National Guard Prepares for More Ferguson Unrest

JEFFERSON CITY, (AP) — As a grand jury weighs possible criminal charges against the police officer who fatally shot Michael Brown, Missouri's governor has again activated the National Guard in an effort to avoid more unrest in the St. Louis suburb of Ferguson. Unlike in August, when Gov. Jay Nixon asked the troops to help provide security after protests turned occasionally violent, his latest move is pre-emptive. It comes ahead of any decision -

on whether Ferguson Police Officer Darren Wilson, who is white, will be indicted for the Aug. 9 shooting death of the black 18-year-old. There also are some operational differences this time. When Nixon last declared a state of emergency, he put the Missouri State Highway Patrol in charge of a unified local police command and later activated the National Guard to provide security around the command center. Senate Passes Hopgood Legislation to Prevent Future Investments in Romulus Hazardous Waste Facility



LANSING - Senate Bill 1105, sponsored by Senator Hoon-Yung Hopgood (D-Taylor), was passed out of the Senate today. Sen. Hopgood introduced the legislation to put an end to speculative investments in a controversial hazardous waste injection well facility in Romulus. In addition to the grave environmental and health risks associated with injecting hazardous waste underground, the facility has been at the center of a failed investment scheme involving the Detroit Police and Fire Retirement System.

"Misguided investments in this dangerous project have jeopardized the financial stability of many local workers and retirees, and that's simply shameful," Sen. Hopgood said. "We must take action to prevent this type of harm from occurring in the future, and I am pleased that my colleagues in the Senate took a step in that direction today by supporting this important piece of legislation."

The Romulus facility, previously owned by Environmental Disposal Systems (EDS), began injecting hazardous waste into mile-deep disposal wells in 2006, but was shut down by the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) within the first year of operation due to above-ground leaks. The pension board of the Detroit Police and Fire Retirement System invested in the project by issuing multi-million dollar loans to the operator of the facility, but the loans were eventually defaulted on, resulting in approximately \$40 million in losses. In recent years, Environmental Geowhich is Technologies, owned by Greektown businessman Jim Papas, has received permits to resume

operations at the facility.

Senate Bill 1105 would seek to stop future investments in the failed project and protect pensioners from further harm. The bill would provide that an investment fiduciary of a large sponsored system that has invested in a hazardous waste disposal well facility would be prohibited from making additional investments in the facility and would be required to sell, redeem, divest or withdraw all investments in the facility if certain conditions occur, including: the operator of the facility files for bankruptcy, a controlling interest in the operator of the facility is sold or transferred, or if an environmental protection violation occurs at the facility.

The study will provide the Administration with the necessary information to determine next steps in its efforts to bring down auto insurance rates for Detroiters.

Mayor Duggan said the unanimous vote shows the strong commitment of his administration and the City Council to bring relief to Detroit motorists.

"The high cost of auto insurance has been one of the key reasons residents have been leaving the city for years," Mayor Duggan "City Council's said. unanimous vote today shows how committed we all are to offering Detroiters a more affordable alternative."

Secretary of State offices to close for Thanksgiving holiday



LANSING, - Secretary of State Ruth Johnson reminds residents that all branch offices and the Office of the Great Seal will be closed in observance of the Thanksgiving holiday.

All offices will be closed on Thursday, Nov. 27, Friday, Nov. 28, and SUPER!Centers will be closed on Saturday, Nov.

The Department of State mails notices to motorists 45 days before their driver's license or license plates expire to give them ample time to renew. Licenses and plates that expire on a day when state offices are closed, such as a holiday or weekend, can be renewed the following business day without penalty.

Most people renewing license plates, driver's licenses and ID cards can do business online at www.ExpressSOS.com or

by mail. Online users renewing their tabs, driver's license or ID card will find the system's 'Print 'N Go feature" beneficial. It allows them to complete their transaction, print off a receipt and carry the receipt until their tabs, license or ID card arrives in the mail. Easy to follow instructions can be found with the renewal notice. Additional services can be done online as well.

