


an impact in your community. There are young people that do not know the names of other Black Americans than the three I named. When the rubber meets the road, youth need to know that their lives matter.

to anyone in the area who wants high quality, comprehensive primary health and dental care", says Linda Atkins, Chief Executive Officer.

The architectural plans were designed by Hooker DeJong of Muskegon using an integrated behavioral health model which embeds offices for behavioral health consultants and therapists into the patient care areas which allows improved communication and team based coordinated care. Atkins explains "there are distinct areas of care offered such as women's health, adult medicine, pediatrics, lab, dental, storage space, offices and meeting rooms. Everything is laid out to give excellent care and to operate more efficiently."

The renovation is financed by Level One Bank and supported by lead grants from Metro Health Foundation, Carls Foundation and the Ethel and James Flinn Foundation.

The new facility will allow WWFHC to serve more people, improve patient care, and provide timely access to care and expanded services to better meet the needs of the community.

WWFHC has centers in Inkster, Taylor and Lincoln Park and provided care to 9,429 patients in 2014 with 31,820 encounters. Primary medical, general dentistry and behavioral health services are open to all, regardless of health insurance status. Most insurance are accepted, including all Wayne County Medicaid and Healthy Michigan Plan coverage, and a sliding fee scale is available for those without health insurance. Insurance application assistance is also offered.

Cherishing History that's in your Attic

We gather together this month to lift up the names that have been frequently lifted, to call the roll of those African Americans who have made a difference. While some names are the tried and true names of important leaders, we need to pay as much attention to the legacies of those whose lives and contributions have been swallowed.

Madame CJ Walker's life and legacy is no secret. There is a woman who shares her name though, and she is rarely lifted up when the roles of Black women in our nation's history are mentioned. Maggie Lena Walker, with a second grade education, established Penny Savings Bank in Richmond, Va. She was the first African American woman to establish such a bank. Through the Great Depression, and through bank regulation shifts, some version of Penny Savings Bank existed until the early 21st Century. This woman's contribution has been overshadowed because it is easy to ignore her contribution to history.

Madame CJ Walker garnered public attention, and few realize that she was not the first to do "black hair." Annie Malone developed a thriving hair care business in St. Louis and surrounding areas. According to some sources, she had at least two dozen training schools in the early 20th Century. Some say she mentored Madame CJ Walker. Many acknowledge that her hair care educational foci were a model for Madame Walker. Did Walker, more flamboyant and better connected, establish a place in history while Annie Malone and Maggie Lena Walker could not? What does it say about Black history when the glitz and glitter are substitutes for sacrifice and substance?

Far too often, we expect leaders to embrace and lift up our Black history. And far too often, we ignore the history in our attics. We forget the uncle who was a member of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, independent union of sleeping car porters and maids established in the 1920s to advocate for their rights. We forget the aunt who was a domestic worker in New York City. We remember the cousin who was a teacher in Mississippi, Alabama, or Louisiana (the last states to desegregate schools), but we have never explored the sacrifices she made to manage such a segregated environment.

We glorify those whose names are represented in the headlines. We ignore those whose contributions, albeit important, hover on the sidelines. We know that we stand on mighty shoulders, but we are unwilling and sadly sometimes unable to call their names.

These are the names we must call. We call them when we pour libation. We call their names and say "ache." Our next responsibility is to lift their names up, to claim them as the postal workers, the civil rights workers, and the activists. Our next responsibility is to remind ourselves and those around us that we don't have to have a name to have "cred."

We call their names when we read Howard Zinn's A Peoples History of the United States that exemplifies "the people's history," not the celebrity history. We own our history and affirm our connection to it, when we own the papers in the attic

As I move around during this Black History Month, people tell me stories that they need to tell others. There was the uncle who took his horn through the "chitlin circuit" backing up major artists, and leaving the circuit when the pull of family took him home. These are the revolutions that will not be televised, the stories that will only be told when we tell them.

We need to tell them year round. It is a travesty of history to reduce an accounting of our heritage to a one-month commemoration of the history that defines our nation. When we are unable to recount the occurrences of Tulsa and Rosewood, of the Red Summer of 1919 and the Poor People's Campaign, we allow our history to be swallowed and appropriated.

