Mayor Duggan announces no-interest home repair loans to help strengthen neighborhoods



DETROIT— Mayor Mike Duggan joined city, community and nonprofit partners to unveil the Detroit 0% Interest Home Repair Loan Program, which will provide \$8 million in financing for eligible homeowners looking to patch roofs, replace win-

dows, upgrade plumbing and address structural or safety issues.

The program is a city-led partnership with the Local Initiatives Support Corp. (LISC) and Bank of America. It is designed to help homeowners fix deteriorating properties and help eliminate blight—all while laying a foundation for renewed private investment in areas struggling to attract capital. It's a focused public-private commitment to Detroit's neighborhoods.

The program targets Detroit homeowners earning up to 80 percent of the area median in-

Two men get life in prison for killing 2-year old baby last summer



A Wayne County Circuit Court jury found Raymond Jackson guilty of first-degree murder, torture, assault and gun charges earlier this month. Authorities said Jackson shot the toddler in the head on July 1, 2014, as she played outside with her father and friends at an Inkster home. The child's father, Kenneth French, and a 13-year-old girl were also shot, but recovered.

French called Jackson a coward, a punk and a sissy during the sentencing hearing on Tuesday.

Judge Ulysses Boykin called the case one of the most "heinous crimes" he had ever seen.

The jury also convicted Raphael Hearn of first-degree murder after prosecutors said the shooting was orchestrated by Hearn, who had a falling out with French after Hearn was shot months earlier at a club where French was working security. French testified that he believed the shooting was in retaliation for the incident at the club, and that Hearn had wanted French to suffer by seeing his daughter

Registering to Vote is **Easy and Important**



Registering to vote only takes a few minutes. With this simple process, you'll be able to vote in the next election and fulfill your duty as an American citizen.

Not only is it important to vote in presidential elections: your vote has even more impact on the local level, whether it's taxes, schools, city government or voter initiatives. All the more reason to be registered. It's a small price to pay for the chance to affect how things are done in your neighborhood, your city, your state and nation. Here's how to do it.

Getting registered to vote is basically a matter of filling out a simple form. Where can you find it? Voter registration forms are available at post offices, city halls, DMVs and other public buildings. You'll also find the form on college and university campuses, other schools and wherever people are gathering signatures for initiatives. Whether or not you agree or disagree, sign a petition or don't, you can still register to vote here.

The form is fairly simple-name, address and other basic information. It also asks you to list any party affiliation with boxes for Democrats, Republi-

cans and Independents. This information is used in primary elections when the parties are choosing their candidates. If you do not fill it out, you cannot vote in these elections. Some states allow all registered voters to vote in primaries regardless of their affiliation.

It may be advantageous to check a party affiliation since it means you can vote in primaries. However, it in no way determines how you can or can't vote. A registered Democrat can vote Republican or any other party and vice-versa.

Once the form is complete, return it at the public counter or to the form taker and you'll be mailed a registration card, showing your proof of registration. You will also receive election information automatically and you will be informed where to vote in person at the time of the election.

While some might consider it a civic duty, registering and voting are really ways that you can control the way we live. Whether it's a financial, community or personal issue, a vote is a voice and the act of standing up for what you believe.

The last day to register to be able to vote in the May 5th election is April 6, 2015.

Make it a family affair and check to make sure everyone in your family is registered to vote and they vote in the Special May election that addresses the condition of the roads in Michigan.

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



Five Years Later, The Affordable Care Act is **Saving Lives and Taxpayer Dollars**

Washington, D.C. - Congressman John Conyers, Jr. issued the following statement on the fifth anniversary of the enactment of the Affordable Care

"Five years ago, President Obama signed into law one of the most important pieces of legislation in a generation: the Affordable Care Act. Along with some of our most historic legislative achievements, including Social Security and Medicare, the Affordable Care Act (ACA) stands as a central pillar of America's social safety net and a key step toward realizing the universal right to health care.

"Thanks to the ACA, more than 16 million previously uninsured Americans now have access to affordable high-quality coverage. At least 105 million Americans have been relieved of the threat of an annual or lifetime limit on care. More than 130 million Americans with pre-existing conditions can no longer be denied coverage and

women can no longer be charged higher premiums than men for the same plan.

