conyers settled a sexual harassment claim with a former employee in 2015 for more than \$27,000. Former staff members also accused Conyers, 88, of making repeated sexual advances on female

staff. The high-ranking, longest serving member of Congress allegedly requested sexual favors from some of his female staff and allegedly transported other women to Washington with whom he was suspected of having affairs. The former staff member filed her complaint in 2014 with the congressional Office of Compliance. It accused Conyers of firing her because she declined his sexual advance.

After the news broke, GOP House Speaker Paul Ryan called the report "extremely troubling," and Michigan's Republican Rep. Bill Huizenga was among the first to call for Conyers' resignation. In his initial response to the report, Conyers seemed to deny paying the settlement. But he later clarified that he indeed settled the case through his congressional budget but denied the allegations. This comes against the backdrop of President Donald Trump backing Alabama's **GOP** candidate Roy Moore, who has been accused of sexual misconduct with underaged girls when he was in his 30s.

Life Is Too Short

I recently eulogized a 29 day old infant girl. I wanted to say that her life was too short. Then I realized that even if she had lived two years, ten years, twenty years, thirty-six, fifty or even sixty-six, it still would have been too short. Even when my grandmother died at nearly age 85, I still want her to have more time with her.

No matter what one's age is at death, life is too short. David reflected in a Psalm saying, "... You made my life short, so brief that the time means nothing to you. Human life is but a breath, and it disappears like a shadow..." [Psalm 39:5,6]

Anytime someone we love dies, a part of us wishes they could have had more time to be with us. Unless they were about 120 years old, then maybe we would say, 'they've had enough of this place." The way we experience time is so different from how time is to God. To Him, a thousand years is like the passing of a day, or like a few hours in the night (Psalm 90:4).



With that said, I imagine that life was short even when people were living for hundreds of years in Genesis. I wonder how the aging process worked back then. Methuselah, the oldest person recorded in the Bible, lived 969 years (Genesis 5:27). That's almost a day to God. Then shortly after Methuselah died, the Lord said, "My spirit shall not always strive with man, for that he also is flesh: yet his days shall be an hundred and twenty years. (Genesis 6:3)." So God put a cap on our lifespan.

Then David, in Psalm 90:10 says, "The days of our years are threescore years and ten [70 years]; and if by reason of strength they be fourscore years [80 years], yet is their strength labour and sorrow; for it is soon cut off, and we fly away." Some people fall somewhere in between. But it seems like these days, more and more younger people are being diagnosed with diseases that used to primarily affect the elderly. More young people are dying, so it's difficult to gauge what life expectancy should

The bottom line is, life is too short to be proud, making trouble or being jealous (Galatians 5:26). We need to spend our precious time being loving, joyful, peaceful, patient, kind, good, faithful, gentle and selfcontrolled (Galatians 5:22,23). Life is too short to procrastinate. Life is too short to waste on foolishness. Life is short, so love the Lord and be the best you can be.

Do the best you can with what you've been blessed with. We don't know how many days we have, so let's make our days count. Live life in all its fullness, that's why Jesus came (John 10:10). May God bless your life.

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Everything You Need To Know About The Libyan Slave Auctions

Here's a log of the horrifying events unraveling in the North African country.

On November 14, CNN published an exclusive report detailing what was then a rumored slave auction taking place in Libya's capital, Tripoli. Since that initial report, the news outlet has spoken with a number of officials confirming what have been called "organized gangs" and "smuggling rings" operating throughout the country.

As world leaders congregate and protesters demonstrate for freedom, here is a timeline of the horrifying events reportedly unraveling in Libya.

November 14

CNN releases its exclusive report, "People for Sale: Where Lives Are Auctioned for \$400," after cell phone video footage of an alleged slave trade in Tripoli. Libya's capital, begins making its rounds on the internet. At the time of CNN's initial report, nine auction locations are cited, and there are believed to be "many more."

While First Lieutenant Naser Hazam of the government's Anti-Illegal Immigration Agency in Tripoli hasn't witnessed a slave auction himself, he tells CNN of "organized gangs" running



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"smuggling rings" in the country.

"They fill a boat with 100 people, those people may or may not make it," Hazam said. "(The smuggler) does not care as long as he gets the money, and the migrant may get to Europe or die at sea."

November 17

Libyan authorities launch a formal investigation into the slave auctions following CNN's first re-

"A high-level committee has been convened encompassing representatives from all the security apparatus to oversee this investigation," Anes Alazabi, an official with Libya's Anti-Illegal Immigration Agency, told the news outlet. "Priorities of the investigation are not only to convict those responsible for these inhumane acts, but also to identify the location of those who have been sold in order to bring them to safety and return them to their countries of origin."

The investigation is welcomed by The International Organization for Migration, though its chief of mission for Libya warned "that the smuggling networks are becoming stronger, more organized and better equipped."

He continued: "We definitely welcome the news for any investigation and we hope that this will cover not only this case but definitely all the cases of abuse and violence against migrants in Libya."