Commemorate Black History Month, if you will. Attend the gatherings at your churches and colleges. And then go home and pull the history out of the attic. If you are a citizen of the world, race notwithstanding, you have some hidden history in your attic. When you share your family stories, you take ownership in a Black History Month that is not about those named, but those unnamed who have made a critical difference in our lives.

My past is the past; Starting over is a blessing



My circumstance is not my character. My circumstance should not be the defining point of my future. But time and time again my circumstance has robbed me of progress, of opportunity and of forward motion. Like many who faced similar circumstances... 'When will our past be what it is "The Past"? 'Everybody has one!! A computer showing some of the adolescent decisions that I made, isn't who I am. I started well in life having not come from the stereotypical upbringing associated with many young men who fall prey to the lure of the streets; namely a broken home and a love struggling parent. I'm grateful to be raised by loving parents whose attempt to guide me on the right path in life was not defeated, but only delayed.

The middle child of my parents I found myself always feeling I had to stand out. Sure, I found sports early as a way to stand out positively. But, by middle school, the negative influences of the street life and that culture pulled me in and I began to express myself in ways that would lead to my incarceration. By the age of 25 after many encounters with the criminal justice system I found myself in the dubious position of standing out in a way that I never intended; namely facing a life sentence in prison. However God had other plans for me. With God's Sovereign grace and wisdom what was intended as a path of destruction became my right of passage. I only served eight years in prison.

While I paid my debt to society on an Involuntary Manslaughter conviction, I invested my energy in building a future outside of prison walls. I always say "Jail ain't a place you want to be, but it may be a place you need to go." During my incarceration I attained my GED and spearheaded many events for the prisoners and recently released prisoners to participate in. Some of the programs included; prisoners giving back to the community by walking

for breast cancer awareness, cleaning up eye-sores in our neighborhoods by donating funds to aid board up homes and cutting fields of grass. I excelled in every job I was assigned to and built a firm spiritual foundation under the tutelage of the Nation of Islam and debating peacefully with my father and brother.

In 2009 I made my transition from prison to regain the life I almost lost. In having this second chance in living, I'm blessed to share a life now with the best thing to happen to me, my wife Kennie. Kennie and I have three boys and one

daughter. Yes, its beautiful being home, but the struggle remains of the stigma associated with prison. It's where I have been; not who I am.

I'm a business owner, a husband, a father, a son, a brother, not a thug, not a felon, not a bad seed. So please don't write me off as a criminal in the history books. I served my debt to society and that part of Artie is over

I introduce you to me, Arthur Willis Jr.; a proud young black man.

Don't underestimate what God can do with a small seed. Don't be discouraged because of your little bit of whatever. A mustard seed is the smallest seed, yet it yields the larges tree that shelters many birds (Mark 4:30-32).

I think we do the same thing when we have a small seed or just a little bit. We see it as not enough and we get discouraged. God has shown us how He can take a little and multiply it into more than enough. He did it with bread and fish from a boy's lunch and fed thousands. He took a widow's vile of oil and oil continued to run from it and she filled multiple containers. He took a widow's last little be of meal, just enough for one cake and she was prepared for that to be her final meal with her son, but God multiplied the supply.

Faith and obedience caused something supernatural to occur. With our little bit of equipment, little bit of money, little bit of supplies, little bit of food and even our little bit of faith, we can do something huge! When we are faithful and obedient, we cannot underestimate the power of our small seed. Let's sow!!!


istration.

Jail Population Overlooked in Reform Efforts

African Americans account for 25 percent of the 12 million jail admissions every year.

WASHINGTON (NNPA) – In a system that is often overlooked by the public and misused by law enforcement, Blacks account for more than one-third (36 percent) of the jail population, according to a new report from the Vera Institute of Justice, a nonpartisan research and policy group.

The report titled, "Incarceration's Front Door: The Misuse of Jails in America," details the practices and policies that funnel a disproportionate number of Black men and women in and out and back into jails.

