Congressman Conyers Urges Michigan Businesses To Learn More



DETROIT- The U.S. Department of Labor has granted the state of Michigan \$2,840,535 in federal funding to support implementation and promotion of the new short-time compensation (STC) program.

The STC program, commonly known as "work-sharing," prevents layoffs by allowing employers to reduce employees' hours as an alternative to layoffs during an economic downturn. Under the STC program, workers affected by reduced hours have their wages supplemented by a percentage of the weekly unemployment compensation that they would have received had they been laid off. The program gives businesses the crucial ability to retain skilled employees at reduced hours during tough economic times, allowing them to simply restore employee hours when demand improves which significantly reduces the high cost to employers of conducting layoffs and re-hiring.

"As an early supporter of work-sharing here in the United States, I am very pleased that Michigan has received federal resources to bolster this important program," said Rep. John Conyers, who is a founder and chair of the Congressional Full Em-

ployment Caucus. "Worksharing is win for all invested parties: workers remain employed and get to keep their health and retirement benefits, while employers can retain skilled workers that are integral to the success of their businesses. Entire communities benefit when lives are not disrupted unnecessarily by the scourge of unemployment."

The federal funding resources were made available through the Middle Class Tax Relief and Job Creation Act of 2012, which included language taken directly from the Layoff Prevention Act (H.R. 2421) that was co-sponsored by Rep. Conyers and Rep. Rosa DeLauro (CT-03) in July 2011.

States have until the end of this year to apply for federal resources to implement the STC program. To address this looming deadline, Reps. Conyers and DeLauro again joined forces to co-sponsor H.R. 5583, the Layoff Prevention Extension Act of 2014, which will give states an additional year to make their STC programs eligible for federal support. Both members plan to reintroduce the Layoff Prevention Extension Act in the 114th Congress.

Several U.S. states and countries with STC programs have seen significant economic results. In Rhode Island, worksharing prevented more than 13,000 layoffs between 2007 and 2010 – the height of the Great Recession. Countries such as Germany and Japan have reduced levels of unemployment by as much as 1% through work-sharing programs.

Yes, Marching Still Makes a Difference

."Hands Up, Don't Shoot" "No Justice, No Peace," "I Can't Breathe"

"Black Lives Matter"

Those are the chants and hand-written signs that continue to characterize marches, die-ins, sit-ins and other nonviolent actions in more than 50 cities across the nation in response to grand jury decisions in Missouri and New York not to indict White police officers for killing unarmed African Americans.

As always, there are detractors who argue that civil rights marches, while helpful in the past, are passe in an era of a Black family occupying the White House. They are wrong. And if they had studied history, they would know it.

Every inch of progress toward racial justice and equality in America has only come as a consequence of organized public protest and struggle. Each march had goals that went beyond marching for the sake of marching.

The Civil Rights Act of 1964, Voting Rights Act of 1965, and Fair Housing Act of 1968, as well as all the subsequent racial justice laws were only established after a protracted period of civil rights demonstrations and protest. It is noteworthy that today a growing number of young people are not only marching, but assuming leadership roles in the mass marches in support of Michael Brown, Eric Garner, Akai Gurley, Tamir Rice, and Rumain Brisbon.

From Boston to Los Angeles, Miami to Phoenix, from Chicago to New York City, from Washington, D.C. to Atlanta, and from St. Louis to Pittsburgh people are demanding equal justice. People are protesting excessive use of deadly force and police brutality. And the movement is growing. On Saturday, December 13, there will be another "March on Washington, D.C." This time, it will be called the "National March against Police Brutality" and will demand equal justice

and federal intervention to halt the senseless killing of unarmed Blacks and other people of color. It will be con-sponsored by a coalition of civil rights organizations and union and trade associations.

The coalition includes the National Action Network, National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), National Urban League, Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), National Newspaper Publishers Association (NNPA), the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights, the Institute for Policy Studies, the National Coalition on Black Civic Participation, and the Hip-Hop Caucus. The goal of the march will be to seek additional protection from Congress and the Department of Justice (DOJ).

We want the DOJ to deploy federal special prosecutors to take over cases of Black Americans being killed by police officers. We should work with members of the Congressional Black Caucus (CBC) to craft the appropriate legislation and remedies that should be adopted into law. The issues of racial profiling, police use of deadly force, prosecutorial misconduct, inadequate police training, video cameras on police officers, and grand jury injustice all are matters that require systemic change.