"The ACA has not only been essential for Americans' health-it's also been crucial for slowing the growth of healthcare costs. After more than a decade of runaway cost increases, the growth in health care costs has slowed to the lowest level in 50 years. The Medicare Trust Fund is more solvent than it has been in a decade.

"The evidence is clear: the ACA works. It means greater coverage, better care, stronger consumer protections, and lower overall costs. I am proud to salute this landmark legislative achievement and look forward to the additional progress that will come of it."

PROS AND CONS: MORE ABOUT PROPOSAL 1

Last December, the legislature tried to devise a plan that would work for all Michiganders. However, the marathon session on the last day of the 2014 legislative calendar produced the ballot initiative.

So, the Proposal 1 ballot proposal on May 5, stands as the

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only – and most viable – option to repair our broken roads. However, the repairs come with a cost and in this case, if Proposal 1 passes, there will be a tax increase.

The Michigan sales tax will be raised from six to seven percent, while the fuel tax will be increased by 42 percent. With the fuel tax increase, gas prices will be raised by nine cents per gallon. Under the Proposal 1 plan, taxes collected in the first two years beginning in 2016 will eliminate the Michigan Department of Transportation's (MDOT) debt that it will cost to repair the roads in their current state. According to MDOT, it has accumulated \$1.3 billion in debt.

If Proposal 1 passes, the revenue collected from sales and gas tax increases will cover the prudent, lasting for years to

In voting on Proposal 1 in May, Michigan citizens will have the opportunity to amend a part of the Michigan State Constitution to allow an increase in sales and use taxes. Proposal 15-1, better known as "Prop 1", calls for an the increase of state sales tax by one percent (from six to seven percent) to replace and supplement the reduced amount of money going to the School Aid Fund (SAF) and local municipalities caused by the elimination of sales/use taxes on gas and diesel fuel for traditional public road vehicles.

Also known as the "Road Funding Prop", this proposal is purporting to help Michigan's road infrastructure as it mainly receives its funding from revenue received from vehicle registration fees and motor fuel taxes. Over the years with the raise of more fuel efficient vemuch-needed road repairs that hicles, gas is not being conare inevitable in our state. "Empire" Shows that **Black Dollars Matter**

"According to a Nielsen consumer report, African Americans are voracious consumers of media, watching 37 percent more television than any other slice of American demography. While that's not new news, it is disturbing that we don't completely understand the connecbetween our consumption and the huge profits generated by our connection to television.

To be fair, some TV programming can actually be beneficial. The recent coverage of the 50th anniversary of "Bloody Sunday" opened the eyes of generations of Americans who were unaware of the brutality of racial oppression in America. Much of television, however, is simply escapist entertainment for us, but a tremendous cash cow for programmers and advertisers. Take for example "Empire" on Fox. The network is known for its history of racist banter and has exploited Black America while simultaneously benefiting from Black consumers. Statistics show that "Empire" is Fox's highest grossing show in three years, which translates into a huge payoff for Fox.

How big?

How about the \$45.2 billion Comcast/Time Warner merger? How about the \$48.5 billion AT&T acquisition of DirecTV or the estimated \$1.3 trillion dollars spent annually by Black consumers? Not to mention the \$20 billion lawsuit filed by the National Association of African American Owned Media and Entertainment Studios Networks, against Comcast, Time Warner, and other civil rights organizations as party to a plan to ensure that profits from Black viewership continue pouring into the same pockets?

We've watched with interest and commented on this situation earlier, but the situation has not improved. We will reserve judgment on the soundness of Entertainment Studios Network's CEO Byron Allen's pending legal action, but there are a few things of which we are absolutely cer-

No telecom giant has a plan for meaningful participation/inclusion of Black business in their day-to-day procurement activity; No programming giant has a plan to include, develop or support the development of positive Black portrayals to any meaningful degree;

No cable/pay TV provider makes programming targeting Black consumers available at their basic service level, which requires their best customers to pay extra to view their favorite shows;

No advertiser using the TV/PayTV medium includes Black business in any significant way in the development, production, delivery/distribution of their products to this loyal consumer

Telecom companies and consumer product companies are gearing up for an assault on your wallets like nothing you've ever seen, and if you're riveted by the latest episode or game-of-theweek, you may not even notice your pocket being picked. Decisions about your money are being made right now. These decisions are being made by people who don't know you, and whose only interest is how long you're in front of your TV before you go buy the products they are selling.