November 18

Upon his return to English professional football (soccer) club Manchester United, midfielder Paul Pogba raises his arms in a handcuff gesture during a game against Newcastle United. "While very happy to be back, my prayers go to those suffering slavery in Libya," he later explained on Instagram. "May Allah be by your side and may this cruelty come to an end!"

November 19

Protests erupt in Africa and France in the wake of news coverage. Particularly, hundreds of young Black protesters organize outside of the Libyan Embassy in central Paris to fight for "an end to the slavery and concentration camps in Libya."

"We have to mobilize — we can't let this kind of thing happen." a protester told TV station France 24, according to The New York Times. "Did we really need to see such shocking pictures before taking a stand? I don't think

Police officers reportedly tear gassed organizers when the rally became violent.

November 20

UN Secretary-General António Guterres called for all countries to adopt the UN Convention Transnational Organized Crime and its protocol on human trafficking while expressing "horror" at news reports.

"I abhor these appalling acts and call upon all competent authorities to investigate these activities without delay and to bring the perpetrators to justice," Guterres said. "I have asked the relevant United Nations actors to actively pursue this matter."

November 21

The UN Security Council called for investigations into Libya slave auctions.

"In recent days we have all been horrified by images of African migrants being sold as 'goods' in Libya," UN Secretary-General António Guterres said during a meeting. "Slavery and other such egregious abuses of human rights have no place in the 21st century."

deaths from breast cancer among Black women.

Even though the ACA, also known as Obamacare, provided healthcare to millions of Americans—some of them Trump supporters—the current president has worked to cripple the law in tweets and actions.

Deep cuts to funding for advertising about the ACA are having expected results.

In previous years, television ads played a key role in educating people about open enrollment and the ins and outs of the ACA. Trump cut that advertising budget to the bone.

According to a recent Kaiser Family Foundation (KFF) poll, "few of those most likely to consider marketplace coverage report hearing or seeing any ads providing information about how to get insurance under the health care law."

Less than 20 percent of the uninsured and just 12 percent of market enrollees said that they saw ads in the past 30 days that provided information about how to get insurance.

The poll also reported that just 5 percent of the uninsured and 25 percent of the marketplace enrollees were aware of the month when open enrollment ends in their state.

Despite White House efforts to discourage Americans from signing up for healthcare and the House Speaker Paul Ryan (R-Wis.) claims that people would choose not buy Obamacare, if the government didn't force them, 90 percent of marketplace enrollees said that they would continue to buy

their own insurance, even if the government stopped enforcing the individual mandate.

Most marketplace enrollees like their health insurance under the ACA.

The KFF poll revealed that 70 percent of current marketplace enrollees are satisfied with their insurance choices.

"The vast majority (85 percent) of marketplace enrollees also say they plan to sign up for health insurance during the 2018 open enrollment period, and most of them (54 percent of the total marketplace enrollees) prefer to renew their current plan if it is available next year," according to the KFF poll.


Most enrollees will also get help paying for healthcare through the ACA.

"Insurers are still required by law to provide reduced deductibles and co-pays for low-income marketplace enrollees," said Larry Levitt, senior vice president for special initiatives and co-executive director of the Foundation's Program for the Study of Health Reform and Private Insurance. "Premiums are increasing, but consumers will also get more help."

Even though consumers will get help paying for health insurance, this isn't President Obama's open enrollment; many things have changed so it's important to start reviewing plans now.

Don't just "auto-renew" your health insurance plan. Study your options carefully.

World AIDS Day 2017: Better drugs, prevention, but opioid epidemic fuels spread of HIV



When Jeff Simmons, now 52, was diagnosed HIV-positive in 1991, the virus was still a death sentence for many — and he went to several friends' funerals.

As he makes plans for World AIDS Day, Simmons has lived to see big changes in treatment and management of HIV, though not without scars. Early on, he battled the virus with the drug AZT (zidovudine), infamous because it had to be taken every four hours to minimize the chance the virus would mutate and become resistant, and because it came with a long list of horrible side effects.

Even after the drugs improved, Simmons gulped down handfuls of pills daily just to keep the virus from genetically encoding itself into more and more cells, turning them into virtual factories where it could replicate itself.

The drug companies keep refining medications to keep HIV in check, and Simmons now takes only three HIV pills, although he takes other meds for a litany of side effects the virus has caused over the years: diabetes, high cholesterol, neuropathy.

But if he were newly diagnosed, he might now get by with a combination of drugs in a single pill, taken once a day, with little to none of the side effects that characterized the older classes of drugs.

"I'm not on 'one pill once a day' yet," Simmons said. "If it's not broke, don't fix it."

Fewer pills, more survivors That lessened "pill burden"

— with fewer side effects — has made a tremendous difference in the survivability of HIV, said Dr. John Narro, medical director for the Centers of Excellence HIV Specialty Clinic at Knox County Health Department. That's because people are more likely to take the medications, crucial in curbing the spread of the virus, which can mutate rapidly.







