Prevention of Future Investments in Romulus Hazardous Waste Facility Passes in the Legislature

LANSING - The Michigan House of Representatives passed Senate Bill 1105 today, legislation to put an end to speculative investments in a controversial hazardous waste injection well facility in Romulus sponsored by Senator Hoon-Yung Hopgood (D-Taylor). The bill was passed out of

the Senate last month and now heads to the Governor to be signed into law.

"Too much damage has already been caused by irresponsible investments in this dangerous facility, but the Legislature's action this morning will finally and permanently protect pensioners from this type of harm," Sen. Hopgood said. "I appreciate my colleagues' support of this important legislation, and I hope that Governor Snyder will act swiftly to sign it into law."

The Romulus facility, previously owned by Environmental Disposal Systems (EDS), began injecting hazardous waste into mile-deep disposal

wells in 2006, but was shut down by the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) within the first year of operation due to above-ground leaks. In addition to the grave environmental and health risks associated with injecting hazardous waste underground. the facility has been at the center of a failed investment scheme involving the Detroit Police and Fire Retirement System. The pension board of the Detroit Police and Fire Retirement System invested in the project by issuing multi-million dollar loans to the operator of the facility, but the loans were eventually defaulted on, resulting in approximately \$40 million in losses. In recent years, Environmental Geo-Technologies, which is owned by Greektown businessman Jim Papas, has received permits to resume operations at the facility.

Senate Bill 1105 would seek to stop future investments in the failed project and protect pensioners from further harm. The bill would provide that an investment fiduciary of a large sponsored system that has invested in a hazardous waste disposal well facility would be prohibited from making additional investments in the facility and would be required to sell redeem, divest or withdraw all investments in the facility if certain conditions occur, including: the operator of the facility files for bankruptcy, a controlling interest in the operator of the facility is sold or transferred, or if an environmental protection violation occurs at the facility.

A Wealth of Unfair Criticism for Obama

I had an interesting, though brief, discussion with a rich friend about President Obama. He is quite conservative, politically. He made the point that this has been the longest economic recovery since World War II. His point was that this was President Obama's fault.

I have many criticisms of President Obama, as you know. But what unsettles me about conservative criticisms of Obama revolves around issues of context and facts. Anyone who has been watching the price of oil drop over the last weeks may have guessed that the global economy is having a great deal of difficulty recovering from the Great Recession. In fact, some parts of the world remain in recession or have returned to recession. Japan, for instance, has been economically stagnant. The U.S. has edged out of the recession.

The problem in the U.S. goes beyond any one presidential administration. Since 1975, the living standard for the average working person has been stagnant or dropping. This is a documented fact. It relates to several factors, including the changes in the global capitalist economy (specifically what we refer to as globalization); changes in economic policies, e.g., privatization; and deunionization, i.e., the attacks on workers and their right to organize. The combination of these factors has led to an economic malaise

As you will probably remember, when President Obama came into office in 2009, the economy was in free fall. He, successfully, helped to stop that. But, because of excessive caution on the part of his administration plus his allies on Wall Street, his administration was not prepared to carry out the sorts of profound economic initiatives necessary to lead to a full recovery, e.g., a greater commitment to investment in infrastructure rebuilding. By "full recovery" I mean putting people back to work on the scale that is necessary. Thus, Wall Street recovered: all of the economic figures have been up; but for most working people, there remain on-going challenges due to home foreclosures and the failure of our incomes to rise.

My rich friend does not believe in anything approaching wealth redistribution, but that is precisely what we need. As the Occupy Movement pointed out, the wealthiest 1 percent are seizing a vastly disproportionate share of the wealth of the country. That happens when workers don't have unions. That happens when politicians are elected based on whoever can pay them the most for their campaigns. That happens when people despair and, instead of struggling collectively, struggle against one another, such as falling prey to the race card.

People like my rich friend have done very well under President Obama, which is what makes it ironic that they hate Obama as much as they do. I guess they feel that they are actually not wealthy enough? Go figure.

Holidays Don't Have To Be An Excuse For Overindulging!

It happens to most of us every year at this time-too many cookies, homemade family recipes, drinks and not enough time to exercise. But the holidays don't have to bring extra pounds with all that enjoyment. You can enjoy the treats and still not do damage to your health or to your waistline.

