Inkster's new Interim Chief of Police looks to build a new culture within the department

Last month, Dr. Joseph Thomas was appointed as new Interim Chief of Police for the City of Inkster.

Also a former chief for the Southfield Police Department, Thomas brings more than thirty years of law enforcement experience to the position. He's also the President and founder of JET Consulting, Incorporated (JCI), a company that provides Police, Fire, Organizational Management & Leadership Development Training.

Having completed two tours of duty in Iraq as a Senior Police Advisor (SPA), Thomas was additionally appointed as Michigan's first Ambassador to the United States Army Reserve, and graduated from the Michigan State Police School of Management, the National Fire Academy and the F.B.I. National Academy. He currently serves as an adjunct professor at Eastern Michigan University and Oakland University, as well as Oakland, Schoolcraft and Muskegon Community Colleges.

So what made Thomas choose Inkster as his latest stop?

"I noticed a phenomenon throughout this country dealing with police departments, the behavior of officers, and society as a whole," he said. "I sent proposals to the New York Police Department and the cities of Cleveland, Ferguson, Baltimore and Inkster because I Chief - Page 18A

NEWS FROM LANSING Legislators Listen to Detroit, Highland Park, Flint Residents on Water Issues

Residents explain hardship caused by bad water, high water bills

LANSING - State Representative Stephanie Chang (D-Detroit) and colleagues today hosted 75 attendees at a water affordability and safety hearing at the state Capitol to hear from residents and community organizations about the water issues affecting their communities. Chang hosted the hearing along with Reps. Sheldon Neeley (D-Flint) and LaTanya Garrett (D-Detroit). Other legislators attending were Reps. Christine Greig (D-Farmington Hills), Julie Plawecki (D-Dearborn Heights), Henry Yanez (D-Sterling Heights), Senator Jim Ananich (D-Flint) and Reps. Edward Canfield (R-Sebewaing) and Martin Howrylak (R-Troy).

"Today my colleagues and I heard testimony from res-

idents of Detroit, Flint and Highland Park about the Michigan water crisis," said Chang. "Thousands of shut-offs in Detroit and the water quality issues in Flint have led to serious public health concerns for our most vulnerable residents. This hearing was not only an important step to raise awareness about water affordability and quality issues, but also an opportunity to move toward legislative action regarding the human right to safe, clean and affordable water, shut-off protections, and transparency."

Since January 2013, more than 53,000 Detroit residents have had their water and sewerage service terminated. Around 15.000 homes have had this service restored. There is financial assistance available, but many on this assistance are still behind on their payments. In April 2014, Flint switched from the Detroit water system to its own system that draws water from the Flint River. Since then, residents have put up with water that tastes and smells strange, high E-coli levels that forced boil water advisories, skin rashes and hair loss. Flint residents have also faced issues relating to Total Trihalomethane monitoring and acceptable levels for

safe consumption.

"What we know from the groundwork of community organizing performed by nonprofit organizations is that human pain and suffering has occurred and continues to occur in Detroit," said Alice Jennings Esq., of Edwards & Jennings PC of Detroit. "Detroit Water and Sewerage Department service increases and 'payment plans,' which are not based on affordability, are not sustainable and the track record in 2014 and 2015 is failure. Not having water service immediately makes a home uninhabitable under Detroit ordinances. Sanitation risks are magnified where no water sanitation is available in the home."

"We need to ensure that our communities have safe, drinkable and affordable water," said Chang. "People going without water or not being able to drink what comes out of the tap is unthinkable. My colleagues and I are committed to sharing the stories we heard today with other legislators and working on ways to ensure that what's happened to these communities never happens again anywhere in Michigan."

All across the country, people are gathering to observe an annual academic rite of passage: graduation. In a scene that will be played out countless times during this season of celebration, family and friends will dutifully take their seats in auditoriums and open fields around the nation and proudly look on as their loved ones walk across stages to receive their diplomas or degrees and, finally, turn the tassel on their graduation caps.

This tradition holds much more significance than its primary function as the formal recognition of a student's academic achievement. It is also firmly rooted in our American belief that education, particularly higher education, is the key to greater opportunity and the chance to live the American dream.

The era when a high school diploma was enough to climb the ladder into America's middle class is long gone. In today's increasingly high-tech society, it is a college education, or degree, that has become the minimum requirement for that climb up our nation's social and economic opportunity ladders. Access to college, therefore, cannot remain a privilege afforded to a few when it has become a prerequisite to achieve greater success by the many.

In recognition of this enduring state of academic affairs, the As was often quoted by Presi-National Urban League is

project is currently being run at three National Urban League affiliates: The Urban League of Greater Pittsburgh, The Urban League of Springfield and the Urban League of Lexington-Fayette County. In those communities, communities that mirror so many Black and Brown communities in our country, national and local advocacy and engagement efforts are underway to ensure that more of our young people go to college.

Right now, there is much to celebrate in our country when it comes to academic achievement in African-American and Latino communities. Today, we enjoy the highest high school graduation rates in history. More students of color are in college and dropout rates are at historic lows. But more work lies ahead.

Despite the fact that more Blacks and Hispanics are getting a college education than ever before, there is a gap in postsecondary attainment. In 2013, about 15 percent of Hispanics had a bachelor's degree or higher, degree attainment was at 20 percent for African Americans and 40 percent for Whites, according to recent Pew Research Center analysis.

When a young man or woman is denied access to opportunity through education, we all lose. That potential graduate loses a well-known and well-worn path to individual success. College Board research demonstrated that people with bachelor degrees earned over \$21,000 more than high school graduates. People with some college and no postsecondary degree earned 14 percent more than high school graduates who worked full time. When young people are not obtaining postsecondary degrees, our nation suffers from the loss of their talent, their increased tax revenues, their civic engagement and more.

Within one day a teacher had a Go Fund Me Account set up to help with the finances for my daughter, Sarah, who is a single mother and would need to stop working to care for Landen and get him to Mott Hospital for weekly chemotherapy treatments and several hospital stays. The love did not end there. A dear friend organized a fundraiser and designed tshirts to sell. All the teachers, many preschool students, parents and high school students bought shirts and wore them with pride, some even attended our fundraiser.

Cards and even a superhero outfit were made for Landen. One would think as time went by they would be busy and forget about Landen, but not this group. The entire preschool adopted Landen and my daughter for Christmas. Homework packets were made as well as calls for updates and Landen's progress. As the school year came to an end in May for the preschoolers, unfortunately, Landen was unable to attend the graduation ceremony and to walk over the bridge with his classmates to receive his graduation bear and portfolio. The teachers let us know it was there whenever he was able to pick it up. Much

to our surprise when he came to get it, the teachers pulled out the bridge and got an audience for him to graduate preschool officially.

GETTING TO KNOW OUR ELECTED OFFICIALS

State Representative Stephanie Chang

The "Getting to know our elected officials" feature is designed to provide access into the minds of local public figures. This week we chatted with State Representative Stephanie Chang about her decision to go into public service. her role as a community organizer, the most rewarding aspects of serving as a politician, problems facing the 6th District today, favorite pastimes/hobbies and much more. 1. When you were growing up, did know that you wanted to go into public service?

I actually had no plans to go into politics. I'm a daughter of immigrants who came to the U.S. from Taiwan in the early 1970's. I wanted to do many things going up, but this wasn't on my radar. I really became interested during my time as an organizer working with different social justice issues. At one point, my predecessor Rashida Tlaib asked me to run for her seat. I was pretty hesitant at first, but then I had a lot of different conversations with people and realized that this was a great opportunity to make a difference in a much bigger way.

2. Before venturing into politics, what kind of community organizing were you involved with?

I was attending the University

enjoying this amazing opportunity to make a difference for the residents in my district. There are definitely challenging days because I'm a Democrat serving in a legislature with a Republican majority, but overall everything has been great. We have a great neighborhood service center where we are able to help residents with all sorts of different issues like tax foreclosure, while providing free tax preparation and expungement fairs. I really enjoy working directly with the people, and I'm really glad to be here.

4. You recently introduced a bill surrounding homeschooling reform in the state of Michigan. Can you give us some additional details about the effort?

In April, we introduced a new bill in response to a particular incident on the eastside of my district where two kids were found in a freezer, and their mom had been hiding behind the homeschooling law. The proposal would basically do two things: first, if you decide to homeschool your children, you would need to notify the school district of your decision. Michigan is 1 of only 11 states that doesn't have any notification requirement, so we literally have no idea who's being homeschooled. Second, the bill would make sure that there are eyes on all of our kids, so children will meet twice a year with either a school counselor, teacher, clergy member, doctor, etc. One thing I've been trying to emphasize is that this is not an attack against homeschooling parents. Instead, it's about finding those who are hiding behind the laws. We want to make sure every child is safe and has a responsible homeschooling experience. 5. What else are you legislation to ensure that everyone has access to those benefits. About 46% of the private sector doesn't offer this at all, and a lot of people may be in a situation where they can't afford to take a day off to get better, or care for their sick children. Lastly, we're working on a set of bills relating to the Detroit water shutoffs.

6. What do you see as the biggest problems affecting the 6th District today?

When I was going door to door during my campaign, a couple of things really jumped out at me. First, a lot of residents mentioned vacant homes and area blight as a huge issue, which they also related to local safety and crime. In certain neighborhoods, air quality and pollution was a big topic as well. And of course jobs and the economy, in addition to education. I've really tried to focus on a lot of these topics because I know that they concern a lot of people.

7. What can Wayne County residents do to help initiate improvements throughout their communities?

A lot of the major issues occurring within the 6th District are centered on quality of life concerns. Many of the problems brought to our attention are city and not state concerns, so we try to help residents get connected to the right contact people-whether they're reporting a broken street light or an illegal dumping on their street. I additionally think that it's very important for residents to stay engaged in local government, while also forming neighborhood associations and block clubs to do what they can to address particular issues in their communities. What hobbies/inter-8. ests do you engage in during vour leisure time? I have a wonderful husband named Sean, and we're actually expecting a baby girl in August. We're really excited about everything. We also live pretty close to the Riverwalk, so we love taking walks, and we always enjoy really good food. Right now our big project is getting ready for the baby.

of Michigan when the affirmative action Supreme Court cases emerged, so I got really involved with students supporting those policies, in addition to other efforts geared toward issues affecting students of color on campus. That was sort of my training ground as an organizer. After college, I worked with a campaign to keep affirmative action in Michigan, and an effort to reform the public defense representation system. I was eventually convinced that I could continue that organization by doing something in the legislature. How long have you 3. held your position?

I started in January, so I've been here about five months. It's been a whirlwind. I'm really working on? We have seven bills related to environmental justice and air quality, and another that will compensate those who have been wrongfully convicted in the State of Michigan. The other big issue evolves around paid sick leave, so I introduced

Brooke Waldon has a noticeable "it" factor about her.

She's a top 10 senior slated to attend Syracuse University in the fall. As a student at Romulus High School, Waldon spent four years as a varsity softball and boy's wresting team captain, and additionally volunteers with Family Community Career Leaders of America (FCCLA) to provide care packages for the Army, tutor elementary school children and teach fundamental classes about sports nutrition. Also a Student Government President and member of the National Honor Society, Waldon serves as a Bright Futures associate and Quiz Bowl academic tournament participant, while always making time to deliver the morning and afternoon announcements at school.

Now Waldon joins a pool of 1,000 recipients recently se-

lected for the Class of 2015 Gates Millennium Scholars Program, a grant provided by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation covering all undergraduate and graduate expenses for high achieving, low income minority students throughout their college careers. For Brannon Bass, a Romulus High School college advisor, Waldon was always the perfect fit for such a prestigious scholarship.

"Once I saw the criteria, I had no doubt that if Brooke applied for this scholarship, she would win it; that's how much confidence I have in her," he said. "I can't put my finger on it, but there's just something about her. It's kind of like when you look at some athletes out here, like Lebron James or Kobe Bryant. You don't necessarily know what it is, but there's definitely an "it" that they carry with them. I've always noticed that in Brooke. Likewise, Bill Gates saw it too."

Completing the lengthy application process required the construction of ten different essays on various topics, including Waldon's favorite/least preferred academic subjects. For the high school senior, who juggles a plethora of activities outside the classroom, the time consuming effort to win the GMS scholarship was well worth it in the end.

"After personally going through this process, I would definitely tell future applicants to take this very seriously," Waldon said. "I didn't think I was going to win, but everyone has a chance and this is a fantastic opportunity. So take everything seriously because this can change your life. It has literally changed mine."

Now a GMS recipient and Romulus High School graduate, Waldon seems intent on looking towards what will inevitably become a very bright future.

"I plan to major in biomedical engineering at Syracuse," she said. "If everything plays out, I want to apply to medical school, where I'll ideally develop a career as a trauma surgeon. My backup plan is to become a biomedical engineer."

reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Detroit River Intakes Source Water Assessment

Your source water comes from the Detroit River, situated within the Lake St. Clair, Clinton River, Detroit River, Rouge River, Ecorse River, in the U.S. and parts of the Thames River, Turkey, Creek and Sydenham watersheds in Canada. The Michigan Department of Environmental Quality in partnership with the U.S. Geological Survey, the Detroit Water and Sewerage Department (DWSD), and the Michigan Public Health Institute performed a source water assessment in 2004 to determine the susceptibility of potential contamination. The susceptibility rating is on a seven-tiered scale from "very low" to "very high" based primarily on geologic sensitivity, water chemistry, and contaminant sources. The susceptibility of our Detroit River source water intakes were determined to be highly susceptible to potential contamination. However, all four Detroit Water treatment plants that use source water from Detroit River have historically provided satisfactory treatment of this source water to meet drinking water standards. DWSD has initiated source-water protection activities that include chemical containment, spill response, and a mercury reduction program.

DWSD participates in a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permit discharge program and has an emergency response management plan. - ٠ Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.
- · Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses

Water Treatment In Detroit

Water treatment is considered one of the ten greatest achievements of the 20th century. And the Detroit Water and Sewerage Department has been at the forefront of advances.

1800s - Screening. The water pumped from Detroit's 19th century water works was essentially identical to the water in the Det River minus twigs, fish and various small animals. Simple screening was the only process employed before water was delivere city residents. Even so, tiny, multi-legged creatures found their way into homes through faucets where they were an occasional source of distress for the faint of heart.

1913 - Disinfection. The incidence of disease was greatly reduced in Detroit through the introduction of calcium hypochlorite combat typhoid fever, a water-borne disease.

1916 - Liquid Chlorine. The Department began adding this more effective disinfectant (15 times as strong as calcium hypochle rite), which virtually eliminated illness from typhoid in Detroit after 1916.

1923 - Filtration. The world's largest filtration plant at Water Works Parks delivered transparently crystal clear water into the homes of Detroiters for the first time. This was a change of pace from drinking water that was usually tinted by sediment and substances suspended in the water. The Department proudly trumpeted that its water was so clear that a newspaper could be re through it.

1955 - Flouride. Millions of metro-Detroit children and adults benefited from improved dental health after fluoride was added drinking water.

1996 - Phosphoric Acid. A small amount of phosphoric acid, a common ingredient in soft drinks, was first added to DWSD's tr ed water as a corrosion inhibitor. The compound coats the surface of a home's plumbing, sealing in lead and other harmful sub stances in the metal or solder.

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant won young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with lines and home plumbing. The City of Inkster is responsible for providing high quality drinking w cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sit several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 secon minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. May 26th, 2015

She states when she went to get them the 21 year old male physically assaulted her. He punched, kicked and pushed her multiple times, then grabbed a long black gun,

a possible AK47 from the attic and threatened to shoot her. The mother somehow managed to restrain her son and later took the female home. The couple broke up two months ago and someone is still angry. Which one is it?

May 28th, 2015

At 1514hrs, officers were dispatched tom the 100 block of Batavia Street for a Domestic in progress. Officer spoke to a 46 year old female in night robe yelling that her 22 year old son had just assaulted her. She states incident began when she confronted him about smoking "marijuana" in her home and his friends were there and are not allowed in her home. She states he began pushing her to the point of ripping her clothes off and then proceeded to break out the kitchen window. He pushed her into the refrigerator over and damaged both screen and the main door then he fled. She was offered medical attention but refused. Officers were unable to locate him but he has to come home sooner or later.

