


Despite the frigid temperature, Detroit turned out in mass to support Dr. Claude Anderson at the Charles H. Wright African Museum on December 29th.



Martin Luther King was born January 15, 1929. He was a great American who worked for civil rights in the United States in the 1950s and 60s. He fought for the rights of African Americans and many people, Blacks as well as whites, supported him in this

Martin Luther King saw how badly black people were being treated and during the 1950s he got involved in the Civil Rights movement. Terrorist bombed King's home and tried to force him to give up his fight for equal rights. But King wasn't afraid. He continued working for the black people in America.

At that time, blacks and whites were separated in schools, restaurants, sport and in other fields. In the 1960s King, met with the American President, John F. Kennedy who shared his opinion on equal rights. Kennedy was killed in November 1963 and the next American government passed a law that gave blacks the same rights as white people.

It was called the Civil Rights Act. The new law gave blacks the same opportunities in education and work. It also gave them the right to vote.

Martin Luther King's life came to a sudden end. On April 4, 1968 when he was killed by a white racist, James Earl Ray. People all over the world mourned King's death.

Today, Martin Luther King, Jr. is remembered and his life is celebrated on the third Monday in January each year. This is a National Holiday where many businesses will be closed.

What are you going to do to remember or celebrate his life? Throughout this issue. there are several events listed thatyou can attend and participate in. Do something to acknowledge the fact that Dr. King gave his life so that you will have the same rights and be treated equally. Make sure vour kids and vour grandkids understand the importance of Dr. King's life.

Prophet Cedric Banks:

We have someone here today who is doing a tremendous job in the Community. We thank GOD today. Welcome Judge Kenneth King.

Judge Kenneth King:

Thank you for the opportunity. Whenever I have an opportunity to speak to GOD's people, I am all for it.

Prophet Cedric Banks:

Judge, tell us a little bit about you being on the bench at 36th District Court and how long have you been a Judge at 36th District Court?

Judge Kenneth King:

I have been a Judge at 36th District Court now for over 10 years. I was appointed by Governor Jennifer Granholm in 2006 and I became a Chief Judge ProTem in 2010, and I became Chief Judge of 36th District Court in 2012 until May of 2013. I am currently assigned to the Criminal Division and I am one of the four Judges that handle the felony criminal examinations that take place in the City of Detroit.

Prophet Cedric Banks: What a great accomplishment you made in a ten year period.

Judge Kenneth King:

Well GOD is good. I try to listen to him and have him direct my path and I am just excited to see what is next.

Prophet Cedric Banks: Wonderful, what are some of your goals?

Judge Kenneth King:

My primary goal is to continue to serve the people of the City of Detroit until I branch out and do something else. I would like to serve on the Wayne County Circuit Court. Also, I would like to be a Federal Judge in Eastern District Michigan, but that would all have to happen in GOD's time. However, when that opportunity presents itself, I am going to seize upon it. But for right now, I will continue to serve the people of the City of Detroit and that is my goal.

Prophet Cedric Banks:

That is really great because when you are a Man of GOD or a Woman of GOD, everything happens in GOD's timing. I am talking about that GOD will begin to bring positions and opportunities forward that a person may not be aware of in his timing. It is so beautiful to have godly people in the political arena. I say that because in the political arena, it is a very corrupted arena. Not everyone in the political arena is corrupt, but there is a lot of corruption in the political arena. I got to tell the truth but we thank GOD that he does have and we have had many Judges that have come right here on the show that are not corrupt. Judge King when does your term end?

Judge Kenneth King:

The cycle for my term at 36th District Court ends in the year 2020.

Prophet Cedric Banks:

You have really, tremendously been a blessing in the Community, I do know that you are a man of integrity, and the community definitely need you for what you stand for and your standards. Do you have any di-

rection on which way you possibly may go in the year 2020? Do you want to stay in the same arena?

Judge Kenneth King:

If something possibly happens before the year 2020 I may run. If not, then I will run for my seat at 36th District Court in the year 2020 But I am hoping that the Lord uses me in a different capacity and that he increases my territory. So that is what I am looking for. I want to serve the people in the City of Detroit, but I would also like to serve the people in Wayne County and in Michigan.