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Remembering Coleman Alexander Young May 24, 1918 - November 29, 1997



In previous years, the healthcare marketplace auto-renewed consumers for the upcoming coverage year. According to the KFF poll, almost 25 percent of marketplace enrollees were auto-renewed for their same plan or auto-reassigned to similar plans in 2016 for the 2017 coverage year.

But experts have said that the auto-renewal feature may not identify the subsidies that you're eligible for accurately and when it comes to prescriptions or other life-saving services that you need, you'll want to make sure that any similar plan fits your needs.

Remember, it's best to enroll early; don't wait until the last minute.

During previous enrollment periods, there has been a surge of interest as the deadline nears; that increased activity

slowed down the responsiveness of HealthCare.gov and created longer wait times for the marketplace call center, said Karen Pollitz, a senior fellow at the Kaiser Family Foundation.

"Log-in to HealthCare.gov, update your application for financial assistance, review your plan choices and what they cost, and select a plan for 2018," said Pollitz. "If you want the same plan, select the same plan."

Whether you choose the same health insurance plan or a new one, don't wait until the last minute to make your decision. This year, thanks to Trump and the Republican-controlled Congress, if you have questions about plans in the final hours of the enrollment period, you might just be on your own.

Prophet Cedric Banks:

We are here today with Commander Mahone of the 7th Precinct Detroit Police Department. Now Commander we have a lot of people watching this TV Show that have broken relationships that they are in. What can you tell them regarding Restorative Practice if they are looking to work things out, and they don't have the fundamentals, the techniques or the skills?

Commander Mahone:

Restorative Practice does work. I have seen it in action. If you want to get involved, you can get trained and get the knowledge you need by contacting Black Family Development. The training I received helped our calls for service to drop dramatically. This allowed me to take our resources we were using to police the one street Dupree. and to spread them out and thereby providing more residents in the area with service.

Prophet Cedric Banks:

Now have you practiced this technique of Restorative Practice on any person? Have you introduced this to any family members or friends? Because you have seen the productivity

Commander Mahone:

I actually practiced it with my child. Actually he is a young adult. Sometimes with parents and children there are communication barriors. So I used Restorative Practice with my son and it turned out well. I'm not sure if he knew that this is what was happening to him, but I knew that by applying the techniques, it gave him an opportunity to tell me how he felt about the different rules I had in my home. That is what the discussion was about. Certain

rules that we had in the house and how he felt about them.

Prophet Cedric Banks:

So you have seen the benefits of Restorative Practices personally?

Commander Mahone:

I have, and more importantly, it allowed me to touch the lives of the citizens I served which was the 9th precinct, while I was there. I have people today when they see me say thank you. People walked away from those 3 to 4 hour meetings feeling validated, refreshed and some were remorseful for their actions.

Homeless Veterans Enjoy Community Support By Renee Summers

The men are jovial and warm with one another, talking and joking as the late afternoon sun breaks through the tall windows of the cozy room where they are seated. Despite whatever their circumstances may be, the men are friendly and upbeat as they seat themselves among the many tables filling the small room. The men are United States Veterans. The room is part of a homeless shelter in northwest Detroit where the men reside.

It is the day before Thanksgiving, a day which for many means an abundance of family, food and celebration. For the residents of this particular shelter, Thanksgiving may be just another Thursday--but not if Nadine Jones has her way. Jones is the founder and director of the Love a Michigan Vet Project, a non-profit organization which is dedicated to meeting the needs and improving the quality of life for the nation's forgotten heroes. On this particular Thanksgiving eve, Jones has a plan to provide a holiday gala for the men of the shelter, the homeless veterans.

Together with donations and volunteers, Jones and her small team of helpers will provide the men a dinner of turkey, ham, mashed potatoes and gravy and all the trimmings one could imagine. In addition, Jones brings with her a bag of goodies for the men, winter hats and gloves which come in handy this time of year. By the time the party is in full swing, the mood in the room is cheerful as some of the men return to the dinner line for seconds. Jones herself is cheerful and perky, and it is hard to imagine anywhere she could be where there would not be a party mood.

In addition to directing her non-profit organization, Jones attends college at the University of Michigan-Dearborn full time and works as a flight attendant four days a week. Her organization works with four local shelters for veterans, assisting a total of 175 homeless veterans. Love a Michigan Vet Project provides basic living necessities such as toiletries, clothing, and small furniture items and even organizes a food pantry. The organization provides dinner at each of the shelters a minimum of once a month. Jones cites her grandfather's legacy of 26 years of military service as one of the inspirations for establishing her organization.

Jones would like the community to know the Love a Michigan Vet Project is available to provide support services to veterans and their families. She welcomes volunteers and donations. "It takes a village," she says, "I can't do this by myself." She wants the community to realize that there are homeless veterans in metro Detroit and the community can and should step in to help. "When people donate to me, I want them to be involved, I want them to come and see the people who are getting the donation, I think it's important for them to have a face," Jones says.
