Governor Snyder signs law to raise the minimum wage



The state's hourly minimum wage will increase in phases from \$7.40 until it reaches \$9.25 in 2018. The legislature passed the bill on Tuesday, May 27 and Republican Gov. Rick Snyder signed it into law.

The compromise was struck a day before a committee turns in petition signatures for

the higher minimum wage hike. The new law includes a provision requiring the minimum wage to grow with inflation once it hits \$9.25 an hour. It also raises the wage for workers who get tips to 38 percent of the minimum wage.

"I commend my partners in the Legislature for finding common ground on a bill that will help Michigan workers and protect our state's growing economy," said Snyder. The law will also tie the minimum wage to inflation, so that it will continue to gradually increase after 2018. While setting minimum wage

at \$9.25 brings it well above the federal rate of \$7.25 per hour, Michigan lawmakers did not go as far as those in



Judge puts Representative John Conyers back on ballot



U.S. District Court Judge Matthew Leitman issued an injunction ordering Conyers back on the ballot just hours after state elections officials upheld an earlier ruling that Hundreds of signatures the had kept him off for failing to secure enough valid petition signatures. At issue was the question of whether a law requiring signature gatherers

to be registered voters is constitutional.


Leitman said he was not issuing an opinion on that question Friday. But because the plaintiffs challenging the law "have shown a substantial likelihood of success" and "because time is of the essence," he said he opted to order that Convers be put back on the ballot.

Leitman's order came the same day the Michigan secretary of state's office upheld a decision handed down May 13 by Wayne County Clerk Cathy Garrett. Garrett's office said Conyers submitted far fewer than the 1,000 valid signatures required to appear on the bal-

Poet Maya Angelo dies at 86



and Maya Author poet Angelou, who rose from poverty, segregation and violence to become a force on stage, screen and the printed page, has died. She was 86.

Angelou was born in Missouri

but spent much of her childhood in Stamps, Ark.

She gained acclaim for her first book, her autobiography I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings, making her one of the first black women to write a best-seller.

She was the poet chosen to read at President Bill Clinton's first inauguration in 1993. She wrote and read an original composition, "On the Pulse of Morning," which became million-seller.

Gov. Mike Beebe called Angelou "an Arkansas and American treasure." "She drew from a troubled and painful childhood to write books and poems that have inspired countless others," he said in a statement. "From Stamps, Arkansas, to the steps of the U.S. Capitol for President Clinton's inauguration, Maya Angelou showed how strength, determination and honesty can take us all to the heights of greatness."

Her cause of death was not immediately disclosed

Did you know that Elected Officials work for us? We hire with our vote. Sometimes we hire them for a two year term, four year term or even a six year term. Yet many of us have not interviewed them for the job. Have you ever had a job that you didn't have to worry about losing for a set amount of time? Many of us are concerned about whether we will have our job next month. But we vote for people and give them a guaranteed job without even getting to know them.

This year's election is very important. The ballot will be full of people running for State Representatives, State Senators, Judges, US Congressmen, County Commissioners, County

Executive, School Boar, Governor and many more. The people who win these elections will have the power to decide the future of City government, dissolvement of school districts, minimum wage increases, unemployment continuation and programs that will enhance or destroy your lives. They will have the power and we just don't want to give it to any-

I challenge you to learn all you can before you hire the people to fill these positions. Check their past voting records, read all their literature, talk to people that knew them before they ran for office. Goggle their name to see what comes up and then check it out. Check with your parents to make sure they have their voting documents. You must show valid State issued identification before you can vote.

Over the next two months, we will publish information when possible to inform you when candidates will be speaking. You should get a group of your family members or neighbors together to stop by the event so that you can hear firsthand what the candidate believes in. Ask questions and give scenarios about topics that you are passionate about and have the candidate give you their viewpoint. Remember this is their job interview.

some other states.

Vermont's legislature approved a bill earlier this month that raises the minimum wage to \$10.50 by 2018, while Maryland lawmakers raised it to \$10.10 by the same year. Lawmakers in Minnesota, Delaware, West Virginia, Connecticut and Hawaii have also approved minimum wage raises this

A minimum wage hike to \$10.10 at the federal level is supported by Democrats and President Obama, but is Congress. in stalled Opponents argue that raising the minimum wage forces businesses to cut workers' hours and jobs.