Brooke Bendix,L MSW is a therapist at Western Wayne Family Health Centers in Lincoln Park. "For many of us the holiday season brings along parties and time spent with family and friends: this can also bring along added stress. Too many time commitments, financial stressors, and family time can sometimes lead to stressful eating and over-indulging in high-calorie foods. The holidays need to be a time for us to reflect on the year and set our intentions for the upcoming year, not to over-indulge and gain weight.." possible to make small adaptations that have big results come time for those New Year's resolutions.

Brooke suggests keeping track of what you eat so that you can make better choices. Keep a food diary on paper or use an app on your Smartphone or tablet like MyFitnessPal that tracks both the calories you put in and the calories you burn with exercise. If you know that dinner will be full of yummy high calorie foods, you can plan a healthy, low calorie breakfast and lunch-and get some exercise before the party. Set goals for the day so that you can pay attention to what you eat and drink at parties and family gatherings. "Watch for the calories in beverages too", she says. "One



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glass of a soft drink can be over 100 calories; alcoholic beverages are empty calories You can cut down on calories by using sparkling water with your favorite wine or juice as a spritzer, and using sugar free mixers and less alcohol for mixed drinks. Drinking water with meals also helps fill you up.

In addition to keeping track of what you eat during the holiday season, Brooke suggests to keep up with an exercise routine. "Even a short 30 minute walk can help balance out a heavy meal; it can even be a new family tradition to walk together before or after a feast. Put on the tunes and have a family dance party after dinner or attend a yoga class the morning of." Brooke also recommends taking a few minutes away from all the hustle and bustle and take "mini breaks" to allow reflection and relax-

Portion size also makes a difference. Plan to fill at least half of your plate with vegetables (with sauce and salad dressings on the side) like salad, carrots, green beans or broccoli. Another quarter is for starches (carbohydrates) like potatoes, corn, rice, sweet potatoes or pasta. The last quarter of the plate is for protein.

Avoid dark meat and take the skin or extra fat off before you eat it. "It's not that you can't have all the foods you enjoy, just keep in mind: moderation is key.", she advises.

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

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

of programs," Lewis said. "I don't know where the signals got crossed, but somewhere down the line all of the programs went away. So I have been in touch with the community to see what kinds of programs they want here. You must have a variety of things going on so that people can be interested in visiting your location. I think that's where a lot of community centers are successful because they have a lot of different things available for people to do."

And with Lewis's progressive outlook on how to keep members of the community interested in the facility, residents of all ages can certainly pursue different interests, hobbies and various other kinds of activities at the Booker Dozier Complex. Locals can choose from a variety of exciting classes which include boxing and karate, Zumba and dance, ballrooming lessons, crocheting and jewelry, senior exercise sessions, and even a boot camp to keep residents in shape. Other additions to the facility involve the freshly renovated fitness center complete with weights, bicycles, elliptical machines and treadmills, along with an up-todate gym floor equipped with new basketball rims. Furthermore, the building has been internally updated with a recently restored front desk, in addition to modernized banquet rooms (one of which was utilized to host Inkster's 50th Anniversary celebration in November). Even more noteworthy, instead of occupying the sizeable office usually designated for supervisors at the center, Lewis opted to transform the space into a computer lab from which kids can complete homework assignments after school.

While Lewis undoubtedly stands as the mastermind behind the center's current success, he humbly maintains that none of these recent advancements would have been possible without considerable assistance from individuals within the community.

"The volunteer community has been outstanding," he said. "Someone will ask me 'What do vou need?' So I'll sav. 'I need to paint this room'. Now people are volunteering to paint, or even pledging to donate to materials. The UAW donated all of the equipment in the weight room, which was like \$40,000 worth of stuff. Also, a construction company gave us all of the material to renovate the front counter. Stuff like that has been tremendous because people see when you really want to make a difference. A lot of them have said that this is what the center has needed for twenty years.

They've been very supportive because they've been able to see someone get out there and actually do something to make some changes at the complex

With the productive strides made throughout the center this year, Lewis hopes to continuously build upon these accomplishments to keep the facility evolving into 2015. Over the next several months, the administration hopes to launch a latchkey program for kids, in addition to starting a membership drive where residents can purchase one month of service, and receive an additional 30 days of benefits free. The center will also host a local health expo on January 17th, offering a variety of health and wellness services including dental screenings, physicals, eve and ear examinations. massage therapy and chiropractic assessments. And to

top it all off, the complex is in the process of obtaining grants to make appropriate updates to the building's exterior, while also working to improve playground infrastructure for youth programs in the summer.

