Originally known as Decoration Day, it originated in the years following the Civil War and be-came an official federal holiday in 1971. Many Americans observe Memorial Day by visiting cemeteries or memorials, holding family gatherings and participating in parades. Unofficially, at least, it marks the beginning of summer.

The Civil War claimed more lives than any conflict in U.S. history, requiring the establishment of the country's first national cemeteries. By the late 1860s Americans in various towns and cities had begun holding springtime tributes to these countless fallen soldiers, decorating their graves with flowers and reciting prayers.

Did You Know?

Each year on Memorial Day a national moment of remembrance takes place at 3:00 p.m. local time

It is unclear where exactly this tradition originated; numerous different communities may have independently initiated the memorial gatherings. Nevertheless, in 1966 the federal government declared Waterloo, New York, the official birthplace of Memorial Day. Waterloo-which had first celebrated the day on May 5, 1866-was chosen because it hosted an annual, communitywide event, during which businesses closed and residents decorated the graves of soldiers with flowers and flags.

Michelle Obama Resists Taking the Easy Way Out

More than any other first lady of the United States of America, Michelle Obama continues to stand above those who would attempt to distort her leadership. First Lady Obama's recent commencement address at the Tuskegee University in Alabama exemplified her courage to speak truth to the world without fear of repercussions.

Michelle Obama's resilient optimism is refreshing as well as sobering. I am certain the class of 2015 at Tuskegee will always remember the strong and poignant words of wisdom that they were given during their graduation cer-emonies. But we all can learn from her timely remarks

We live today in an increased atmosphere of racial polarization in America since the election and reelection of President Barack Obama. We, therefore, should welcome public utterances that transcend the prevalent negativity surrounding any attempt to address the question of race in the United States.

Michele Obama is perfectly qualified and strategically positioned to use her leadership in a constructive manner to advance the interests of Black America and all those who struggle and cry out for freedom, justice and equality. As a talented Harvard Law School graduate, devoted mother, and loyal spouse to the president, the first lady has risen to become one of the most admired persons in the world.

The first lady eloquently stated. "But here's the thing – our history provides us with a better story, a better blueprint for how we can win. It teaches us that when we pull ourselves out of those lowest . emotional depths, and we channel our frustrations into studying and organizing and banding together then we can build ourselves and our communities up. The good news is that thousands of Black American college graduates from HBCUs and from other institutions of higher learning will be pushing forward to demand greater access to wealth-building careers with the intent on giving more back to the communities from which they have emerged. Like the first lady, I am optimistic about the future to the extent to which we continue to stand up to injustice while at the same time pressing forth to economically empower our families and communities.

Education and empowerment are both goals that must be attained and each generation has to rise to the occasion with persistence and focus. There will be setbacks and sometimes disappointments in everyone's life. Yet, the enduring lesson from Michelle Obama's magnificent address was that when those life challenges happen, do not let your problems or critics define who you are. We have to have faith in our own capacity to rebound and to stand for truth even when it might not be the popular or politically expedient.

We are a resilient people. We resist oppression. We are against inequality and injustice. We stand for liberation and freedom for ourselves and for all people. The more we stand together, the more we make progress. We are grateful that in our lifetime we are privileae to witness how the first ladv epitomizes what it means to be a freedom fighter with courage and grace, but most of all, with a glowing resilience that motivates and

GETTING TO KNOW OUR ELECTED OFFICIALS Westland Mayor William Wild

The "Getting to know our elected officials" feature is designed to provide access into the minds of local public figures. This week we chatted with Westland Mayor William Wild about his decision to go into public service, the most rewarding aspects of his current position, spring and summer plans for the city, specific factors that distinguish Westland from other surrounding communities. favorite pastimes/hobbies and much more.

Did you grow up in the Westland area?

Yes I grew up in Westland, and graduated from John Glenn High School.

As a child, did you know that you wanted to go into public service?

When I was younger I had no idea that I would go into this line of work. In fact, I can remember wanting to grow up and play for the Detroit Tigers. What eventually influenced you to venture into politics? At a young age, I got involved with my father's small business which was located in Wayne. He was pretty active in the community, so he would take me with him to city council, planning commission and DDA meetings. I think that's how I got the bug.