Yes marching does make a difference in particular if it leads to both a change in how laws are established and enforced with transparency and equal justice. In his book, Where Do We Go From Here: Chaos or Community? Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. warned, "The persistence of racism in depth and the dawning awareness that Negro demands will necessitate structural changes in society have generated a new phase of white resistance in North and South."

It is ironic, although some will say it is providential, that 47 years after Dr. King's prophetic words, the persistence of racism in America continues with a majority of White Americans living in what Rev. Joe Lowery calls the 51st state the state of denial. Yet, younger Americans - Black, White, Latino, Asian, and Native - are jointly protesting racially-motivated police killings. I agree that attaining equal justice today requires more marches and demonstrations. But, as always, they represent a great start.

Statement by Detroit City Council Member Raquel Castañeda-López on House Bill 5977



I strongly oppose House Bill 5977 as it strips local municipalities of their rightto home rule, contradicts the Michigan constitution and places an unfair hindrance on the economy and people of Michigan."The State is prohibiting local City governments from passing vital laws and ordinances regarding their municipal concerns.

In addition, HB 5977 undermines efforts to grow Michigan's economy by prohibiting local municipalities from requiring the use of Michigan based companies. It further weakens'our economy by placing restrictions on local gover nments ability to negotiate wages and employee benefits. As stated in the legislative analysis of the bill, every development or redevelopment of properties in municipalities is critical to the economic success of those municipalities.HB 5977

would strip a local government of their right to ensure that these developments benefit their local economies and residents.

Local governments are better

equipped to determine the economic needs of their communities. HB 5977 would undermine these effort by creating a blanket policy. HB 5977's attempt to create economic uniformity throughout the State is short sighted and will be detrimental to Michigan's economy. One size rarely fits all.'

Furthermore, every local government has the right to regudevelopment. late Developments that receive public subsidies are receiving a public benefit and thereby have a responsibility to return the public benefit in some shape or form. Local hiring and contracting preferences have a positive impact on our economy and quality of life.

Restrictive policies such as HB 5977 do not attract businesses or residents to our state or cities.

Not allowing municipalities to determine how they make deals is bad for the state, bad for business and bad for residents.

I want Detroit to succeed. I want Jackson to succeed. As a state, we should want all cities to prosper. That cannot happen if local governments'ability to govern and act in the best interests of their economies and residents is restricted.

regained full powers to run the city in September, but Orr remained as emergency manager until the city exits bankruptcy later today.

Orr informed Snyder and state Treasurer Kevin Clinton that he relinquishes his position today, which will be the effective date of the court-approved plan of adjustment and the closings of a series of settlement agreements. Orr also recommended the city's receivership pursuant to Public Act 436 of 2012 be terminated.

"Detroit stands taller today," Snyder said. "Our state's largest city has moved through this historic bankruptcy to move toward a brighter future. This was difficult work that reguired bold leadership and sacrifices from many people, and there is more to do. But we also have watched through this process the people of our state draw closer and stand together in support of Detroit, recognizing that all of Michigan is better when the city thrives."

Snyder authorized the placement of the city into bankruptcy in July 2013 because it could not provide adequate services to its residents or meet its obligations to creditors. Today, the quality of life for the city's 700,000 residents is improving. The response time for police and emergency medical services hasdropped dramatically. Work is underway to improve streetlights, trash is being picked up and a plan is in place to remove hundreds of abandoned structures that have blighted neighborhoods.

Detroit also has a firm, sustainable financial foundation, with a two-year budget in place and plans for reinvestment in the city's services and infrastruc-

ture.

Snyder, in his letter accepting Orr's determination, thanked him for his service, "which has been extraordinary and transformative for the city of Detroit and our state as a whole."

The bankruptcy effort was guided by Orr and was supported by a wide variety of community, business and philanthropic leaders in and around the city as well as appreciated sacrifices from hardworking Detroit employees, past and present.

"Reaching the effective date of the plan of adjustment is a milestone, but it also is just one step in a journey," Orr wrote in his letter to Snyder and Clinton. "If the city takes advantage of this unique opportunity to shed the problems of the past and stays on the path that has been blazed in the restructuring, Detroit is poised to grow and thrive for the benefit of its residents and this state for many years to come."