Wayne County Treasurer releases additional \$68.3 million to general fund



DETROIT —Two weeks after transferring \$82 million from the Delinquent Tax Revolving Fund (DTRF) into Wayne County's general fund, Wayne County Treasurer Raymond Wojtowicz today announced that an additional \$68.3 million will be made available to aid in reducing the County's accumulated deficit.

The Treasurer's Office has traditionally transferred excess funding in varying amounts over to the County's general fund each year. Through a concerted effort earlier this month, the Treasurer was able to market bonds without using the reserves as collateral and received an SP1 rating from Standard & Poor's indicating a stable and viable program. The ability to market bonds without the reserve has allowed the Treasurer to transfer a significantly larger surplus to the general fund.

The Treasurer expects the additional \$68.3 million to be available in July and will include \$30 million from the DTRF, \$28.3 million due to a reduction in internal funding, nearly \$1 million from collections of significantly delinquent taxes and \$9 million from auction proceeds.

Combined with the \$82.2 million transferred earlier this month, the \$68.3 million addition will bring this year's total to \$150.5 million in excess funds released, the majority of which can now be used to reduce the County's \$175 million accumulated deficit.

"We've had a great team working hard to overcome the County's financial lenges," said Wayne County Executive Robert Ficano. "The Treasurer and County Commission have been great partners that have stepped up to the plate in particularly tough times."

"We're pleased to have the opportunity to serve the citizens of Wayne County. These funds will assist the county through these most challenging economic times and this is what being a team player is all about," said Wojtowicz.

Commission Chairman Gray Woronchak (D-Dearborn) said, "The county executive, the chief financial officer and the rest of us at the table have shown how reasonable people can start from positions that may be far apart but find a way to collaborate in the best interests of our residents." He added, "I have to credit the Office of the Auditor General for its role in moving this process forward, and credit the Treasurer for his willingness to work with the administration and the Commission on this matter and for being a leader at this time of crisis for the county."

Since the real estate crash in 2008, Wayne County has lost more than \$325 million in property tax revenue, the primary source for its general fund which supports basic government operations including the Prosecutor and Sheriff's Offices. This fiscal year, the county is working with \$125 million less in general fund revenue than it had in 2008.

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Blackonomics

Controlling the Money

"Let me issue and control a nation's money and I care not who writes the laws."

- Mayer Amschel Rothschild.

I often wonder if most Black people in America really understand the across-the-board impact economics has on our daily lives. Or, have we just been beaten down so badly that we have fallen into a state of apathy when it comes to our collective pursuit of economic empowerment? The above quote by Rothschild always reminds me of the kind of nation and world in which we reside. It also makes me even more aware of Black folks' economic position in this country, and our lack of emphasis on what's really important vis-à-vis real

What are the messages being given to Black people by many of our leaders? Well, they run the gamut from "civil rights" to "voting rights" to "gay rights" to "immigration reform" to someone calling one of us or all of us a name we don't like. Many unsuspecting Blacks are riled about issues that do not and will not affect us one iota when it comes to being able to obtain power for ourselves; and we spend an inordinate amount of time caught up in nonsensical discussions that only keep us from devoting ourselves to selfempowerment.

Maybe we are simply unwilling to "pay the cost to be the boss," as B.B. King likes to say. Or, maybe the "cost of doing business" is just too high for us. Maybe we just want to continue to buy everything and anything other folks make and distribute rather than do those things for ourselves. Maybe we are just content to be the primary consumers in this nation.

The engine of the U.S. economy is fueled by consumption, which is 70 percent of our Gross Domestic Product (GDP), and that does not include purchases of new housing. Our current GDP is more than \$15 trillion. Do the math and see how much is being spent on goods and services.

Doesn't it make sense for Black people to be producing and selling much more than we do presently? With an aggregate annual income of more than \$1 trillion, we could carve out a few niches in the business world and make a veritable killing.