License plate tabs can also be renewed at Self-Service Stations, many of which are available around the clock. Visit the Branch Office Locator at www.michigan.gov/sos to find a Self-Service Station near you.

With the exception of holidays, offices are open Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Smaller offices may close for the lunch hour. On Wednesdays, most offices are open from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m., with those in city centers open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. **PLUS** offices SUPER!Centers are open from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Wednesdays. SUPER!Centers also provide Saturday hours from 9 a.m. to noon.

Ending the Cradle to Prison Pipeline

disempowering millions by tak-

A Black boy born in 2001 has a one in three chance of going to prison in his lifetime and a Latino boy a one in six chance of the same fate. The U.S. has the highest incarceration rate in the world: 7.1 million adult residents. One in 33 are under some form of correctional supervision, including prison, jail, probation, or parole. Michelle Alexander writes in her bestselling book The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration in the Age of Colorblindness that there are more adult African Americans under correctional control today than were enslaved in 1850, a decade before the Civil War began. In 2011, our state and federal prison population exceeded that of all European nations combined. Something's very wrong with this picture. The numbers are frightening - and there's more. That's why the Children's Defense Fund focused on this unjust crisis in one of the main plenary sessions at our national conference in Cincinnati on July 24. This epidemic of mass incarceration has created one of the most dangerous crises for the Black community since slavery and affects everyone in our nation. Black males have an imprisonment rate nearly seven times higher than White males, and Hispanic males have an imprisonment rate over twice that of White males. Mass incarceration is tearing fathers and mothers from children, and economically and politically

ing away the right to vote and ability to get a job and public benefits in some states after prison terms are served. One in nine Black, one in 28 Hispanic and one in 57 White children have an incarcerated parent. Mass incarceration has also become a powerful economic force and drain on taxpayers. Annual state spending on corrections tops \$51 billion and states spend on average two and a half times more per prisoner than per public school pupil. I think this is a very dumb investment policy. Federal spending on prisons totaled \$6.6 billion in fiscal year 2012. An added danger driving mass incarceration is the privatization of prisons for profit. The Corrections Corporation of America, the largest private prison corporation, has proposed to 48 state governors that it will operate their prison systems for 20 years with a guaranteed 90 percent occupancy rate. A majority of all those incarcerated have committed nonviolent offenses. Some young prisoners I recently visited are in prison for use or possession of marijuana. The toxic cocktail of poverty, racial disparities in child serving systems, poor education, zero tolerance school discipline policies, racial profiling, unbridled prosecutorial discretion, and racial disparities in arrests and sentencing are funneling millions of young and older poor people of color, especially males, into dead end, powerless and hopeless lives. So we are bringing an extraordinary group of experts together at our national conference to talk about how to halt the epidemic and get our nation back on course and our children into a pipeline to college and productive work. d experience about how to better ensure public safety through

prevention and early intervention and fairer law enforcement policies. They'll also examine mass incarceration as a continuing method of racial control and discrimination and recommend measures to replace the Cradle to School to Prison PipelineTM one to college and productive work. The panel will lead into an interactive town hall discussion with various speakers, including formerly incarcerated participants, to focus on how we can close off the major feeder systems fueling the Cradle to Prison Pipeline and mass incarceration and create new hope and opportunity for children in their place. It's time to reroute our children, youths, and parents from prison to college and productive work. And it's way past time to stop the uniquely American blight of mass incarceration permanently.

"Republicans have refused every effort in Congress to fix our broken immigration system despite countless opportunities. In the face of Congressional inaction, like those before him, the President must act," said Rep. John Conyers.

Spearheaded by Rep. Gutierrez and House Judiciary Subcommittee on Immigration and Border Security Ranking Member Zoe Lofgren (CA-19), Rep. Conyers and over 115 House Democrats issued a letter to President Obama urging him to exercise his power under existing law to prevent the separation of undocumented family members of U.S. citizens, lawful permeant residents, and deferred action beneficiaries. The letter also encourages the President to recognize undocumented farmworkers that face exploitation and abuse.