Mayor Mike Duggan said that having Detroit out of bankruptcy, combined with effective partnerships with City Council and in Lansing, will allow the city's recent progress to continue.

"Over the past year we have built a strong management team that is beginning to deliver better city services in a number of areas," Duggan said. "With bankruptcy behind us, our administration's full energy can remain on making city government work for all Detroiters."

City Council President Brenda Jones said Detroit emerges from bankruptcy with a plan to invest in the city and its people.

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there is a long road ahead. Overall, the branch must stay diligently active in the continuous fight for social justice in 2015.

"We had a great year in 2014...We're working on building our branch higher to a level that has not been seen before," Starghill said. "We're going to need each of your help to make this branch more vibrant and even stronger. We've got to be to be on the offense, and we have to be a relevant part of the community... .I'm excited with great anticipation about what's going to happen with the Western Wayne NAACP."

Our ancestors fought all of these years to get us to the

Lions Claw the Buccaneers

We will all agree that our home town Detroit Lions are giving us all something to talk about as this season compare to last has got us all in a great holiday spirit. Yes, With a 34-17 victory over the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, the Lions claimed their ninth victory in the season's first 13 games and improved to 9-4. This marks Detroit's best record through 13 games since 1991 (9-4). By starting 9-4, the Lions tied for the fifth-most wins through 13 games in team history, which includes the 1952-54 and 1956 seasons when the Lions only played 12 games. Quarterback Matthew Stafford led the Lions on offense in the team's 34-17 win over Tampa Bay by completing 26-of-34 passes (76.5 pct.) for 311 yards and threw for three

touchdowns. His passer rating of 133.8 was the second-highest tally of his career behind only his 137.6 efforts vs. San Diego December 24, 2011. Stafford garnered his 27th career 300-yard passing game with 311 yards in the air. This was his fourth 300-yard game of the season. He now has registered 300 yards in back-toback games for the eighth time in his career. However it has been a while that both Stafford and his favorite receiver Calvin Johnson been health at the same time. Johnson caught 8 passes for 158 yards and had one touchdown reception (6 yards). Johnson has now surpassed 150 yards in a game for the 14th time in his career, and he is now tied with WR Randy Moss and WR Isaac

Bruce for the fifth-most 150yard receiving games in NFL history. Wow!!!

The Lions defense limited the Buccaneers to 233 total yards (26 rushing, 207 passing). It was the seventh time this season; Detroit has held opponents to under 300 yards in a game. With the 233-yard output from Tampa Bay, the Lions are now allowing just 295.7 yards per game. This is the lowest yards per game allowed by the Lions through 13 games since 1993 (280.8). In addition the rush defense has been fantastic again, only allowing just 26 rushing yards to Tampa Bay in the team's 34-17 win. The Lions now have allowed opponents to under 60 yards rushing in six games this season, four times under 50 yards and twice under 30 yards. Again, Wow!!!

Lions Head Coach Jim Caldwell put the game in perspective, as this is what he had to say in his opening statement during post, "I think our guys played a pretty good team game It certainly wasn't great, it wasn't perfect, the games never are particularly against a team that has the kind of talent they have. That's a talented football team and I think when you look at teams that we play in this league, you've got to throw the record out of the window. They're big, strong and physical up front. I think our offense played with control. Matthew (Stafford) had another really good day and we ran the ball better than we have ran it all year, obviously, in terms of numbers. I think we were over 117 yards, which is the first time we've been over 100 yards, I believe this year. Calvin (Johnson) did his usual. Defensively, one of the big things I think is, coming out of the half, we had a couple of penalties, they took the ball down the field, scored and they had a little momentum, I think. And our defense came out and only allowed them 25 yards, I think, that entire quarter. That really kind of sets the stage for the rest of the game and gave us a chance to get a little bit of a cushion, some breathing room. But no lead is insurmountable in this league, but the guys played well. Special teams were solid as well. We've got a lot of room to improve and we've got to get ready for another tough one next week."

