Majority of Detroit leaders not seeking re-election

DETROIT – A visibly frustrated Detroit Mayor Dave Bing announced Tuesday that he won't seek a second term and ripped Michigan officials for not giving him enough time to solve the financially strapped city's problems on his own.

His announcement came just seven weeks after the city's checkbook was handed over to an emergency manager, making it the largest U.S. city placed under state oversight. Detroit has a budget deficit approaching \$380 million and long-term debt over \$14 billion. The city could run out of



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cash before the end of the year, and bankruptcy hasn't been ruled out.

Known for his cool as a former NBA basketball player, Bing spoke in a measured tone during a news conference where he announced he'll step down after his term ends in December. He spent the first 15 minutes touting his own accomplishments while blasting Gov. Rick Snyder and other Michigan officials for failing to cooperate with city leaders on a solution.

"Change takes time and hard work," Bing told supporters at the Charles H. Wright Museum of African American History. "However, when Gov. Snyder didn't feel progress was occurring fast enough, he made the decision to appoint an emergency manager with the power to immediately fix some of the city's longstand-

ing financial problems."

The roles of the mayor and the elected City Council were reduced after Snyder appointed Washington-based bankruptcy attorney Kevyn Orr in March as emergency manager. Orr has final say on all the city's financial matters.

Although Bing long resisted the appointment of an emergency manager, he decided not to pursue a lawsuit to block it and referred to the arrangement as a "partnership" after Orr was appointed. He didn't directly criticize Orr on Tuesday either, pointing out that some of Orr's findings about the city's situation were similar to his own.

In a statement Tuesday, Orr commended Bing on his service to Detroit.



Michigan's drunk driving standard remain the same



LANSING. - Gov. Rick Snyder today signed into law a pair of public safety bills that will maintain Michigan's current drunk driving standards and sentencing guidelines.

"These are important bills that will help maintain the health and safety of drivers, passengers and pedestrians in our state," Snyder said. "They send a clear message that Michigan is serious about stopping drinking and driving and supporting the ongoing efforts of law enforcement and the courts to protect public safety."

HB 4093, sponsored by state Rep. Andrea LaFontaine, maintains the existing drunk driving standard of 0.08 percent blood alcohol content (BAC) until Oct. 1, 2018. That BAC standard was scheduled

Romulus Mayor Lambert will not seek re-election



ROMULUS – After serving the City of Romulus for 33 years in various capacities, Romulus Mayor Alan Lambert announced he will not seek a fourth term as the top elected officer in the city.

"After working for the community that I love for the past three decades, it's with a heavy heart that I announce I will retire at the end of my term," Mayor Lambert said. "After talking with my family, saying many prayers and giving the decision deep thought, I have decided to retire and not seek a fourth term. After 33 years of service, it's time for me to spend more quality time with my family."

May 14 is the deadline to file petitions to seek elected office in Romulus and most communities in Michigan. A city primary election would take place on August 6. A General Election is scheduled for November 5.

Mayor Lambert has dedicated his entire life to improving his community, dating back to childhood when he distributed literature for favored causes. His distinguished career in public service began in 1981, when he was the youngest person ever elected to serve on the Romulus City Council. He served for seven years as a Romulus councilman, leaving only when he qualified as a police officer.

From 1988 to 2001, Mayor Lambert proudly served as a Romulus police officer. His many achievements while with the Police Department include two years as an instructor in G.R.E.A.T. (Gang Resistance Education and Training), a program designed to help students resist drugs, peer pressure and gang activity. For three years, Officer Lambert also served as police liaison to Community High and Romulus Middle School. Officer Lambert truly enjoyed his duties of interacting with the students as both a counselor and a mentor.

From 1998 to 2001, Mayor Lambert was elected and served on the Romulus Board of Education, serving as trustee and then president of the Romulus Community School Board. Quality education and recreation for children have remained among his priorities.