Last year, after substantial negotiations between a bipartisan

group of 4 Democratic and 4 Republican Senators, the Senate overwhelmingly passed legislation that would have overhauled U.S. immigration law. If enacted, the bill would establish a fair pathway to citizenship for millions of undocumented immigrants after undergoing several security measures before obtaining a green card, further secure our borders, and ensure that our nation's economic needs could be met through improved visa programs. House Republicans have repeatedly blocked progress of this critical legislation by refusing to allow a vote on the bipartisan immigration reform bill.

"At this time, it is clear to me that the only path forward on immigration policy is through Executive action. I encourage the Obama Administration to move forward with bold, Executive action because it's the right thing to do for the country," added Rep. Conyers.

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

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




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Mall Protesters Hope to "Take Back Thanksgiving"

ANN ARBOR, Two weeks from today, instead of enjoying a day off, a growing number of Michiganders will head to work in businesses that no longer close for Thanksgiving.

That has one group fighting to Take Back Thanksgiving.

Rev. Joseph Summers, vicar of the Episcopal Church of the Incarnation in Ann Arbor, is among those planning to protest outside Ann Arbor's Briarwood Mall, which recently announced it will open even earlier this Thanksgiving Day.

"I don't think people are realizing now what a toll it's taking on community life, religious life, family life, for people to no longer be able to count on having time together," he says.

In a statement, the mall's management says it is simply giving shoppers what they want, and refers to Thanksgiving as the mall's Super Bowl.

The rally takes place at 4:30 today, with similar protests planned for other Michigan malls and businesses.

Summers stresses he isn't anti-business, and he recognizes that there are many essential community workers such as doctors, nurses and police officers - who do not get the day off. But he says that's very different from a retail business choosing to eliminate a holiday.

"I think it's time for our country and our business community to wake up to how important it is to honor traditions like Thanksgiving, for the sake of the wellbeing of our country and our working people," he says.

Summers adds those who can't attend the rally can still send a message by simply not shopping on Thanksgiving.

Organizers of the rally have also sent a letter to all Michigan legislators, asking for a Thanksgiving Preservation Bill that would forbid stores from opening on the holiday

Tips will help hunters have a safe, responsible and enjoyable experience.



Michigan conservation officers offer top 10 tips for a safe hunting experience

As firearm deer hunting season approaches, Michigan's hunters are headed to the field to carry on the state's rich hunting traditions. Conservation officers with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources are offering their top tips for a safe hunting experience.

"Hunting in Michigan is a timehonored activity rich in tradition, when families and friends come together to enjoy our great outdoors," said Lt. Andrew Turner, who leads the DNR's Recreation, Safety and Enforcement Section for the Law Enforcement Division. "Making your hunt a safe and responsible experience is key to having an enjoyable and memorable time. Our officers want everyone to have a safe and responsible experience."

Turner said the top 10 safety tips for hunters to remember are:

Treat every firearm as if it is loaded.

Always point the muzzle in a safe direction.

Be certain of your target, and what's beyond it, before firing. Know the identifying features of the game you hunt. Make sure you have an adequate backstop - don't shoot at a flat, hard surface or water.

Keep your finger outside the trigger guard and off the trigger until ready to shoot.

loaded firearm. Unload a firearm before you climb a fence or tree or jump a ditch. Pull a firearm toward you by the butt, not the muzzle.

Avoid alcoholic beverages before or during hunting. Also avoid mind- or behavior-altering medicines or drugs.

All firearm deer hunters on any land during daylight hunting hours must wear a hat, cap, vest or jacket of hunter orange visible from all sides. All hunters, including archers, must comply during gun sea-

Camouflage hunter orange is legal provided 50 percent of the surface area is solid hunter orange. (Exceptions: waterfowl, crow, and wild turkey hunters, and bow hunters for deer during bow season).

Always let someone know where you are hunting and when you plan on returning. This information helps conservation officers and others locate you if you get lost.

Carry your cell phone into the woods. Remember to turn your ringer off or set your phone to vibrate rather than ring. Your cellp hone emits a signal that can help rescuers locate you when you are lost. Make sure before you leave for the woods each day that your phone is fully charged. If you have a smart phone, download a compass and flashlight app – there are many versions of these apps that are free to download in the iPhone App Store or on Google Play for Android. Also, program the DNR's Report All Poaching (RAP) Line in your phone contacts - 1-800-292-7800 - so you can alert conservation officers to any natural resources violations you witness while hunting.