In the introduction to the report, Nicholas Turner, the president and director of the Vera Institute wrote that jails are necessary for some people, but too often ordinary people are "held for minor violations minor violations such as driving with a suspended license, public intoxication, or shoplifting because they cannot afford bail as low as \$500."

The report said that roughly 75 percent of sentenced offenders and those awaiting trial in jail were there on nonviolent traffic, property, drug, or public order offenses. And while they sit, life goes on without them. Bills pile up, rent goes unpaid and hourly wage workers watch paychecks shrink or they just get fired.

Turner added: "Single parents may lose custody of their children, sole wage-earners in families, their jobs – while all of us, the taxpayers, pay for them to stay in jail."

In everyday dialogue, people often use "jails" and "prisons" interchangeably, but these tools of the criminal justice system serve distinct purposes.

"Unlike state prisons, which almost exclusively hold people serving state sentences, jail populations are heterogeneous, making them particularly challenging to manage," the report said.

Pretrial detainees, locally and state sentenced inmates, apprehended pretrial or sentenced inmates from other jurisdictions and Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) detainees all bunk in local jails, while local jurisdictions collect fees. Sentences can range from a few hours to months for more serious offenses or overcrowding at other facilities.

But just like mass incarceration in prisons was sparked by the War on Drugs, the growth in the jail population also soared because of drug arrests.

"From 1981 until 2006, when they peaked, total drug arrests more than tripled, from 560,000 to 1.9 million, and the drug arrest rate (per 100,000) grew 160 percent," according to the Vera report. "The share of people in jail accused or convicted of a drug crime increased sharply in the 1980s."

Even though, state and federal prisons house more inmates, jails record about 19 times more admissions. African Americans account for 25 percent of the 12 million jail admissions every year.

"Black males, in particular, are arrested at a younger age and at higher rates than their white counterparts, often giving them a longer 'rap' sheet regardless of the charges or the eventual dispositions of the cases," the report explained. "Schools in minority neighborhoods are more likely to have law enforcement officers on site and to embrace 'zero tolerance' policies."

The report continued: "With arrest records on file at earlier ages, subsequent contacts with police result in more severe case outcomes as these young men come of age."

When people suffering from mental health disorders find themselves homeless, unemployed, or on drugs they are arrested for minor crimes at higher rates than other offenders and spend time in jail where their conditions deteriorate.

"Serious mental illness, which includes bipolar disorder, schizophre¬nia, and major depression, affects an estimated 14.5 percent of men and 31 percent of women in jails – rates that are four to six times high¬er than in the general population," the report said. "According to the [Bureau of Justice Statistics], 60 percent of jail inmates reported having had symptoms of a mental health disorader in the prior twelve months."

On the inside, jailed inmates with few options pay private phone companies exorbitant fees to stay in touch with loved ones on the outside. Some jails also charge for laundry services, room and board, and medical care.

"Add to this child support payments, credit card debt, rent, and other living expenses that can accumulate during incarceration - often with late charges or compounded interested tacked on - the financial picture for many leaving jail is very bleak," said the report. High bail amounts often contribute to that bleak financial picture and "combined with overloaded courts, a situation arises in which defendants can spend more time in jail pretrial than the longest sentence they could receive if convicted."

The report recommended introducing debt payment plans, making basic re-entry tools available for everyone leaving jail, and problem-solving courts that address socioeconomic issues surrounding incarceration including substance abuse, mental illness and homelessness.

While some jurisdictions have made modest gains in steering individuals away from jails and curbing the length of sentences, the report said that systemic reform would take significant cooperation among all local law enforcement officials.

"The misuse of jails is neither inevitable nor irreversible," the report said. "To both scale back and improve how jails are used in a sustainable way, localities must engage all justice system actors in collaborative study and action. Only in this way can jurisdictions hope to make the systemic changes needed to stem the tide of people entering jails and to shorten the stay for those admitted."

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Tax Season is Here, and So are Scams



LANSING - Tax season is under way, with Forms 1099 and W-2 already in mailboxes and the Internal Revenue Service has also issued its annual list of the most common tax-related scams, called the dirty dozen.