We understand it's about business - big business. We also understand that it is Black consumers' money that makes the business so big. But if Black businesses don't flourish as a result of all this activity designed to move dollars out of Black pockets, we'll be back to "Good Times" in the projects instead of building Empires. All the more reason to invest money in the Black community. If you can devote time to watching your favorite television show, then you can also devote time to buying from your local Black businesses. Make #Blackdollarsmatters not just a hashtag, but a way

When I read "The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People" by Stephen Covey, one of the habits that stuck out to me was habit #2: Begin with the End in Mind. This habit has to do with thinking about the end of your life and letting that impact the way you live each day. What will you be remembered by? Are you living to impact the image and legacy you will leave behind? Are you living like you want to go to Heaven?

Many of us avoid thinking about end of life as if thinking about death will make it happen. Very often, intense fear is associated with death. We need not dwell on thoughts of death, but we do need to consider it. Instead of looking at is as the end, look at it like a new beginning.

As a hospice chaplain, I spend a lot of time with dying people. Although I see many sad situations, dying people have taught me more about life than I could ever learn in any classroom. They teach me how to live. They remind me that one day I'll die and as long as I am

The dying give real meaning to the phrase, 'maximize the moment.' The dying realize their moments are limited, but we who are alive should also live like ours are limited. We should live to to our best to fulfill our destiny and purpose. Don't waste time. Don't be afraid of the future. Embrace it. Alter it if you can. Trust that God will be providential in it.

Death is sad to the living and grief is bitter, but the what gives me hope is when a dying person has peace with God that is beyond our understanding and is looking forward to their encounter with our Maker. While their loved ones try to hold on to them, they are eager to be released from suffering to fly away to glory. There is something different about the death of the godly. In the book of Numbers, the Prophet Balaam recognized this. In verse 10 he says, "Let me die the death of the righteous, and let my end be like his." (NKJ).

Death is inevitable, we have no choice about that. However we can choose whether we die like the godly or the ungodly. Which do you choose? Are you living with the end in mind? Are you being highly effective in the Kingdom?

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

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

Mayor Tidwell focuses on future plans for Ecorse in State of the City Address

On March 18th, a capacity crowd gathered at Ecorse High School to witness Mayor Lamar Tidwell's inaugural State of the City address.

"We've faced many challenges over the past 30 years, but the old Ecorse way has to stop," he said. "We can't allow special interest groups to take away from the citizens of Ecorse because at the end of the day, taxpayers are the stakeholders here. We need to start moving forward in the right direction because the old way is not working."

topics discussed Other throughout the address included the return of Smart bus services for local seniors, little league baseball/recreational activities and the possible removal of the Ecorse Public Library from the Wayne County system. In addition, Tidwell revealed pertinent budget information regarding FEMA flood reimbursements, decreasing DTE costs (which will result in the installment of LED lights citywide), and economic development efforts to reduce area blight.

"So far since I've been in office, we've torn down about 60

houses. Now with the new money we've received, we want to tear down another 80-100 homes," Tidwell said. "We're going to be replacing sidewalks, and demolishing blighted homes to change the image of Ecorse. The grand total of money received in the past 18 months is \$4 million, so that's a big plus for the city." Tidwell also commended the municipality's public safety department for making steady imwhile provements, acknowledging special units within the division that have contributed to additional revenue for the area. With new plans on the horizon for the on looking toward a brighter future for the City of Ecorse.

"So what can we do to move forward? Stop the old Ecorse way, increase revenue, and create a DDA to make the city more attractive," he said. "Most importantly, we have to come to council meetings, and we have to complain. I don't care if you call me because that's my job. You have to tell us because we don't know everything, and we need you to help. We have to come together as one big happy family and put our differences aside. The community has to get involved."