John Conyers and MLK Day Congressman John Conyers, an African-American Democrat from Michigan, spearheaded the movement to establish MLK Day. Rep. Conyers worked in the civil rights movement in the 1960s and was elected to Congress in 1964, where he championed the Voting Rights Act of 1965. Four days after King's assassination in 1968, Conyers introduced a bill that would make Jan. 15 a federal holiday in King's honor. But Congress was unmoved by Conyers' entreaties and though he kept reviving the bill, it kept failing in Congress.

In 1970, Conyers convinced New York's governor and New York City's mayor to commemorate King's birthday, a move that the city of St. Louis emulated in 1971. Other localities followed, but it was not until the 1980s that Congress acted on Conyers' bill. By this time, the congressman had enlisted the help of popular singer Stevie Wonder, who released the song "Happy Birthday" for King in 1981.

Conyers also organized marches in support of the holiday in 1982 and 1983.

Congressional Battles over MLK Day

Conyers was finally successful when he reintroduced the bill in

1983. But even in 1983 support was not unanimous. In the House of Representatives, William Dannemeyer, a Republican from California, led the opposition to the bill, arguing that it was too expensive to create a federal holiday and estimating that it would cost the federal government \$225 million annually in lost productivity.

Reagan's administration concurred with Dannemeyer's arguments, but the House passed the bill with a vote of 338 for and 90 against.

When the bill reached the Senate, the arguments opposing the bill were less grounded in economics and more reliant on outright racism. Sen. Jesse Helms, a Democrat from North Carolina, held a filibuster against the bill and demanded the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) make public its files on King, asserting that King was a Communist who did not deserve the honor of a holiday. The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) had investigated King throughout the late 1950s and 1960s at the behest of its chief, J. Edgar Hoover, and had even tried intimidation tactics against King, sending the civil rights leader a note in 1965 that suggested he kill himself to avoid embarrassing

personal revelations hitting the media.

King, of course, was not a Communist and had broken no federal laws, but by challenging the status quo, King and the Civil Rights Movement discomfited the Washington es-Charges tablishment. Communism were a popular way to discredit people who dared speak truth to power during the '50s and '60s, and King's opponents made liberal use of that tactic.

When Helms tried to revive that tactic, Reagan defended him. A reporter asked Reagan about the charge of Communist against King, and Reagan said that Americans would find out in around 35 years, referring to the length of time before any material the FBI gathers on a subject could be released. Reagan later apologized, and a federal judge blocked the release of King's FBI files.

Conservatives in the Senate tried to change the name of the bill to "National Civil Rights Day" as well, but they failed to do so. The bill passed the Senate with a vote of 78 for and 22 against. Reagan capitulated, signing the bill into law.

The First MLK Day

King's wife, Coretta Scott King, chaired the commission responsible for creating the first celebration of King's birthday in 1986. Though she was disappointed at not receiving more support from Reagan's administration, the result included over a week of commemorations beginning on Jan. 11, 1986, and lasting until the holiday itself on Jan. 20. Events were held in cities like Atlanta and Washington, D.C., and featured a tribute at the Georgia State Capitol and the dedication of a bust of King at the U.S. Capitol.

Some Southern states protested the new holiday by including Confederate commemorations on the same day, but by the 1990s the holiday had become established everywhere in the United States.

Reagan's proclamation of the holiday on Jan. 18, 1986, explained the reason for the holiday: "This year marks the first observance of the birthday of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. as a national holiday. It is a time for rejoicing and reflecting. We rejoice because, in his short life, Dr. King, by his preaching, his example, and his leadership, helped to move us closer to the ideals on which America was founded. . . . He challenged us to make real the promise of

America as a land of freedom, equality, opportunity, and brotherhood."

It required a long 15-year fight, but Conyers and his supporters successfully won King national recognition for his service to country and humanity.

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Motown Museum Receives \$500,000 Donation


The vision of an expanded space for the world famous Motown Museum is closer to fruition with the donation of \$500,000 from the Hudson-Webber Foundation, Business Insider reported.