May 28nd, 2015

At 1334hrs, an officer met a 35 year old female in the 100 Block of Batavia Street. The female told the officer the concern was about her

could see an immediate solution to their problems. I received one call from Ferguson, and communication from Inkster's mayor and city manager. I then did some consulting work with the city, and they asked me to be their interim police chief. I believe that Inkster chose me; we chose each other."

Thomas has accepted his new position at a critical time. Over the past several months, Inkster has been thrust into the national spotlight following the brutal police beating of local resident Floyd Dent. William Melendez, the officer caught on dashcam video repeatedly punching the unarmed motorist in the face, has since been charged with assault and misconduct. In April, former interim chief Vicki Yost resigned amongst the firestorm. Joseph was appointed as her replacement in May.

Last month, Dent agreed to a \$1.37 million settlement from the City of Inkster.

"I think that the City Treasurer Mark Stuhldreher and City Attorney David Jones should be congratulated in negotiating with Mr. Dent and his attorney to settle this case. They did a wonderful job," Thomas said. "I also want to commend Mr. Dent and his attorney because they're aware that this city doesn't have a lot of money. Based on what I know about these types of lawsuits, that settlement amount is a win-win decision in a losing situation." After stepping in as chief of police, Thomas-who remains intent on creating a new culture within the Inkster Police Department-consulted with a team of reviewers to make a decision on whether to reprimand officers seen on video apparently mocking Dent, who suffered serious injuries during the beating. In early May, Thomas issued suspensions to two additional officers for their roles in the incident. "I won't pass judgement on how things happened," Thomas said. "What happened and who was involved is my focus. My job is to make sure that something like this never happens in this city again. That type of behavior will not be tolerated on my watch." But Thomas maintains that the climate is now changing within

the Inkster Police Department, greatly demonstrated through two letters recently received from local citizens commending noticeable changes in behavior amongst area officers. For Thomas, this is the best way to rebuild trust within the community.

"True community policing is a way of life, and certainly starts in the department," he said. "I'm fair and firm, but I treat our officers like professionals. In return, I expect them to conduct themselves as such. I then request that they take the way they're being treated into the streets. Be fair and firm to the citizens. Work with them to solve crime, but also make sure that you're making an effort to solve problems. Become a resource person for the residents. Get to know them all over again; that's how you build positive trust. It appears to be working."

Inkster Mayor Hilliard Hampton agrees with these sentiments, maintaining that Thomas is effectively transforming the atmosphere within the department to ultimately set the stage for the introduction of a permanent Inkster police chief later this month (Thomas is one of several finalists vying for the position).

"I haven't done any personal assessments to our officers or the staff, but from what I'm gathering, [Thomas] is doing all the right things," Hampton said. "He's certainly bringing some stability and structure in terms of making officers aware of the protocol and procedures relating to how they execute their work. Chief Thomas has also been able to create an environment that provides a better fit for the department as we make our transition to a permanent police chief."

Relating to this, the city is also looking to hire qualified police officers, though they're not just searching for experienced applicants. According to Thomas, only those interested in bringing positive qualities to the table need to apply for the current vacancies.

"I'm not really looking for qualified police officers to work for this city," he said. "I'm looking for good people to work here. It's easy to make a good person a great police officer. But it's difficult to make a good police officer a great person. Their heart has to be in the right place."

Overall, since joining the city last month, Thomas seems to be right at home in the Inkster community. With city officials, residents and officers taking so well to his presence, his mission to create a new climate throughout the area has kicked off to a great start.

"I did not receive the amount of pushback that I anticipated," Thomas said. "As a matter of fact, I've received overwhelming cooperation with the modifications, rules and policies that I'm putting into place. Everything has been well received, and that was somewhat surprising.

"I think we just have to change the image here. We have to do these things as an example to other departments around the country. It can be done and must be done. We must rebuild trust with the people in our community."