Win Over Michigan EMU hoops downs U-M, 45-42,

ANN ARBOR-. (EMUEagles.com) – Behind the stifling 2-3 zone defense, the Eastern Michigan University men's basketball team delivered a statement win by knocking off the University of Michigan, 45-42, Tuesday night, Dec. 9, at Crisler Center. It was just the third time in the series history that the Eagles (8-1) defeated the Wolverines (6-3). With the game tied at just over three minutes remaining, Karrington Ward (Lockport, III.-Lockport Township (Moraine Valley C.C.)) hit a go-ahead three, and the Eagles would forced Michigan into contested shots for the rest of the game to hold on for the three-point win.

The Eagles claimed the victory over their Washtenaw County rival by limited the Wolverines to their fewest point total since Feb. 9, 2009, when the Maize and Blue fell to then-No. 9 Michigan State University, 54-42. The Green and White snapped a 59game streak with no back-to-back losses, the longest such streak in the Big Ten. EMU's win was also the second victory over a Big Ten Conference opponent in the Rob Murphy era, the previous win coming almost two years from tonight's win, a 47-44 home decision over Purdue.



Movie Review: 'Top Five'

Chris Rock recently hosted "Saturday Night Live." During the show's normal intro section, he did around 10 minutes of standup. One of the targets of his wicked humor was the new World Trade Center. He said he would never go in it. There were audible gasps, and a bit of controversy followed. Some weren't amused that he had the audacity to say what people think. That's the brilliance of Rock, who is a talented social satirist; he'll say anything. Top Five gives us a glimpse of that comic genius. Just a tad.

Andre Allen (Rock) is a hip New York-based stand-up comedian who has stretched his talents thin. He's in a plethora of movies; none are particularly good, though they have brought him fame and fortune. His ladyfriend, Erica Long (Gabrielle Union), a gorgeous, sexy brown-skinned woman with a blonde, two-tine weave, has a reality show, and Andre is a frequent guest. An impending filming of their marriage will put their fragile relationship to the test, on coast-to-coast TV. He lives in a fish bowl. Rock's script sets up the incessant turmoil of Andre's life perfectly. You know something deep and meaningful is missing in his existence, yet you don't feel sorry for the wealthy brotherman. A normal screenwriter/director would add just a couple of more characters to the soup. But not Rock. His script calls for an endless parade of cameos, from his own friends and acquaintances that turn the proceedings into a potpourri of New York Who's Who and Who Cares. Fate brings a tall, lovely, headon-her-shoulders-right journalist into Allen's life. She's Chelsea Brown (Rosario Dawson) and she's writing a profile

piece about the comedian. He's reluctant at first. His agent (Kevin Hart) twists his arm. Then almost instantaneously, Allen is smitten. Chelsea is everything Erica is not: genuine, smart and not playing to the cameras. Could she be the one that helps him find a more fulfilling life?

Over a 24-hour period, sequences on the red carpet, in the ghetto, the streets, fancy apartments, busses and bathrooms blend together like a drunken night spiraling out of control. It's New York. Anything can happen, and it does. The over-the-top scenes peak with a mini-orgy and Allen trying to manhandle two sexy, insatiable ladies. It's the funniest scene in the movie.

As a director, Rock's style is either controlled mayhem or he's letting his cast run amuck. An endless parade of headstrong comedians, movie stars, journalists and celebrities play to the balcony seats. They overpower the thin plotting. And the way-too-talky script makes the movie feel like a play on wheels. If you get the feeling that this vanity project panders to a shallow, attention-deficit, reality TV-type audience, you're not alone. But so what? You'll laugh anyway. Rock is solid as the comedian in turmoil, and he looks dapper. Dawson is the kind of alluring actress most men wish they could date, and her Chelsea character has an equally come-hither persona. Gabrielle Union's Erica is a synthesis of all the Housewives of Wherever shows. Shallow, glamorous and add another pinch of shallow for good measure. Saying Kevin Hart is manic as the agent, is redundant. He does frantic better than anybody. Chilean cinematographer

Manuel Alberto Claro was the D.P. on Lars Van Trier's controversial sex drama Nymphomaniac: Vol. I. Maybe that's why the bedroom scene was so much fun to watch. Editor Anne McCabe (Maria Full of Grace) has OK timing; the laughs, outrageous moments and funny cameos come at the right times.