At the top of the list is identity theft, followed by potential tax swindles pitched by phone and email.

Mike Dobzinski, media relations with the IRS, says to beware of IRS imposters telling you something like this ...

"You owe X amount of dollars.

If you don't pay up, we're going to arrest you, take you to jail. We'll deport you, revoke your license,' and a whole bunch of threatening tactics," says Dobzinski. "The IRS just doesn't make these kinds of calls."

Other tax deceptions on the dirty dozen list include schemes to hide money offshore, and false promises of free money for inflated refunds. Of the identity theft cases it tracks, the Federal Trade Com-

mission's Consumer Sentinel Network says in 2013, 30 percent were related to tax or wage fraud.

Dobzinski says with personal information on W-2 forms and others in mailboxes this time of year, it isn't hard for scammers to steal it and even attempt to file taxes in your name to claim your refund before you can get to it.

"I recommend contacting Internal Revenue Service, if you get a letter that's addressed incorrectly to you, to contact us," says Dobzinski. "It's possible that a return has been filed in your name. You may not know that, but that may be the first tip-off."

Dobzinski says the IRS also has made a special effort to alert businesses with large databases to take extra steps to protect client data.



Black History Month "It's Just a Thought" Commercialism with Black History Month and Sports

National African American History Month found its origins in 1915 with the founding of the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History by historian and author Dr. Carter G. Woodson. Eleven years later the organization initiated the first Negro History Week choosing February because it included the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass, according to the Library Of Congress. Years later Congress passed the public law 99-244 in 1986 that designated February as the "National Black History Month". The purpose of the month-long celebration was to "provide opportunities for the Nation's public schools, institutions of higher learning and the public to gain deeper understanding and knowledge of the many contributions of Black Americans to our country and the world," according to the resolu-

However, Commercialism with Black History Month and in sports is an important issue today. Huge sums of money are being spent on sports every year. Before reaching a conclusion on whether this is justified, one needs to realize where this money is spent, and its effects. Money is invested in sports at a national and international level. However are the same amounts of investments in the Black community being made by the companies that so claim they are in support of Black History Month and the education it is meant to be celebrated or are they just taken part to make the al mighty dollar bill.

AT&T and many more companies use BHM as a means to connect their brand to an idea of tolerance and progress in order to reach 13.1 percent of the American population. Unfortunately, this approach takes away from the original celebratory purpose of the month and leads to the full-blown co alteration of black history. Nike for example has a line of clothing and shoes all to celebrate BHM. The limited edition 2015 BHM Collection includes 28 items, all featuring a black and white palette and mix of three different prints. The collection ranges from performance to lifestyle with 12 shoes and 16 apparel and accessory items for men and women. The 2015 BHM Collection includes: NIKE, Inc. celebrates Black History Month with a collection of products across basketball, football, running, soccer and skateboarding that honors six athletes and coaches who have positively impacted sport with their courage and determination: Theotis Beasley, Kevin-Prince Boateng, Jerry Rice, Brianna Rollins, C. Vivian Stringer and John Thompson. A portion of proceeds from the sale of the 2015 BHM Collection go to the Ever Higher Fund, which supports organizations that leverage the power of sport to maximize the potential of underserved youth. The fund's mission is to assist communities with knowledge, resources and tools for the next generation of leaders. I call Nike Inc. to ask about the beneficiaries in Michigan of the organization the Ever Higher Fund and have not received a call back. Nicki Minaj recently used a picture of Malcolm X for the cover of her single "Looking Ass N*gga" again where is the educational value. On the other hand, MacDonald's runs picture of famous Black Historians and verbally supports in it BHM 30 and 60 seconds commercials spots participating in saying "Black history should be everyday learning instrument". All in all, it can be seen that commercialism in sports and BHM has its advantages and disadvantages.