This is only Kevin Weber's second year as principal of Wayne Memorial High School. Still, in teaching there since 2004 and also serving as an assistant principal, his dedication to the Zebra way reflects an overall atmosphere at the school personally described by Weber as

nothing short of exceptional. "Wayne pride is a really unique part of this school; it's truly contagious," Weber said. "We always say success is the only option, so we try to live that statement as best as we can for our students. Michigan leads the Midwest in creating private sector jobs since end of 2010

Unemployment rate drops to 5.9 percent, lowest in 14 years



LANSING, Mich. - Michigan has gained more private sector jobs than any other Midwestern state since the end of 2010, and the state's unemployment rate has dropped to 5.9 percent – the lowest in 14 years, Gov. Rick Snyder said Wednesday.

Michigan has created nearly tion in developing the skilled 400,000 private sector jobs since late 2010, with the unemployment rate now nearly cut in half since that time, according to the federal Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Michigan has created the fifthmost private sector jobs in the country, trailing only California, Texas, Florida and New York all larger states, according to the most recent data available.

"We should be proud that our hard work in reinventing Michigan is showing results, with companies tapping our talent and legendary work ethic as they create more and better jobs," Snyder said. "But we can't just be satisfied with being a leader in the Midwest. We're working to lead the na-

trades, creating an environment for businesses to grow and thrive and building on the entrepreneurial spirit that is known around the globe."

Statistics released Wednesday show Michigan's unemployment rate to be the lowest since October 2001. The state has gained nearly 400,000 private sector jobs since December 2010, including 105,000 in manufacturing. There have been nearly 100,000 private sector jobs created overall in Michigan in the past year

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What is Your Obesity Costing You?

Sometimes celebrities or otherwise physically fit people will put on a fat suit and document their experience with a video camera, usually to be aired on a daytime talk show. The overall impression is universal: Being severely overweight is taxing on almost every level, says Dr. Eleazar Kadile, who specializes in treating patients with obesity and associated chronic disease.

"Physically, emotionally, mentally and even spiritually, being obese is an ever-present condition to the experience my clients face every day," says Kadile, director of the Center for Integrative Medicine and author of "Stop Dying Fat"

"Obesity is a vicious cycle that usually starts with bad eating habits during childhood" Kadile said. "Childhood obesity has quadrupled in recent decades. I don't think enough of us appreciate how established bad habits are before most obese people reach adulthood.

"Overweight or obese people often eat for comfort when they're depressed or as a reward when things are going well, much like an alcoholic."

Like substance abusers, obese people pay a significant price.

- Bigger is costlier. Many are emotional eaters, and when you eat for emotional satisfaction rather than physical satiation, you eat more, which increases the dollars spent. Obese people often have to buy clothes specially tailored for their size, which adds costs. The biggest cost, however, is healthcare due to bad health. Obesity has severely taxed our country's healthcare costs.
- What's your self-esteem worth? Being a large individual often proves challenging in public, as daytime talk shows sometimes attest. Obesity can keep you from social engagements and make you feel selfconscious while out and about. This can lead to depression and lack of activity, fueling the vicious cycle of the obese lifestyle.
- Time arguably the most important metric. What do we really have in life? Money, work, love, relationships and material goods these are all good and necessary things. But they are all for not if your health does not permit you to live long enough to enjoy them.

• Opportunities, quality of life and happiness are compromised. You can be the most qualified professional at work, but obesity can cost you a raise. You may be a funny, intelligent and attractive person, but being too big might keep you from finding love. Simply having 100 or 200 pounds of extra fat is a burden obese people cannot escape throughout their waking existence.

"As a society, we should be more compassionate toward obese individuals – they have it hard enough without our critical judgment," Kadile says. "If you are obese, you owe it to yourself and your loved ones to save on the associated tangible and intangible costs. If you don't take action today, it can cost you many days from your future that you'd otherwise have."

Dr. Eleazar Kadile is a complementary physician who specializes in treating patients with obesity, who may suffer from heart disease, hypertension, type-2 diabetes, arthritis, depression or ADHD.



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

DETROIT -- Detroit Western International benefited from second and third-chance points Tuesday evening, using its size to win the rebound battle against Ypsilanti.

Jesuit at 2:50 Friday at the Breslin Center in East Lansing.

Highlights

-- The Cowboys outscored Ypsilanti 13-4 in the first quarter with the help of five offensive rebounds between the 6-foot-8 duo of Kheri Maxwell and Blackshear. Blackshear led all scorers in the frame with five points, though he was 1-of-4 from the free-throw line.