Lambert was elected Mayor of Romulus in the fall of 2001 and is serving his 12th year as Mayor. Since his election, one of Mayor Lambert's top priorities has been economic renewal for the city. Under his leadership, many new businesses and neighborhood developments have been brought to Romulus, creating jobs and opportunities for residents and

visitors. Business and industry continue to locate in Romulus, ranging from new fast food restaurants, like Taco Bell, to large firms such as Lee Steel and Detroit Thermal Systems (DTS) that will provide hundreds of jobs to our community.

The Mayor said his administration has faced many challenges head on. He is proud of the fact that the city has had a balanced budget in each of his 12 years as Mayor and, in fact, has a modest surplus in the current fiscal year while some communities struggle to avoid financial ruin — all while keeping the city's modest levy one of the lowest in Michigan.

The Mayor established his priorities early in his career in public office, placing emphasis on quality public safety, city infrastructure and services. As Mayor, he prided himself on hiring talented individuals to lead departments and assist him "to do the work of the people."

Programs such as the Mayor's "Operation Fresh Look" saw the demolition of more than 350 unsafe, unsound and abandoned structures throughout the city. The program also employs a host of new beautification projects and stringent ordinance enforcement.

New-and-improved city facilities also mark Mayor Lambert's 12 years in office. His dream of a state-of-the-art athletic center came true with the design and construction of the Romulus Athletic Center, considered to be the premier facility in the State of Michigan. The RAC has about 10,000 members that pay dues to operate the facility, which does not rely on residential taxpayers' dollars.

Another dream was the new Romulus Senior Center which was created to serve the city's older residents. "I have enjoyed participating in many events and programs in this new building and love spending time with our seniors" said Mayor Lambert. "I have so much love and respect for our seniors and they deserved this beautiful new facility." We are very happy that it will be paid off 2014, using federal Community Development Block Grant funding to pay the debt.

A new Animal Shelter, supported by Councilman William Wadsworth and an army of volunteers, came to fruition during the Lambert years. The city's public library expanded to the point where it's now open more hours per week than any time in city history. Improvements in the Romulus Historical Park area, signage and other decorative improvements in the Downtown area and the Romulus Farmers Market all took place during the Lambert years as Mayor. All of these projects have improved the quality of life for Romulus residents with no increases in taxes.

The Mayor was honored to reunite with his old band mates and performed with them and family members for several years at the Pumpkin Festival until the unexpected passing of his best friend and outstanding guitarist Bob "Luke" Sweet. Romulus has become a city for all seasons with such events as the annual

Christmas tree lighting, singalong and Santa visit, the Winter Frost and – scheduled to return this summer – summertime fireworks.

Like the fireworks, some of the best projects are on the horizon. The Mayor said continued road improvements Goddard Road in the Downtown area), upgrades in the sanitary sewer system and new sidewalks along major roadway (such as Wayne Road) are in the works as the leadership of the Department of Public Works seeks and secures federal aid and creates partnerships to make the infrastructure advancements. A study is under way to create new police and district court facilities. Also, Mayor Lambert is very excited to once again see new homes under construction all around our

Mayor Lambert said he is proud that his administrative team instituted long-time fiscal planning, prudent management and crucial decision making on a daily basis. He said it is mandatory to have the right administration in place to find ways to stretch taxpayers' dollars make tough decisions and keep Romulus moving forward. During some of our nation's worst economic times, Mayor Lambert has proven to be a strong leader, making some of the toughest decisions ever faced by our community. While other communities have been taken over by **Emergency Financial Managers** and are still laying off employees, Mayor Lambert has worked diligently to be able to bring back to work every Police and Fire department and DPW employee that had been laid off.

As Mayor, Lambert said he has enjoyed contributing to and supporting so many organizations, from Little League baseball to Boy Scouts to many school events and church organizations and Senior Citizen parties and programs – all of which are vital to make a community, he said.

"While I am proud of our achievements, I have been fortunate to work with some outstanding individuals on a daily basis," Mayor Lambert said. "I have been blessed by the support of Romulus voters since Day One and I can't thank them enough for providing me the honor to guide our wonderful city. I'll still be around and remain active in the community I love. I will always feel that Romulus is a great place to live. work and raise a family." On a personal level, Mayor Lambert is married to Diane Banks Lambert, whose family also has a long and rich history of public service in Romulus. Mayor and Mrs. Lambert are the parents of seven children and the proud grandparents of eight wonderful grandchildren. Their family has a long history of involvement in Romulus and family members continue to be involved, contributing to the community and its activities. It's those family ties that helped make Mayor Lambert's decision to retire at the end of his current term.

Mayor Lambert also urged residents to research the candidates on the upcoming ballots and then exercise their vote, calling the election "important to our city's future"

Michigan Municipal League Fund Announces Loss Control Achievement Awards



LANSING, Michigan – Twenty-six Michigan communities have earned statewide honors for their outstanding efforts in maintaining safe work environments.

The Michigan Municipal League Workers' Compensation Fund (mml.org/insurance) has issued its annual Loss Control Achievement Awards for 2012-2013 to the communities listed below. The certificates were mailed to community winners Thursday, April 25.

"These awards represent the best of the best when it comes to communities being safe places for their employees and citizens," said Michael Forster, director of risk management services for the Michigan Municipal League. "The awards reflect excellent management and an understanding that making safety a priority clearly pro-

tects their staffs, residents and budgets."

The awards are based on a community's Experience Modification Factor (EMF) rating, using a formula measuring the frequency and severity of employee injuries over a 3 1/2-year time period. The average EMF is 1.00. Any fund member with an EMF under 1.00 saves significant premium dollars.

Thirteen cities were classified in the "Lowest EMF" 2012-2013 Award Winners and thirteen cities were classified in the "Most Improved EMF" 2013-2013 Award Winners" About the MMLWCF: The Michigan Municipal League Workers' Compensation Fund started in 1977 with five members and has grown to a current participation of 862 public entities. Assets exceed \$137 million.

About the League: The Michigan Municipal League advocates on behalf of its member communities in Lansing, Washington D.C., and the courts; provides educational opportunities for elected and appointed municipal officials; and assists municipal leaders in administering services to their communities through League programs and services

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Cleveland's Charles Ramsey: Hood or Hero?


When some of us saw the first video of Charles Ramsey, the colorful Black dishwasher in Cleveland who is being celebrated as a hero for rescuing three White women captives from horrid conditions in a Cleveland house, we had a flashback to Antoine Dodson, who became a flamboyant Internet sensation after saving his sister from a would-be rapist in their Huntsville, Ala. housing apartment, and Sweet Brown, who barely escaped a fire in her Oklahoma City complex.

But more than any other famous "hilarious Black neighbor" Internet sensation, the coverage of Ramsey – and his criminal past – raises serious questions about how we treat a hero with a troubled past and, yes, how Blacks and Whites look at the same event through different prisms of race.

First, as they say in TV news, let's go to the videotape.

"I've been here a year," Ramsey said in an interview with WEWS, a local television station. Referring to Ariel Castro, the suspect arrested for holding the women against their will, Ramsey said, "You see where I'm coming from? I barbeque with this dude. We eat ribs and whatnot and listen to salsa music...

"He just comes out in his backyard, plays with the dogs, tinkers with his cars and motorcycles, goes back in the house. So he's somebody you look, then look away. He's not doing anything but the average stuff. You see what I'm saying? There's nothing exciting about him. Well, until today."



Ramsey explained that Castro "got some big testicles to pull this off, bro."

He added, "I knew something was wrong when a little, pretty White girl ran into a Black man's arms. Something wrong here. Dead giveaway."

There was plenty wrong, as Ramsey learned when he put down his McDonald's Big Mac and answered a call for help from Amanda Berry, who had been last seen in 2002 on the eve of her 17th birthday. The two other women were Georgina "Gina" DeJesus, who had been missing since 2004 at the age of 14, and Michelle Knight, who disappeared in 2002 at the age of 21

While being hailed as a hero, Ramsey was the object of both racism and ridicule.

Though we're reluctant to publicly admit it, some African-Americans cringed at the sight of Ramsey. His hair, curled in the back like Al Sharpton's do and as slick as Chuck Berry's, is interspersed with what we once called post office hair — each nap has its own route. This is one of the few cases where a person's mug shot looks better than his real life photo.

To put this in context, think back to when Black civil rights protesters dressed up in their Sunday's best, knowing they were going to get physically assaulted by police and White supremacists. Then, as now, image matters. Especially when one of us appears on TV. Still, there are plenty of people in our community who look like Ramsey and their speech and appearance make them no less valuable than the best dressed and most articulate among us.

Some have suggested than many Whites take delight in seeing Blacks caricatured in the image of Charles Ramsey and Antoine Dodson.

"Perhaps it's time for the world's meme artists to stop assuming that any black dude getting interviewed on local news about a crime he helped to foil can be reduced to some catch-phrase or in-joke," Miles Klee wrote on Blackbookmag.com. "It's just baffling that we're trying to find a way to laugh about what is, in itself, a harrowing turn of events."

Most of us knew, or at least suspected deep down, that something about Ramsey's past would surface, causing further embarrassment.

The Smoking Gun website disclosed on May 8 that Ramsey "is a convicted felon whose rap sheet includes three separate domestic violence convictions that resulted in prison terms."

Blacks instantly asked: Why is something that happened a decade ago – and had nothing to do with Ramsey's heroism – relevant today? Cleveland's WEWS-TV, facing a backlash from viewers, apologized for reporting on Ramsey's criminal past.

"While the story was factually sound, the timing of it and publication of such information was not in good taste, and we regret it," the station said on its Facebook page.

Normally, I would agree that Ramsey's criminal past, certainly in this situation, should be irrelevant. But there's nothing normal about this case.

But the reporting should not end there. Ramsey's exwife, since remarried, said Ramsey eventually apologized for battering her and they now interact on "an okay basis."

In addition, she posted two earlier photos of Ramsey on her Facebook page. She told the Smoking Gun, "For my daughter's sake I show he didn't always look hood."

There will be a mega book signing book release celebration and sale on June 8, 2013 in Tennessee. The book will be widely available

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
at bookstores everywhere or you can purchase directly from one of the writers.

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






Romulus High National Honor Society Inducts New Members

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MDOT promotes safety during **National Bike Month**

Fast Facts: - May is National Bike Month; May 13-17 is Bike to Work Week. - There were 1.970 reported crashes involving bicyclists Michigan in 2012, resulting in 1,598 injuries and 20 fatalities. - Fatal crashes involving bicyclists remains disproportionately high compared to other crash types.

May is National Bike Month, and the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) reminds motorists to be aware of bicyclists on Michigan

roads. In 2012, there were 1,970 reported crashes involving bicyclists Michigan resulting in 1,598 injuries and 20 fatalities. MDOT savs that while the number of fatalities is down 17 percent (there were 24 fatalities in 2011), fatal crashes involving bicyclists remains disproportionately high compared to other roadway users or crash types.

"While this data suggests some improvement, drivers must remain focused at all times when they get behind the wheel and share the said road," State Transportation Director Kirk T. Steudle. "These crashes are avoidable. Drivers should always be alert and pass slower moving traffic, including bicyclists, from a safe distance." In addition to May being National Bike Month, Bike to Work Week is May 13-17, with Friday, May 17, designated as Bike to Work Day. "We join other transportation agencies to raise awareness and promote our safety message: 'Give 'em Space, Make it Safe, Please Share the Road," said Steudle.

to go up to 0.10 percent in October. It also would maintain a 0.04 BAC standard for drivers of commercial vehicles and a "zero tolerance" standard of 0.02 BAC for those under the age of 21.

HB 4131, sponsored by state Rep. Klint Kesto, maintains the existing sentencing guidelines in place for those convicted of exceeding the state's BAC limits.

ESTABLISHED 1944

"This legislation helps save lives - research has proven strict drunk driving laws help reduce alcohol-related fatal crashes by nearly 90 percent," said Col. Kriste Kibbey Etue, director of the Michigan State Police. "Keeping the legal BAC level at .08 forces people to think twice before getting behind the wheel after having too much to drink and keeps Michigan consistent with drunk driving enforcement in all 50 states."