Direct advertising can appear on school walls, school materials (such as posters or book covers), buses, or athletic scoreboards. Such ads can be small or large, appearing on a school lunch menu, or on a huge billboard in a hallway or on a sports field. Channel One, the TV news and advertising program broadcast into middle schools and high schools, forces students to watch two minutes of TV commercials every school day. Reaching 8 million middle school and high school students each day, Channel One is the single largest form of commercialism in schools. Indeed also Black history events can provide an informative and interesting experience, for all and is an opportunity to engage with black members and others in publicizing and challenging the inequalities they face in the workplace and society.

Now actor Morgan Freeman expresses, in his famous 60 Minute interview with Mike Wallace, that BHM should be treated as American history and not separate by reducing it to only one month. He also said that the annual BHM should be eliminated. So indeed let's celebrate Black History Month (BHM), which means it is time to commemorate the legends of the civil rights movement, talk about Black invertors, poets, contributors in fine arts and music, have a discussion on slavery and the fight for freedom sequence of events, and yes, watch giant corporations take advantage of the time to associate their name with the black subject in 28 days because, efforts to associate with the black community are dropped as soon as the first day of March arrives and the next moneymaking opportunity arises: National Women's History Month. " It's Just a Thought"

African American poets have long used the beauty of written prose to shine a light on important themes throughout history. As Black History Month comes to an end, we want to celebrate writers whose profound impact has continued to inspire us through the ages. In commemoration of these momentous contributions, here are five African American poems you absolutely must read during your lifetime.

1. "If We Must Die" by Claude McKay

...O kinsmen! we must meet the common foe! Though far outnumbered let us show us brave, And for their thousand blows deal one death-blow What though before us lies the open grave? Like men we'll face the murderous, cowardly pack Pressed to the wall, dying, but fighting back!

POETRY BREAKDOWN

The emerging militant consciousness of the early 20th Century "New Negro", paired with the budding appeal of Marcus Garvey's ideologies of Black Nationalism, are manifested in Claude McKay's "If We Must Die". Penned as a defiant response to an upsurge in race riots and mob lynchings during the Red Summer of 1919, this poem stands as a valiant declaration of the inherent right to human dignity and armed self-defense—principles that would later be reflected in the ideologies of transformative figures like Robert F. Williams, Malcom X and Huey P. Newton.

2. "I, Too, Sing America" by Langston Hughes

...Tomorrow, I'll be at the table When company comes. Nobody'll dare Say to me, "Eat in the kitchen," Then. **Besides** They'll see how beautiful I am And be ashamed—

I, too, am America.

POETRY BREAKDOWN

Also written during the Harlem Renaissance era, "I, Too, Sing America" explores intersectional themes of race and identity as Langston Hughes unearths the dual reality of the "darker brother"—one whose pained experiences are wrought by the humiliating stipulations of racial segregation, yet stirred by optimism and a patriotic allegiance towards America and her potential for a brighter future in regards to race relations and social equality.

3. "Ego Tripping (there must be a reason why)" by Nikki Giovanni

...I am so hip even my errors are correct I sailed west to reach east and had to round off the earth as I went The hair from my head thinned and gold was laid across three continents I am so perfect so divine so ethereal so surreal I cannot be comprehended except by my permission I mean...I...can

flylike a bird in the sky...

With abstract imagery and a whimsical celebration of ancient African civilization, Nikki Giovanni's "Ego Tripping (there must be a reason why)" brings readers on an ethereal journey that gloriously hails all things black and woman. Through a radical encapsulation of cultural pride and black power, this abiding masterpiece remains one of the most potent poems written in contemporary times with its consciously vain emphasis on the superior contributions made by women of African descent to the modern world, and their capacity to bring about endless possibilities for the future.

Perhaps one of the most widely misunderstood figures in history, the great Tupac Shakur transcended the mere limitations of his label as a rapper. As the son of a former Black Panther, Tupac was a brilliant, radical intellectual who adeptly offered a glimpse into the bleak realities of a young black male struggling to survive in the concrete jungles of America—as personified through the poem "Liberty Needs Glasses". Politically charged and forthrightly cynical, the piece presents a critical conversation on systematic racism and the hypocrisies of a criminal justice system designed to remain blind, deaf and dumb when it boils down to black life in this country-issues that still plague our nation as we continue the fight towards social equality in 2015.


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And Still We Rise:
