

Action must be taken on the Voting Rights Amendment Act Of 2014



Patrick Leahy (VT) and the U.S. House Representatives, led by Congressman **James** Sensenbrenner (WI) introduced bipartisan legislation, S. 1945 / H.R. 3899, the Voting Rights Amendment Act of 2014. The purpose of these bills is to update and modernize the provisions of the 1965 Voting Rights Act (VRA) which were struck Summer Activities Page 6A down by the U.S. Supreme Court in the Shelby County, Alabama v. Holder case decided on June 25, 2013.

Shelby challenged the constitutionality of the "preclearance" provisions of the VRA, under which certain jurisdictions which have an established history of state- or jurisdiction-administered disenfranchisement based on race need to obtain advance approval or "preclearance" from the US Department of Justice or the US District Court in D.C. before they can make any changes to voting practices and / or procedures. Examples of these changes include "redistricting", or the re-drawing of congressional district boundaries which happens every 10 years as the result of the census; or a change in the date, time,

place, or manner under which an election is held. Federal approval would be given as soon as the state or jurisdiction proved that the proposed change would not abridge the right to vote on account of race or color. The Shelby decision held that Section 4 of the VRA, which sets out the formula that is used to determine which state and local jurisdictions must comply with the preapproval requirement, is unconstitutional and can no longer be used. Thus, although the concept of "preclearance" Constitutional scrutiny, it will have no actual effect unless and until a new statute to determine who should be covered by it.

mula for determining which states must obtain preapproval before making any changes to their election laws, and while the NAACP deeply appreciates all of the work that went into crafting this bipartisan legislation, we will now work to amend it through the legislative process so that more states and jurisdictions with a troubling history of administering voter disenfranchising practices must have proposed changes to election laws and practices prebefore making changes. Sadly, we are alltoo aware that discrimination continues to plague our electoral process throughout the country, and the bar that is set by this legislation is too high, and too few jurisdictions will be covered if it is enacted in its current form. From the exceptions for voter ID laws which are contained in the bill to decreased preclearance coverage to increased reliance on costly litigation, there are essential revisions and amendments to this bill that must take place to ensure ALL voters have fair and equitable access to the ballot box. While we know that compromise will be needed to pass this bill, we cannot sacrifice our core principle: participation in our democracy should be unfettered and all votes should be properly counted.

which is the leading cause of kidney failure.

Approximately 13 million men have diabetes in the United States, which is 11.8 percent of all men ages 20 and older. Men with diabetes and their families can face devastating complications from unmanaged diabetes, especially since people with diabetes are at a high risk for heart attack and stroke. In addition to causing kidney failure, diabetes can also lead to blindness, loss of a toe or foot, and erectile dysfunction. Although diabetes is a serious, life-long condition, there is good news. Taking care of your diabetes and your health can help you avoid long-term health problems and enjoy a long and healthy life.

Men with diabetes can reduce their chances of having lifethreatening complications by managing their A1C, Blood Pressure, and Cholesterol (ABCs of diabetes).

• "A" is for the A1C test. The A1C test shows you what your blood glucose has been over the last three months. The A1C goal for many people is below 7. High blood glucose levels can harm your heart and blood vessels, kidneys, feet, and eyes.


• "B" is for blood pressure. The goal for most people with diabetes is 130/80. High blood pressure makes your heart work too hard. It can cause heart attack, stroke, and kidney disease.

"C" is for Cholesterol.
 Bad cholesterol (LDL) builds
 up and clogs your arteries.
 The LDL goal for most people
 with diabetes is below 100.
 Good cholesterol (HDL) helps

remove cholesterol from your blood vessels. The HDL goal for most people is above 40. For those with diabetes and those at risk for diabetes alike, it's also important to maintain healthy nutrition and to include physical activity in your daily routine. By making these healthy lifestyle choices part of your life, you can help to prevent type 2 diabetes, and also help to manage diabetes if you have already been diagnosed. It's also important for men to quit smoking. Smoking increases your chance of having type 2 diabetes and makes diabetes harder to control, making it even more deadly and disabling for individuals with dia-

It's essential for men with diabetes to take action to reach their ABC targets and for all men—especially those with diabetes and those who are at risk—to follow a healthy lifestyle in order to preserve their health and quality of life. 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

Rising Earnings Disparity Between Young Adults with And Without a College Degree

tion to the share employed full time—young college graduates are outperforming their peers with less education. And when today's young adults are compared with previous generations, the disparity in economic outcomes between college graduates and those with a high school diploma or less formal schooling has never been greater in the modern era.

These assessments are based on findings from a new nationally representative Pew Research Center survey of 2,002 adults supplemented by a Pew Research analysis of economic data from the U.S. Census Bureau.

The economic analysis finds that Millennial college graduates ages 25 to 321 who are working full time earn more annually—about \$17,500 more—than employed young adults holding only a high school diploma. The pay gap was significantly smaller in previous generations.2 College-educated Millennials also are more likely to be

employed full time than their less-educated counterparts (89% vs. 82%) and significantly less likely to be unemployed (3.8% vs. 12.2%).

Education and Views About Work Turning to attitudes toward work, employed Millennial college graduates are more likely than their peers with a high school diploma or less education to say their job is a career or a steppingstone to a career (86% vs. 57%). In contrast, Millennials with a high school diploma or less are about three times as likely as college graduates to say their work is "just a job to get [them] by" (42% vs. 14%).

The survey also finds that among employed Millennials, college graduates are significantly more likely than those without any college experience to say that their education has been "very useful" in preparing them for work and a career (46% vs. 31%). And these better educated young adults are more likely to say they have the necessary edu-

cation and training to advance in their careers (63% vs. 41%).

But do these benefits outweigh the financial burden imposed by four or more vears of college? Among Millennials ages 25 to 32, the answer is clearly yes: About nine-in-ten with at least a bachelor's degree say college has already paid off (72%) or will pay off in the future (17%). Even among the two-thirds of college-educated Millennials who borrowed money to pay for their schooling, about nine-in-ten (86%) say their degrees have been worth it or expect that they will be in the future.

Of course, the economic and career benefits of a college degree are not limited to Millennials. Overall, the survey and economic analysis consistently find that college graduates regardless of generation are doing better than those with less education.

The teenage years can be a confusing time fraught with highs, lows, revelations and sometimes disappointment. Imagine how much more complex it might be if you had to address the needs of a growing business at the same time.

Some teenagers do take on the responsibility of starting and managing ventures and a handful of them become rich doing it. Born with an almost preternatural desire to create or build, these young prodigies allow their ambitions and

visions to blossom into businesses.

Most recently, Australian app developer, Nick D'Aloisio sold his product and company - a news summary service called Summly - to Yahoo! for \$30 million plus a job at the tech giant. With a firm base in computer knowledge, young people have a lot of tools at their disposal to create new products and companies that can gain traction. Plus, with a model that requires intense development of a product that, when finished, can be

download and sold ad infinitum, the rewards in tech can be astronomical.

There are also opportunities for teenage entrepreneurs outside of tech. Galveston, Texas's own Madison Robinson's Fish Flops apparel business has grown to over \$1 million in sales, putting its 15-year-old founder and CEO in the spotlight.

Justin Bieber

Justin Bieber, perhaps one of the most famous teenagers turned millionaire entrepreneurs, branched out from his pop star status to the tech field, holding a stake in a handful of companies as a venture capital investor. Last year FORBES measured his two years earnings at about \$108 million.

Cameron Johnson

Cameron Johnson started his first business at age 9, making invitations for his family's parties. Several businesses later -- selling Beanie Babies, internet ad space and greeting cards -- and his net worth had surpassed the \$1 million mark before he'd finished high school.

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

Ten Tips for Parenting Teens Today



(StatePoint) Parenting a teenager can be an uphill battle. In addition to the problems you may have faced in your youth, a new host of issues are presented by texting, sexting, social media and cyberbullying, point out experts.

"Say the right thing and you'll open up lines of communication. Say the wrong thing and it could lead to a fight or silent treatment," says Joani Geltman, child development and parenting expert and author of "A Survival Guide to Parenting Teens: Talking to Your Kids About Sexting, Drinking, Drugs, and Other Things That Freak You Out." (AMACOM).

Geltman offers her "Top Ten Parenting Tips."

• Encourage teens to think independently. Restrain your-

self from being chief problem solver, so they can make good choices even when you're not around.

- Try not to ask a zillion questions. You won't get the answers you want anyway. Engage them in a conversation on a neutral topic before you start the interrogation.
- Refrain from going on the "lecture circuit." Model what it means to be a good person so you don't need to tell them. They will "get it."
- As uncomfortable as it may be, you have to talk about sex. Do it with honesty, and understanding, not judgment.
 Talk about your own experiences when you were a teen, especially those moments of which you are the least proud so that they will feel freer to share their questions and

worries.

- When it comes to alcohol and drugs, make your house safe. Again, have honest discussions, sans judgment. Help them to anticipate new situations and problem solve about ways to stay safe.
- Don't rule with an iron fist. This may have worked when the kids were younger, but teens need to be part of the rule making. Most kids are actually pretty reasonable when given the opportunity to have some control.
- With their input, set limits with phones, computers and video games. Just like you let them eat only a few pieces of Halloween candy a night when they were younger, you need to see these devices in the same way.
- Express your appreciation and pride in your teens. Not for the good test scores or grades necessarily, but for moments of kindness and hard work. There's nothing more important than an out of the blue "you're a good kid, and maybe I don't tell you that enough."
- Find some fun with your teen. Hang out, watch TV, order pizza, go to the driving range, play a video game, listen to music, go get manis and pedis, bake a cake, take

Graduation season is now in full swing, as many students prepare for the future by narrowing down options for which universities they plan on attending. With tuition costs steadily increasing, looming questions on just how to pay for college are extremely common among prospective enrollees and their families. 





Seniors Need Extra Care to **Beat the Heat**

Summer is fast approaching. The days will be long. Your grandchildren will be out of school. You will want to spend time outdoors enjoying barbecues and other activities that are part of this sea-

You should have a wonderful time. But you also need to be careful. Daytime summer high temperatures are often above 90 degrees here in July and August. The humidity can make it feel even hotter.

People over age 65 are at higher risk of suffering a heat-related illness, such as heat exhaustion or even heat stroke. They may be slower to adjust to higher temperatures. Some may have medical conditions or take medication that affects their ability to cope with heat. While seniors can and should get outside, they need to take steps to stay as comfortable, and as safe, as possible.

Use air conditioning to stay

If you have air conditioning in your home and — if you have one — your car, use it. In addition to keeping you cool, the dry, air conditioned air will feel much more pleasant than the humid air outside. If the evening weather happens to be cooler and dry, you can turn it off for a few hours during the evening. But keep it on

during the day.

If you do not have air conditioning, you can use electric fans. But you should spend as much time as possible during the day in an air conditioned environment, such as a library or an indoor shopping mall.

Go early or late

The heat and sun are strongest in the late morning and afternoon. If possible, you should save outdoor activities for the early morning (before 9 a.m.) or very late afternoon (after 5 p.m.).

Dress for the weather

This is not the weather for cardigan sweaters or wool suits. If you plan to be outside longer than for just a short walk, like going from your front door to your car, you should wear light, loose-fitting clothing. Lighter colors are best, as they reflect more of the sunlight and heat than darker colors.

You should also wear a hat and put on sunscreen to protect your head and skin from sunburn.

Drink water

While not really a heat-related illness, dehydration occurs much more quickly in hot weather because vou're sweating. Even if you don't feel thirsty, make sure you drink plenty of water. You may want to take a water bottle if

you are going to be outside for any length of time.

Cool down when you come home

Even if you follow the tips above, you should cool down when you return home. A shower, bath or even a sponge bath can help. If it is the middle of the day and you have the time, taking a nap is also a good idea.

If you start to feel weak or dizzy from the heat, you should go into an air conditioned building as soon as possible. If those feelings don't go away, you should call your doctor.

Even during the summer, it is still important to get outside and do physical activities. With a few simple steps, your summer can be a pleasant one.

Detroit Pistons Head Coach and President of Basketball Operations Stan Van Gundy announced today that the team has named Brendan Malone, Bob Beyer and Charles Klask as assistant coaches and Adam Glessner as a team scout over this weekend past. Also this past Monday, New Detroit Pistons coach and president Stan Van Gundy is close to hiring Marist coach Jeff Bower as general manager, according to Yahoo Sports.

Malone spent five seasons (2007-12) as an assistant coach on Van Gundy's staff with the Orlando Magic. 