"These simple, common sense tips can prevent hunting accidents and save lives," said Turner. "We encourage all Don't run, jump or climb with a sportsmen and women to follow these guidelines when enjoying the great outdoors in our

Keith Whittemore started smoking when he was a teenager serving in I the Navy, and kept up a pack-a-day habit for decades until finally quitting about two years ago.

He says reaching out to others was what finally helped make the differ-

"I really made it clear to my family, my friends, my neighbors and everybody that I associated with every day, that I needed to get some support, and that is a critical way of doing it," he relates. "It's really one of the hardest things that somebody has to go through in life, is to try to quit smoking."

According to a recent study, Michigan has one of the highest smoking rates in the nation, with more than 23 percent of adults lighting up.

The American Cancer Society has tools and resources available for those ready to kick the habit on its website, Cancer.org.

Whittemore says breaking the smoking habit meant breaking lots of other habits, as he had to clear his life of all the things he associated with cigarettes.

He says while that doesn't happen overnight, the Great American Smokeout offers a good place to

"Just try it for one day, and recognize right off the bat that it's going to be tough, and that you have to look at those trigger items that you have in your life that you pull a cigarette out for," he urges.

The American Cancer Society recommends that anyone trying to kick the smoking habit should check with his or her doctor first to discuss the options and figure out what method will work best for each individual.

Many communities, employers and health care plans also offer smoking-cessation programs and assistance.



"I see you because I can look in the mirror and see myself," Taylor said as she smiled into the capacity crowd at the Garden Theater.

And for most of the women in the audience that evening, the feeling was certainly mutual. During her 37 year stint at Essence, the icon standing before them undeniably became a bold, powerful, eloquent and stylish reflection from which they were able to envision themselves through.

In the face of a looming divorce and the trials of single motherhood, Taylor began as freelance fashion and beauty editor for Essence in 1970. She would eventually rise to the position of chief editor, and became the visionary who initiated its evolution into the leading cultural magazine for African-American women. Yet even in all of her fabulousness, Taylor spoke candidly on a previous battle with depression, and also discussed the struggles of juggling career and family life with the hustle and bustle of running a renowned publication. Nevertheless in the mist of all of the chaos-the

joys, pains and everything in between-she assessed that at last she needed to slow down long enough to discover her inner bliss-the ultimate peace within herself.

"Bliss is something that we hope, and it's within us. It's always there, but you have to be aware," Taylor said. "Pain is information. Where you're hurting is where you need to pay attention...No matter what that condition is-whether it's physical, emotional, financial, or relational, it's here to teach you something. With every breath, you have the opportunity to begin again. This is what I love most about life."

Having retired from Essence in 2008, Taylor is now focused on her National CARES Movement, an organization centered on alleviating intergenerational poverty, and transforming the prospective futures of at risk children through relationships with strong mentors. But even now, the 68 year old insists that life is all about balance. Maintaining a healthy lifestyle, stress reduction, and reserving 45 minutes for daily meditation and personal relaxation are all key to a blissful existence. And while she acknowledges that life's struggles remain inevitable, these challenges can be converted into valuable learning opportunities that will eventually strengthen us as human beings.

"Life is always trying to lead you to a better place," Taylor said. "When we're not doing well, when we're not feeling well, and when things seem like they're coming apart, I've learned that there is a question that we have to ask: 'What have you come to teach me?'

...Have a sense of gratitude for your life. No matter what you're dealing with, this is not the rough side of the mountain. The rough side was lived by those who came before us; who sacrificed in ways that we will never have to. Our challenge is to understand who we are, and to stand together for what is right."

All in all, the overall message that night was clear: Once women take the time to develop the best in themselves, only then can they become strong, productive and disciplined enough to tend to additional matters-whether it pertains to career, family or any other aspects of their busy existence. Thanks to Taylor's wise oratory, those attending "Fabulous Not Frantic" undeniably walked away with an awakened sense of empowerment, as well as a renewed understanding of the differences that they can make in the world, if only they can maintain the joy and meaning within themselves that will lead to a blissful journey through life.

Bernard Mussill was the first owner of Mussill's Sports Center. Bernard (Barney) was born on October 1, 1919 in Bower Hill, PA, the son of Anthony and Theresa Mussill and died at the age of 93. Bernard grew up in River Rouge and graduated from Our Lady of Lourdes High School where he was a standout, left-handed baseball pitcher and had the opportunity to throw in the bull pen practice with the Detroit Tigers.

He went on to attend college at Bowling Green University where he continued to play baseball from 1937 to 1940 and graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree. Barney served in the US Army during World War II in 1942-1943, attaining the rank of Sergeant, and was able to continue playing ball

during those years as well. Barney was drafted by the great Connie Mack to play ball in both minor and major leagues and played for AA and AAA minor league teams and farm clubs for the New York Yankees.

In the 1944 season, he pitched for the Philadelphia Phillies major league baseball team and was inducted into Cooperstown Hall of Fame for an article he had written in 1989; "The Evolution of the Baseball Bat."

After his professional baseball career, Barney became the owner of Mussill Sporting Goods in River Rouge for 50 years. His time in River Rouge was experienced by many people as they listened and



"Anthony is a true center fielder than can provide us with above average defense in center field with a good arm," said Tigers President, Chief Executive Officer and General Manager David Dombrowski. "He possesses above average speed and can steal bases at the major league level. He

swings the bat from the left side and we feel that he will continue to improve his offensive game.

Tigers on 11/14/14, announced the club has agreed to terms with designated hitter Victor Martinez on a four-year contract through the 2018 season. NFL Bans Adrian Peterson for Rest of the Season



*Minnesota Vikings running back Adrian Peterson has been suspended without pay for the remainder of the 2014 NFL season, the league announced Tuesday, with NFL commissioner Roger Goodell criticizing the star for his behavior and for not showing any "meaningful remorse."

Earlier this month, Peterson pled no contest to the misdemeanor charge of reckless assault of a child, but the NFL said Tuesday that he violated the league's personal conduct policy "in an incident of abusive discipline that he inflicted on his four year-old-son."

Goodell also directed Peterson to meet with a psychologist and complete a counseling, treatment and community service program. The timing of his reinstatement to the league, which won't be considered before April 15, will be based on the results of that program and his commitment to change, Goodell said in a letter to Peterson Tuesday.

"You must commit yourself to your counseling and rehabilitative effort, properly care for your children, and have no further violations of law or league policy," he wrote.

Goodell wrote that Peterson's punishment is consistent with his modifications to the NFL's personal conduct policy on Aug. 28, saying there were aggravating circumstances that warrant further discipline than the baseline sixgame suspension.

"First, the injury was inflicted on a child who was only four years old. The difference in size and strength between you and the child is significant, and your actions clearly caused physical injury to the child," Goodell wrote. "While an adult may have a number of options when confronted with abuse - to flee, to fight back, or to seek help from law enforcement - none of those options is realistically available to a four-year old child. Further, the injury inflicted on your son includes the emotional and psychological trauma to a young child who suffers criminal physical abuse at the hands of his father. Second, the repetitive use of a switch in this instance is the functional equivalent of a weapon, particularly in the hands of someone with the strength of an accomplished professional athlete. Third, you have shown no meaningful remorse for your conduct. When indicted, you acknowledged what

you did but said that you would not 'eliminate whooping my kids' and defended your conduct in numerous published text messages to the child's mother. You also said that you felt 'very confident with my actions because I know my intent.' These comments raise the serious concern that you do not fully appreciate the seriousness of your conduct, or even worse, that you may feel free to engage in similar conduct in the future."


Peterson was indicted in September on a felony charge of injury to a child for using a wooden switch to discipline his four-year-old son earlier this year. Peterson said he never intended to hurt him and was disciplining him in the same way he had been as a child. He was put on paid leave from the Vikings while he dealt with his legal problems.

The NFL had been working with Peterson and the NFL Players Association to review his conduct in the days after the Vikings running back struck a plea deal.

Peterson has three days to appeal the league's decision. If he appeals, he'll remain on the NFL's exempt list and will continue to be paid pending a decision.

"It is imperative that you to avoid any incident of this kind in the future," Goodell wrote to Peterson. "Any further violation of the Personal Conduct Policy will result in additional discipline and may subject you to banishment from the NEI."

With US Steel and DTE's Later that day, the group took a drive coal plant located in the region, locals residing in these neighborhoods are situated alongside the largest industrial operations in Michigan. Additionally, studies have linked major health problems to Ambassador Bridge border crossings, where 10,000 diesel engine trucks sit idly every day. All of these factors contribute to 48217 being ranked as the highest polluted zip code in the state.

To get more information about these matters, the group stopped by the Telegram offices to speak directly with Publisher Gina Steward about the newspapers coverage of environmental justice issues dating back to the 1940's, as well as her own personal experiences in the community. Steward, an alumnus of River Rouge High School, explained that while she grew up in the neighborhood, the lasting health concerns posed by these issues were never made clear until years later. For Steve Furay, a participating Detroit River Institute journalist and writer for the Michigan Citizen, this interaction demonstrated how entities like the Telegram are crucial in distributing information about these kinds of Detroit River Institute unquestionably issues to citizens in the community.

"I saw a really engaged community newspaper that has done great longstanding work in promoting really good positive views for the area," Furay said. and you can really get that out in a region as a local native. community news setting, so I was re-

around local neighborhoods led by Rhonda Anderson, an environmental justice organizer with the Michigan Sierra Club. The objective was for participants to get a sense of just how close in proximity these residential neighborhoods are to industrial facilities in the area. In addition, journalists were granted the opportunity to mingle with citizens who have experienced issues with asthma and other health related concerns as a result of high level air toxicity in these communities.

"The purpose was to see these issues firsthand," Anderson explained. "They were able to speak to residents about whatever the impact is and get their own stories, which will hopefully promote the idea of reporting on these issues more often in their various publications."

During the rest of their voyage, journalists were able to team up with the Detroit Riverkeeper to venture out on the river, and also experienced a daylong bicycle style tour of urban agriculture, which included Eastern Market and community urban farms. Overall, the provided an enlightening experience on environmental concerns in the area for all of the participating journalists. But for Steve Furay, it was particularly extraordinary because even in the midst of ecological issues, he was still able to "...People have fascinating histories, develop a deeper appreciation for the

CITY OF INKSTER TRANSITION TO MONTHLY WATER & SEWER **BILLING**

In response to the request of Inkster customers, the City of Inkster will begin billing monthly for water and sewer usage effective January 1, 2015. Customers will no longer be billed on a quarterly basis. This change will assist customers in managing their water and sewer bills more efficiently and assist our customers in tracking water usage and detecting leaks earlier which could result in saving money.

Why is the City switching to monthly billing?

Monthly billing makes it easier for customers, especially those on a fixed income, to manage their monthly household finances and budget more efficiently. It also provides customers with more frequent and timely information about their water usage. This allows customers to track their usage, reduce consumption and detect leaks in their household plumbing sooner. Detecting leaks and reducing consumption saves water and money.

What are the benefits of monthly billing?

It allows customers to budget more efficiently.

It is easier for customers, especially those on a fixed income, to manage their monthly household finances.

It provides customers with more frequent and timely information about their water usage. It allows customers to adjust month-to-month consumption, especially during summer months, which can save money.

It allows customers to detect leaks more timely, thus allowing for prompt repairs and reducing the potential of a high water bill as a result of the leak. (Customers are responsible for repairing household leaks).

How often will my meter be read?

Meters will be read on a monthly basis and will be billed monthly based on consumption.

Will my water bill look different?

No changes will be made to the water bill. The bills will contain water and sewer charges for one month of usage verses quarterly usage.

During the transition, will I be billed more than once for the same water and/or sewage consumption?

Customers will not be billed more than once for water or sewer services. Each bill will cover a different usage period.

Where or how can I pay my monthly bill?

Payments may be made as follows:

In order to expedite bill payments and to avoid past due notices and accrual of penalties, please allow five (5) days for your payment to be received timely. Bills should be mailed to the following address:

What is the timeline for the monthly billing?

We anticipate a smooth transition from quarterly billing of water and sewer to monthly billing. Below is a timeline describing when you can expect to receive your bill and for what usage period as the transition is made.

Drug Raid at Inkster Home Incites Gun Battle and Several Arrests

INKSTER – Earlier this month, a drug raid in Inkster went awry after gunfight ensued between law enforcement officials and residents occupying the prop-

At approximately 8:30 pm on November 5th, Westland Police arrived at a home on Colgate Street, located near the Inkster-Dearborn Heights border. Upon approaching the property to execute a narcotics search warrant, officers were met with gunfire from an AK-47 discharged from inside the residence. Officers returned fire, retreated and maintained a

perimeter around the home with assistance from Michigan State Police. Eventually all occupants were removed and taken into custody. No injuries were reported.

The raid was conducted in response to an initial investigation originating in the Westland area, which eventually led the municipality's narcotics division to this particular home in Inkster.

"It's a common trend in law enforcement...we have a narcotics unit that executes search warrants on different

communities, including our own," Westland Police Chief Jeff Jedrusik said. "If we have narcotics coming into our city, what we want to do is battle that, so sometimes investigations do lead us outside of our city borders. In the end, proactively enforcing these state narcotic crimes helps to reduce drug activity in our city as well." Chief Jedrusik explained that the incident is still part of an ongoing investigation. A total of 11 people were arrested in the incident, some of which have been released pending further examination of the matter.

the St. Louis County Police Department would be in charge of security in Ferguson and would work with the Highway Patrol and St. Louis city police as part of a unified command to "protect civil rights and ensure public safety" in other jurisdictions. "My hope and expectation is that peace will prevail," Nixon said Monday. "But we have a responsibility — I have a responsibility — to plan for any contingencies that might arise." There is no specific date for a grand jury decision to be re-

vealed, and Nixon gave no indication that an announcement is imminent. But St. Louis County prosecutor Bob McCulloch has said that he expects the grand jury to reach a decision in mid-to-late November. The U.S. Justice Department, which is conducting a separate investigation, has not said when its work will be completed. It's looking into potential civil rights violations in Wilson's actions and the police department's overall practices, including whether officers used excessive force and engaged in discriminatory practices. The governor did not indicate how many National Guard troops would be mobilized, instead leaving it to the state adjutant general to determine. Nixon said the National Guard would be available to carry out any requests made through the Highway Patrol to "protect life and property" and support local authorities. If the Guard is able to provide security at police and fire stations, then more police officers may be freed up to patrol the community, Nixon said. St. Louis Mayor Francis Slay said Monday that he supports Nixon's decision to activate the Guard. He said the Guard "will be used in a secondary role" and could potentially be stationed at places such as shopping centers and government buildings. "The

way we view this, the Guard is not going to be confronting the protesters and will not be on (the) front line interacting directly with demonstrators," Slay said. On the day of the shooting, Wilson had spotted Brown and a friend walking in the middle of a street and told them to move to the side, but they did not. According to a St. Louis Post-Dispatch report based on sources the newspaper did not identify, Wilson has told authorities he then realized Brown matched the description of a suspect in a theft minutes earlier at a convenience store. Wilson backed up his police vehicle and some sort of confrontation occurred before Brown was fatally shot. He was unarmed and some witnesses have said he had his hands up when he was killed. Brown's shooting stirred longsimmering racial tensions in Ferguson, where two-thirds of the residents are black but the police force is almost entirely white. Rioting and looting a day after the shooting led police to respond to subsequent protests with a heavily armored presence that was widely criticized for continuing to escalate tensions. At times, protesters lobbed rocks and Molotov cocktails at police, who fired tear gas, smoke canisters and rubber bullets in an attempt to disperse crowds. -

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


Jaden and Willow Smith Tag Team for Weird Joint Interview