When we look at per capita GDP by country, interestingly, we see that Liberia ranks among the lowest in the world. Why? Well, I have writings from Booker T. Washington to the officials in Liberia and Haiti

warning them to be independent and to take full advantage of their land and natural resources by maintaining ownership and control over them. He admonished them not to allow foreigners to buy their land and use it for their own economic advantage. Unfortunately, they did not follow Washington's advice, and Liberia ended up signing 100 year leases on its rubber tree plantations to Goodyear, and Haiti, now the poorest nation in the western hemisphere, failed to control its beautiful island and turn it into a primary tourist attraction.

We are so hung-up on meaningless and powerless political discussions, and instead of mimicking even the smallest measure of what Rothschild said, we obviously keep thinking the politicians are going to take care of us. But they keep telling us things that will not move us forward economically. When it comes to economic advocacy, where is our voice in Washington?

Let's be honest. Over the past 50 years, Black people have cast millions of votes. We have helped elect thousands of Black public officials - and White ones, too. In 2012, Black people voted at a higher rate than other minority groups and by most measures surpassed the White turnout for the first time. What has that gotten us, as it pertains to what Rothschild said? Suppose for the past 50 years we had cast our "little green ballots," as Booker T. directed us, to build our own economic infrastructure and support system. Had we done that, we too could say it does not matter who "writes the laws;" we would be true political powerbrokers.

Take reparations, in whatever form you support. What politicians in D.C. are seriously advocating for what Louis Farrakhan called, Reparatory Justice? John Conyers' bill has been languishing for decades now. The president says he does not support reparations for Black people, so where does that leave us? How about the political talking heads on TV? Are they devoting a serious amount of time talking about economic empowerment for Black people, or are they just trying to get us to vote a certain way?

Wake up, Black folks! The cost of doing business requires commitment and sacrifice. The Rothschild's were ruthless and unethical, but they knew that economics runs politics. We can build an ethical and moral economic foundation, but we have to jettison our current way of thinking and take on an economic mindset.

ty clerk and the secretary of state after a challenge by Rev. Horace Sheffield. Sheffield is Conyers's primary opponent to represent Michigan's 13th District in the U.S. Congress. The challenge was based on the grounds that the petition signatures were not collected by registered voters.

The state could appeal the ruling. But the office of Attorney General Bill

Schuette (R) said Friday afternoon that no decisions had been made yet. "We are reviewing the ruling in consultation with the secretary of state," said Joy Yearout, a spokeswoman for Schuette. First elected in 1964, Conyers was initially elected to serve in Congress in 1964. He is the second-longest-serving member of the House behind fellow Michigan Rep. John Dingell (D), who is retiring this year.





Citizens hold key to their survival

Editor's Mailbox

To the Editor;

When will the citizens of River Rouge finally realize that they hold the key to their own and their community's survival?

The first week of March will mark the end of a legend. That's when the S. B. Milton Community Center (THE CENTER) is scheduled to close its doors. You know, the building in the fourth block of Beechwood off Schafer. The building where 90 percent of the community on the West side of River Rouge grew up. I mean literally grew up.

We started out in story hour as preschoolers. Then we moved outside to the now, nonexistent wading pool. As we grew older we attended Arts & Crafts in the basement. After school we would come to the THE CENTER for game room. This included playing pool, board games and cards with other kids from the neighborhood.

We took dancing lessons, ballet, tap and modern dance and after dancing lessons, we also took karate lessons. Even though karate demands discipline and hardwork, some of us made it to the level of green and brown belts.

During the summer months we were supervised by the high school students with Koogan jobs and as time went, we became the students with those jobs. We would play box hockey, children's games, watch the guys play basketball and most of all those awesome games of four squares.

Those were the days. I'm

sure that I left out some of the activities that you participated in at THE CENTER, but I'm sure I brought back a lot of memories. Those memories that will soon be history. Memories that your children or grandchildren will never participate in. Why? ... Because we as a community are letting the doors of THE CENTER close.

Sure the city is in financial debt and had to make cuts to balance the budget, but we let that happen too. (That's another story). On January 30, 1990, the city council voted to close THE CENTER along with other buildings in 30 days. Well, the 30 days are just about over.

On February 5, 1990, my sister and I submitted a proposal to the council that would basically allow the citizens to run THE CENTER. We haven't been told of the decision yet. But we are not giving up? THE CENTER is and has been a part of us for all of our lives. But we cannot, I repeat , cannot give up. We cannot do it by ourselves. In order to operate THE CENTER we have to pay the utilities, liability insurance and have people help operate the programs. This takes time and money. You can pay now, or you can pay later. When the city is full

of children and adults with no sense of direction; don't blame anyone but yourself. It's up to you. Are you ready to pay the price?