There's a good chance this nugget of urban and urbane humor will find a laugh-starved audience this holiday season. But if Chris Rock truly wants to give his fans a holiday treat, he will film a new stand-up comedy concert and talk about: Poshootings. Global lice warming. Oil pipelines. Poll tax. National healthcare. Immigration. Or, even the new World Trade Center. It's what he does best.

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Barrington Irving's "Flying Classroom" takes learning to the sky



Did you know that Barrington Irving holds the Guinness World Record as the first black pilot, and the youngest person to fly solo around the world? Born in Jamaica and raised in inner city Miami, Irving developed a burgeoning interest in aviation at the age of fifteen. After turning down a full ride football scholarship to the University of Florida, he began cleaning aircraft to earn funds for flight school, and also invested in a \$40 flight simulator video game to sharpen his ever growing piloting skills. Irving's hard work and humble beginnings played a key role in the development of his dream to fly across the world-a feat that would ultimately propel him into the realms of history. In 2007, Irving took off in a single-engine airplane called "Inspiration" for a 97 day, 30,000 mile transnational journey. With a mere \$30 in his pocket, and no weather radar or deicing systems on board, the

twenty-three-year-old endured thunderstorms, snowstorms, sandstorms and monsoons to successfully circumvent the entire globe. In completing his historic mission, Irving professed all hope that the epic flight would somehow inspire young people to fearlessly pursue their aspirations. Even when facing a shortage of finances to fund his voyage, and in the mist of cynics who told him that it could never be done, he became living proof that through hard work and dedication, anything is possible.

Now the founder of a non-profit organization called "Experience Aviation", Irving "aims to boost the numbers of youth in aviation and other science and math related careers." In September, the groundbreaking pilot took to the air in the world's first "Flying Classroom"-a jet plane aptly named "Inspiration III". Through videos and real-time blogs, the program allows for students from across the globe to accompany

Captain Irving as he embarks on 75 different STEM+ land, sea and air expeditions. From this exciting, intercontinental trek through destinations like Machu Picchu, the Galapagos Islands, the pyramids, the Serengeti Plains, the Roman Coliseum, the Taj Mahal and the Great Wall of China, students are able to complete virtual challenges and competitions, and are provided with assorted lessons in science, technology, engineering, math, geography, culture and history. Following this experience, children will undoubtedly walk away with a newfound love and respect for the art of flying.

Ultimately, through his extraordinary accomplishments as a pilot, and with the creation of innovative programs like the "Flying Classroom", Barrington Irving has come to serve as a prime example of what it means to dream the impossible dream.

Luke is an alumnus of both River Rouge High School and Wayne State University, and has served as City or Assistant City/Housing Commissions Attorney in River Rouge throughout a lucrative career that has lasted over three decades. In addition, the "F Dennis Luke Law Office" was established in Allen Park over thirty years ago.

As City Attorney, Luke has had the honor of working under a total of six different mayors and a variety of city commissioners, along with several former classmates from his high school years. This provided an enjoyable, familial style atmosphere amongst colleagues that will always stay with him, even after retirement.

"I've always enjoyed working with the people there, the mayors and the councils," he said. "I've probably worked with upwards of thirty different commissioners over the years. Just like with the elected officials, I went to high school with some of the appointed officials as well. There were so many people that I knew even before I was an attorney, so it's just kind of a family attitude."

In practicing law, Luke has also remained active in community development and downtown authority, additionally functioning as Deputy District Attorney in River Rouge, Allen Park and Melvindale at one time or another. He maintains that these were the some of the most rewarding projects because he was able to contribute to substantial improvements being made around the community. For Luke, a native of the downriver area, these types of neighborhood operations have always brought him the greatest gratification.

Though he leaves his post as City Attorney at the end of the year, Luke hopes to motivate River Rouge residents to stay involved in issues occurring within the area.

"I would like to see more participation and involvement with local government," he said. "When I first got here, there were a lot of people attending council meetings. Now very few people bother to come. I think part of that is because it's kind of changed from a homeowner's community to a renter's community...But both are citizens so everything like public safety, recreation and pollution affects everyone. So whether they're renters or owners, they should participate."

After his retirement is made official, Luke anticipates spending time at his new home in Union Lake. He also plans on expounding upon his growing interest in gardening, and will also enjoy the opportunity to do some fishing around the area. Amongst other things, he also expects to set aside a bit of traveling time to enjoy with his family.