"Every time we get another one of these significant lead gifts in the campaign, not only does it encourage us as a team, but also sends a message to the rest of the funding community about this project, the importance of this development and also makes clear that this is real," Robin Terry, chairwoman and CEO of the museum, told the Detroit Free Press when the foundation notified her about the award.

The Motown Museum in Detroit today announced that the Hudson-Weber Foundation has approved a 0,000 grant to assist with the museum's expansion plans.

This donation comes after the museum received a \$1 million donation from the Fred A. and Barbara Erb Family Foundation. In October 2016, the museum announced plans for a \$50 million, 50,000-square foot expansion project. The new space will include more interactive exhibits, a performance theater, recording studios, retail shops and meeting spaces. Museum-goers currently only have access to two houses on Grand Boulevard and the funds from the campaign will allow a third house with more exhibits to be built. The expansion will foster job creation and economic growth in Detroit, providing the local community with nearly 250 job opportuni-

"The Motown Museum project will increase the vitality of the surrounding neighborhood and will expand the museum's



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

The Detroit Lions are looking to hire their 10th permanent head coach since the NFL went to a 16-game schedule for the 1978 season. The Lions have interviewed defensive coordinator Teryl Austin, offensive coordinator Jim Bob Cooter, Packers associate head coach Winston Moss, Minnesota Vikings offensive coordinator Pat Shur-Houston Texans defensive coordinator Mike Vrabel and recently New England Patriots defensive coordinator Matt Patricia to the Lions' vacant head coaching position. However Lions defensive coordinator Teryl Austin reportedly interviewed with the Cincinnati Bengals on Friday for their vacancy at the same position. The move required permission from the Lions, considering it was a lateral move. Though the Lions reportedly gave the Bengals permission, they did not offer the same courtesy to the Green Bay Packers. In my opinion, the defense has sucked the last two years. The only thing that sucked worse than the Defense is some of the talent on the defenses side of the ball.

Nevertheless, there are reports that the next Lions head coach will be New England Patriots defensive coordinator Matt Patricia to accept the Detroit Lions' vacant head coaching position, according to Pro Football Talk's Mike Florio and ESPN. Now Patricia cannot officially accept the job, if it is ultimately offered, until the Patriots' season comes to a close, so we will wait and see what will come.

By the way if you care to know, Detroit DE Ezekiel Ansah was named the NFC's defensive player of the week after his three sacks in the season finale against Green Bay. Ansah had six sacks over the last two weeks of the season. He is one of the bigger questions for the Lions this offseason, too, as he is set to become a free agent in March unless Detroit uses the franchise tag on him or signs him to an extension. In addition, the Associated Press named Darius Slay and Jamal Agnew first-team All-Pro on Friday. Slay was as a "defensive back," although they had corners and safeties. Agnew was picked as the punt returner. They are the Lions' firstteam All-Pro picks since Ndamukong Suh in 2014, according to Pro Football Reference. Lion's kicker Matt Prater has been named to the Pro Football Focus All-Pro team. Glover Quin was named a second-team All-Pro safety.

Buycks has had game action with the Pistons' Gatorade League affiliate in Grand Rapids, when he was called up when guard Jackson and forward Stanley Johnson (strained right hip flexor) came down with injuries.

tions. This was followed by dancers and drummers in the African tradition and an explanation of Kwanza by Greg McKenzie.

Dr. Anderson was introduced by former Detroit city council member, JoAnn Watson, and he wasted no time in not only speaking on the working principles of Black economic cooperation, but the history and dire necessity of it as we approach the third decade of the 21st century.

"We need to go back and build our own communities, "admonished Anderson. "But right now we don't have any communities. You don't have not one single, solitary community in the United States of America. You cannot practice group economics and cooperative economics if you don't have a community. So quit using the word community. Don't ever use the word community, because you don't have one."Anderson is president of the PowerNomics Corporation of America, Inc. and the Harvest Institute which is reputedly the only Black think tank in America. For decades he has travelled the nation speaking at various venues and urging Black economic empowerment.