ASK AYANA

"Spoiled Son Causes Rift in Family"



Dear Ayana, My husband and I are in a heated battle and it's turning nasty. The fight is over our son who will hopefully be graduating from high school this June. Our son is rotten to the core! I take some responsibility for this; he is our only child. My husband and I have allowed him to run our home for over 18 years. Things really changed for me in his sophomore year of high school when we realized that he would probably not graduate on time because of his failing grades. I began to get tough with my son, making him accountable for his actions and setting boundaries. In the past, he was treated like royalty. Just as we suspected, he was unable to graduate last year when he should have, but we are optimistic that he will earn his diploma next month and walk across the stage. Here's the problem: my husband has promised our son a brand new car and a job with our family business when he graduates. He made these promises without any discussion with me and with no regard for my feelings about this. When I found out, (I overheard my son brag to some friends about his new car) I was heated. I told my son that there was no way he would be getting a car, absolutely not a new one, and that he could forget about being on our payroll until he has some college under his belt. In true spoiled brat fashion, he pouted and threw a fit, threatening to join the army if my husband and I didn't at least make good on the promise to give him a job in our landscaping business- a promise that I never offered. Now both he and my husband are barely talking to me and although I feel like I'm doing what is right, I feel wrong about it. My husband has said that I should at least compromise and agree to give him a job and allow our son to save up his own money to buy a car. I believe that my husband is afraid that our son will follow through with his threat and enlist in the army; my husband served in Desert Storm. I don't think that giving him a job is the right thing to do; he has never had to earn anything is his life other than his diploma which is coming a year late! Do you think I'm being too hard on him and that offering him a job with our family business is the right thing to do?

Dear Mean Mama,

Mean or not, I think you've got the right approach, but your timing is off. I won't beat you up about how you should have been teaching your son about being responsible all the while he was growing up; I know you're probably kicking yourself about this now. It's hard to try and teach this kind of life lesson to your son because he's nearly an adult- but that doesn't mean you shouldn't give it your best try. First, you and your hubby should try not to panic about his decision to join the army. The U.S. Armed Forces have standards; they select men and women who are disciplined and that have the mental fortitude that it takes to complete dangerous missions-l'll say no more about that. Next, I don't think that your husband is totally off-base about offering up a compromise to your son; however, I think that his idea of compromise sounds a lot like your son getting his way, AGAIN. Maybe your compromise could actually be, well, a compromise. Your son definitely needs to give a little if he expects to gain it all. I'm screaming "NO" with you at the top of my lungs over the notion that your husband would even consider buying your son a new car. But he's got my ear about offering him a job, although I think that earning a job makes much more sense. Here's an idea: assuming that your son earns his diploma, perhaps you might consider offering him a part-time job after he enrolls in college and makes passing marks for first semester. After, and only after he's shown that he can keep up with his studies and still work part-time, think about assisting him in the purchase of a used car that he can afford with his earnings. Who knows what could happen if he actually had to work for something on his own?! He may find that he wants to pursue another career path and completely ditch the thought of working for mommy and daddy when he's finished with school. The goal isn't to punish him. The goal is to assist him in becoming a responsible man. If you allow him to stand on his own two feet, he'll be able to get up when he falls. We hurt our children when we teach them that they have no one to answer to and nothing to be accountable for; and that's exactly what we teach them when we treat them "like royalty". I commend you for making a stand. Set your ground rules, draw your line in the sand and waver not! Good luck to you.

Each Fantasy 5 play is only \$1. For an additional \$1 per play, EZmatch may be added to a Fantasy 5 ticket, giving players a chance to win up to \$500 instantly. Fantasy 5 players select five numbers from one to 39.

About 95 cents of every dollar spent on Lottery tickets is returned to the state in the form of contributions to the state School Aid Fund, prizes to players and commissions to retailers. In the 2013 fiscal year, the contribution to schools was \$734.3 million. Since it began in 1972, the Lottery has contributed more than \$18 billion to education in Michigan.

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

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
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