In addition to protecting the public safety, the governor also said the new laws keep Michigan in compliance with federal drunk driving standards and eligible for federal transportation funding.

HB 4093 and HB 4131 are now Public Acts 23 and 24 of 2013.

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
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Making A New Start The Easy Way

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The Affordable Care Act – How will it change Dental Coverage for kids?

Editor's Note: The Affordable Care Act will make pediatric dental care more accessible than ever before, but many children's advocates are concerned about the affordability of coverage and the availability of providers. New America Media spoke with Joe Touschner, a Senior Health

Policy Analyst at the Center for Children and Families of the Georgetown University Health Policy Institute, about what changes families can expect.

Generally speaking, how will the Affordable Care Act change families' access to dental coverage for their children?

For a lot of families, the ACA won't change their coverage directly. If a family gets its dental coverage through a large employer, that will continue, or if the child is covered by a public program like Medicaid, that will remain similar. Where the ACA will improve coverage, though, is in places where it was previously harder to obtain children's dental care, such as in the individual market and in small group insurance. The ACA guarantees that there will be dental coverage available for purchase, either together with other benefits or through stand-alone plans. It has made children's dental coverage part of what are called "Essential Health



Rouge Panthers receive Muscle Milk Grant

The River Rouge Football program has \$10,000 to invest in their student athletes. On Friday, May 10, 2013, CytoSports, maker of Muscle Milk presented Head Coach Corey Parker and the football program with the ceremonial 'Big Check'. River Rouge was one of 22 schools across the nation that received the funds.

The River Rouge football players gathered in the LGI room showing pride in their program wearing their football jerseys. Coach Parker explained that they had applied for the grant because the football program had grown substantially and he didn't want to turn any player away because they didn't have enough equipment for them to use. He said, "Our players had to share equipment between the Middle School, Junior Varsity and High School players. But they didn't complain. We worked it out, because that is what men do." Even with sharing equipment, all three teams had a stellar season. Each team only lost one game.

To apply for the grant, each team had to submit an essay and video explaining why they need additional money for their program. The video which can be viewed on YouTube at (http://www.youtube.com/watc h?v=rhOYUhb1bJg).

Coach Parker showed the video that morning during the presentation of the check. It showed the small lockers that will not hold football equipment. Parker said, "River Rouge is known as a basketball town and the lockers were designed for basketball players not to hold football gear." The football equipment is kept at the bottom of the stairwell by the weight room during the day. It wasn't said whether some of the money will be used to fix this situation, but the funds will be used in many positive ways.

Jerry Gaines, Brand Marketing Manager from CytoSport, said, "River Rouge High School represents everything that the grant is supposed to. RRHS is one of the first schools that we followed from practice to games. You guys brought it every single game and every single practice. The great thing about this grant is that we try to level the playing field, to give you guys what you need, what you earned and what you deserve to have whatever you need to make your school on par with other programs. I couldn't image a better school, better organization, a better team to receive the Muscle Milk Recovery Grant."

Coach Parker said the grant they were able to make sure each player in the program have their own equipment. They have a new practice sled, like the one that the Detroit Lions use. They also had the helmets reconditioned and were able to purchase additional helmets.

State Champs Sports Network has followed the Panthers throughout the season and was on site video taping the ceremony. The program will be aired on Sunday at 12Noon on CW50.

The city was once home to sports greats like Hank Aaron, Marcus Fizer, Tyrone Wheatley, Olympic Bronze Medalist Earl Jones and many more. It's also home to hit music makers like the Marveletts. Redd Foxx and Malcolm X roomed together in Inkster as young men.

The city of Inkster was first populated by Native Americans. The first non-indigenous settlers came in 1825. The city has since become the tenth most dangerous city in the country.

Shocking, how could a city of only six square miles earn such status? Inkster has gone the way of so many minority populated cities in this country. It has suffered shrinking businesses, joblessness, the migration of its brightest and best children, but most of all declining schools and what seems like a lack of interest in the children. All of the above have culminated into what we have today, the infamous title of the tenth most dangerous city in the country.