In 2004 Anderson, who has roots in Detroit, spearheaded a drive to set aside an area of Detroit for the establishment of a Black business district popularly known as 'African Town.' This was to be the model for Black business districts that he planned to initiate in cities across America. Unfortunately, it was blocked by local officials that succumbed to pressure by non-Black groups who labeled 'African Town' as racist. The irony is that many of these

same groups have dominated the business structure in the Black community although they refuse to live or socialize with the people there or provide community resources.

"Racism is a competitive rela-

tionship between groups," explained Anderson. "It has nothing in the world to do with individuals. It's a group phenomenon. In order to be a racist vou must be associated and identified with the group that has the power. That's racism. It's a competitive group relationship who's competing for the ownership and control of wealth, resources and power. You've got to have economic wealth and power to be a racist, and I'm sick and tired of people accusing Black folks of being racist. Forget that; Black folks cannot be racists." Anderson has the experience and has done the research to be well versed in the subject of economic empowerment. He was Coordinator of Education for the state of Florida under Governor Reubin Askew. He was assistant secretary in the U.S. Department of Commerce, and he headed a regional commission that directed economic development projects for governors in the southeastern states. He is an entrepreneur who founded and developed Waterland Fisheries. Inc. which is a sea food factory he owns on the coast of Maryland. He is also the author of five best selling books on history and economics and its impact on Black Americans.

"Collective cooperative economics, that's what you should be focusing on," said Anderson to a nearly standing room audience at the museum. "Collective, cooperative; what does Photo by Dale Rich ean? That means cor

that mean? That means coming together as a people and acting as a group. Why? Because racism is a group sport. It's a team sport. You either play as a group, or you lose by default."

In Anderson's book, 'Power-Nomics: The National Plan to Empower Black America,' he reasons that America's national leadership (both Black and White) remain silent and avoid the reality that after 400 years Black Americans are still economically exploited and disenfranchised. And that time is running out for Blacks to resolve their wealth subservience and inequality. He reasons that if Blacks cannot enter America's mainstream channels of wealth then it must do the next best thing and construct a parallel economy of its own. Anderson writes:

"Throughout history nearly everyone, except Black people, has seen wealth in the race. Black people have responded by enriching every other group but themselves. It is now time for Black people to create wealth for themselves. The secret to creating wealth is to own and control resources, whether they are natural (land, water, precious minerals and metals), processed (machinery, factories, consumer items, public improvements) human capital (skilled, literate, labor force). We need activities and mechanisms that produce wealth for Black people and their communities. When a group or community begins to acquire resources, and manage them for the economic benefit of the group, they have created an economy, a mechanism to produce income, wealth, jobs, and business opportunities. It is important that we understand this concept of an economy."1

Anderson expresses outrage that Detroit, a city that he was raised and educated in which was once considered among the vanguard of black business and intellectual advancement, is now in such a dismal condition economically and culturally.

"They told me that if I did something only for Black folks in Detroit, then that's racist. They got China towns, Pole towns, Greek towns, Arab Towns and Mexican Towns; but a Black Town is racist!

You got to learn how to play the game. Get your own resources and buy from your own people, and support your own people and do not let elect any politician who will not support you. And when you build those businesses build them where you will have a cultural and competitive advantage. You must dominant in politics and economics wherever you dominate in population. You are 92 percent of the population in Detroit. You should have 92 percent of the businesses in this city.

And your key is your exceptionality. Not the way you hear about it today. They think what exceptionality is for Blacks folks is being the best dancer, or the best singer, or being able to out run anybody with a ball; that's exceptionality but it's not the kind that I'm talking about. My exceptionality is this: We are the only people in the world that has been mistreated in a certain way. Nobody in this country has been treated like Black folks. You are the only people that was brought here involuntarily and denied all your human rights.

Nobody has sacrificed and suffered and contributed like you to build this nation.

You are a special people, so do not allow them to keep putting you in these bags with everybody else. These bags with minorities, poor folks, diversity, and handicapped and poor." Steven Malik Shelton is a Detroit based writer and journalist. He can be reachedat: malik-shelton562@gmail.com

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


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"Talk to Tasha"

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