In addition, the number of citizens opting to utilize services at the Booker Dozier Complex is constantly on the rise-particularly amongst seniors and local youth. And while the City of Inkster currently grapples with the pressures of ongoing financial strain (leaving limited funding for the parks and recreation department), locals continue to see the center as a central force of influence within the community-perhaps now more than ever before.

As a key entity within the complex, Lewis contends that putting forth an effort to sustain the recreational facility is crucial-not only because the building serves as a staple within the city, but also due to the fact that it represents a safe haven for kids from area neighborhoods. All in all, experiences obtained at the Booker Dozier Complex may very likely influence youngsters and the critical decisions they make as they transition through their juvenile years, and eventually into adulthood.

"I'm really passionate about this job because if you give kids something to do, they'll stay out of trouble," Lewis said. "I truly believe that because I was one of those kids. I grew up in Lemoyne Gardens, and I always had the rec center to go to and stay out of trouble. I feel like with the center closing down, kids are now getting into trouble that normally would not be going down that road because they have nothing else

...That's really why I'm trying to have a diverse center. Everybody's not going to play basketball...You might have a twelve year old who loves clothes, but if you don't have a space where he can hone into his craft, you will never know. You have to offer a variety of programs so that kids can tap into what they're really good at. This is exactly why we have to keep this facility up and going, that's just how I look at it."

A late touchdown run by Joique Bell, the Lions managed to get past Jimmy Clausen and the chaotic Chicago Bears 20-14, this past Sunday. The win keeps the Lions in the race for the top spot in the North Division of the NFC conference as the show down will be this Sunday against the Green Bay. The winner will not only win the division, however will receive a week off and a home game against the winners of the "Wild Card Weekend". Now the playoff-bound Lions (11-4) can wrap up the NFC North title with a win or a tie next week against Green Bay. Regardless, the Lions will make their second trip to the postseason in four years and third in 16 years after Philadelphia's loss to Washington on Satur-

Matthew Stafford outplayed Jimmy Clausen, but just barely. He completed 22 of 39 passes for 243 vards and hit the 4.000vard mark for the fourth straight year. Ndamukong Suh had two sacks, Calvin Johnson added six catches for 103 yards, Reggie Bush ran for a touchdown and finished with 54 yards rushing and 44 receiving for Detroit and running back Joique Bell 13 carries for 74.yard including a touchdown for the home team Lions on offense. The Lions came away with their highest win total since they went 12-4 in 1991. The Lions might have run away with this one if not for Stafford's interceptions in the second quarter and a muffed punt by Jeremy Ross that led to a touchdown for Chicago near the end of the first half. The Bears' Jeremiah Ratliff blocked a 37-yard field goal by Prater early in the fourth, keeping it a four-point game.

The defense for the Lions was outstanding went needed as an interceptions, by Safety Glover Quin late in the fourth quarter help savage a win in Chicago to go along with Suh two sacks.



Bet Your Bottom Dollar. 'Annie' Will Leave You Entertained

Last weekend director Will Gluck's modern take on the Broadway inspired, motion picture classic, 'Annie,' made its theatrical debut-delivering a hip, fun filled experience for audiences of all ages. The much anticipated film managed to exceed box office expectations with a solid \$16.2 million in opening weekend sales-even in the midst of the highly publicized Sony Pictures hacking scandal that led to widespread online leaks of the production weeks before its scheduled release date.

While the announcement of a new millennial 'Annie' delighted many prospective moviegoers, the flick wouldn't kick off without some sort of backlash. After word surfaced that the lead role would be played by up and coming star Quvenzhané Wallis, previously known for her breakout, Oscar nominated performance in "Beasts of the Southern Wild", disgruntled spectators around the world of social media demanded to know: Is Annie really going to be black? The answer in short: Yes-with deep brown skin and a lovely natural afro-a radical departure from the signature red hair and fair skin traditionally associated with the characters image. Still, in spite of the criticism and negativity, Wallis predictably rose to the occasion. brilliantly shining as Annie and further demonstrating why she has long been considered a multifaceted force to be reckoned with.