All in all, Luke ends his career with a special connection to the place from which he grew up. "It's been nice to know all of the players here, that's for sure," he said. "I moved into River Rouge in 1955, and the city sure has changed a lot since then. But I think that familiarity with the people and the community was very helpful during my time here."

educators on different styles and strategies to implement in order to effectively prepare scholars for college academia and life after high school.

"When I first got here, I met with a lot of different staff members, administrators, teachers and learning specialists to see where the curriculum was at during that point and time," Smith said. "The data that I looked at was showing that we really weren't in alignment, so now I'm working hard on getting our curriculum vertically and horizontally aligned from top to bottom. We have this K-12 curriculum that everybody can view, and you can see what previous grades have done in math, science, social studies and ELA. We can start looking at those gaps to see where our holes are and fix them to make sure our students are career and college ready."

Other notable adjustments to the district arose at the beginning of the school year with the transfer of over 300 students following the dissolution of Inkster Public Schools. Even with the sudden changes, those newly integrated into the school system seem to be adjusting well to their latest academic environment. Additionally, Romulus Community Schools are in talks with several K-8 charter schools to see if the district can serve as their next step into the high school rank.

"Our taxes are currently split into two bills-part in the summer, part in the winter," McAnally said. "Every year we have to take a loan that will float us from June until those winter taxes come in....So the board decided that if we got one collection in summer, that can carry us through without having to get a loan. Right now that's the big plan."

In the meantime, many Romulus students are keeping busy with charitable endeavors in honor of the holiday season. On Thanksgiving eve, the National Honor Society took time out to serve free turkey dinners to underprivileged families at the Romulus House. At the current time, various students are gathering collections for Goodfellows, while others involved in the culinary arts program are in process of baking pies for Christmas dinners at local senior's centers. All in all, the district strives to instill the value of giving back to those in need during this special time of the year.

Though various staff members have left over the past several months, those who chose to remain with the district are making steady contributions to guarantee that Romulus area schools are able to return to their full potential. Despite being laid off after twelve years as a teacher, learning specialist and principal in Romulus, Smith never questioned returning to the region as the new Curriculum Director.

Commission votes to appoint Marcella Cora as Wayne County legislative auditor general



The Wayne County Commission voted 14-0 Dec. 4 to appoint Marcella Cora as the Wayne County legislative auditor general to replace Willie Mayo, whose term is expiring Jan. 4, 2015.

Cora's initial appointment is for three years; the maximum a legislative auditor general can serve is 10 years, according to the Wayne County Charter.

Cora has served as deputy legislative auditor general since 2011 and has worked in the office since 1999. The office, which is mandated under the charter, provides independent audits, reviews and other work products to assist county

elected officials in their oversight and operational responsibilities.

"I'm excited about being named as legislative auditor general," said Cora, 52, a River Rouge resident. "I'm looking forward to leading the department as it continues to find ways for Wayne County government to strengthen internal controls, increase efficiencies and add value."

Mayo has served as legislative auditor general for 10 years.

"Marcie is an extremely capable individual and will make a fine auditor general," Mayo said. "She possesses outstanding skill sets and institutional knowledge, so this will be a seamless transition."

Four candidates were interviewed Nov. 18 by the Commission's Auditor General Search Task Force, which voted 4-0 that day to recommend Cora for the position. Two days later, the Committee of the Whole voted 11-0 to send the nomination to the full Commission for final approval. The search task force was chaired by Commissioner Raymond Basham (D-Taylor),

chairman of the Commission's Committee on Audit.

"Marcie Cora was easily the top candidate," Basham said. "She was the first interview, and she set the bar very, very high. Her experience and her expertise will serve the department and the county very well. "Willie Mayo has done an excellent job in guiding the office. We wish him the very best in retirement."

Cora is a certified public accountant, certified internal auditor, certified internal control auditor and chartered global management accountant. The 1993 Davenport University graduate was a senior auditor for the U.S. Army Audit Agency from 1994 to 1999, when she joined the Wayne County Legislative Auditor General's Office. She was a principal senior auditor and supervisory auditor from 1999 to 2005 and Audit Division administrative manager from 2005 to 2011, when she was promoted to deputy legislative auditor general. She also served on the River Rouge School District Board of Education from 1998 to 2010.