-- Avery Williams carried the struggling Grizzlies through the first half, scoring seven of his nine points in the second quarter. Allen added five points, including a three-point play off a steal, but Ypsilanti started the second half in a 15-point hole.

-- Allen capitalized on an unforced turnover by the Cowboys, picking up the loose ball and taking it in for two points to begin the second half. The Grizzlies turned the ball over on two of its first three possessions though and the Cowboys made them pay.

- -- After Western settled down its offense, McFolley scored five-straight points including a second-chance 3 following a Maxwell rebound, and a layup inside. He recorded nine third-quarter points to lead the Cowboys to an 18-point lead heading into the fourth.
- -- Western finished out the game with a 16-13 final eight minutes, led by McFolley with six and Armanti Tinsley with four.
- -- Neither team shot particularly well from the free-throw line. The Grizzlies made 4-of-9, while the Cowboys made 6-of-18.

Pregame notes

- -- Ypsilanti earned its Class A regional title last Thursday, 63-58 over Romulus. Corey Allen scored a game-high 19 points and Jamezell Davis and Kendrick Williams both added double-digit scoring in the Grizzlies victory.
- -- Detroit Western International came into Tuesday's contest with a 23-0. Their most recent victim Warren De La Salle by a score of 51-35. Blackshear led the way for the Cowboys with 14 points, 12 rebounds and four blocks. McFolley and Karim Murray added a combined 24.



element to what may otherwise serve as an uneasy experience.

"A lot of my patients do come to me because I'm a female; they want to have that connected perspective," Johnson said. "I think that as a woman, you can bring a lot to the table because you've experienced some of the same issues that vour patients are experiencing. And I really enjoy what I do because it provides a long term point of care, from delivering a baby to also impacting patients when they're coming in for regular concerns. So as an OB/GYN, I do get to experience the whole spectrum of things."

In addition to her duties as an OB/GYN, Johnson—a wife, mother and practicing physician for over two decades—has always sought to maintain a healthy family life in the midst of career responsibilities. So just how does she manage to do it all?

"You learn to be a great master of time, and you also learn to

prioritize things that are important," Johnson said. "My kids are important, so I made sure to be available for them, and that meant making adjustments in my professional life to ensure that they had my attention whenever they needed it. Also, being able to develop a strong support network of family and friends is always essential."

And while Johnson has admittedly enjoyed the process of balancing family and professional obligations, she concedes that being a mother and physician can present its challenges because "your male colleagues may not take you seriously; they may have wives to take care of other aspects of their lives, but I have to multitask because I am the wife." However for the Spelman College graduate and Stanford University Medical School alum, these very factors shine light on the need to celebrate women and all of their accomplishments throughout the month of March.



CITY OF ROMULUS NOXIOUS WEED NOTICE TO THE PROPERTY OWNERS IN THE CITY OF ROMULUS

In accordance with P.A. 359 of 1941, as amended and Chapter 34, Article 3, of the Romulus Code of Ordinances it shall be the duty of all owners of lands on which noxious weeds are found growing, to destroy the same before they reach a seed bearing stage and to prevent such weeds from becoming a detriment to public health.

If any such owner, agent or occupant of such land shall refuse to destroy such noxious weeds or cause them to be destroyed, it shall be the duty of the Noxious Weed Commissioner to enter upon such land and destroy such noxious weeds.

Nothing in this notice shall apply to weeds in fields devoted to growing any small grain crop such as wheat, oats, barley or rye.

All weeds not cut by May 1, 2015 will be cut by the City and the owner of the property will be charged with the cost. Subsequent violations will result in additional cuttings and will be done as often as necessary when vegetation reaches eight (8) inches in height and/or seed bearing stage.

Any expense incurred in such destruction shall be paid by the owner or owners of such land and the city shall have a lien against such land for such expense. Any owner who shall refuse to destroy such noxious weeds shall also be subject to a fine of not more than \$100.00 per cutting in the discretion of the court.

All refuse and debris on the given owners property will be removed by the City at the owners' expense.





She makes sure that the museum complex is open every Sunday from 1-4 p.m. The museum is only closed in the event of inclement weather, or on a major holiday weekend. Pearl has often made the comment that her family knows where to find her on Mother's day. Pearl has not received any compensation for performing her duties. She does this out of love for the Romulus community.

The Museum's artifacts occupy two buildings, an 1839 Romulus School House (District #1) which was moved to the park in 1986, opening to the public in 1991, and The Historic 1855 Kingsley House. The Kingsley house is a unique duplex structure, which was moved to the park in 1995, and opened to the public in 2002. Pearl's father Fred, and her late mother Helen led the push to save both of these buildings. Without

their backing, neither of these projects may have come to fruition.

Pearl utilizes an all-volunteer staff to open both of the buildings to the public. She also supervises people that are supplied by the 34th District Court Work Program.

Current and former Romulus residents, visitors, history buffs, and those that are researching family history and genealogy are able to access a wealth of information that is contained in the archives of the two buildings. Pearl established these archives in 2001, and they continue to grow as the museum receives more material.

Including the two of these buildings, there are a total of five historic structures on the property that is known as Romulus Historical Park, which is located in the downtown area. Pearls father. Frederick W. Hay was serving as the first chairman of the Romulus Historical Commission when this park was dedicated in the fall of 1992. The other three structures

are vital to Romulus history. There is a circa 1900s Wabash Railroad Freight House, which is the only surviving railroad building in the city. There is a circa 1940s Caboose, which traveled the railroad tracks through Romulus, and a Windmill that was located on the Mach Family Farm north of the airport. The progress that occurred in this area has spanned a period of around thirty years and three city administrations; the late Mayor William Oakley, the late Mayor Beverly McAnally and former Mayor Alan Lambert. Prior to 1986, none of these building were

located on this property. It was a blighted area which included an abandoned foundry and several derelict buildings along Hunt Street.

Pearl became interested in researching and preserving history as a young girl, when she was influenced by her maternal grandmother, Flora Morris. Her grandmother taught Pearl the family genealogy regarding her grandmother and grandfather. This

evolved into a quest to learn as much as she could about Romulus history. Her family settled in the township of Romulus in 1854, shortly after it was organized in 1835.

In 1978, the State of Michigan recognized the Merrill-Morris house located on Huron River Drive, as a Michigan Historical site. This house was owned by Pearl Morris, a sister to Pearl's mother Helen. Pearl grew up in this house.

The recognition of this house by the State of Michigan created an idea to start a local Historical Society. The late Mayor William Oakley called a meeting to see if he could obtain at least 10 interested people to form the society. It became a reality in 1979.

Pearl is one of the 20 charter members, and served as the first President. She served in this capacity for 14 years, and served as Vice President for 3 years. Since 1979, a great deal of progress has occurred with the advancement of the society through the years...Pearl was fortunate to work alongside many city officials and other Historical Society members in order to continue to improve the city. The first program that the society embarked upon was the recognition of 14 local historical sites. This occurred between 1979 and 1998. The 15th historical site was recognized in 2006, as the centennial farm that belongs to Pearl's parents, Fred and Helen Hay was added to the list.

1985 was a very important year for the city as it celebrated its 150th anniversary. As previously mentioned, Pearl's father Frederick W. Hay was the first chairman, and he continues to serve as a commissioner.

In 1987 the State of Michigan caught up to the City of Romulus as it celebrated its Sesquicentennial. There were a few programs that occurred in the city to commemorate this event.

Pearl was born to Frederick W. and Helen Hay during World War II. She was born at the local Romulus hospital on Goddard road. (Incidentally the building is still there, and is now the Witherow Woods apartments.) She is the oldest of four children. Her siblings are Margie, Frederick and Carla. She grew up on Huron River Drive near Eureka Road.

Pearl attended Romulus Community Schools and graduated in 1960 as the valedictorian of her class. She continued her education and earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Science and Math from Michigan State University. She taught high school for several years. Then she worked at Parke-Davis Pharmaceutical Company in Ann Arbor as a research assistant. She currently teaches piano lessons and is a math tutor.

She married Virgil L. Varner on December 26, 1964, Virgil ran his own electrical contracting business, and is also retired from General Motors. They reside in the adjacent community of Van Buren Township, but Pearl and Virgil spend a great deal of their waking hours in the community of Romulus. They have two sons, Darius and Lloyd, and they are residents of Romulus. Her sons reside on

the original family homestead property. Their grandchildren, Hanna and Asa, have and continue to participate in many historical events and activities.