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Dr. Dre, Jimmy Iovine Donate \$70M to Launch USC Academy




Rap mogul Andre "Dr. Dre" Young and music industry veteran Jimmy lovine have donated a combined \$70 million to create a new institute at the University of Southern California, the school announced Tuesday night.

The huge gift from the two who have been music business partners in the past will be used to create the Jimmy lovine and Andre Young Academy for Arts, Technology and the Business of Innovation, reports Billboard.

The academy will provide a special four-year program for undergraduates whose interests span several fields from marketing to computer science to visual design and other arts. It will include one-on-one faculty mentoring with professors from programs around the university and interaction with entertainment industry luminaries.

"The vision and generosity of Jimmy Iovine and Andre Young will profoundly influence the way all of us perceive and experience artistic media," USC President C. L. Max Nikias said in a statement. "We are committed to encouraging our students to use their intellectual and creative resources to effect change in all segments of society. Our goal is to ensure that the academy is the most collaborative educational program in the world."

The academy will accept its first class of 25 students in the fall of 2014.


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

Benefits," which are categories that have to be covered by individual and small group plans. Pediatric dental care has to be included as part of that coverage.

Will families who have insurance that does not cover pediatric dental care be required to purchase dental coverage for their children?

At the federal level there is no requirement in the exchange, but some people are concerned about this being established as a state requirement, and there are states that are considering it, including California. It would be up to the state to require families to purchase a stand-alone plan if their current insurance doesn't offer it.

Are there concerns about stand-alone plans being affordable?

There are some concerns, but first I would say that if a family does not have pediatric dental care as part of its existing plan, the fact that there are stand-alone plans offered through the state exchanges will be helpful ... There are many plans right now that have a very low limit for what they'll cover, but because pediatric dental care is now a part of the Essential Health Benefits, that coverage has to be more comprehensive, and the ACA is eliminating those annual and lifetime limits. As a result, though, the monthly premium may end up being higher for some families. Affordability will be a challenge - it's going to be important for the state exchanges to keep affordability in mind.

Could you briefly explain health insurance exchanges?

Every state will have an exchange ... It's basically a set of rules aimed at improving competition among health plans, to get them to compete to offer quality coverage for a low cost. Not all plans will be able to sell on the exchange; plans will have to compete to get there, and will have to offer lower costs while still providing for the Essential Health Benefits. exchanges are also going to be the place where people can get federal subsidies; the ACA will pay part of your premium for you on the exchange if your income is at or below 400 percent of the poverty level, and you don't have access to insurance through your job. The tax credits will help people afford the coverage, and this ensures that there's business for the health plans to compete for.

One of the recommendations

that's been made by advocacy organizations with regard to serving rural and lowincome communities is to increase the number of dental health professionals by training professionals who work under the supervision of dentists, comparable to nurse practitioners. But American Dental Association sued a group in Alaska (the Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium) that provided for the training of dental therapists who would work in rural communities and tried to block them from practicing. Is there a concern about the ADA pushing back if steps like this are taken to increase the availability of care?

The idea of dental practitioners is something that several states have been interested in Minnesota in addition to Alaska. There is certainly opposition, but we need to focus on the needs of kids. If we're seeing that kids have low access to dental services, having new kinds of providers is something that we need to look at. We need to look at the services that need to be provided and the providers that are available. If the services are not available, finding providers who can perform services at a lower cost may be the way we have to go.

What do you see for the future of dental care for kids?

I think that the ACA has taken a great step forward in making pediatric dental care part of the Essential Health Benefits. We're getting to a place where dental care is seen as integral to every kid's health ... Having access to dental care is now being seen as just as important as having access to a doctor, and just as necessary - which is a good thing. It's going to take changes to current dental practices - for example, the training of other kinds of practitioners - to create more access.

Is there any hope for this kind of access being extended to adults?

For adults, the future is a little more uncertain. When Congress passed the ACA, it made a choice to include dental care for kids and not for adults. We may have a ways to go as far as seeing dental care as an integral part of medical care for everyone. Maybe down the line we could think about adding care for adults, but it's hard to see that happening anytime soon.

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