How long have you served as the Mayor of Westland?

I was elected in 2007, so I'm in my 9th year. Prior to that, I served on the Westland City Council for 6 years.

What do you see as the biggest issue affecting your city today?

Our city is going to be 50 years old in 2016. Over the years, the city has grown pretty fast but we probably didn't invest enough money back into our infrastructure. We're now the 10th largest city in the state, and we're having to reinvest in our assets. We recently opened a new city hall and built a fire station, while spending a lot of money in our parks and roads to improve these issues.

How can residents initiate change throughout the Westland area? We're investing a lot of public money into our infrastructure, but residents and businesses can do their part by improving the curb appeal on their properties. We think that this will allow us to help people recover some of the lost tax value in

What distinguishes Westland and its citizens from other Detroit metropolitan cities?

their homes and businesses.

One thing about our city is that we've always been very patriotic. We started a new marketing campaign in 2007 for us to be known as the "All American City", and that's something our residents have really taken to. Plus we've worked to create more of a green community. and our curbside recycling program has one of the highest participation rates in the country. We're also working on becoming more of а compassionate city. When you put those things together with the fact that we're the only city in Wayne County with a three year balance budget, I think it really starts to set us apart

With spring and summer approaching, does the city have any fun events in store?

Probably the coolest thing we have going on will occur in August when we hold our 4th annual Blues, Brews and Barbeque Festival. It's a two day event at our new Central City Park located behind the old city hall, which includes live music and great food. This year, we're actually going to have an amateur barbeque

contest as well.

Will the annual citywide fireworks return for 4th of July this year?

We're kind of moving away from the 4th of July festival with the carnival, and trying to do more community oriented events. At some point we'll probably bring back the fireworks, but it may be incorporated into the Blues, Brews and Barbeque festival.

What do you enjoy most about being the Mayor of Westland?

I really like coming to work every day to make a difference in the community that I grew up in. We have a talented team, and we're working hard to improve our city services. We solve a lot of problems every day, so we go home feeling really good about everything that we're doing.

Do you engage in any hobbies/special interests in your leisure time?

I'm an avid adult hockey player. At the same time, I have three young children: a son who's 12, and two girls ages 10 and 8. So between all of their activities, I try to spend the free time I've got with them.

The first step is the 31st annual NBA Draft Lottery will determine the order of selection for the first 14 picks of the 2015 NBA Draft. 

Point out unsafe places to play like intersections and discourage them from taking shortcuts.

3. Agree on a code word for emergencies that only trusted adults who knows the code word can pick up your child if necessary.

4. Accompany and supervise children in public facilities, including restrooms.

Use the buddy system for 5 older kids, including designating a time and place to meet. Remind children to remain in the area where they become separated, and teach them to dial 9-1-1 in emergencies.

Kids dressed in bright col-7 ors are easier to recognize if they get lost in a large crowd. Avoid clothing and toys with your child's name on it. A child may not fear someone who knows their name.

Teach your children not to 8. accept rides and gifts from anyone - even people they might know.

If your child is grabbed by someone, team them to yell "This person is trying to take me!" or "This is not my mother/father!" and to resist by pulling or running away.

Click It or Ticket, a national campaign coordinated annually by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration to increase the proper use of seat belts, takes place May 18-31, 2015

Using a seat belt is one of the most effective ways to prevent serious injury or death in the event of a crash. Using lap/shoulder seat belts can reduce the risk of fatal injury by almost 50% (1). In 2013, more than 21,000 passenger vehicle occupants died in motor vehicle crashes in the United State; 49% were unrestrained at the time of the crash (2). An additional 2.4 million nonfatal iniuries were treated in emergency departments in 2013 (3). Yet, millions of persons continue to travel unrestrained (4).

During the 2015 Click it or Ticket campaign,* law enforcement agencies across the nation will conduct intensive, high-visibility enforcement of seat belt laws, during both daytime and nighttime hours. Nighttime enforcement of seat belt laws is encouraged because seat belt use is lower at night (2).