Pearl has not only committed herself to the Romulus Community, but has enlisted the help of her parents, brother sisters, her sons and their families, grandchildren, nieces and nephews. It is labor of love for the whole family, and they have utilized their talents and labor on many of the projects that have occurred throughout the years.

She also has a group of dedicated voltorical Society and the Romulus Historical Commission. Each one of these individuals, too

The next major ongoing project will be

the complete restoration of the Perter C. Bird home, which was built by civil a war veteran in 1878. A lot of progress has already occurred on this structure. Pearl has secured donations for the naming rights of the rooms of the house, which included a donation form her father. Pearl, the Romulus Historical Society, and the Romulus Historical Commission are currently working with the City and Mayor LeRoy Burcroff to make this project a reality.

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

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



come (\$54,150 for a family of four), as well as households in targeted parts of the city, regardless of their income. It helps fill a growing market gap—owners who want to invest in their homes but can't get affordable traditional financing because property values have eroded their ability to borrow.

"We worked very closely with HUD and our other partners to make sure these loans are accessible to as many Detroiters as possible," said Mayor Duggan, who added, "establishing this loan fund will generate a wave of home improvement work across the city that will raise property values and strengthen neighborhoods."

Funding for the program comes from \$4 million of Community Development Block Grant funds from HUD, as well as \$4 million from Bank of America. LISC will use the funding to provide loans to qualified homeowners. Borrowers will pay no interest on their loans—the partners will absorb most of the costs to operate the program—but they must pay back the principal. That helps homeowners improve their credit history as they improve their homes, while also building a track record of loan performance that will encourage others to lend and invest in these communities.

"Our support of the Detroit 0% Interest Home Repair Loans Program in partnership with the City of Detroit and LISC is yet another demonstration of our commitment to aligning our resources to help revitalize Detroit, and more specifically its neighborhoods," said Matt Elliott, Michigan Market President, Bank of America. "We see this partnership as a way to support homeowners with resources that will improve their lives and be instrumental in sustaining the economic vitality of our city."

The program taps highly regarded local nonprofits to help with outreach. Bridging Communities, Central Detroit Chris-CDC, Cody Rouge Community Action Alliance, Detroit Non-Profit Housing Corp., Goodwill Industries of Greater Detroit, Jefferson East, Inc., New Hope Community Development, Operation ABLE, SER Metro Detroit, Southwest Economic Solutions, U SNAP BAC, and Wayne Metro Community Action Agency each serve as Inhelping Centers, homeowners complete the intake forms and start the loan application process.

"This is an exciting opportunity for LISC to work in partnership with the Mayor to bring new resources to the hardworking

and proud residents of Detroit," said Tahirih Zeigler, executive director of LISC's Detroit program, which over the last 25 years has invested \$187 million in Detroit neighborhoods. "With the 0% Interest Home Repair Loan Program, homeowners can reinvest in their homes and play an active role in revitalizing the city.

The City has scheduled five information sessions to help Detroit homeowners learn more about the application process. Homeowners can pick up applications, talk to City staff, and set application review appointments with Intake Centers.

for road repairs. As road repairs are delayed, the roads get worse and the cost to repair them becomes more expensive.

Currently when we buy gas, we are paying a motor fuel tax (which supports road funding) and a sales tax (which supports the SAF, General Fund, and local municipalities). Proposal 1 will eliminate the sales tax leaving only the motor fuel tax which it also purports to increase and adjust for inflation. The one percent increase in state sales tax is supposed to counteract the removal of the sales tax in order to continue funding the SAF as well as give it more money than it is currently receiving from the sales tax.

If passed, Proposal 1 is supposed to do the following:

- · Increase the state sales/use tax from six to seven percent.
- · Increase the amount of money dedicated to the SAF

from the revenue obtained from these taxes.

- · Expand the use of SAF to include community colleges and vocational schools while prohibiting use for four year colleges/universities.
- · Increase vehicle registration
- Dedicate revenue from the increased vehicle registration fees for road repair and other transportation purposes.
- · Increase the earned income tax credit.

If the proposal does not pass, there will not be an amendment to the Constitution, the sales tax won't go up, and the other parts of the proposal that would be triggered (increased road funding, increased earned income tax credit, SAF expansion, etc.) will not occur.