Though the movie features other

prominent Hollywood stars, Wallis naturally steals the show as the adorably witty, impeccably resilient 10-year-old orphan caught up in the hard knocks of life as she braves the madness imposed by her raging, alcoholic foster mother, Miss Hannigan (Cameron Diaz). As fate would have it, Annie stumbles upon Will Stacks (Jamie Foxx)-a wealthy cell phone tycoon running for mayor, who eventually welcomes her into his million dollar penthouse (initially as a publicity ploy by his campaign manager to boost the odds of winning the election). In the end, Stacks grows to love the youngster as she comes to teach him valuable lessons in hope, family, love and the true meaning of friendship.

Yes, this version of 'Annie" contains some noticeable glitches, particularly when it comes to the realism of the plotline. But what remains unmistakable is the fact that the film is adorable and superbly entertaining. For that, kids are guaranteed to love it.

Most notably, the film will undeniably pull at anyone's heart strings. The loveable bond that eventually forms between an emotionally detached Stacks and an optimistic Annie remains particularly touching throughout the production. while scenes where the hopeful orphan patiently sits outside of a local restaurant in hopes that her real mother and father will arrive is especially memorable as well. And while the movie indeed falls short at times during its failed attempt to deliver comical dialogue (most noticeably with Diaz's character, who was indeed a bit sensational and over-the-top), no one can deny that certain elements of Miss Hannigan's misguided existence serve as rather hilarious additions to the production's storyline. I mean, she was a wannabe pop star who got kicked out of C+C Music Factory during the 1990's. Come on now, really?

When it comes to the remixed interpretation of the film's music, classic songs, such as the ever emotive "Tomorrow", do seem to miss the mark when contrasted with the alluring sound of the original recordings. One tune of note however, is the finger snapping, stomp and clap rendition of "It's the Hard Knock Life" that makes you want to bob your head and sing along as the foster children express their collective discontent while cleaning their Harlem apartment amidst the draining demands of Miss Hannigan, In addition, new numbers are introduced through out the movie, as is demonstrated through Annie's performance of the now Golden Globe nominated ditty, "Opportunity". While this moment could possibly represent an attempt to add a contemporary flare to the picture, the lengthened out scene, accompanied by the dreary, prolonged string arrangements seem to fall flat rather quickly. (Still, who knew Quvenzhané could sing like that?)

While 'Annie' fails to fare amongst the instant classics, if you're looking for an enjoyable, family friendly film to see over the holidays, this remake is a must see. The atmosphere undoubtedly makes you want to sing and dance in your seat, while also providing inspirational messages for young viewers to internalize in the process. And in an industry as historically one dimensional as Hollywood, what may stand as most notable about this 21st Century reboot is the fact that Wallace's brilliant performance as Annie successfully demonstrates that black actors are capable of portraying classic, on screen heroes as effectively as everyone else.

CITY OF INKSTER TRANSITION TO MONTHLY WATER & SEWER **BILLING**

In response to the request of Inkster customers, the City of Inkster will begin billing monthly for water and sewer usage effective January 1, 2015. Customers will no longer be billed on a quarterly basis. This change will assist customers in managing their water and sewer bills more efficiently and assist our customers in tracking water usage and detecting leaks earlier which could result in saving money.

Why is the City switching to monthly billing?

Monthly billing makes it easier for customers, especially those on a fixed income, to manage their monthly household finances and budget more efficiently. It also provides customers with more frequent and timely information about their water usage. This allows customers to track their usage, reduce consumption and detect leaks in their household plumbing sooner. Detecting leaks and reducing consumption saves water and money.

What are the benefits of monthly billing?

It allows customers to budget more efficiently.
It is easier for customers, especially those on a fixed income, to manage their monthly

It provides customers with more frequent and timely information about their water usage. It allows customers to adjust month-to-month consumption, especially during summer months, which can save money.

It allows customers to detect leaks more timely, thus allowing for prompt repairs and re-

ducing the potential of a high water bill as a result of the leak. (Customers are responsible for repairing household leaks).

How often will my meter be read?

Meters will be read on a monthly basis and will be billed monthly based on consumption

Will my water bill look different?

No changes will be made to the water bill. The bills will contain water and sewer charges for one month of usage verses quarterly usage

During the transition, will I be billed more than once for the same water and/or sewage consumption?
Customers will not be billed more than once for water or sewer services. Each bill will

cover a different usage period.

Where or how can I pay my monthly bill? Payments may be made as follows:


